When all of the ballots were tabulated, Mr. Patterson had unseated Judge Porter by a vote of 1,427 to 767.

Of 18 boxes, Judge Porter carried only five-and by very close margins at that. Absentee voters also gave Judge Porter 68 votes as against 60 for Mr. Patterson. The boxes that Judge Porter carried and his majorities in them were: Caradan, 5, Rattler (Jones Valley), 1, Regency, 5, Ebony, 5, and Pompey, 8. Mr. Patterson carried 13 boxes-some by as few as five votes and in some cases by 3 to 1.

From the start of the counting the outcome of the Patterson-Porter race never was in any doubt but the count was not complete until 1:00 o'clock last Sunday morning when the returns from Goldthwaite box, number 19, finally became available. That return gave Mr. Patterson 320 votes and 192 for Judge Porter. 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#### EDITORIAL BY ALLEN DUCKWORTH

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An article by Allen Duckworth of the Dallas Morning News, written from Chicago during the Democratic National Convention, merits, we believe, the thoughtful attention of all our readers-especially since the candidate of the Democrats for the Presidency of the United States was handpicked by Harry S. Truman. Mr. Duckworth's penetrating and thought-provoking article follows in full. It is better than any editorial we could write. It should be pondered throughout the South while Adlai Stevenson tries to give a new face to the same old deal.

This was old home week in the Democratic party. Like bad boys who had been blinded by the glitter of the bright lights in the big city, they flocked back to the doorstep of the mother of the party - the

It wasn't a sentimental journey altogether.

Children usually come home when they strike oil on the old homestead.

The northern party bosses needed the southern votes and they did everything short of serving blackeyed peas and mint juleps on the convention floor to prevent a Dixie walkout.

For sixteen long years, the South has been kicked around in the Democratic conventions.

The party could afford to do that. It had the minority groups of the North to appease, and Democratic national leaders didn't think it made much difference how the South was treated—it would vote Democratic just because Abe Lincoln was a Repub-

But times have changed. Party leaders with keen minds became aware of these factors in the South:

1. Population shifts had brought in new citizens, many from the North and West, who were not bound by southern traditions in voting.

2. The old-line southern Democratic leaders had had enough. They would no longer kiss the foot of the political boss who kicked them in the face.

So, the national Democratic leadership was faced with this problem:

Should the South be sacrificed in order to cater to the left-wing Northern minority groups?

Radicals like Sen. Hubert Humphrey of Minnesota said "yes"- the party could win without the South.

The men in the saddle, however, didn't figure it that way. They decided to appease the South and offend, if necessary, the hothead leftists who were trying to take over the party.

A heavy factor in swaying the practical politicians to the South was the bloc of votes brought into the convention pledged to Sen. Richard B. Russell of

Russell wasn't just a token, or protest candidate from the South. He meant business and in addition to his great core of Southern votes was gaining scattered support all over the country.

The battle was on when the conventtion opened

Monday.

Left-wingers picked Rep. Franklin D. Roosevekt, Ir., of New York and Sen. Blair Moody of Michigan to master-mind their attack on Dixie.

They couldn't have found two better men-so far

as the South was concerned.

Roosevelt and Moody bungled around for five days, like a couple of banana-fingered plumbers trying to repair a lady's wrist watch.

The two drew up a party loyalty pledge designed

to keep Southern states from voting.

Few persons understood the pledge after Roosevelt and Moody presented it. And, after they amended it, there was some doubt whether Roosevelt and Moody understood it.

After jockeying around for five days, Roosevelt and Moody could look back on this record:

1. They passed a pledge to keep three Southern

States from voting. 2. Saw the pledge set aside by the convention so

the three Southern States could vote. 3. Delayed the convention three days with useless

The South could look back on this: They had been challenged by the Liberals to take a personal pledge they would support the party nominee-even if it turned out to be an antisouthern candidate.

They thumbed their noses at the left wing, didn't

walk out and waited.

The moderates of the party found they couldn't whip the Liberals without the South.

Southern States got back in the convention with-

out taking the pledge. The net result is that the Democratic party, with the exception of the Roosevelt-Moody-Humphrey thinkers, has recognized that Southern States now have a bargaining power to match the minorities of the North.
