#### 3100 In Airdrop On Tuesday Seen By Our Citizens

Several hundred Mills County citizens gathered early on Tuesday morning of this week on both sides of the Colorado river near the bridge on the highway to San Saba to watch one of the most spectacular events in the Army-Air Force maneuver, Exercise Longhorn. It was a drop by approximately 3,100 paratroopers of the 508th Airborne Regimental Combat Team from Fort Benning, Ga.

One paratrooper was killed when his parachute "streamered"-failed to open-and there were a number of injuries because of a gusty ground wind The major drop was on land owned by Pat Kennedy and which had been prepared in adwhich had been prepared in advance by the 46th Battalion of Put C. C. Collier Army Engineers. Other drops were on land owned by Adrian Long and many spectators wit-Long and many spectators witnessed the drop from a hilltop that is owned by L. B. Burnham.

Sgt. Lawrence Thomas of Taunton, Mass., a veteran of 67 jumps, said that Tuesday morning's drop was his "toughest" because of the wind. In addition to personnel, much equipment, ranging from loaves of bread. machine guns and ammunition to jeeps, trucks and artillery also were dropped, but the final two flights of planes from San Angelo kept their cargo aboard warned of too much danger because of a steadily rising wind

The paratroopers were dropof 15 men. Within a few minutes men and at eight o'clock there was a mass jump by several hundreds. The spectacle continued for more than two hours. At about the same time, two fighter planes collided in midair near Evant. The pilot of one plane was killed but the pilot of the other parachuted to safety.

Just before the mass jump and for a short time afterwards the highway between Goldthwaite and San Saba was closed by military police, operating the 307th MP Battalion, to all but authorized vehicular traffic.

By the time our subscribers read these words, Goldthwaite and Mills County will have had some exciting and long-to-be remembered experiences because of the gigantic Army-Air Force maneuvers, Exercise Longhorn.

This was the week for the "liberation" of both Goldthwaite and Mills County. What with the First Armored Division roaring around the very outskirts of our town and with the 31st Infantry Division actually coming into the Square of Goldthwaite, nobody will have been in any doubt about the fact of Exercise Longhorn or the visible evidences of "liberation.

What has not been so clearly understood is the pretense that since March 25 we have been ground under the heel of an Aggressor Force. In reality it has been Major General Charles D. W. Canham's splendid 82nd Airborne Division but in practice, for maneuver purposes and in simulation so far as civilaans have been concerned, it has been an alien, totalitarian conqueror who has denied individual freedom, loused up our elections, closed our schools and Churches, suppressed freedom of the press and of assembly, and confiscated both private and public property.

Lampasas last week had a show in which the Aggressors were present and very much "visible and in which there was not only a Military Governor but also a grand entry with flourishes by "the illustrious "General Gustav Muller" — the name that was tacked on General Canham when he put on the green uniform of the Trigon or Centralist Party. In theory, Goldthwaite has been just as much under the cruel sway of the Aggressor as Lampasas was on Thursday of last week and that is why there was so much commotion this week when we were "liberated" by Major General Bruce C. Clarke's crack First Armored Diwision, Major General Alexander G. Paxton's 31st Infantry Division from Fort Jackson at Columbia, S. C., and Major General Norman E. Hendrickson's 47th or Viking Division from Camp Rucker at Dothan, Ala. Of course, everybody knows that General Clarke's First Armored Division's station is at Fort Hood and that General Clarke's 31st is called the Dixie Division.

The point of this editorial is that this area COULD be occupied by an Aggressor, who most certainly would deny what is left of freedom to us. But the point also is that American fighting men. hed by such commanders as Generals Clarke, Paxton and Hendrickson, are capable of defeating aggression - if we give them the support that they

Along about the time that this editorial meets the eyes of Eagle readers there will have been posted in the Mills County Court House and elsewhere in Mills County and Goldthwaite some proclamations over the signature of Lieutenant General William M. Hoge, who actually commands the Fourth Army, with headquarters at Fort Sam Houston in San Antonio but who, for the purposes of Exercise Longhorn, is the Commander, Gulf Theater of Operations. That word "Gulf" is in there because it is assumed, for maneuver purposes, that the Aggressor landed from the sea and has his supply route through Corpus Christi.

The proclamations will restore the freedoms that would be denied if a real aggressor were to get the upper hand among us. Those freedoms are those which all of us enjoy but which so many of us take for granted, not realizing that very few among the more than two billion people in the world have them or even know about them.

Exercise Longhorn has been more than a training of troops and a testing of staff planning and organization. It has been a demonstration, at least to those who have been willing to think about it, that freedom is won and preserved only in struggle. So long as there are men who are willing to fight for it, there will be freedom - but it can be lost if we are mot both ready and willing to do battle against the forces that seek to enslave mankind.

For the men in the Army and Air Force, Exercise Longhorn has been very serious business. It has been serious, also, for the ranchers and farmers who so generously gave the use of their land for maneuver purposes. Damage has been inevitable especially to fences and to land over which tanks have rumbled. There has been some damage to livestock and poultry. But pledges of repairs or compensation were made in entirely good faith. Claims should be filed with John Slay at the Real Estate and Claims Office at Fort Hood. Mr. Yarborough even depleted the stocks of red cloth in his mercantile establishment. He used squares of the cloth to mark the points at which his guerrillas had operated - something which was not included in the umpire rules nor in the control regulations of the Maneuver Director, Lieutenant General William M. Hoge, who normally is Fourth Army Commander but who, in Exercise Longhorn, commanded the Gulf Theater of Operations.

One puzzled umpire is known to have taken one of Mr. Yarborough's squares of red cloth and to have pocketed it with the remark that it would make a fine neckerchief for his wife.

Another umpire, not knowing to whom he was talking, volunteered to "Mr. X" the information that the Aggressors had no such propaganda machine as that which was aiding the U.S. Forces. He was not told that the clarion call to "TEXANS -AMERICANS" to ARISE was inspired by Major General Bruce C. Clarke of the First Armored Division, who made it possible to spread thousands of leaflets that contained the words, DOWN WITH THE AGGRES-SOR" and "REMEMBER THE ALAMO! REMEMBER GOLIAD! REMEMBER LOMETA! RE-MEMBER PIDCOKE!"


