A. Downey Gets Precinct 3 Nod as Commissioner

The only runoff primary election that was held in Mills County last Saturday A. A. Downey won nomination, equivalent election, as County Commissioner, Precinct 3.

Downey defeated W. T. Lee by 28 votes. A total of 236 votes was cast.

Returns from Precinct 3 run-over canvassed and certified last Monday afternoon by Executive Committee of the County Democratic Party.

Results of Saturday's vote are announced by Chairman A. Palmer of the Executive Committee were:

Downey, 121; Fisher (Democrat), 30; Priddy, 158; 5; absentee ballots, 18 for a total of 332.

Mullin, 208; Fisher, 23; 28; Pompey, 24; absentee ballots, 21 — for a total of 324.

Downey and Mr. Lee emerged as the top men among candidates for nomination as County Commissioner in Precinct 3 in the first Democratic primary election on July 23. Those who were defeated in the first primary were R. T. Edmondson and E. Wooten.

Downey will take office January 1, succeeding K. B. Ray, who did not seek re-nomination. Upon taking office County Commissioner Mr. Downey will resign as member of the Mills County Board of Equal Trustees in accordance with the requirements of the constitution.

Mr. Downey thanked the voters for their support and pledged himself to work for the best interests of the citizens of Precinct 3 and for the County as a whole.

Blood Donors Urged To Sign In Effort

Persons who will be willing to donate blood when the Red Cross comes to Goldthwaite on October 9 were urged to register their names at the Fire House on the west side of the Square.

Warren P. Duren, who is in charge of recruiting donors for the October 9 visit of the Red Cross Bloodmobile unit to Goldthwaite, said that all persons have registered on cards that have been placed in the Mills County building of the American Red Cross.

Mr. Smith said, Mrs. Duren also may register with the Bloodmobile unit at the County State Bank, Mr. Duren, Secretary-Treasurer of the Red Cross Chapter.

Mr. Smith said this week that the Bloodmobile unit will take its station at the First Baptist Church of Goldthwaite from noon until 3 p. m.

Mr. Smith said, Mrs. Duren will announce sub-committee chairmen who will work to recruit blood donors in the community.

The County now is affiliated with the Regional Blood Center, which serves both civilian and military needs but, like all blood centers, is dependent upon voluntary donations.

Donors who registered for the October 9 visit of the Bloodmobile unit are helping men who are fighting for their country, and making whole blood or plasma available for disaster emergencies, and will be helping themselves or their loved ones who may be hospitalized and need transfusions, Mrs. Duren said.

When the Red Cross Bloodmobile unit made its visit to Goldthwaite last year Mills County was proud by having more blood donors than any other County in proportion to population, Duren recalled.

3 Mills County Polio Victims Aided By "March Of Dimes" Funds

Three cases of polio in Mills County this summer have been confirmed, it was announced this week by E. T. Fairman, Chairman of the Mills County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

The Chapter, of which Miss Veveva Sellers is Secretary and of which Raymond Casbeer is the Treasurer, administers funds that are raised through the annual March of Dimes. The polio cases that have been confirmed are:

Evelyn Witzsche, 2, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wilford Witzsche of Priddy. Evelyn was admitted to the Shannon West Texas Memorial Hospital in San Angelo on July 17 and was discharged on July 23. She has received continued treatment at Eden and now is able to walk, but with a limp. It was expected that Evelyn will require treatment for at least another three months.

Pauline Sutherland, 2, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John H. Sutherland of Rt. 2. She was admitted to the Robert B. Green Hospital at San Antonio on August 3 and at last report she still was being treated in hospital.

Charles Henry Edmondson, 7, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert L. Edmondson of Rt. 2. He was admitted to the Shannon West Texas Memorial Hospital in San Angelo on August 21 and still is being treated in hospital.

The sad fact of the presence of poliomyelitis in Mills County should serve as a reminder of the day-in and day-out work of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, which is financed by the March of Dimes, Mr. Fairman said.

"During the past several years," he added, "the Mills County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis has spent more money on polio patients in this County than has been donated by Mills County citizens to the Foundation through the March of Dimes. Always, one-half of the proceeds from the March of Dimes is retained in Mills County for patient care.

Work Begins On Cattle Shed At Livestock Show

Work was started on Tuesday morning of this week on a new shed for breeders cattle at the Mills County Livestock Raisers' Association "Barn" or Agriculture Building in Goldthwaite.

Bright and early on Tuesday morning L. R. "Bully" Rudd was busy clearing ground to be covered by the shed. Precinct 1 Commissioner Jess Y. Tullos had loaned a maintainer to assist operations.

Farth for fill at the location of the shed was donated by J. T. "Buddy" Morris and it was being hauled by Dana Howard Saylor in a truck that had been loaned by Malcolm and Sig Farnigan of the Mills County Commission Company.

The earth was being loaded by P. R. Jordan, who provided a tractor and shovel for the purpose.

Robert L. Steen, President of the Mills County Livestock Raisers' Association, was supervising operations. He said that the City of Goldthwaite also had made available a truck to be used in the work.

The shed, Mr. Steen said, is to be 40 feet wide and 100 feet long. It will have a sheet iron roof and the sides will be open. The hope is to have the shed ready for use at the time of the January Show of the Association.

Plans for the structure were made at a meeting of the Association that was held on Thursday night of last week, when the job of finding ways and means of providing the necessary finances was assigned to a committee. The members of the committee are County Agriculture Agent George G. Reese and Y. B. Johnson, Jr., Don Clark, E. C. Evans and Charles E. Davis, teachers of vocational agriculture at Goldthwaite, Mullin, Priddy and Star, respectively.

Further news of Mullin plans will be published next week.

New Section Of Mail Boxes Due For Post Office

The lobby of the Goldthwaite Post Office is to be made five feet one inch longer because any day now Postmaster Lucile Fairman expects the arrival of a new section of mail boxes.

There will be 15 large boxes and 40 "middle size" boxes in the new section, the Postmaster said—adding that she is going to require the services of a good carpenter for installation work.

Since this is not a legal notice, the best possible suggestion that can be thought up in the absence of a formal call for bids is that carpenters go to see the Postmaster, get the specifications for the work that is to be done, and then tell her how much.

While she awaits visits by carpenters the Postmaster is rejoicing over the prospect that soon there will be an end to the shortage of large mail boxes. Further, she is highly pleased because she will have "middle size" boxes to offer to the patrons—for a consideration each quarter, of course.

The news from the Post Office gave the Eagle's Miss Ruth Ervin a headache. As Vice President in charge of circulation, she figures that soon Eagle subscribers in Goldthwaite will have new mail boxes and she will have to keep a steady grip on herself to keep from going crazy while, at the same time, seeing to it that Eagles get addressed properly every week. Nobody has yet taken up her problem with the Postmaster.

Annie Laurie Petsick Honored By Ford Foundation Research Grant

Signal honor came this week to Miss Annie Laurie Petsick of Goldthwaite who has been selected by the Ford Foundation to spend the next year doing research in international relationships—research that will result in the writing of a "work book" to guide high school students throughout the United States in their study of foreign affairs and understanding among peoples.

Miss Petsick has been granted a year's leave of absence from her post as a member of the Alvin High School faculty. She was nominated for the Ford Foundation grant by three members of the staff of the Alvin Junior College and by three prominent Alvin citizens.

Next Wednesday, Miss Petsick will go to Alvin to attend a faculty breakfast in her honor. She will then begin work on her project at the University of Texas. In the course of her research she will travel extensively and will discuss foreign affairs and

international relationships with qualified personages in New York, Washington and elsewhere.

The Ford Foundation, of which Paul Hoffman, former automobile manufacturer and former European Aid Administrator is the President, grants fellowships through a highly selective process to competent persons so that they may engage in research and, on the basis of such research, contribute to the American educational process in a practical, effective manner.

Under the Ford Foundation's grant to Miss Petsick, she will receive traveling expenses and the equivalent of her salary as a member of the faculty of the Alvin High School. In the face of the great distinction that has come to her, Miss Petsick this week was most modest—but the fact remains that the grant by the Ford Foundation and her selection for a task requiring both ability and responsibility represent an honor of no mean proportions.

TEXAS, TIDELANDS, AND DEMOCRATS

On this same page this week we have devoted the Eagle's Aery to the tidelands issue. In this space, however, we feel it necessary to say that no Texan will be able to look himself squarely in the eye if, on the tidelands issue, he takes care of the Queer Deal, Adlai Stevenson and the Washington bureaucrats merely by "going fishing" on November 4. We believe that the only way to fight a fight is to fight it—and if Texans want to keep their tidelands they would do well to stand shoulder to shoulder with those who are ready and willing to fight for them. "Going fishing" ain't fightin'.

OUR SCHOOLS REQUIRE IMPROVEMENT

Children who go to school in Mills County do not have the advantages that are enjoyed by children in many other places. If that statement is blunt, it is because it is factual. When we have sub-standard conditions or situations, our job is to face up to the facts and then make it our business to raise standards.

Next Monday is the opening day for schools in Mills County.

In Goldthwaite, opening day will be marked by an innovation — a request that parents start the 1952-1953 academic year by going to school themselves so that they may meet the members of the School Board, the administrators and the faculty, and so that they may hear for themselves and see for themselves about what we have here, what we lack, and what is necessary if there is to be improvement.

The proposal for "Parents' Day" at the Goldthwaite Schools next Monday was presented to the Board of Trustees of the Goldthwaite Independent School District by Superintendent J. T. Jones and it was approved. The opportunity that next Monday morning will afford ought not to be overlooked by anybody.

Information about our schools is of vital importance to the parents, most of whom want their children to have the best educational facilities that can be made available; and it is important to the taxpayers generally — because if our schools are to be raised in standard, then money for raising the standard must be forthcoming.

Next Monday morning there will be heart-to-heart talks about our school problems in the Grammar School auditorium and then there will be a tour of the school buildings so that parents and other taxpayers may see what is there and hear about what is needed. Those who go to the Goldthwaite Schools next Monday, and they should be everybody, will be able to go with the certainty that the School Board, the administrators and the faculty have only one purpose and that is to give the children of the Goldthwaite Independent School District the educational facilities to which they are entitled.

We have reported in the Eagle on the work of the School Board members, whose regular meetings go on until as late as one o'clock in the morning and who have had the routine activities of their work-a-day lives interrupted for a number of special meetings. There is no question but that the School Board is earnestly interested in better schools. The same goes for the new administration under the Superintendency of Mr. Iones. His life is being devoted to preparing pupils for the responsibilities of living in a world that increasingly is becoming more complex. It is our conviction, after having talked much with Mr. Jones and after having seen a great deal of him at his work, that he is motivated only by a desire for better schools here.

That our schools need to be better cannot be argued. They are not as good as they ought to be. How to make them better is a community challenge and the challenge can be met only as informed parents and informed citizens generally engage in full and frank discussion of our needs and then set out to solve the problem of achieving the goals that must be set.

We have written here before and we never shall tire of writing that "we go into the future on the feet of our children."

For the sake of the future and the highest welfare of our children, please make it a point to be present at the Grammar School auditorium next Monday morning. These are trying times for many of us but the fact that our worries are being stacked one on top of another in increasing numbers cannot be taken as an excuse for shirking our responsibility to the children on whose feet we shall walk into the future. You will be in a better position to know where your own responsibility lies and what part you will be expected to take in meeting the challenge before us if you are numbered among those present at the Goldthwaite Schools next Monday morning.

We have educational problems; there is no getting away from that.

GUEST EDITORIAL

(Editor's Note: President Truman last week insulted the intelligence of the American people when he said at his White House news conference that he knew of no mess in Washington. He was, however, correct when he said that Adlai Stevenson, the candidate of the Democrats for the Presidency, could NOT avoid running on the records of the Roosevelt and Truman Administrations. In this connection, an editorial published by the Scripps-Howard newspapers that was entitled, "Promise to Clean Up," is highly relevant. We reprint that editorial in the following paragraphs.)

An overriding issue in this year's political campaign is the need for a change.

After 20 years, the leadership of the party in power has become tired and shopworn. It has lost its alertness and has staled by being too long in the trenches. It is a leadership which has become tolerant of evil in its own ranks and intolerant of either outside or inside efforts to clean up.

The need for a change is recognized, naturally, by the Republicans. But it also is recognized by many Democrats. And its force as a campaign issue is a matter of keen concern to Adlai Stevenson, the Democratic candidate for President.

To meet this paramount issue, Mr. Stevenson has taken two steps:

He has tried, to a degree, to disassociate himself from the Truman administration. And he has promised to "clean up the mess in Washington." He tacitly admits it is "time for a change," but hopes to persuade the voters that "they can have a change without changing parties."

On the evidence so far, few would doubt that Governor Stevenson, as President, would represent a considerable change from the present administration. But would it be possible for him to make a complete change?

Mr. Stevenson may try to protect his candidacy from the stigma of the Truman administration. But he cannot disassociate himself entirely without a full break — a break which would splinter the organization on which he depends for support.

He pledges himself to "clean up the mess in Washington," while at the same time accepting the substantial backing of the Truman administration which refuses to admit there is any mess.

The governor invites scrutiny of his own record in Illinois as evidence of his ability to clean up Washington. On that point, a roundup of just what has happened in the Stevenson administration in Illinois has been written by Charles Lucey, Scripps-Howard political reporter.

In Illinois, Mr. Stevenson succeeded an inept and venal Republican administration. As the new Democratic governor, it was comparatively easy for him to make a clean sweep. Rooting out camp followers of his own party would be much more difficult.

What is required in Washington, as Dwight Eisenhower has said, is a complete overhauling — not only of faces and names, but of principles, methods and morals. Governor Stevenson's record in Illinois and in the campaign so far does not provide convincing evidence of his ability to meet the need.

The Eagle's Aery

By The Editor

So far as Texans are concerned, the Presidential election campaign strikes right home now that it is clearly on the record that Dwight D. Eisenhower, Republican, is FOR retention of the tidelands by Texas, and that Adlai Stevenson, Democrat, is AGAINST Texas on the vital tidelands issue.

For all of his efforts to convey the idea that he is not the captive candidate of President Truman, Governor Stevenson is following the Truman attitude on the tidelands—and on many other issues, too. As Ben Guill of Pampa says: "There is just one vote in Texas if you want to keep your tidelands — for Eisenhower." Mr. Guill incidentally took issue with Governor Stevenson's suggestion that some compromise on tidelands could be worked out. "It is just like a fellow caught stealing from you and he then wants to make a compromise," he said. "Texans don't compromise on principle. We did not compromise on the nomination of Dwight D. Eisenhower and we won't compromise on the tidelands."

Just about the most forthright comment that the editor has seen on the outcome of last Saturday's conference between Governor Shivers and Governor Stevenson was published editorially by the Dallas Morning News last Monday. It made the strong and important point that Texas can get the tidelands back with Eisenhower but lose them with Stevenson. Because the Dallas Morning News editorial was both temperate and fair, we reprint it in full in the following paragraphs. Here it is:

Governor Stevenson deserves credit for speaking out on the tidelands. He has put the issue

squarely up to the Texas voters. In this state you can vote for Eisenhower, knowing that both his party and the general are pledged to return title to the submerged lands to the state. You can vote for Stevenson, fully aware that both he and his party are against doing just that. (The Democratic platform does not mention the tidelands issue but the 1948 platform took Stevenson's view, the current administration has had that view and it was plain equivocation for the Chicago convention to ignore.)

All there is to it is that you get the tidelands back with Eisenhower, you lose them with Stevenson.

From the standpoint of a fundamental constitutionalist, Governor Stevenson is wrong on the Texas case and wrong on the general state ownership case. He is wrong both as a lawyer and a citizen.

The Governor says that he will abide by the Supreme Court decision as he would by all of his decisions. There, it seems to the News, that he errs as a lawyer. The Supreme Court has never averred federal ownership but a remarkable "paramount rights" theory which sets aside the property ownership guarantee of the Constitution. Anybody will concede that the Federal Government has the paramount right to take your property if it pays for it but not otherwise.

The Governor errs as a citizen for the simple reason that the quick claim bill has been passed to remedy a wrong. The Truman veto perpetuates the wrong. Stevenson — fortuitously enough, but wrongly even more — agrees with that veto.

STRAW POLL ON POLITICAL RACE BRINGS OUT IKE FANS BUT ADLAI SUPPORTERS CLAM UP

STRAW POLL ON IKE, ADLAI

I FAVOR DWIGHT EISENHOWER

I FAVOR ADLAI STEVENSON

Remarks _____

Mills County supporters of Governor Adlai Stevenson, candidate of the Democrats for the Presidency of the United States, either have writer's cramp or they have gone into hiding—possibly because last Saturday Adlai approved of the Queer Deal's big steal of the Texas tidelands. In any event, the straw poll on "Who will win, Eisenhower or Stevenson?" that the Eagle has been conducting at the request of the Associated Press, has brought a large number of votes for Dwight D. Eisenhower, candidate of the Republicans for the Presidency, and very, very few for the candidate of the Democrats.

In many ways the returns in the straw poll are highly interesting.

First, the Eagle has received many, many more ballots in favor of Eisenhower than there are known Republicans in Mills County.

Second, many of those who have voted in the straw poll have signed their names, although signatures were not requested and are not necessary.

Third, a number of those who have voted have taken advantage of the space on the straw ballot that has been provided for remarks.

The names of those who are voting in the straw poll are being kept in confidence by the Eagle. But here are some of the remarks that have come in on the ballots during the past week:

"I favor Dwight Eisenhower. The mess that Roosevelt, Truman and the Democrats have made makes it obvious why."

That ballot, incidentally, was marked as reflecting the opinion of not just one, but of FOUR voters.

Another ballot in favor of Eisenhower, which was marked as being the attitude of TWO voters, carried the following in the space reserved for "remarks":

"We think Ike is the man for the job. There are two votes in this family and both of them are for Ike."

One forthright citizen, who also favors General Eisenhower, wrote the following expression of feeling on his ballot:

"I think he (Ike) knows more about it than the others. We have a blockhead in there now!"

Still another ballot, it, too, in favor of General Eisenhower, recorded the following:

"I object to Adlai's stand on the tidelands."

One citizen, who brought his ballot to the Eagle office and who said that he never before had voted Republican except in 1928 when he voted against the late Al Smith, said:

"I want to see General Eisenhower in the White House before they steal Washington."

Another sample reflecting public opinion came from a citizen who went on record as favoring General Eisenhower by saying that he would vote for Ike "because he is the most level-headed—or he would not have a head by now." That ballot contained the following parenthetical remark: ("And Ike was NOT hand-picked.")

A number of voters contented themselves with marking their ballots FOR Eisenhower and, to be doubly certain that the count would show what they meant, they crossed or "scratched" out the line on which a vote for Stevenson could have been tallied.

The few who so far have cast straw votes for Stevenson have not given any reason for the faith that is in them. They have not used the space in which "remarks" may be made.

In view of the fact that Governor Stevenson's stand in favor of Federal ownership of the tidelands against the Texas position that the agreement of annexation should be respected came several days after the Eagle's straw poll was offered, it has been decided to continue the straw poll.

The ballot appears herewith and those who may not have voted as yet are given opportunity to do so. If you have already voted, please don't vote again. The idea is to obtain an accurate reflection of public opinion for the Associated Press, which is reaching into every nook and cranny of the land in an attempt to come up with the answer to the question:

"Who is going to win—Eisenhower or Stevenson?"

After this week, the ballot will not appear. The first report on the straw poll already has been sent to the Associated Press. Another report will be due soon. The more ballots that are received in the straw poll, the more accurate will it be as a reflection of public interest.

Dove Season Opens

The open season on mourning doves will open in the north zone of Texas, which includes Mills County, next Monday and will continue through October 10, with shooting hours restricted each day from noon until sunset. The bag limit, according to an announcement by the Texas Game and Fish Commission, is not more than ten a day and not more than ten in possession. Shotguns must be permanently plugged to three shell capacity and they may not be larger than 10 gauge. There is NO open season on white-winged doves in this area.

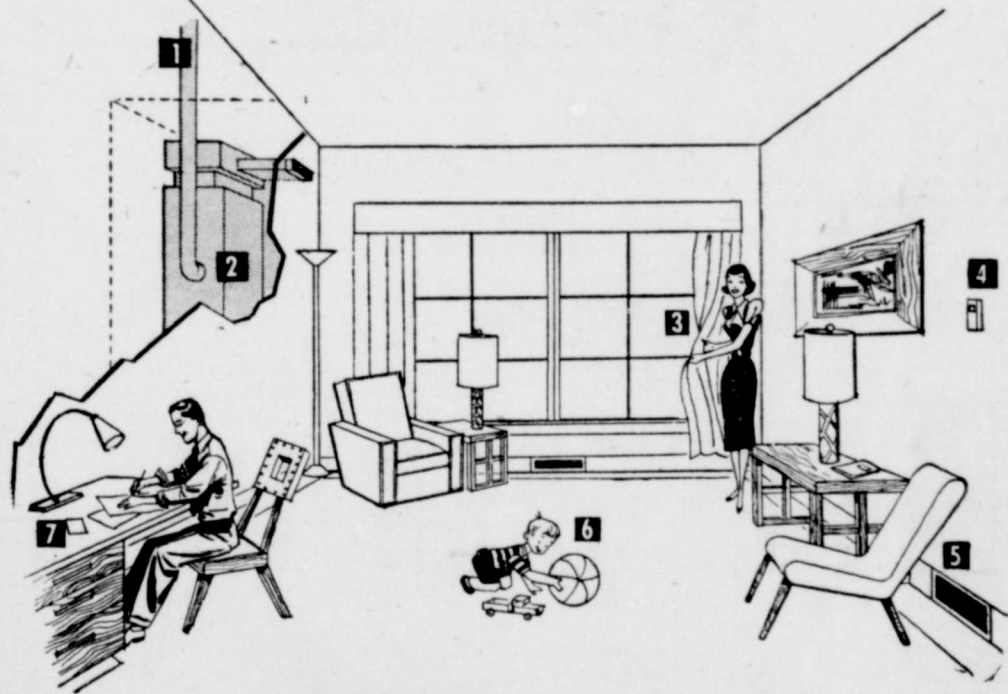
