Funeral services for Pfc. Earl Sebolt who lost his life in the Korean war, will be held at 2 o'clock this Friday afternoon at the First Baptist Church of Goldthwaite with the Rev. T. Ayers, Pastor, and Rev. Fate Collier of Coppell, officiating. Interment will be in the Goldthwaite Cemetery.

Sebolt's widow, the former Mrs. Grady Duncan, daughter of Mr. Grady Duncan of Goldthwaite, this week received a letter from her late husband's commanding officer informing her of the death by drowning of her son, on July 3 at Birch Lake Recreational Center.

Member of this organization, 4th Infantry, Ladd Air Force Base, Milton was killed by an enemy plane. Lieut. David wrote to Mrs. Sebolt. "He was an excellent soldier, performing his tasks in a cheerful and efficient manner, thereby earning the respect of his superior officers and men."

Soil Service Man Describes How Organic Residue Prevents Erosion

Whether or not terraces alone will protect cropland from erosion has been the basis for many a discussion by farmers and agriculturists alike. You can find the answer to this question by observing terraced fields after heavy rains. Small gullies form between terraces to carry silt deposits into terrace channels. Some terraces are broken because of these deposits of silt, allowing the water to gain more volume and causing more damage to terraces below. Where fields are planted to row crops and the soil is clean tilled, severe movement of soil is noted. Inter-terrace erosion is a problem on most soils. The proper use of crop residue is one way of remedying this problem.

When a soil, low in organic matter, is shifted and moved about by water, the finer particles including the organic matter is sifted out and carried away. This leaves the soil in poor condition to absorb moisture and air. Organic residue is the one thing that will stabilize the soil to stop the inter-terrace erosion.

Cooperators of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District are using several crops and plowing methods to increase the organic content of their soil. Some of these crops are sweet-clover, winter peas, grasses, grain residue and other field crops that will help to stabilize

the soil. Mr. Evans of the Democrat-Neighbor group has changed his tillage operation in the last three years to leave his crop residue as close to the surface of the soil as possible, with good results. This residue not only prevents soil movement but allows deeper penetration of water with less evaporation.

J. H. Priddy has changed from a disc plow to a one way plow and tandem to increase the soil residue. Floyd Sykes of Big Valley likes the Hoeme plow for this operation. Charlie Swindle of the Washboard Neighbor Group said very little water has run off his Madrid clover field in the last four years. Madrid clover's deep root system allows free penetration of water with little or no runoff. Some farmers have sacrificed grazing and seed crop of legumes so they might be added to the soil as green manure.

Maintaining and replenishing the organic content of the soil is a continual process and is one of the most important soil and water conservation practices in use today.

With a good sound knowledge of soil, along with improved techniques in applying organic material to the soil, farmers are "licking" this problem of soil movement between terraces.

Col. Lewis urged that anybody with damage claims resulting from Exercise Longhorn be certain to see Captain Garrett at the Court House on Friday.

Mills County Republicans, galvanized into action by the three letters that spell "IKE," this week posted an official notice for a precinct convention at the Mills County Court House on July 26 and for a county convention, also at the Court House, on August 2.

In view of the recent death of S. J. Eaton of Mullin, Mrs. J. H. Saylor has assumed the acting chairmanship of the Republican Party in Mills County and Mrs. H. R. Ekins is acting secretary. Their names were affixed to the notice on the Court House bulletin board calling for a precinct convention at the Court House at 2:00 p. m., on July 26, a meeting of the Republican executive committee at 1:30 p. m., on August 2 and a county convention at the Court House at 2:00 p. m., on August 2.

Persons who participate in the Republican precinct meeting on July 26 will be in violation of the law if they enter the first Democratic primary election on July 26.

The Republican county convention on August 2 will select delegates to the Republican State Convention, which will be held on August 26. Copies of the Republican notice that was posted at the Court House this week were filed with County Clerk Earl Summy and with Carlos G. Watson of Brownsville, Secretary of the Republican State Executive Committee.

Persons who participate in Republican meetings from the precinct level on up will be required to sign the following declaration: "I am a Republican and desire to participate in Republican Party activities in the year 1952."

Local Republicans said this week that they would welcome newcomers to their ranks, in line with national policy.

Restriction On Use Of Water Is Eased By Council

The Goldthwaite City Council, which last week requested consumers to conserve on the use of water, announced this week an improvement in the situation which will make it possible for householders to water their lawns from 5:00 o'clock until 7:00 o'clock in the evening.

Jesse Moreland, President pro tempore of the City Council, thanked the citizens for their cooperation in water conservation.

"I am happy to say that if the watering of lawns, flower beds and shrubbery is confined to the hours between 5:00 p. m., and 7:00 p. m., we shall be able to relax conservation measures," Mr. Moreland said. "We have had splendid voluntary cooperation."

Mr. Moreland added that water still should be used carefully and not wasted. However, after daily checks with Fred Laughlin of City Utilities, he and other members of the City Council agreed that continued care against waste will make possible a relaxation of voluntary restrictions that were applied on Friday of last week when a circular was distributed warning that water consumption had exceeded pumping facilities.

In announcing the relaxation of restrictions Mr. Moreland urged that all watering of yards be discontinued at 7:00 p. m., so that during the night pumping operations could replenish reservoir supplies.

Bishop To Dedicate Center City Church

The Rev. C. A. Hogan of the Star-Center City-Pleasant Grove circuit announced this week that September 14 has been set as the date for formal dedication of the Center City Methodist Church. The dedication will be by Bishop A. Frank Smith. Also participating will be the Rev. L. U. Spellman, Superintendent of the Kerrville District. Brother Hogan said that an impressive program had been planned — the details of which will be announced at a later date.

More than 100 ballots cast in a "straw poll" to determine whether Goldthwaite wants a swimming pool have resulted, so far, in only four votes against the project.

The overwhelmingly favorable response and pledges of cooperation prompted the Goldthwaite



Lions Club to decide at a meeting last Tuesday night to proceed with planning for the swimming pool. A presentation of latest developments was made by Ray Duren who emphasized that:

1— Water is NOT a problem even during drought since a swimming pool would require no more water than is consumed by the occupants of a residence.

2— The question of taxpayer's money is NOT involved since it is proposed to finance the swimming pool by subscriptions and by revenue bonds — the interest and principal of which would be paid off by the proceeds from admissions to the pool.

Of the four votes cast against the swimming pool project, one called for farm-to-market roads instead. That, it was pointed out, is a responsibility of government. Another called for a hospital instead of a swimming pool. Surveys have shown, it was pointed out, that Mills County would NOT be able to maintain even a small hospital without the use of public funds — which would NOT be required by a swimming pool. Two persons objected to a swimming pool on the grounds of insufficient water. In reply, proponents emphasized that a swimming pool would be filled at a time when water would be plentiful supply and that the same water would be used and re-used through the season because of up-to-date filtering and purification processes.

Incidentally, one of the "NO" voters described the swimming pool project as "a scheme hatched up by a few people to give a job to some persons at the expense of the tax payers." In reply, sponsors of the pool project said there was nothing wrong with providing jobs for (Continued on Back Page.)

WE ARE FOR IKE TOO

On the grounds that the welfare of the Country comes first, we hope that General Dwight D. Eisenhower will be elected to the Presidency of the United States of America.

Many another newspaper that previously has confined its endorsements to Democratic candidates is or will be expressing the same hope.

Here in Texas the influential Caller-Times of Corpus Christi already has urged the election of General Eisenhower in November, "regardless of who opposes him." That action marked the first time that the Corpus Christi newspaper had ever given its endorsement to a Republican candidate.

General Eisenhower is a "no deal" man. We are for him all of the way and we believe that the result of the voting on November 4 will show that many, many millions of our fellow-Americans want a change for the better — including giving self respect back to the mink.

THE OLD GUARD PASSES — OUT

At Chicago last week there was a revolution within the Republican Party. To mean anything, a revolution has to be successful and the revolution within the ranks of the Republicans was so successful that the Old Guard was tossed out and a new, vitalized and inspiring leadership took its place behind the proud banner of General Dwight D. Eisenhower.

With the tossing out of the Old Guard the Republican Party now has unbolted the door and it welcomes those who have been disillusioned by the corruption that has developed among the Democrats in the course of two decades of entrenched power. EDITORIAL**

(Editor's Note: Although it was published as a news article, a dispatch from Chicago by Allen Duckworth to the Dallas Morning News last Sunday was in effect a very fine editorial on the impact of the Republican National Convention on the South. Mr. Duckworth's article follows below in full.)

By ALLEN DUCKWORTH

The South—once its arch enemy—has given the Republican party a new vision.

No longer is the Republican party an exclusive club.

It has thrown wide its doors to the people who are disgusted with the Fair Deal—the independents and the disillusioned Democrats.

Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, a few hours after arriving here a week ago to take personal charge of his nomination battle, called on the delegates to the convention to overthrow the party bosses. They did.

But the sensational events of the last two weeks were a climax to the years of work by two Southerners.

It was the Texas fight, led by Jack Porter of Houston, and the Louisiana scrap, commanded by John Minor Wisdom, that grew into a national issue.

Porter and Wisdom have a simple plan for building two-party government:

If the Republican party were to become as big as the Democratic party in the South, the GOP must have more members.

How to get more members? Well, you invited independents and disgusted Democrats to join the Republican party.

The Old Guard leadership in Texas and Louisiana found a way to throw out the Porter and Wisdom groups.

The traditional political viewpoint would have been, "Well, that's politics." Convention rigging is nothing new. This time, however, there was a factor the politicians hadn't figured. Thousands of people had participated in precinct conventions. You could argue with them till the end of their days and you couldn't explain to them why a minority could upset a majority.

A surge of indignation ran through Texas and Louisiana. The Taft leadership didn't realize just how angry the people were becoming.

By the time they woke up, the Texas story had become a national issue.

Desperately, the Taft leaders tried to calm the storm.

Falling, they tried to compromise. They got together in hotel rooms and tried to make deals for delegates.

Compromise was rejected. Sen. Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr., Eisenhower's manager, said he would not swap around in closed rooms with the people's votes.

The spirit of revolt swept the Taft men from the convention floor and nominated General Eisenhower for President.

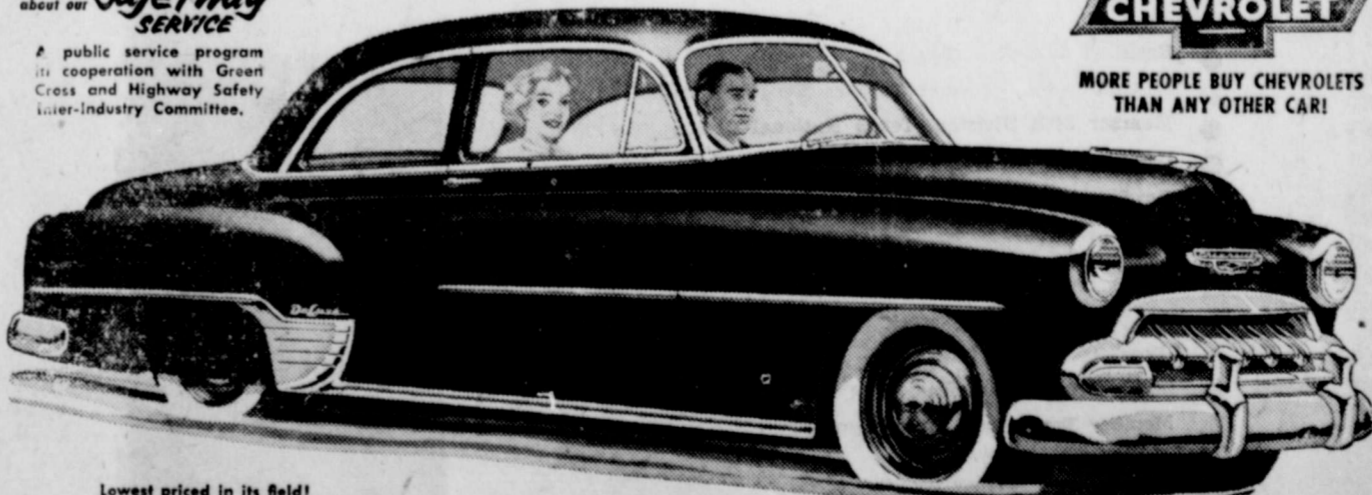

Shivers Against Auto Inspection Law; "Shall Change It Or Repeal It" He Says

Governor Allan Shivers said today that the new auto inspection law should either be modified or repealed.

The Governor told the Press before he left Austin for Houston to make a campaign appearance that he had some ideas for changing the controversial law.

His idea is to take the red tape and confusion out of the law.

"The law was intended to bring about real safety and not inconvenience," said Governor Shivers.

"We need to stop killings on the highways. Texas has become the number one State in the United States for murder on the highways.

"The Legislature passed this inspection law by a vote of 117 to 12 in the House of Representatives and 19 to 9 in the State Senate, with the thought that it would save more than 200 Texas lives each year. If this law fails to do this and instead causes confusion and inconvenience, it ought to be changed or repealed."

The Governor said that he would recommend to the next session of the Legislature that it re-study and examine this law in view of the experience and either modify it or repeal it.

(Several months ago, when it became apparent that the new law was causing inconvenience and confusion, Governor Shivers ordered it suspended until it can be reviewed by the Legislature.)

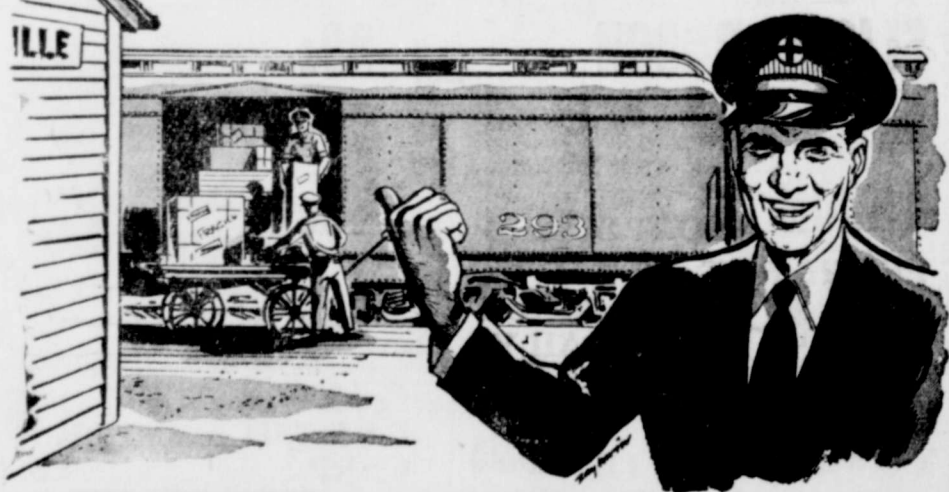

AFTER ONE YEAR IN TEXAS THE BAXTERS, FORMERLY OF SCOTLAND, LIKE LIFE HERE

Editor's Note: On July 23 last year the Andrew Baxter family came to Goldthwaite from Greenock, Scotland as the by-product of an offer by E. B. Goldthwaite, Monument builder, to replace the of Stone, which had been stolen from Westminster in London but which was returned to its place on the Coronation Chair, the approach of the first anniversary of the arrival of the Baxter family was asked for his impressions of the heart of Texas, U. S. Here is what Mr. Baxter wrote:

ANDREW BAXTER

Now nearly one year we were sponsored here by E. B. Adams. I have been asked to give my opinion of the first year. To begin with, I never would look forward to what I am doing now. At

first, we thought that we would have died from the Texas heat but now we are acclimated to it and, as the Scots would say: "It's nae bother."

You can picture how my wife felt when she was able to walk around in a grocery store and be able to buy anything she wanted.

Other things that I have found out include that a poor man can run a car here as long as he is willing to work. Back in Scotland that would be impossible, unless he sacrificed essential things. Further, the highways here are something worth seeing and the towns are more colorful. So are women's clothes — but I am NOT committing myself by saying whether the women in America are better looking than the women in Scotland.

At first, I got mixed up when in conversation with people they kept saying "old boy." But now I know that an "old boy" can be of any age. Also, it was confusing to us a year ago when

The people here are just the same in many ways as the people in Scotland. The Scots tell their jokes about their own tightness just as the Texans brag about their own State.

Well, I didn't expect to see the pavements lined with gold, as the Irish story goes, and my road has not been too smooth. But I am not complaining in any way. Maybe the experience of living in "austerity" in Scotland has helped.

But since working about here I have listened to certain people moaning and groaning about the high food costs and taxes. All I can say is that it is a pity these same people couldn't arrange to have a vacation in either Scotland or England and then they would soon realize how well off they are here in the U. S. A.

It is the housewife who suffers back in Scotland when she has to figure out what to cook for a meal every day when the ration for each person FOR A WEEK is one-half pound of sugar, two ounces of bacon, four ounces of tea, one-half pound of meat — with eggs varying from one to four.

people spoke to us as "you all." But who am I to criticize anybody — especially with my brogue? Maybe after a few years I will have that old Southern drawl for you all!

The other day I heard two men discussing the two ocean

liners, the Queen Mary and the Queen Elizabeth as English ships. Well, for their information, the ships were built on the river Clyde in Scotland and no Scotsman likes to let England

get this honor.

The people here are more Church-minded than the Scots and they take more interest in their Churches. This, of course is based only on my observations in Goldthwaite.

I would like to conclude by saying that my hope now is to be a good citizen and to help in any way I can. In behalf of Mrs. Baxter, Susan and myself, I want to express our thanks to neighbors and to other people who have cooperated and helped us in this American way of life.

(Mr. Baxter, who is in business for himself as a commercial sign painter and muralist, intends to apply for his first papers, leading toward naturalization as an American citizen, as soon as he has had sufficient residence to enable him to do so. The Eagle believes that the people of Mills County have long since accepted the Baxters as "good citizens" and that everybody is mighty happy indeed, that the came to live here among us. — Ed.)

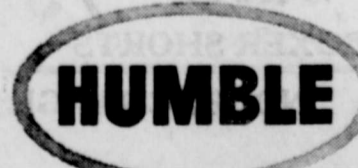
