Horse Lovers Uncork Enthusiasm At Lively Racing Meet At Hangar

Jernigan Arena Show Saturday Calls For More

Even if it did start an hour and a quarter late, a show better than most rodeos was staged last Saturday night in the Jernigan Arena where there was calf roping, a cutting horse contest, a ladies barrel race and a thrilling performance by a sheep dog owned and trained by Joe LeMay.

After two go-arounds at calf roping, first place was taken by M. Yates of Cherokee whose times were 19.4 and 13.2 for an average of 32.6. Second place was won by C. Black, whose times were 18 and 14.6 for an average of 32.6, while third place went to P. Snyder of Melvin.

Others who competed in the calf roping events, amidst much joshing by Emcee "Colonel" Delton Barnett, were J. Barnett of Gatesville, B. Russell of Brady, J. L. Stewartson of San Saba, G. Russell of Brady, T. J. Yates of Cherokee, W. Potts of Lometa, F. Bearden of San Saba, Loyd King of San Saba Peak, J. D. McKenzie of Goldthwaite, D. Parker of Brady, A. Davis of Coryell County, K. R. Fry of Gatesville, M. J. Hanna of Copperas Cove, G. McQuirt of Goldthwaite, J. W. Oglesby and J. Burns, both of Shive, V. Roy of Lampasas, and Malcolm Jernigan of Goldthwaite.

Loyd King took a bit of ribbing from Emcee Barnett when, in the first calf roping go-around, the loud speaker blared "no time." Then "Colonel" Barnett added, "His little calf got up and gaily walked away."

The "Colonel" also had a time for himself with F. Bearden of San Saba. In his case, Emcee Barnett kept calling for help to get and keep Bearden on his horse.

In the cutting horse contests, for which Dr. Darrell B. Spratt of Killeen was the judge, first place went to Stormy Conger, owned and ridden by Sam Watts of Shive. Second place was won by Lilly Bell, owned and ridden by the famous Floyd Bearden of San Saba, and third place was taken by Queenie, owned and ridden by Roger Smith, Jr.

Soil Service Finds Local Seed Produces Better Growth Of Grass

The grass seed that was harvested in Mills County last fall and seeded on pasture land is proving that local seed is better adapted than imported seed. Dr. T. C. Graves harvested seed from Native bluestem pastures and seeded several hundred acres last fall. These plantings are up to a good stand and with good management will enable Dr. Graves to harvest good quality native grass seed on his place in the future.

Grass seedlings made with seed obtained from Oklahoma did not prove to be as successful. A. J. Smith, Blanket Springs, seeded some retired land with this seed. The length of germination of this seed was considerably longer. After obtaining a stand, the seedlings were less vigorous than those from locally harvested seed. For the first time in more than 20 years Mills County had a highly successful afternoon of horse racing at the Hangar airstrip three miles south of Goldthwaite last Saturday. The event, which drew upwards of 500 persons to the rails, was topped off on Saturday night with a fine show at the Jernigan Arena where a crowd also close to 500 saw calf roping, a cutting horse contest, a ladies barrel race and a demonstration by Joe LeMay of Center City that dogs can be smarter than people.

The horse races, operated by John A. Jackson and Jack Locklear and supported by a considerable segment of the Goldthwaite business community, drew from Sig Jernigan the comment that "the attendance shows there still is a lively spark left in the old horse racing game."

With lovers of horse flesh and followers of "the sport of kings" enjoying themselves so hugely last Saturday afternoon and night, Mr. Jackson and Locklear and the Jernigan brothers, Sig and Malcolm, said they hoped that soon again the performances of last Saturday could and would be repeated.

Sheriff Gets His Men Despite Dash From Local Clink

Sheriff C. F. Stubblefield, who was alerted about 3:30 o'clock last Sunday morning by Night Watchman Jack Davis when an attempt was made to burglarize the Shelton Brothers Garage on Fisher Street, jailed two men in the Mills County bastille after a chase that led through several counties.

After he had been called by Watchman Davis, Sheriff Stubblefield arrested on suspicion of robbery Adley D. King and Jack R. Stewart, both of Dallas. He took them and the car, which later proved to have been stolen, to the lockup.

As Sheriff Stubblefield was about to march the suspects into the cooler, they made a break. They got into their stolen car and headed south. After firing a warning shot, Sheriff Stubblefield gave pursuit. He lost the trail in San Saba but he radioed descriptions of the men and their car to other law enforcement officers.

About 6:30 o'clock Sunday morning, King and Stewart had traveled to a point near Hamilton where their car was involved in a wreck and where they were identified by Texas Highway Patrolmen on the basis of Sheriff Stubblefield's radioed descriptions. The Sheriff brought them back from Hamilton and lodged them securely in the Mills County jail on warrants charging attempted burglary as signed by Justice of the Peace E. A. Obenhaus.

Investigation has disclosed not only the records of King and Stewart but also the fact that they are wanted as suspects in a number of other places.

"By the time they are through they probably will face quite a few judges," Sheriff Stubblefield said.

As the Eagle went to press the prisoners were in jail at Hamilton pending their return to Goldthwaite or perhaps to other places where they are wanted by the police, including Dallas.

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TEACHERS AND IMMATURE MINDS

E. B. ADAMS RECEIVES A LETTER

Here is an answer to those who say that Congressmen do not read their mail. It came in the form of a letter to E. B. Adams, Goldthwaite monument builder, from Representative O. C. Fisher.

As everybody knows, Representative Fisher recently, and for the second time since he went to Washington to represent our own 21st Texas Congressional District, sent a questionnaire to the voters asking them for their thoughts and opinions on a wide range of matters of public concern. On the form that was used for the questions asked by Representative Fisher were the words: "Not printed at government expense."

After he had answered the questions that had been asked by Representative Fisher, Mr. Adams, in his usual blunt and forthright fashion, wrote this on the questionnaire: "If this was not printed at government expense, then at whose expense was it printed?"

The other day Mr. Adams received a reply from Congressman Fisher. It was written in longhand. Even the envelope was written in longhand. The letter was as follows:

"Dear Mr. Adams:

Your comment on the questionnaire inquiring who paid for the cost of printing the poll is noted. The cost for the printing, amounting to a little less than \$500.00, was paid by me out of my own pocket. I did this as a public service and to assist me in better representing the people in the 21st District. Your cooperation is appreciated.

Sincerely,
(Signed) O. C. Fisher."

The point of the letter, in addition to showing that Congressman Fisher continues to be an alert representative of the people of this District, is that the men in Washington are sensitive to opinion at the grass roots. If they are not sensitive enough, then it is our fault.

Right now, the number of persons on the federal payroll is as high as in World War II, at the peak of government employment. Right now, there are 5,000 government press agents in Washington turning out reams of material everyday—material that is designed to regiment the thinking of the people and sell them on the unlimited government doctrines of the "Queer Deal." Although some newspapers, such as this one, give the distorted propaganda the wastebasket treatment that it deserves, much of it does get printed in one place or another and an impact is being made on the minds of people who are willing to believe that there is such a thing as something for nothing — when there isn't—and who are not willing to believe that the government cannot give anything to anybody except as it takes away from somebody else.

The responsibility of the people who think straight and clearly about America's destiny is to let their elected representatives know what they think. Senators and Representatives, whether in Washington, in Austin or in the Mills County Court House, can be made responsive to the wishes of those whom they represent. Congressman Fisher received many thousands of replies to his questionnaire. Nevertheless, the pungent question by the redoubtable E. B. Adams did not escape his attention and Mr. Adams had a definitely personal reply from Mr. Fisher. There was neither a brush-off nor a mere form letter. The incident ought to serve to encourage others to convey their thoughts to their elected representatives without pulling any punches.

GUEST EDITORIAL

(Editor's Note: With obvious good sense, the Dallas Morning News proposes that our country recognize the bankruptcy of its foreign policy and start fresh all over again. An editorial entitled, "Why We Shifted Foreign Policy," as published by the Dallas Morning News, follows in full:)

Maj. Gen. Patrick J. Hurley told the Senate inquiry committee that, soon after the war, our State Department abandoned the objectives for which the war had been fought. Thus, in a few words, he stated something that the American public is coming to realize. He was right also in saying that an attempt has been made to conceal this change from the public.

But Hurley, always the good politician, is inconsistent in putting the blame entirely on Acheson while praising President Truman for a courageous stand. And Hurley did not go far enough in his statement to tell why the change was made. He could not afford to do so without revealing the inconsistency of his stand with reference to Acheson and Truman.

Our difficulties today get back to President Roosevelt's misjudgment at Yalta, and to Truman's adherence to this wrong policy at Potsdam. When the President and Secretary of State came to realize these blunders, they had to make a shift in policy that necessitated abandonment of World War II objectives in large degree.

In fact these objectives were lost at Yalta and Potsdam, but neither Truman nor Acheson could afford to admit so much to the public. The truth had been withheld from the public after the Yalta meeting. The political way out of the difficulty for the administration was a continued withholding of the truth. But Truman, not Acheson, was primarily to blame insofar as living personalities were involved. It is true that Acheson has admitted deliberate practice of deception in the instance of Formosa, but he was merely carrying out a policy that had been established.

It is now obvious that our foreign policy, as actually practiced, has not been far from that of Hitler and Stalin. The difference is that these two men formulated their policies with deliberate design and masterful cunning. We seem to have stumbled into ours because of lack of knowledge and experience, plus Roosevelt's assumption of self-infallibility.

We have on our hands a morally bankrupt policy that attempts to sustain itself in the public eye by day-to-day resort to expediency. We might as well declare our bankruptcy and start over again.

CONGRESSMAN FISHER REPORTS ON THE RESULTS OF HIS POLL

(Editor's Note: Representative O. C. Fisher of the 21st Texas Congressional District, which includes Mills County, recently polled the voters of the District for their opinions on issues of the times. In the following article Congressman Fisher reports on the results of the poll.)

Most of the people in the 21st district believe we cannot "go it alone" in the struggle against world communism. They believe overwhelmingly that further communist expansion in the Far East and in Europe would endanger American security here at home. Ninety percent of them approve American participation in the Atlantic Pact and the joint defense under General Eisenhower under General Eisenhower.

These reactions are disclosed in more than 12,000 responses to the questionnaires which I recently sent to the people in our 27-county district.

More than 25% of those to whom polls were sent returned them, several thousand with interesting and revealing comments. This is probably the highest percentage of responses ever recorded in a Congressional polling operation of this nature. The average, I am told, runs 10 to 15 percent.


PMA payments to farmers and ranchmen to help pay for certain range practices would be substantially reduced if the pollsters had their way about it. On that issue the vote was 76% for reduction, 20% against, and 4% with no opinion. In a further break-down by occupation, the tabulation reveals that among farmers and ranchmen 75% favor the PMA reduction, 25% oppose, and 3% have no opinion. In occupations other than ranching and farming, the score was 77% for, 17% against and 6% with no opinion.

Answers to the first two questions reveal numbers of modified answers, many pointing out that military considerations were involved which called for expert judgment.

By questions, here are the results:

1. Do you favor an amendment to the Constitution removing from the President the exclusive authority which the constitution now gives him for making appointments and re-placements of military Field Commanders? Yes — 53%; No — 43%.
2. Do you subscribe to General MacArthur's proposal that there be: "(1) intensification of our economic blockade against China and the imposition of a naval blockade against the China coast; (2) removal of restrictions on air reconnaissance of China's coastal areas and of Manchuria; and (3) removal of restrictions on the Chinese Nationalists on Formosa with logistical support to contribute to their effective operation against the Chinese mainland?" Yes — 69%. No — 29%.
3. Do you favor the continuation of Communist intervention in the Far East as vital to our own security? Yes—91%, No—9%.
4. Do you believe that the States will be in a better year from now than they were in 1949, relatively speaking? Yes—94%, No—6%.
5. Do you think we should take steps now to up an army of Japanese soldiers to be ready to attack Communists if Japan is attacked? Yes—90%; No—10%.
6. Do you regard the need for independence of European countries and freedom from Russian domination as being vital to our own security? Yes—94%; No—6%.
7. Do you believe Germany should be encouraged and encouraged to re-armed? Yes—73%; No—27%.
8. Do you believe that is doing right in (by providing some military equipment) to 12 Atlantic Pact countries in Europe in creating a fence against possible aggression? Yes—96%; No—4%.
9. Do you favor the training program required by the law for young men have not had military training? Yes—87%; No—13%.
10. Do you approve actions of Congress in gating and exposing Communist in and out of Government and of other investigations (such as R.F.C. Organized Five Percenters, etc.) conducted under direct Congress? Yes—97%; No—3%.
11. Do you think that should be abolished? Yes—20%; No—80%.
12. Should Congress substantial reductions in payments to farmers and ranchmen for range practices such as drilling water, building dams, mesquite cation, etc., during this emergency? Yes—76%; No—24%.
13. Should taxes be increased, if necessary, on a pay-go plan, for adequate appropriations, providing non-essential spending is eliminated? Yes—83%; No—17%.
14. Do you favor the Wage and Hour law increase the present wage to at least 44 hours this emergency? Yes—10%; No—90%.
15. The President's message contended that interest of national defense requires that the Congress should call a so-called Fair Deal including Socialized Civil Rights. Do you agree? Yes—6% No—94%.

Mullin Class Of 1915 Has Grand Weekend To Mark Second Reunion

Mrs. Golightly Records History Of Class Of 1915

(Editor's Note: At last weekend's reunion of the Mullin High School Class of 1915, Mrs. George B. Golightly of Hamilton read a Class History. Because of the widespread general interest in the names and events referred to in the Class History, it is published below in full.)

The story of this Class started in 1906 when Thelma Herrington, Vergia Taylor and I started to school in Mullin. Of course, there were others, but they either moved away or quit school, for they did not finish with our Class. We three were the only ones who started and finished in the Class. The others joined later and we were all graduated together.

Miss Erma Harrison, who now resides in Goldthwaite, was our first teacher. I shall always remember her as a beautiful person. Probably the thrill of a first teacher and her kindly attitude toward the pupils helped her to win their utmost respect.

Miss Alice Fisher took Miss Erma's place later when she had to quit and take care of her sick grandfather. We kindly remember our Superintendent, Sam Fisher, who now resides in Mullin and who came to our room with his sister, who was to be our teacher. What was outstanding was the little red hat she wore and we wished that when we grew up we would be able to own and wear a hat so pretty.

Other teachers through the years included Miss Nell Kirkpatrick, Mrs. Sallie Skaggs, Miss Joy Houston, Miss Flora Summy, Miss Zula Hale, Miss Pinkie Scarborough, P. M. Bowden, E. W. Deckert, B. E. McGirk, J. G. Pickens, F. P. Bowman, A. H. Daniel, D. D. Kemper and Wilbur F. Wright. Miss Marie Kirkpatrick was the music teacher who started most of the pupils in music.

There is some particular characteristic concerning each teacher. All of us remember Wilbur F. Wright as the teacher who always kept time by a beautiful thin gold watch such as some of us never had seen before. J. G. Pickens was Superintendent at the time the new building was erected. A. H. Daniel was Superintendent when we were graduated and for the life of me I do not see how he "put up" with all of us during our last year in school. I am sure there were many times when he failed to notice some of our pranks, for he was kept pretty busy trying to impress upon our minds the importance of making our grades so we could get our diplomas. Sometimes I wondered if he didn't fudge our grades a little to get us on and out of school!

Most of our teachers we loved; most of them were friendly and had a sense of humor and knew how to get along with their pupils. Some were exceptional, had original ideas and made their classes so different from those of the others. Some of them had enthusiasm and were teaching to

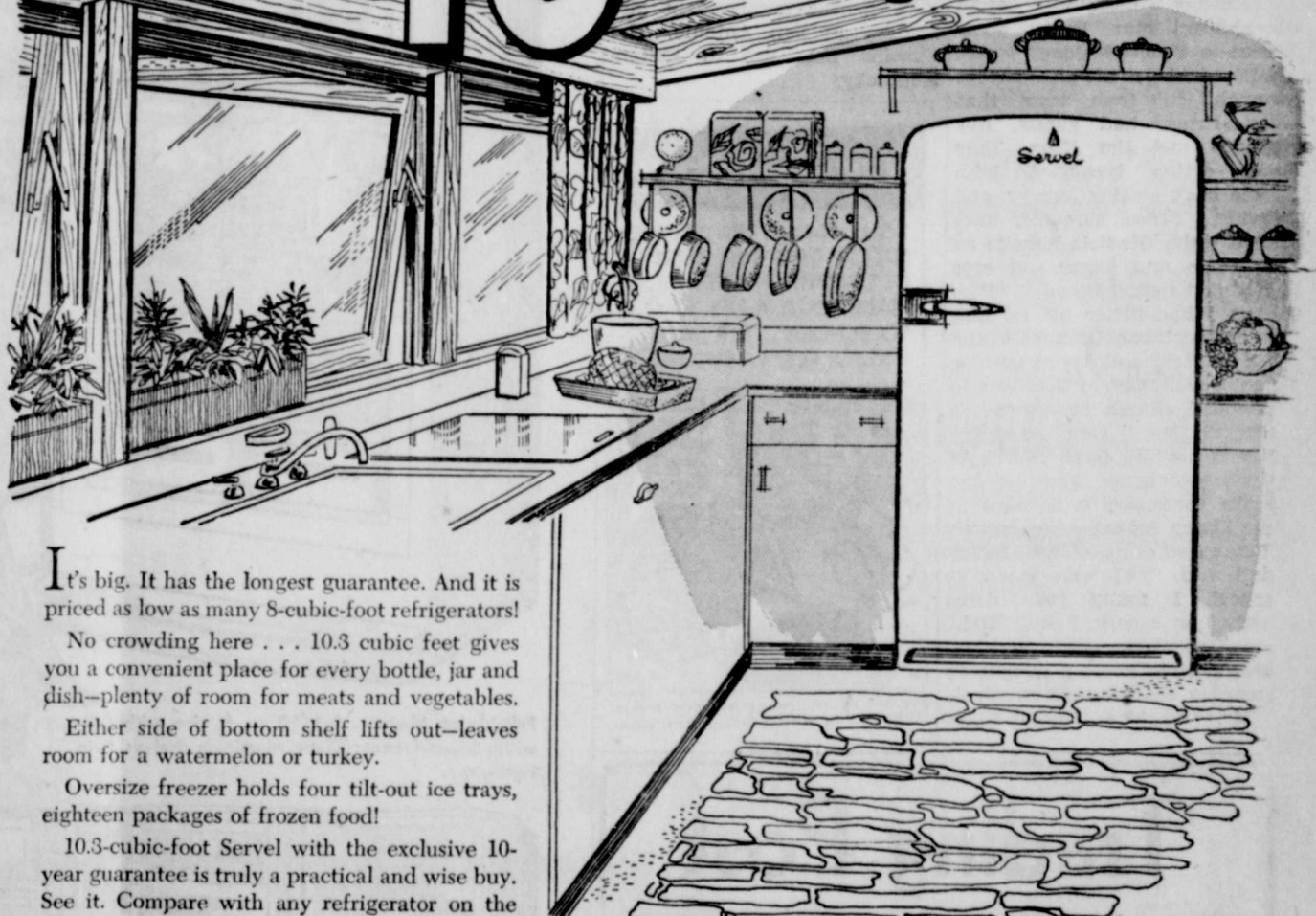

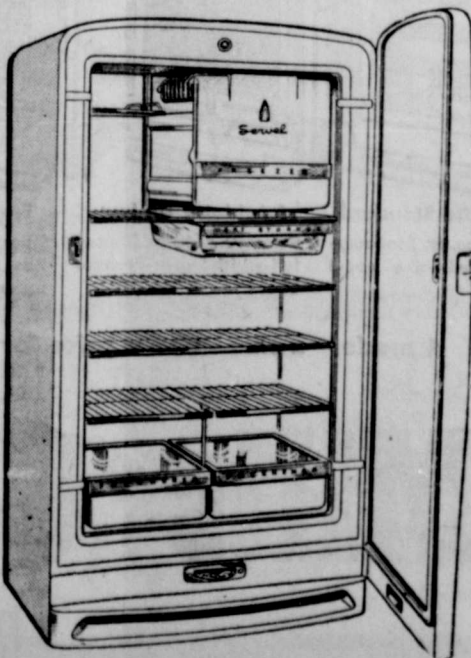

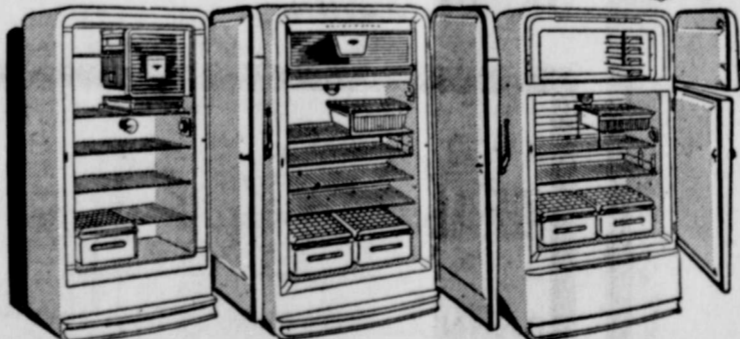

better qualify the pupils to approach life's problems calmly and with consideration for others. I remember most of them as trying to get us to see the importance of being the right kinds of girls and boys as we went out in life. This they stressed as being as important as our book learning.

We owe so much of what we now think to our teachers and there is not a one in the Class who does not believe in a Supreme Being who takes care of and watches over all of us. Most of our teachers sought to teach us Faith.

Thelma's parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Herrington, were pioneers and her Dad spent his entire life serving humanity. Vergia's mother died when she was young and her father was both father and mother to the family of children. I remember that all of us thought he was too strict, but as we grew older we realized the responsibility he had in rearing a fine bunch of children. Mr. Taylor was a pioneer blacksmith; he served farmers mostly, but occasionally he did his welding and finer machine jobs for those living in town.

In those days their biggest business was to keep horses shod. The Taylors came to Mullin in the early 80's before the railroad came through. During this time, of course, my father, the Rev. L. J. Vann, was busy trying to save souls and get them ready for the next world. We moved into town from out in the country shortly before I started to school in 1906 and I think it was about this time that my father started preaching.

Cora Scarborough and Pearl "Dutch" Kemp entered school the next year. Cora is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Scarborough, who came to Mullin from Page. Mr. Scarborough ran a gin for many years. Dutch's people, Mr. and Mrs. Sam Kemp, moved to Mullin in 1907 from Florence, where Dutch was born. Dutch started in the third grade at Mullin.

Katye Wallace entered school in 1910. She is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. G. B. Wallace, who moved to Mills County in 1900. They lived in the Democrat community until Katye was ten years old, when they moved to Mullin. Mr. Wallace was always a farmer and a good one. Katye lost almost one year of school and didn't go the last three months. Mr. Bowden wanted her to take the exams so she could go on with the Class but Mr. Wallace objected because she wasn't able, physically. That is when we were lucky to get her in our Class.

It was in 1912 when "Our Pride and Joy," better known as "Little Willie," started in our Class. All of us set our eyes

in his direction. How proud we were to know there was really a boy whom we thought might see us through! And he did. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Wasserman, left Germany in 1881 and settled in the Duren community, where they farmed until their death. In interviewing Willie about his early schooling in Mullin, I heard him say this: "I liked my teachers fairly well but thought my classmates were just about it, although I never had the courage to express my feelings in words, much less in actions." He added, "I struggled along and somehow managed to keep up with my Class but I soon learned that all education is not between covers of text books and that the education outside of the Mullin High School was well worth acquiring."

Winnie, whose parents were the Rev. and Mrs. L. A. Clark, joined us in 1914 when her father came as Pastor of the Methodist Church. Although Winnie always felt that she should not be counted in the Class, she is just as full-fledged as those of us who started in the first grade. Her parents have passed away.

Nettie Spencer's parents grew up in Mullin. Nettie was born in Mullin but when she was very young her family moved to Burnet County. Nettie attended Oakalla school until she was 15 and went to the Duren school while living with her sister. She dropped out of school because she was stricken with polio but in 1915 she joined the Class of 1915 and lived in Mullin with her brother, Tom Spencer. Nettie's sister, Mrs. Charles Hays, now lives in Mullin, having moved in from out in the country.

Besides struggling for an education, we managed to look on the humorous side of life as we went along. Of course, it was daily routine for some of us girls to sit in the seat with Willie. Most of the time he would blush and that would only cause us to pester him more. I sometimes wonder how he ever put up with us. The main reason we teased him so was because we enjoyed it—and when he looked a little disgusted, we couldn't understand why he wouldn't show a little interest in at least one of us. But he never did!

Then comes to mind the time when Vergia, Cora, Tut and I buried some love letters and brass jewelry on the school ground. That memory has stayed with us. Then there was the time during recess when a bunch of us—Seniors—crawled through the panel of a door in the Primitive Baptist Church near the school. As the bell rang to signal the end of recess one or two of us got hung in the door. That time Mr. Daniel did not laugh; instead he gave us one of his sober lectures.

It was the year when Wilbur F. Wright was there that we had our first declamation contest. He gave Vergia a crazy little piece to speak because all of the others had heavy pieces. She won in declamation. Miss Cassie Williams was teaching declamation then.

I shall never forget the plays by Shakespeare that we used to put on. You can imagine how bored the audience was with our dull plays and lack of expression. But I am sure our parents thought we were really talented!

I can't recall the name of the lady teacher who used to whip the girls, but it might have been Miss Joy Houston. I know that I was scared to death of her and shuddered every time we put on a program—for that was when her temper seemed to flare up. I remember well Betty McDonald getting a whipping and I didn't think she deserved it—but probably she did. Then—remember when we crawled down aisles eating pie? Mrs. Sallie Skaggs almost scalped us, as indeed, she should have.

Our Class was graduated from Mullin High School with aims and ambitions and with hope that the world always would be a free world. We had resolved to conduct ourselves so as to approach life's problems calm-

I think that each is making his or her contribution and although sorrow has come to some, their Faith never has been weakened nor their hopes destroyed. Each believes in a God who is ready at all times to keep us on the right path as we attempt to complete life's journey.

May many good things come your way during the coming year or until we meet again.

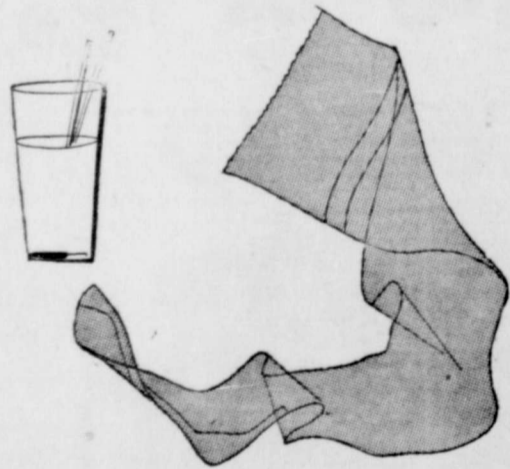
