The Revenue Act of 1951 has made important changes in the Income Tax laws including higher rates. Disclosure of Income Tax liability required if single person has minimum income of \$600.00 and married couples \$1200.00. Farmers and ranchers must file declaration of Estimated Income Tax not later than January 15, 1952 for 1951 Income Tax or in lieu of Declaration of Estimated Income Tax farmers and ranchers may file final Income Tax Returns not later than January 31, 1952.
