FINAL RITES

A mourning Goldthwaite paid deeply moving tribute to the memory of Dorothy Helen Featherston at the First Baptist Church in Goldthwaite at five o'clock on Tuesday afternoon of this week.

The Rev. J. T. Ayers, Pastor, officiated at the funeral services. He was assisted by the Rev. Joseph L. Emery, now of the Riverside Baptist Church in Houston. Brother Emery is a former Pastor of the First Baptist Church in Goldthwaite.

Also assisting Brother Ayers were the Rev. Bland Kirby, Pastor of the Lometa Baptist Church, and the Rev. J. R. Forester, now of May and a former Pastor at Lometa. Miss Featherston lived in Lometa with her family prior to their removal to Goldthwaite some six years ago.

Pall bearers at the funeral were members of the Class of 1951 of the Goldthwaite High School, while Senior girls were flower bearers.

At the conclusion of the funeral the memorial chimes of the First Baptist Church tolled "Abide With Me, Fast Falls the Even" tide, and other appropriate hymns.

Interment was in the Goldthwaite Memorial Cemetery. Funeral arrangements were by the Fairman-Wilkins Funeral Home of Goldthwaite.

GRAND JURY INVESTIGATES MAY 22 ATTACK ON SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS OF MULLIN

With some 70 witnesses summoned to testify, a called session of the May term of the Mills County Grand Jury started on Wednesday of this week an investigation into an attack on the night of May 22 on Mullin Superintendent of Schools Wray B. Williams at the Mullin High School.

The Grand Jury was convened by District Judge Wesley Dice at the request of the Board of Trustees of the Mullin Independent School District. District Attorney James K. Evetts and County Attorney A. M. Pribble were in attendance at the Grand Jury investigation which, by Wednesday afternoon, had given Bailiff J. G. "Jimmy" Jones an exceedingly busy time as the presence of more than three score and ten witnesses was required by the Grand Jurors.

Up to early afternoon of Wednesday only some 20 witnesses had been interrogated. District Attorney Evetts and County Attorney Pribble said then it was likely to be noon of Thursday of this week—perhaps even later—before the Grand Jury would be ready to

reach decisions based on the testimony of witnesses. Judge Dice, who came to Goldthwaite from Lampasas for the Grand Jury investigation, instructed the Grand Jury as to their responsibilities on Wednesday morning. Inasmuch as charges had not been filed, the Grand Jury had been called to investigate the assault on Mr. Williams, who also was pelted with uncooked eggs on the Mullin school premises, and it was up to the Grand Jury to reach its findings on the basis of the testimony.

The Grand Jury investigation arose from a situation that had been brewing in the Mullin Independent School District since the Board of Trustees failed to renew the contracts of Mullin High School Principal Ray Barnett and Miss Marie Wallace of the Mullin Grammar School. Prior to the events of Tuesday of last week there was gossip of threats to "beat up" Mr. Williams on the last day of school. As it turned out, the threats materialized before the last day of school, which was last Friday.

Red Cross Civil Defense Program Considered Here

Civil defense and other aspects of the American Red Cross program that has been designed to help to meet community needs of the national emergency on a nationwide basis in coordination with Federal, State and private organization activities were discussed at a meeting on Tuesday afternoon at the office of the City Utilities of Goldthwaite.

Hilton Gilliam, Safety Service Representative of the American Red Cross, conducted the meeting, which was attended by Mayor Loy Long, Warren P. Duren, Vice Chairman of the Mills County Chapter of the American Red Cross; Mrs. T. C. Graves, Home Nursing Chairman; Mrs. A. L. Whittaker, Blood Program Chairman; Walter Summy, First Aid Chairman; and Brian Smith, Executive Secretary of the Mills County Chapter of the American Red Cross.

Mr. Smith said that in addition to discussing civilian defense generally, those who were present at the meeting considered the first aid and home nursing programs, which have been conspicuously successful in Mills County; the provision of food, clothing, shelter and transportation in the event of emergency, medical care and blood-donor programs.

May Rainfall Up To 4.83 Inches As Clouds Vanish

Rain in Goldthwaite during the month of May as measured officially by Harry Allen for the United States Weather Bureau totaled 4.83 inches.

On Thursday night of last week rain, accompanied by gusts of wind, totaled 1.38 inches, according to Mr. Allen's government gauge in Goldthwaite. South of Goldthwaite, the rainfall was heavier. At Rancho Nueces in Big Valley, for example, Edwin H. Hapgood measured Thursday night's rainfall at 1.92 inches.

Miss Pearl Crawford of Chappel Hill reported that the rain up there last week measured up to 1.5 inches. W. L. Conner and W. P. Oxford found their gauges measured two inches. Miss Crawford said that on Thursday night her gauge showed 80 inches of rain. Last week A. L. Crawford measured 1.5 inches of rain on a Sam Henry Rahl gauge.

Priddy, which this year has not had so much rain as the more southerly reaches of the County, did all right last week. Albert Hopper told Miss Crawford that rainfall up his way measured two inches last week.

At his place 3 1/2 miles southwest of Star, Roy Lee Hill said that he suffered discrimination again with a rainfall last Thursday night of only .7 of an inch. That was all right with Mr. Hill, however. He said his oats are doing very nicely, thank you, and torrential rains would serve only to wash away his oat crop.

Karen, who will be four years of age on July 3, suffered severe cuts on her lips and chin, large bruises on her back and arm, a skinned knee and a bump on her head when, at noon on Sunday, she was struck by a car that was being driven south on Parker Street by Sylvia Jones. 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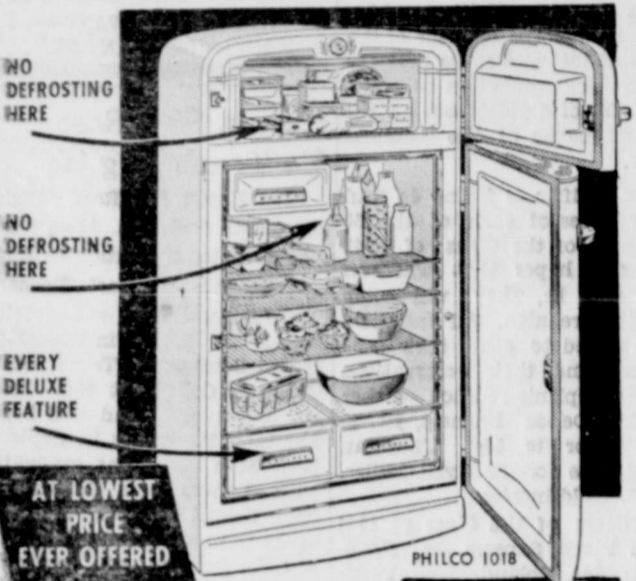

News Of The Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District

A good native grass pasture will give that additional moisture needed by grass plants during the dry months ahead. Farmers and ranchers cooperating with the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District who had their pastures in good condition during the last rains noticed that very little runoff occurred.

Two sites were selected on the Henry Soules Ranch at Star. Site one was a pasture consisting of Little bluestem, Sidecoats grama, Indiangrass, and other choice native grasses. Across the fence in another pasture, site two was selected. This pasture consisted of needle grass, evax, hairy triodia, and Texas grama. After digging in site one, it was found that the water had penetrated to a depth of four feet. The soil was in a good crumbly condition with roots of the perennial grasses appearing at this depth. Also present on the pasture was a good grass mulch. This formed a sponge to break the raindrop splash and to allow the water to enter. The plants will utilize the moisture stored later in the summer.

Site two was lacking in the amount of moisture that soaked into the soil. At a depth of eighteen inches the soil was dry, packed, and run together. The grass roots present, laid within the first six inches of the soil profile. When hot weather arrives, little reserve moisture will be present in this pasture. The plants will then begin suffering from lack of moisture.

A similar test was made on cultivated land on the David Watter's farm in the Pleasant Grove community. A field of second year Madrid Sweetclover was examined and found that the water had soaked approximately three feet into the soil. The deep roots of the clover had penetrated the tough waxy subsoil making it porous and allowing the water to soak deep into the soil. In a corn field a few yards away where no clover had been grown, the moisture quit at a depth of ten inches. This field had been cultivated before the rains. This would tend to increase the ability of the soil to soak up water. However, on the contrary, washes

were present in the corn middle where the excess water had runoff.

A cove field belonging to Charley Swindle has been in Madrid Sweetclover for the last five years. Mr. Swindle says that little or no water has been lost due to runoff. "It is the water you get into the soil that produces your present and future crops," said Mr. Swindle.

Because of the limited rainfall we have been having, it is more important now that our pastures and cultivated fields are in condition to soak up the water. The water that runs into our creeks and rivers is not helping our land.

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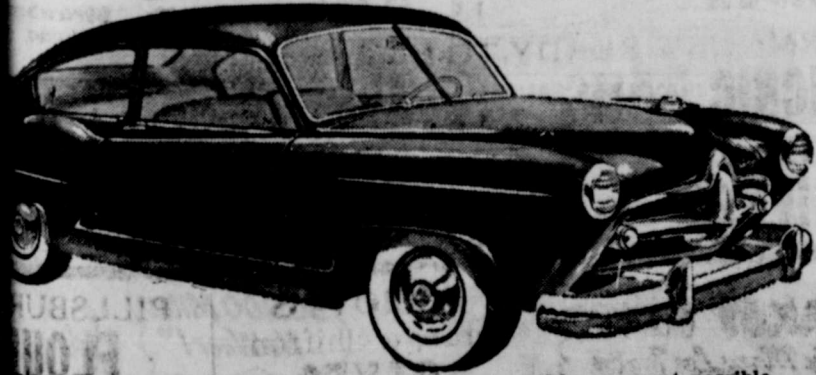

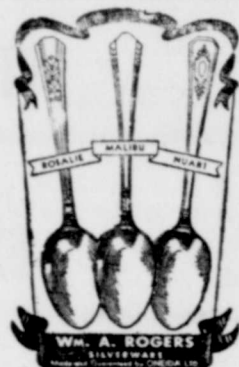

er Street, said that he had not seen the girls in the rain.

Sheriff Stubblefield, Kenneth Wesson and others carried Miss Featherston into the Stubblefield home. Upon his arrival, Dr. M. A. Childress summoned the Fairman-Wilkins ambulance and Miss Featherston, accompanied by her mother, Mrs. Childress and Roy Wilkins, was taken to Memorial Hospital in Brownwood where examination confirmed the diagnosis of Dr. Childress that Miss Featherston had suffered multiple fractures of both legs between her knees and ankles. Subsequent examination disclosed that Miss Featherston also suffered a fractured pelvic bone. She did not regain consciousness until the following morning when, in hospital, she greeted her father with conversation about the Goldthwaite High School Commencement Exercises that were conducted on Wednesday night of this week. Mr. Featherston had arrived at the hospital from Fort Worth in response to notification that his daughter had been injured.

Subsequently Miss Featherston again lost consciousness and it developed that her injuries were more serious than at first had been believed. Examination disclosed a brain concussion that affected the cranial centers governing the respiratory tract. Her condition grew steadily worse until her death last Monday.

After the accident, Sheriff Stubblefield followed the ambulance to hospital. He was accompanied by Mrs. O. O. As he was unlocking the padlock on the door in the High School entrance, which is covered and deeply recessed, he was "jumped." Eggs flew from the hands of those who had been skulking outside. Eggs also struck the facade of the High School Building.

A group estimated at from six to eight persons was clustered around Mr. Williams in the darkness. He was punched on the face and behind the left ear. He did not fight back, but he did attempt to reason with his attackers—in vain. None of his attackers spoke.

After the attack, Mr. Williams made his way to his home, where he spent a sleepless night. His face was badly bruised and he had suffered cuts around his left eye and behind his left ear. Last Wednesday he was treated for his injuries by Dr. M. A. Childress of Goldthwaite.

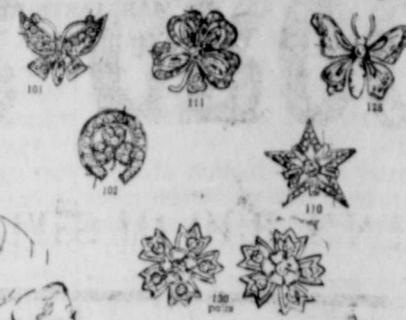

When the OPS ordered a roll-back on cattle prices, many feeders as well as producers sustained financial losses, according to an admission by an OPS official when he testified before the House Agriculture Committee last week.

An example was given of a cattle dealer in Kansas who, before the roll-back bought 100 cattle in Texas, weighing 500 pounds each, and paid 37 cents per pound. Then came the unexpected roll-back of 10% on May 20, 4% on August 1 and 4% on October 1. The buyer had planned to keep



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them on pasture until October at which time they would gain about 200 pounds in weight. But now he finds that if he keeps them until October he cannot charge more than 26 cents a pound, and will sustain a net loss of \$49 a head.

Similar examples have been multiplied hundreds of times. Last January Eric Johnson told the nation that roll-backs on meat would not work and would mean less meat for the consumer. The producers were thus led to believe they could buy and contract without fear of such a roll back. Then suddenly

the roll back order was issued, and it caught large numbers of people with heavy investments and faced with unavoidable financial losses.

Actually, the order is not helping the consumer. The shopper is still paying as much as before the roll back, the packers and distributors are, in some instances, reaping some benefits at the expense of the grower. There will be much less incentive for feeders to buy and fatten cattle, and the consumers will in all likelihood find less meat on the counters.
