# The Eagle's Aer

By The Editor

W. B. Summy reached his 80th birthday last Sunday. I regard it as a privilege to write about Summy in this column this week. I have known him for only a relatively short time—which is my bad fortune—but in that time I never once have heard him speak other than good of any person. I have tried to find people who ever heard Summy speak ill of any man I could find no such people.

So far as I have been able to observe and hear, W. B. Summy has lived by the Golden Rule—what most people know about, but ignore. If enough people would "do unto others as you would have them do unto you," this would be a wonderful world, instead of the unhappy one in which we find ourselves. In both his personal life and in long years of public service, W. B. Summy has set some examples the others well might follow.

Knowing that Mr. Summy's birthday, 80th, was coming up for last Sunday, I tried several times to talk with him about him. But I never got to first base in the Sheriff's office, quiet and efficiently, he always was a great help to me except on a topic of W. B. Summy. When I have learned about him and what I write here, I had to learn elsewhere.

I realize the much of what I write here is known to many persons, but for the sake of readers who do not know all of the story, here are some of the facts about W. B. Summy. A son of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Summy, he was born in Cherokee County. With his parents, he moved to Mullin at about the turn of the century, when he was about 18. Previously, his father had been County and District Clerk in Blanco County in the 1880's.

One of Mr. Summy's sons, Mills County Clerk W. E. Summy, has among his prized possessions the deed which certified W. P. Summy's office in Blanco County in 1888. Earl Summy, incidentally, has a number of such certificates. There is one, dated 1915, certifying the Mills county clerkship of his Dad, W. B. Another certifies Mrs. Earl Summy, the former Mina Stee, as Mills County Clerk in 1916. She had been appointed to the post when Earl went to military service in 1943 and she was elected in her own right in 1945. She did not run against Earl when he was elected again in 1947 to the post he continues to hold.

Some of the high spots in the life of W. B. Summy include work with his father's stores that were owned and operated by the late W. P. Summy in Johnson City. He also worked with his father in Mullin. Mr. Summy was married to Addie Sanders, a native of Mississippi, who moved to Mullin with her family when she was a child.

Their children, in addition to County Clerk Earl Summy, are Walter "Jake" Summy, who is maintenance chief herabouts for the Texas Highway Department; Weldon Summy, who can be found at Barnes & McCullough's in Goldthwaite; Raymond Summy, who always is cheerful at "Little's since 1938"; Miss Lillian Summy of Aco, Mrs. Addie Mae Fowler of Fort Bragg, North Carolina; and

Miss Nina Summy of City. Mr. W. B. Summy's public life has included many years in the office of the County Clerk, where he was a Clerk before he became Clerk. In the office of the Sheriff-Assessor-Collector. It was those posts that he enjoyed himself to so many of his citizens. In the office of County Clerk, as well as Sheriff's office, there are all thousands of page records in the fine handwriting with painstaking care by W. B. Summy. So long as are records in the Mills County Court House, those who into them will admire Mr. Summy's work.

I have sketched here very little about W. B. Summy. But the story could go on indefinitely. He was County Clerk in 1912, when the County burned. He played a large part in planning and designing the present Court House, into which he moved as a public servant in 1913. It is thanks to planning, based on expectation that the County Clerk's office of the present has its working quarters.

You could go to Marshall or to any one of several other men in Mills County hear only good words of W. B. Summy. His birthday Sunday was observed very lively. It was followed by a "virus X." At last, fortunately, Mr. Summy did go home. Although his birthday was on the last day of the year, the editor and staff of the Eagle take the opportunity to wish him happy returns of the day to express our gratitude to have a man like him in the midst.

Often, I have seen Mr. Summy walking at the end of a block to his home on Street. During the day, I have seen him busy at his desk in the Sheriff's office. He lived 30 years more than I have, and as I have seen him walking home, I have seen his serenity and his ability to work much younger than

As I have watched Mr. Summy as he walked home, I wondered what his thoughts might be. Perhaps he has been thinking of his sons and daughters, who must be of great help to him. But it is difficult to know about any man's most thoughts. I do know, however, that as I have thought of him and wondered about him, I have wished that I had had a man as, according to testimony, he has been that can't be. ## GUEST CORNER

(Editor's Note: Red Chinese operations south of the 38th parallel in Korea again this week put it squarely up to the United Nations to make a long-delayed decision about new acts of aggression directed by the Soviet Union. They also put it squarely up to the United States to make a new decision about the anti-Communist forces led by Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek and which we have immobilized on Formosa. A contribution to sound thinking on these issues has been made in an editorial that was published throughout the country by the Scripps-Howard newspapers. The editorial, entitled: "The War Mr. Lie Can't See," is reprinted herewith in full.)

Safe in his Norwegian home, Trygve Lie, Secretary-General of the United Nations, has asserted that the U. N. should risk a war with Communist China rather than give up in Korea.

Thor and Jehovah! When does a war become a war in this man's eyes? Communist China went to war against the United Nations last October. Since then the war in Korea has become one of the bloodiest in history.

American casualties, as of Dec. 14, totaled 38,878. That was higher than the combined total of the Revolutionary War, the War of 1812 and the war with Mexico.

Deaths already number 5870. By the next report that figure probably will exceed Norway's total losses in World War II. If these figures do not spell war to Mr. Lie, what would.

Only the pettingfogg statesmen at Lake Success, who are willing to sell out to the Red bandits, have been blind to the cruel facts of this war.

They have convinced themselves that war is not war because they have been afraid to brand Red China as an aggressor nation.

By that attitude they have stultified themselves and made the United Nations a mockery of all it once professed to be.

Even with the bloody history of the last two months before him, Mr. Lie is still willing to admit the outlaw Peiping regime to the U. N. if he can arrange something he can call "peaceful settlement." He does not seem to realize that if the organization sank that low, self-respecting nations would have to leave it.

If Korea cannot be rescued from Communist aggression, what interest but communism is served by any kind of a deal with Red China?

The Chinese Reds are dangerous only when they can fight on their own Asian mainland, where they can call up reinforcements by the hundreds of thousands. They will be no threat to us if we withdraw from Korea, since they have neither ships nor planes. What would Mr. Lie be buying by paying them off? Certainly nothing of any interest to any American.

China needs much more from the West than it can give and there is no reason why we should give Red China anything.

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### COMBINED EFFORT WAS NECESSARY

There had to be two important elements to make possible the report that is published on the first page of this week's Eagle telling of the accomplishments during 1950 of the Goldthwaite Work Unit of the United States Soil Conservation Service and the farmers and ranchers who cooperated with its technicians. One, of course, was the knowledge of the men in the Soil Service. The other was the eagerness of farmers and ranchers to have "know how" applied to their land for the sake of soil conservation, pasture improvement, and maximum use of the extremely limited water that is available in this area.

Every week the Eagle publishes an accounting of the stewardship of the Goldthwaite Work Unit of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District. Looking back through the weekly reports and stacking them up with this week's first page story on the annual report by Ben R. Day, we cannot find one in which the words "Co-operator" or "Co-operators" have not been used. In the two words lies the secret of the achievement that Mr. Day has been able to report to the Board of Supervisors, which has Willis A. Hill as Chairman.

Thinking back, we are not able to recall a single conversation with Mr. Day about soil conservation in which he has not used the words "voluntary" and "co-operators." It is the attitude of the technicians themselves that they have been simply made available by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and that the wonders that have been wrought in soil conservation and pasture improvement are due to the voluntary cooperation of the farmers and ranchers who have taken advantage of the scientific methods taught by such men as Mr. Day, Paul Koshi, Carl Casbeer, Charles Haenisch and Roger Powell.

We think that the farmers and ranchers—the "Co-operators"—would be the first to agree with us that what has been accomplished on their land would not have been possible without the technicians of the Goldthwaite Work Unit. Their insistence on remaining in the background is a fine demonstration of a desire to get an essential job done, and "never mind who gets the credit," but the fact is that the job could have been done only by combined effort.

There has been combined effort—by the members of the Board of Supervisors, by the Soil Conservation Service and its technicians and their superiors, such as W. R. Heizer; and by the farmers and ranchers who recognized the value and benefits to be derived from asking for a plan that would increase the productivity of their acres.

We hope that everybody will read our first page story that is based on the high spots of Ben R. Day's annual report to the Board of Supervisors of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District. It shows that there was much more than planning. There was action to put the planning into effect, with resultant gains to everybody who lives in Mills County, no matter what they might do for a livelihood. The facts as they are stated in Mr. Day's report speak for themselves. In this editorial, we are trying merely to do what we can to make certain that as many people as possible understand how much all of us owe to the combined efforts of those who have met and who will continue to meet their obligations to care for, to improve, and to produce from the good earth.

### USE THE ANTI-COMMUNIST CHINESE

Good news is not easy to find these days. But there is some good news, even in the war picture. It comes from the increasingly louder questioning by the American people and especially by the newspapers of this country as to why young Americans continue to die in Korea while the good Chinese Kuomintang armies commanded by Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek are held in leash. Quite correctly, the Fort Worth Press said this week that Chiang had been kept out of the war for purely political reasons and that he had not been allowed to draw his sword because, consistently, down through the years, he had refused to make a deal with the Communists of any kind. Such a man and his troops are sorely needed now and they should be used.

Even if it makes the face of the State Department in Washington very red, this is a time to remember that we stayed the hand of Chiang Kai-shek once before, to our great sorrow. Error of that sort ought not to be perpetuated.

Members of the Goldthwaite Art and Civic Club, cooperating with the management of the Melba Theatre in response to an emergency call by Governor Allan Shivers for additional funds to aid the victims of polio, raised a total of \$120.03 among theatre patrons here last month.

Mrs. Philip Nickols said that the Melba Theatre participated in the 1950 Texas Theatres Polio Fund by showing a film strip of Governor Shivers making his appeal and by making it possible for the members of the Art and Civic Club to take the collection "to help Texas to take care of its own."

The Melba Theatre also will participate in the March of Dimes Campaign for polio research and the rehabilitation of patients which is to start in Mills County on January 15 under the general chairmanship of W. C. Barnett.

Last month's audience collection, Mrs. Nickols said, was to help to meet the needs of the Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation. The Texas Theatres Polio Fund was created to meet an urgent need for more equipment and bed space at the Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation—a need that resulted from the fact that more than 2,700 Texans in 200 counties were stricken with polio in 1950.

Governor Shivers, as Honorary Chairman of the Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation, supported the Texas Theatres Polio Fund and asked for the cooperation in the effort by Clubs affiliated with the Federation of Women's Clubs. As part of the Federation, the Goldthwaite Art and Civic Club responded promptly and worked with the management of the Melba Theatre locally, Mrs. Nickols said.

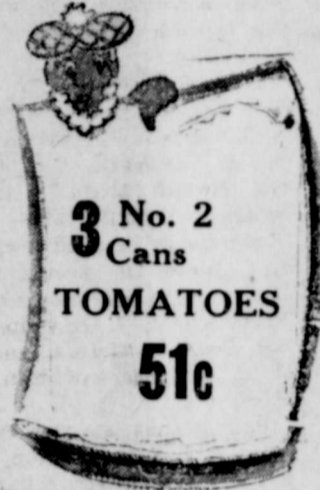

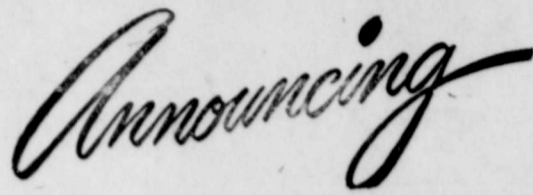

ing restored were featured on the three big field days held during the year.

Over 1160 acres of range land was seeded to native grasses. One hundred and fourteen acres were seeded to introduced pasture grasses. Perhaps the best indication of the interest in improving the condition of native grasses is shown in the record that the Goldthwaite Work Unit keeps on range deferments. It shows that 53 pastures totaling over 14,000 acres were rested during the critical growing season last year.

The native grasses on these pastures made a good seed crop along with an increase in vigor of the plants. Farmers and ranchers planted temporary pastures of small grain, vetch, peas, clover, and sudan in order to rest their native pastures. Other ranchers cut down the number of livestock that they carried on their native pastures or leased other land in order to improve the grass on part of their place. They report that the deferred pastures paid off last fall and winter.

The past year found an increasing number of farmers trying new methods of land preparation that will leave the crop residue on or near the surface of the soil to protect the sion. Implement dealers report an increase in sale of sweeps, tillage tools, and tandem discs that lend themselves to stubble farming.

New machinery that cooperating farmers brought into use last year included the windrower for clover harvest, clover seed cleaning equipment, clover attachment on the grain drill, grass seed harvesters, and grass seed planters.

The three field tours that were conducted during the year were, the Madrid Clover tour, sponsored by the Farm and Ranch Group, tour of the Priddy community after the Supervisor's meeting in August, and Dr. T. C. Graves' field day in November. In all, the techni-

When he completes the plan that he makes with the assistance of the Soil Conservation Service, and maintains the annual practices, his land is protected from erosion and should remain permanently productive.
