Rainfall in Goldthwaite during the year 1951 totaled 20.04 inches, according to the figures of Harry Allen, official recorder of precipitation here for the United States Weather Bureau. By Mr. Allen's figures the rainfall last year was 10.10 inches under normal. Normal rainfail for these parts is 30.14 inches inches. That was 7.41 inches under normal. So, 1951 in Goldthwaite was drier than 1950.





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
