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## Wool Conference On Price Support In Washington

Hollis Blackwell said as the eagle went to press this week that he hoped to receive soon official news from Washington regarding details of the government price support program for wool.

On Tuesday and Wednesday this week, Mr. Blackwell said, the President and Vice President of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association were conferring with Department of Agriculture officials with a view toward determining the extent of loans that will be made on the current wool clip through the Commodity Credit Corporation.

Two weeks ago Mr. Blackwell himself was among the conferees in Washington, where assurance was given that there definitely will be government loans on wool through the CCC. Such loans are necessary because of a stagnant market created by the dumping of wools from Uruguay, Argentina, New Zealand and Australia.

There has been indication that wool growers may obtain loans of 60 to 62 cents per pound of wool. Loans would be non-recourse. In event of a market decline, the grower could pay off the loan and sell his wool. In the event of steady prices or a declining market, the grower would keep the loan proceeds and the wool would be taken over by the CCC next January 1. Wool on which government loans may be made will be kept in warehouses that will be listed and approved by the Department of Agriculture.

Mr. Blackwell said on Wednesday that he was hopeful that a definite and official announcement on the price support program for wool would be forthcoming very soon. Maximum support, which is expected, would be 90 per cent of parity.

## Red Cross Fund Reaches \$742 At Mid-Month Mark

Barren P. Duren, 1952 American Red Cross Campaign Fund director for Mills County announced that as of Tuesday \$742.00 had been raised toward a quota of \$2,940.00. The campaign is to continue throughout the month of March and the returns that have been reported to Mr. Duren are only preliminary.

Goldthwaite, where Ray is Chairman and where the quota is \$1,500.00, the sum of \$17.00 already is in hand. Mrs. W. H. Freeman, chairman of the committee, started on Tuesday of last week.

M. McCasland, Center City chairman, already has raised toward his suggested quota of \$135.00, and Mrs. M. L. Jones, Jones Valley Chairman, has reported \$26.00 in toward her suggested quota of \$40.00.

A. Triplett of Pompey has reported raising \$19.00 toward his suggested quota of \$35.00. (Continued on Back Page.)

## E. T. FAIRMAN OFFERS SITE FOR RECREATION CENTER AS LIONS ASSUME LEADERSHIP

During the past week the Goldthwaite Lions Club assumed leadership of a program that, it is hoped, will give Goldthwaite and Mills County a recreation area and swimming pool for the use of all the citizens, young and old.

Announcement of the proposed project was made at last week's Style Show at the Grammar School auditorium by President Ray Duren of the Lions Club.

Action resulted from an offer by E. T. Fairman, President of the Mills County State Bank, formerly the Trent State Bank, to make available at no cost and in perpetuity a tract of 12.6 acres just southeast of Goldthwaite on the Moline Road near the J. T. "Buddy" Morris place. Mr. Fairman recently "struck" an abundant supply of water on the tract, thereby giving assurance that a swimming pool is feasible.

Immediately after Mr. Fairman had made his public-spirited offer to the citizens of Mills County through the Lions Club, Mr. Duren appointed a Civic Development Committee, of which the Rev. Ed H. Lovelace, Pastor of the First Methodist Church of Goldthwaite, is the Chairman. Other members of the Committee are City Utilities Manager W. C. Barnett, Leston F. Bain, A. W. Lilly, and E. B. Gilliam, Jr.

Mr. Duren said that obviously the Lions Club itself cannot undertake the financing necessary to bring into being an outdoor recreation center.

"But we have accepted leadership responsibility and we do call upon all citizens and organized groups to work with us," Mr. Duren said. "The proceeds from the Style Shows that were presented by the Lions last week with the cooperation of local citizens and the 82nd Airborne Division could turn out to be a small nest egg from which an outdoor recreation center and swimming pool would grow."

Feeling among those who are enthusiastic about the possibility of having Goldthwaite and Mills County enjoy a recreation center that would eclipse Hancock Park in Lampasas is that once achieved, it could be made to operate on a self-sustaining basis.

More concrete proposals for the project were expected to come from further meetings of the Civic Development Committee.

Mr. Duren said this week that the Civic Development Committee, of which Brother Lovelace is the Chairman, will be glad to hear from all groups and individuals who are willing to work on and for the project that not only would be of great value to Mills County citizens but which also would attract business to this trading area. ## Public Invited To See Air Drop Saturday Morning

All citizens of Mills County were invited this week to see an air drop by the 82nd Airborne Division at 8:00 o'clock tomorrow morning, Saturday.

Even if weather conditions should not be favorable, there still will be a great show by the paratroopers this Saturday.

Major General Charles D. W. Canham, Commanding General of the famed 82nd Airborne Division, said that approximately 2,500 skilled paratroopers have been scheduled to make the jump this Saturday. It will be a rehearsal for the Army-Air Force maneuvers, Exercise Longhorn, in which the 82nd Airborne Division is playing the role of the aggressor force.

Saturday's jump is scheduled for the Lometa-San Saba area, three miles east of the Colorado river and just north of U. S. highway number 190, General Canham said.

The General, in making the announcement, stated that all visitors desiring to witness the jump will be welcomed; however, to prevent any misunderstanding, official sources cautioned potential visitors that rain, exceedingly high winds or other unfavorable weather conditions, would either delay or force cancellation of the drop. Any wind above fifteen miles per hour is considered excessive and could cause the drop to be delayed or called off to avoid injury to the troops.

In addition to the men dropping with their weapons, equipment, and rations, other separate equipment and supplies will be parachuted to earth. However, only a portion of the heavy equipment which normally forms part of the parachuted material will be dropped. Parachutes with a diameter of one hundred feet will be used for this phase of the operation. Use of C-122 assault aircraft to land and deliver supplies on the Drop Zone is also scheduled.

Army spokesmen suggested that visitors follow this simple rule: Those living West of Lampasas County should travel to the Drop Zone by way of San Saba. Those living in or East of Lampasas County should move to the Drop Zone. (Continued on Back Page.)

## Drawing For City Election Ballot Is Made As School Candidates File

Names for places on the ballot for the Goldthwaite city elections that will be held on April 1 were drawn officially during the past week and a number of candidacies were filed for the School Board elections that will be conducted throughout the County on April 5.

Drawing for places on the Goldthwaite city election ballot was by City Secretary Raymond Summy in the presence of members of the Municipal Council. As result of the drawing, names will appear on the ballot in the following order:

For Mayor, Howard Hoover, Charlie T. Wilson. For Aldermen, with three to be elected, J. D. Harper, George R. Gilbert, V. C. Bradford, Jack Reid and Carl Letbetter.

Candidacies for seats on the Board of Trustees of the Goldthwaite Independent School District increased to four this week when C. L. "Solly" Featherston entered the race. Previously Talbot Ledbetter and Malcolm Jernigan had filed as candidates for the Goldthwaite Board and Vance Cockrell had said that he would seek reelection.

For the Mills County Board of School Trustees, the name of Chairman Jim Soules of Star has been filed for reelection by petition. The petitioners who filed the name of Mr. Soules with County Judge Lewis B. Porter, who is Superintendent of Schools, ex-officio, were Charles R. Hunter, LeRoy Beard, J. D. Hunt, Fred Soules and Miss Billie Soules. Mr. Beard is Superintendent of Schools at Star and Miss Soules teaches English in the Star School. Pre-

viously Luther E. Booker had filed for the County School Board, Precinct 1—the seat for which is to be vacated by Howard B. Campbell. As yet no candidacy has been filed for the Precinct 4 seat that will be vacated by Cecil Egger, who is running for election as a County Commissioner.

In the April 5 elections for members of the Board of the Star Independent School District two seats are to be filled and there are, so far, four candidates for them. The candidates are Wesley Woodard and Clark Miller for reelection, and W. L. Alexander and Jack Elms. The petitioners who supported these candidacies were the same as those who filed with Judge Porter in behalf of Mr. Soules for the County Board, including members of the Star School administration and faculty.

In the Priddy Common School District, where the terms of O. L. Harris and W. W. Limmer are to expire, the following candidacies have been filed by petition with Judge Porter:

O. L. Harris, for reelection; Al Feist, Charlie Schrader, Carl Jeske, Jr., and George Hiller.

The petitioners were the Rev. A. H. Muehlbrad, G. R. Wagner, Albert Schumann, W. A. Bufe, and J. Walter Warwitz.

In the Mullin Independent School District the candidates for two seats, as previously reported, are M. L. Ethridge and Kyle Smith for reelection, and Clyde Hodges, Jack Cooksey, Derwood Chesser and Hubert Reeves.

March 24 is the deadline for the filing of candidacies for School Boards. The deadline for the filing of candidacies in city elections already has passed.

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A CIVIC DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

A very important announcement with far-reaching possibilities for great good was made last week from the stage of the Goldthwaite Grammar School auditorium by Ray Duren. As President of the Goldthwaite Lions Club he told the public generally that the Lions have accepted responsibility for the leadership that is necessary to give Goldthwaite and Mills County an out-of-doors recreation center that will include a swimming pool.

Details of the high hopes of the Civic Development Committee of the Goldthwaite Lions Club may be found in the first page news article in this week's Eagle. But there are several matters that, in our opinion, ought to be emphasized. They are:

1 — The Goldthwaite Lions Club, in assuming leadership toward a goal that, if achieved, will be of great benefit to everybody in Mills County, will need all of the help it can receive. That means that organizations and individuals should rally immediately around the Lions Club leadership. They should devise every possible means of raising money to make a good and big dream come true. The result, if there turns out to be the desired result, will be well worth the effort. A really worthwhile recreation center, such as Lampasas has in Hancock Park, will mean a lot to Mills County. It will provide wholesome play and pleasure for our own people and it will bring people here.

2 — The Goldthwaite Lions Club this very month is working under the Presidency of Ray Ruren to increase its own membership. Every man who is not at present a member of the Lions Club here should join it, attend its meetings, and work with it. That means, among other things, that the editor of this newspaper is going to abandon a policy of 35 years' standing. For the sake of maintaining his objectivity as a journalist he has consistently refused to join anything but religious and purely social groups. The Lions Club here in Goldthwaite, however, obviously is at present so concerned with the public welfare that the Eagle editor has asked if he may be accepted into membership so that he may practice what he advocates; so that he may work with the men of this community for the good that the Lions are undertaking locally.

Others who also want to see Goldthwaite realize the promises that the future holds for it also ought to consult with Joe Bailey Karnes, Chairman of the Lions Club Membership Committee. Then, both old members and new members should make it their business to attend every meeting and to accept and carry through to conclusion all assignments that may be given to them. It is a high privilege and an honor to serve a good community that is striving to be even better—and honor and privilege, both, are waiting for the men of Goldthwaite who now are not working, attending members of the Lions Club.

The subject of this editorial is only the start of what will be a long and — it is to be hoped — a continuing story. But the editorial cannot close without a resounding cheer for E. T. Fairman, President of the Mills County State Bank, who has offered to make available both the land and the water necessary for the recreation center that Goldthwaite needs so badly and that can be so much of a boon to all of us, both individually and collectively. Mr. Fairman has given a big starting push to a project that Goldthwaite and Mills County need and from which there can be great benefit; it is up to everybody to keep on pushing to the point of completion. The job CAN be done.

GUEST EDITORIAL

(Editor's Note: In a biting article entitled "Government For Friends," and with "Harry At The Fountainhead" as its sub-title, Robert C. Ruark has written that the "... ripe, rich odor" of the Truman relin is a product "not so much of open bribery" but rather of what Washington calls "friendship." The scathingly penetrating article by Mr. Ruark follows:

The sacred word, "friendship," like many another old value, has been twisted and turned and abused by the times until it has lost a deal of the meaning that once sanctified it as the noblest relationship between men.

Friends were what you laid down your life for; gave the shirt off your back for. Friendship surpassed the love of man for woman, and endured after blood ties were severed. Friendship has been corrupted into what amounts now to an almost-dirty word, a synonym for devious dealing and crooked pressure.

Blair Bolles' new book on corruption in government, called "How to Get Rich in Washington" stresses the fact that the messy stew of favors that lent such a ripe, rich odor to the Truman relin was produced not so much of open bribery as what Washington calls "friendships."

Friendship is a variety of things in Washington. It can be bought by suave favors, the gifts and trips and social drinkings. It can be smoothly blackmailed by past association or tomorrow's prospects. It is bartered by telephone and the swift chit, the hasty introduction, and the difficult connection. Friendship has turned into a slippery commodity which, when brought to light, always seems surrounded by scandal and incompetence. The flower of friendship, 1952, style, has been the fix, the deal, the illicit monkeyshine, the sinister attachment.

The switch on friendship in Washington has been that the friends have covered for one another, and attempted to make one another rich and secure off what was not theirs to bestow—government loans, clearances, subsidies, tax adjustments. The bonus is no more on the giver than the receiver. It merely rests on friendship.

Government by crony has been the special promise of the Truman operation, with Harry himself as the fountainhead of the perversion. Since last August and in one way or another, Goldthwaite and Mills County have been cooperating in every way possible with the great, joint

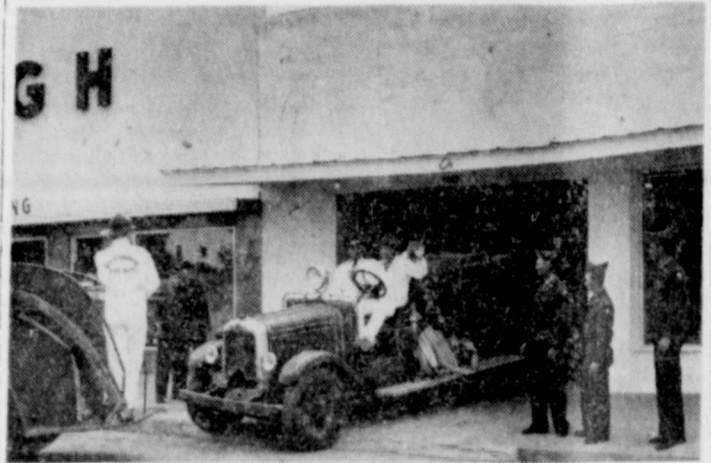

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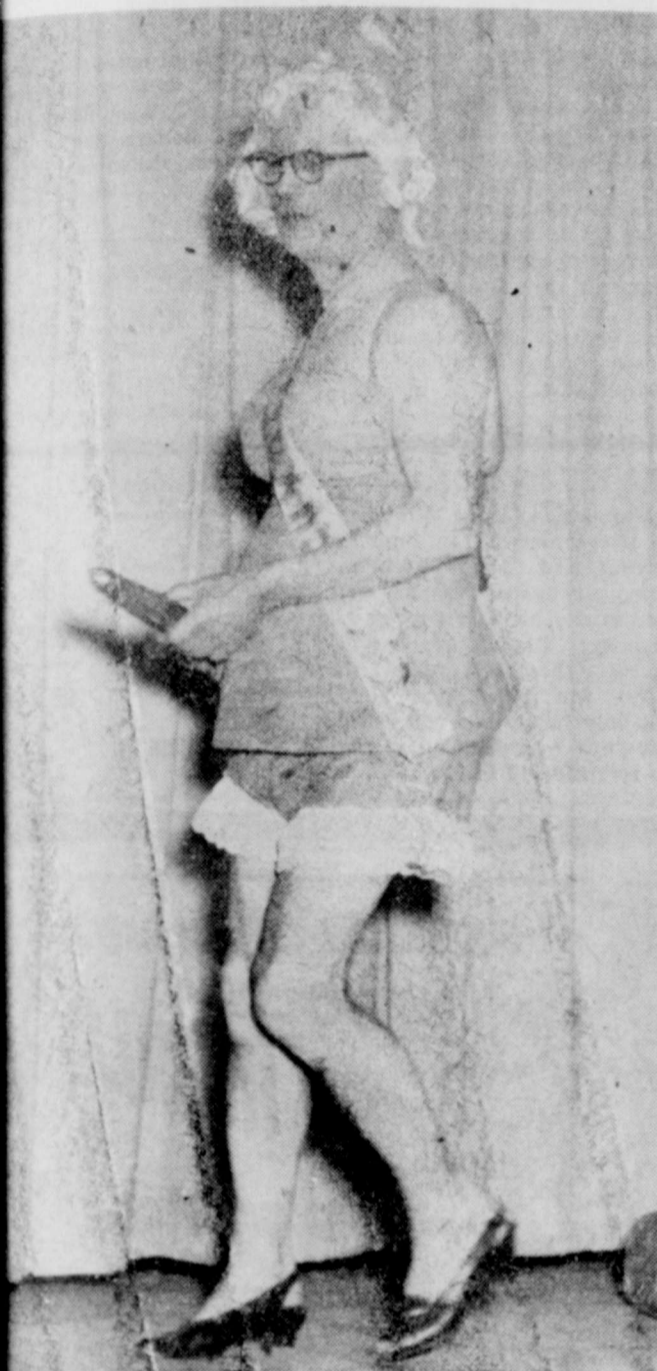

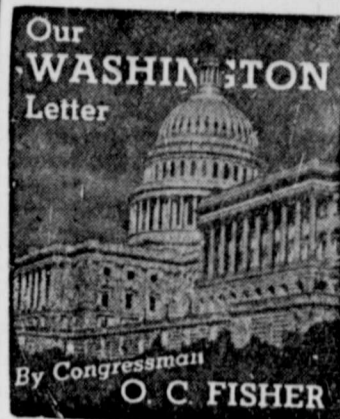

In the first show-down vote the Congress has ever taken on UMT, the House last week scuttled the proposal by a vote of 236 to 162.

It was regarded by some as an election year about-face, the House having approved the principle of UMT a year ago by a 10-to-1 margin. The sole question before the House last week was the rules under which the program would function. Without these rules written into law, the training machinery will remain inoperative. I voted against scuttling the program.

Actually, the training rules, prepared by a civilian-controlled commission and the House Armed Services Committee, eliminated most of the objections that have been raised by the public. Among these were:

1. The plan voted down last week prohibited any military control over the training of the trainees—that control being committed to a civilian-dominated commission, subject to the direction and control of the Congress. After training, the reservists thus created would be subject to active duty only by special action of Congress.

2. The training plan would provide the maximum of protection against undesirable environment and immoral influences while training—even more so than can now be provided in most of the colleges.

3. When fully effective, as a reserve pool of "ready reserves" would be created the standing forces would be substantially reduced without reducing the Nation's security, at an estimated saving to the taxpayers of \$13 billion annually.

At the same time, if the UMT program had been approved, the Korean veterans—and other veterans—would have been given a break. Men now on

duty, under present law will when released after two years, automatically be subject to six more years of stand-by duty in the reserves. If another war or expanded emergency should develop in the future, these veteran reservists may be the only "ready reserves" of fighting men available.

That happened when we got into the Korean war. With our embattled forces facing possible disaster and pushed back to a small periphery around

Pusan, the Pentagon turned to the trained reserves—nearly all of them veterans of the last war—and called 800,000 of them away from the wives, children and jobs. That was done even though there were around two million young non-veterans who had reached military age after 1945. They were available for draft, but it would have taken months to train them and General MacArthur called for trained men immediately.

The whole purpose of UMT is to give basic training to non-veterans, then return them to civilian life in a ready reserve status, subject to call in case Congress should in the future decide an emergency should justify their call to active duty.

But with the defeat of UMT, the only ready reserve forces that can be counted on, in the main, will be those who have fought in Korea and in World War II. Many of us think that burden should not be confined to veterans of other wars but should be primarily assumed by youthful non-veterans—products of UMT.

On the subject of fairness, a good question was asked: "Isn't it fairer to train four trainees for six months than it is to draft one recruit of the same age for 24 months of actual service?"

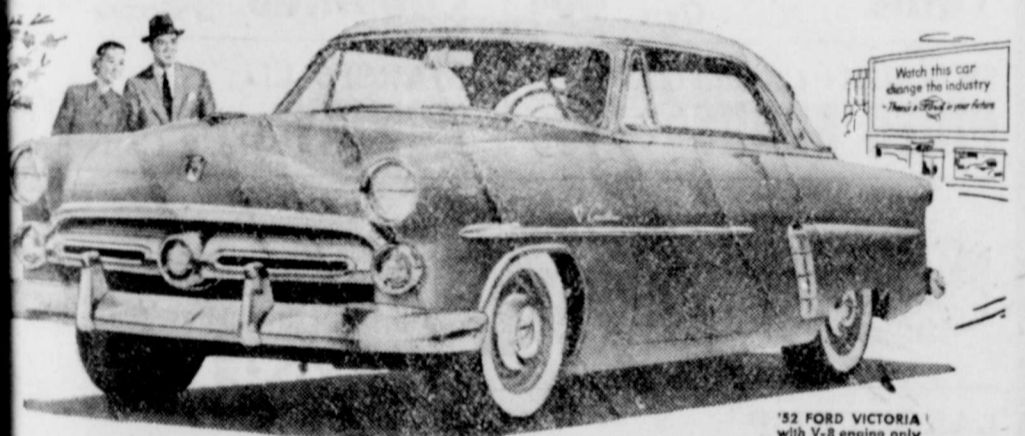

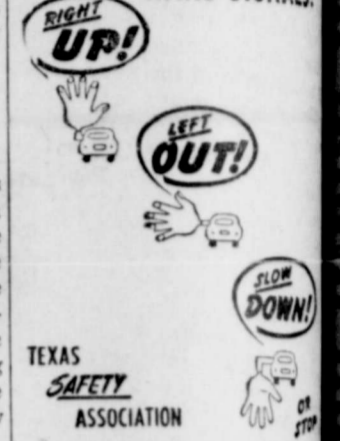

"The real need of Europe today is not a new political set-up nor a better economical or social drive, but a spiritual awakening," states the French minister.

"The five million Communists in France could very well take over the key positions in that land and bring the Communist border to the Atlantic unless American Christians realize the spiritual needs of western Europe, a civilized paganism, and fill the vacuum that Soviet Russia has been filling in Europe so far.

This young Baptist missionary evangelist has been referred to many times as a "Firebrand for God." Recently he conducted 31 campaigns in France, England, Ireland, Germany, Corsica, Norway, and North Africa. Over 800 decisions were reported from these campaigns.

The 28-year-old French Baptist, who worked in the French underground against the Nazis in World War II and is a personal friend of many of Europe's leaders, will sail for Europe June 1 on the French liner, Liberte'.

## THE REV. ED H. LOVELACE PREACHES THAT ALCOHOLISM IS A COMMUNITY PROBLEM TO WHICH PUBLIC INDIFFERENCE CONTRIBUTES

Preaching last Sunday morning at the First Methodist Church of Goldthwaite, the Rev. Ed H. Lovelace, Pastor, said that alcoholism is a community problem for which any community must be responsible and he called for "the practice of total abstinence from alcoholic beverages as a wise way of life."

Brother Lovelace took the 13th verse of the eighth chapter of Corinthians I as his text. It was: "Wherefore, if meat made my brother to stumble, I will eat no flesh while the world standeth lest I cause my brother to stumble."

He said that although science thinks of alcoholism as a disease, "yet no person ever became an alcoholic who had refused to take a first drink." Then he added:

"Since even science cannot tell until it is too late who can drink with moderation, the only safe course of action is total abstinence."

By his own admission, the sermon by Brother Lovelace was long and at its close he said:

"I have no apology for keeping you later than usual even if the roast in the oven at home burns. There are poor souls in our community who have been burning in a living hell all because we have been in too much of a hurry or too indifferent to do something about removing the temptation to drink from our community."

In part, the remainder of the sermon by Brother Lovelace was as follows:

"Each Church in Methodism is asked to observe Commitment Sunday the first Sunday in Lent. The local Methodist Church observes it as the prelude to the Week of Dedication. A commitment to sobriety is an appropriate way to begin dedication. If members are not willing to sign a pledge of total abstinence from alcoholic beverages, there will not be much dedicating of lives to a higher loyalty to the Master during

the week.

"The Discipline of the Methodist Church contains the stand of our Church on the use of alcoholic beverages. It says: 'The Church of Jesus Christ from its very nature stands in variance with the liquor traffic. For it to be silent in its opposition would be disloyal to its function. . . . The liquor traffic never yet has adhered to truth or law except under compulsion.'

"It was said that the saloon never would be brought back, but it was brought back. It was said that Repeal would cut taxation, but taxation was not cut. It was promised that the liquor traffic would be good, but it proved itself worse than it was remembered to have been. . . .

"Science has demonstrated that alcohol is a vicious drug. Jails and courts of law reveal what a factor alcohol is as a creator of crime. Insanity and vice declare how dangerous is the use of alcoholic beverages to human welfare. And respectable people, by their patronage of a destructive traffic, prove how incompetent and careless is public thinking in the face of this destroyer. Therefore, an aroused public needs to assert its powers in the defense of society. Reeling men and women—finished products of the open saloon—make the call for sobriety urgent, even to the extent of immediacy.

"In this hour Methodism accepts its responsibility and calls all members to join the fight. We stand for the Christian principle of total abstinence. Since human welfare decreases as the drinking of alcohol increases, we stand opposed to continuation of the organized liquor traffic. We urge Congress to enact legislation to prohibit all advertising of intoxicating liquor. Methodism has insisted and does now insist that intoxicating liquor cannot be legalized without sin.

"Jesus said, 'If any man will come after me, let him deny

himself and take up his cross daily and follow me.' We are not following Jesus when we drink even occasionally. The body of a Christian is the temple of the Lord and anything which harms the body is a sin. In the second place the person who drinks, consciously or otherwise, is exerting an influence on those about him.

"He likewise is patronizing an industry that causes millions every year to fall and brings to their loved ones heartache, a feeling of disgrace, and too often, poverty and want."

At the conclusion of last Sunday morning's Service of Worship at the First Methodist Church of Goldthwaite a number of those who were present signed the Commitment Card. It reads:

"The Lord Jesus Christ, being my helper, I commit myself to sobriety and a good example by adopting for myself the principle and practice of total abstinence from alcoholic beverages as a wise way of life."

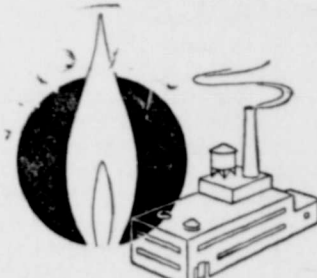
me. Since they had already convinced me that the cleaner would be of no use to me, all I could do was tell them go without a sale.

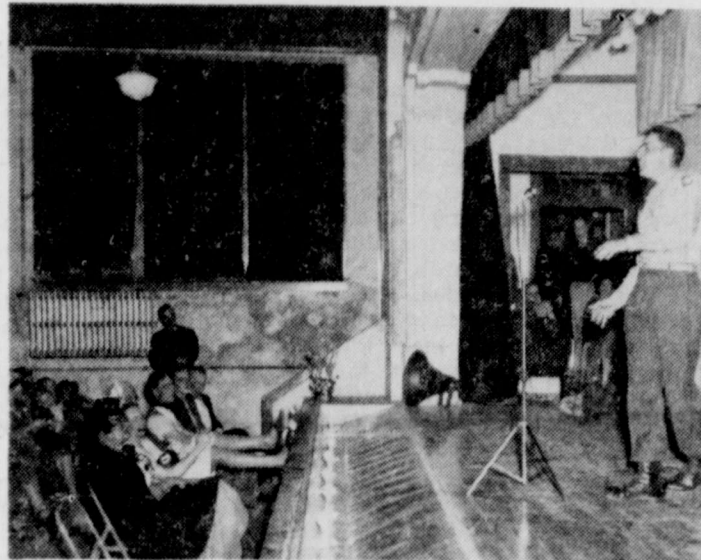

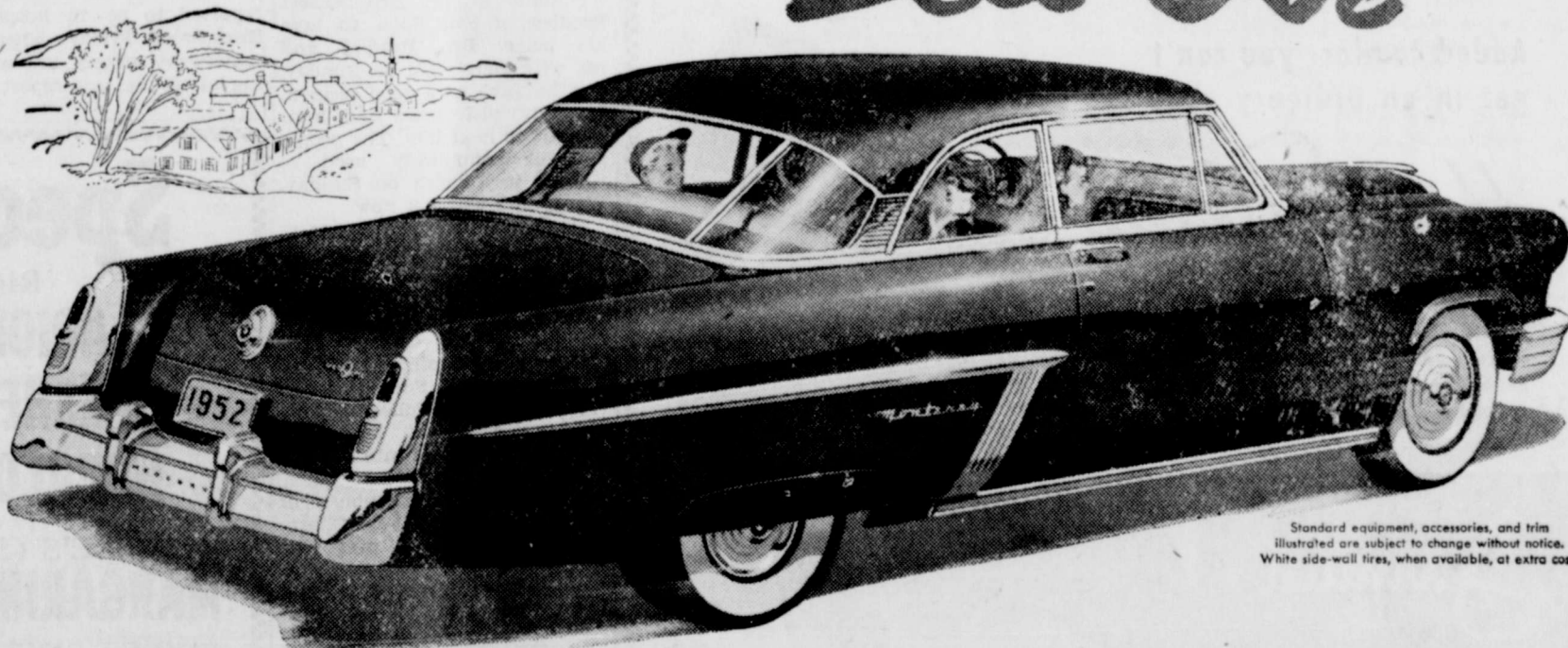

nance crop plantings. Accordingly, disaster loans now are available in all Texas Counties.  
Farmers who have sustained production losses on crops and livestock may apply for funds to pay for seed, fertilizer and materials for insect control where needed, gas and oil for tractors, feed for livestock, essential farm and home operating expenses, machinery repairs and other expenses incident to the production of a crop.

Credit is advanced under authority of Public Law 38 and is available to farmers who have sustained losses, and who cannot obtain from local sources the funds needed to plant a crop this year. Before a loan is made a County Committee of three farmers must certify that the applicant suffered a substantial production loss.

Better farming practices are emphasized in the FHA loan program. These will be discussed and agreed upon by the county supervisor and the applicant when the loan application is prepared. A program of diversification is the safest course. Farmers who have carried out a balanced farming program with livestock do not need emergency aid this year even though they did sustain losses because of drought conditions last year, according to a survey of case files.

via Lometa. Military Police will be stationed at key points leading to the Drop Zone and will assist visitors in reaching the spectator areas. Parking zones will be set aside for their use.

No grandstand arrangements can be made by the Army; visitors are advised to bring folding chairs or similar items, for seating during the demonstration.

Stationary displays of airborne equipment will be set up in the visitors area. Qualified personnel will be on hand to answer questions from persons interested; visitors will be encouraged to examine the displays and inquire about airborne warfare in general.

Before and during the actual airborne operation, loudspeakers will carry a running commentary by a staff officer on each phase of the jump, and how it is carried out.

The troopers, once on the ground, will quickly assemble into their proper units, prepared to move forward toward their assigned objectives. A similar airborne drop, scheduled during the field phase of Exercise Longhorn, will give the 31st Infantry, 4th Infantry, and the 1st Armored Divisions, all reactivated last year, valuable training in defense against parachute attack as they pit themselves against the experienced 82nd Airborne Division.
