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WHAT COULD HAPPEN TO MILLS COUNTY

It is, of course, not yet known whether any portion of Mills County is to be used by the national military establishment if, as and when Camp Bowie might be expanded and reactivated. It has been reported, however, that there is a possibility that the Department of the Army will want not only the Mills County land that was used for Camp Bowie during World War II, but also an additional 40,000 acres along the Pecan Bayou and the Colorado river.

The reports of possible plans by the national military authorities were taken so seriously by those who are concerned with the economic future of Mills County-indeed, its very existence - that at a meeting of citizens at the Court House on the night of August 17 a Steering Committee to "do something" effective and constructive was organized with Hollis Blackwell as Chairman and with E. B. Gilliam, Jr., as Advisor.

Since the Steering Committee was set up, a number of events have occurred. They have been reported in the news columns of the Eagle. They have included enlisting the interest of Congressman O.C. Fisher and they have included the gathering of pertinent information by such persons as County Clerk Earl Summy, Mrs. Delton Barnett, County Surveyor J. C. Long, and M. L. Jernigan. We believe that the information that has been gathered for the Steering Committee for the consideration of our representatives in Congress and the Army presents a picture of such interest to everybody that we will try to depict it here even if, as a rule, statistics are dull and uninteresting. It could be that in this case, with the statistics dealing with our own futures, they may not seem quite so dull as usual. In fact, they might make enough persons sit up and take notice as to give the Steering Committee unanimous public support in the job that, after all, it has only started to do.

Assuming that the worst fears of the Steering Committee should be justified and that the Department of the Army might want 80,000 acres of Mills County, including the land that was used in World War II and 40,000 acres more as well, here is what would happen—on the basis of the facts and figures that have been gathered for the Steering Committee:

Mills County would lose 18 per cent of its area, which totals only 734 square miles anyway.

A total of at least 80 homes would be lost to the County-13 of them in the area that was used for Camp Bowie during World War II, and 67 of them in the areas that have been newly appraised by government agents during recent months. Those areas are west of Regency and in the Bayou Valley

The number of people who would be dispossessed would include at least 320-assuming that the worst might happen and that the Army would want 80,000 acres of Mills County.

It is estimated that 6,400 head of cattle and other livestock are running in the area about which the Steering Committee is worried.

It is estimated, further, that the loss of area now in the Mullin Independent School District would total 44.4 per cent of that District and that the Goldthwaite Independent School District would lose five per cent of its area.

The taxable value of the area that could be lost to Mills County on the basis of present tax rolls is \$787,500.00. That is a considerable chunk, especially when it is understood that the present total taxable values of all Mills County add up to \$5,250,000.00.

If Mills County should lose the land about which the Steering Committee is concerning itself there would be, on the basis of the present tax structure. an annual deficit of several thousands of dollars that would have to be made up by the taxpayers who would remain after the 80,000 acres under discussion were to be lost. A sum of say, \$15,000.00, to be made up by the rest of us after we lost 80 homes, 320 people, 80,000 acres and several thousand head of livestock would be a matter of more importance than some of our citizens seem to realize.

We do not like cries of "wolf" or false alarms. It may be that the Army will not want 80,000 acres of Mills County or any acres at all. But the fact is that nobody knows for sure. So long as the danger exists, we are all for the Steering Committee—which should continue to exert its utmost effort in behalf of the continued existence of Mills County. If you have any doubt in your mind about the need for a Steering Committee, then read again the statistics that are contained in this editorial.

On many occasions constant patrols have been maintained by the Sheriff, Deputy Sheriff Cockrum and the Texas Highway Patrolman. Such patrols will be continued, Sheriff Stubplefield said, in hope that traf-Dr violations will continue to diminish and that the streets and highways may be made safe for everybody.
