John, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. B. Gilliam, Jr., was treated at the Hillcrest Hospital in Waco, where his injured arm was encased in a cast for protection during healing. He will return to hospital for a checkup in about two weeks, when it will be determined how soon he may resume his football activity.

The Eagles will feel the loss of John Gilliam in the season opener, for which a squad of about 45 is pointing under Coaches Ray Akins and Jack Locklear. The first game will be on Friday night of next week, when the Eagles play Cross Plains here in Goldthwaite.

F. A. auspices at the Municipal Ball Park in Goldthwaite on the night of September 27.

Anybody who has seen Joe LeMay's border collies at work or who has seen the performances of similar dogs at the Jernigan arena in Goldthwaite or at the Dublin rodeo will realize that a great treat is in store for everybody on the night of September 27. Y. B. Johnson, Jr., Advisor to the Goldthwaite F. F. A. Chapter, said this week.

Border collies will come to the Goldthwaite sheep dog trials from all over Texas — from Junction, San Saba, Center City and a whole lot of other places, to be announced later. The highly intelligent and expertly trained border collies will put on a show that will be well worth watching, Mr. Johnson said.

Qualified judges will come to Goldthwaite for the September 27 trials. In addition to working under rigid rules and standards, some of the border collies will trot out under the lights at the Ball Park simply to provide entertainment. For example, one of Joe LeMay's wonderful dogs is going to work ducks — and that itself, according to Mr. Johnson, ought to be worth the price of admission, which will be only 50 cents for adults and ten cents for school children. Last year one of Joe LeMay's dogs worked goats up at the Jernigan arena. It was the first time that dog ever had worked goats and he held a crowd spellbound while he did it.

With a Principal lacking, the Board met in two special sessions last week with Superintendent J. T. Jones and the availability of Mr. Patterson was welcomed pending appointment of a permanent High School Principal and teacher of mathematics. Mr. Patterson will be sworn into office as County Judge and County Superintendent of Public Instruction next January 1.

At last week's meetings the School Board agreed to merge two of the bus routes of the Goldthwaite Independent School District and to purchase a new bus, delivery of which is expected about Christmas, according to Superintendent Jones.

Classes at the Goldthwaite Schools got started on a full-time basis on Tuesday. Last Monday was "Parents' Day" at the School and some 250 adults took advantage of the opportunity to learn more about their school and its needs.

## SUPERINTENDENT J. T. JONES TELLS LIONS CLUB OF SCHOOL NEEDS; PLEDGES OWN SERVICE

### R. H. Williams Is New Mullin High School Principal

It was "back to school" in Goldthwaite, Priddy and Star for many Mills County youngsters this week and next Monday pupils will answer to the roll call in Mullin, where Raymond H. Williams has been appointed High School Principal.

Another new addition to the Mullin High School faculty is Felton "Pooch" Wright, who achieved widespread fame during his many years of football coaching at Howard Payne College.

Even in advance of the opening of school at Mullin the Mullin Bulldogs, who play six-man football, have been working out with Mr. Williams as their coach. Twelve men have reported for workouts and Mr. Williams anticipates a good season. Mullin will open its six-man football season with a game against Gustine at Gustine on September 12.

Mr. Williams and his wife, the former Audra Reynolds, plan to make their home in Mullin with their son Del, who is 11. Well known in Mills County, Mr. Williams was graduated from the Star High School. He received his degree as a Bachelor of Science from Daniel Baker College and he taught in rural schools in Mills County for nine years. For the past five years he has taught at the Mills County Vocational School in Goldthwaite.

Superintendent J. T. Jones last Tuesday night told the Goldthwaite Lions Club that the future of the school system here is "up to the citizens" and he pledged that the school administrators would do their full part in working for the highest possible standard of education.

"Our task is to serve you," Mr. Jones said. "I am not trying to tell you what to do nor am I advocating higher taxes. I am convinced, however, that all of you want better schools."

Mr. Jones spoke objectively and in detail on the "Economic Needs of the Goldthwaite Schools" before an unusually large Lions Club attendance and at the end of his address he was thanked by Lions President Jesse Moreland, who assured the new Superintendent of Schools that he could depend upon the sympathetic cooperation of the citizens of the community.

A number of guests were present to hear Mr. Jones. They included Band Director and Mrs. George W. Reed, Mrs. M. A. Childress, Mrs. T. M. Glass, Mrs. H. R. Ekins, School Trustee Walton Daniel, Bob Crossland of the U. S. Soil Conservation Service, Bill Yeager, and Billy Law Cardwell, new science teacher at the Goldthwaite High School. Mr. Jones was told by Mr. Moreland that the guests, the large attendance and especially the presence of the ladies all were indication of high interest in a higher level of education.

The talk by Mr. Jones on Tuesday night followed "Parents' Day" at the Goldthwaite Schools last Monday morning when approximately 250 adults were present to hear E. B. Gilliam, Jr., speak on "Our Responsibility to Our Schools" and when the Superintendent told the patrons "What We Propose to Do This Year." In his address Tuesday night Mr. Jones made frequent references to Monday morning's talk by Mr. Gilliam, which is the subject of an editorial on page two of this week's Eagle.

Mr. Jones on Tuesday night pointed out to his audience that while the tax rate of the Goldthwaite Independent School District is lower than that of County Seat Districts in adjoining Counties, reductions in the local District have been reduced by drought this year.

"Fewer livestock are running, thereby reducing renditions, and so this year we have less money on which to operate in the face of higher costs of operation," Mr. Jones said.

He emphasized a number of problems. They included:

## Death Calls Minister A. B. Finley Formerly Of Church Of Christ Here

Minister A. B. Finley, formerly of the Church of Christ in Goldthwaite, died last Friday in Gaston Hospital in Dallas after a long illness—an illness that had caused him to resign his pulpit here.

Funeral services were conducted last Sunday at the Irving Church of Christ with J. Monroe Thorp of El Paso, Dean Bullock of Grand Saline, and

Kansas. He conducted a series of revival meetings at the Goldthwaite Church of Christ last July. A daughter, Mrs. Roy Priest, is the wife of a Church of Christ Minister in Carlsbad, New Mexico.

Also surviving are a brother, C. S. Finley of Irving, and six grandchildren.

Until 1943, Minister Finley had been an employee of the Lone Star Gas Company, which he served for 21 years. He also was an Elder and had preached in the Church of Christ for many years. His Church work covered areas in five states and, in addition to filling the Church of Christ pulpit in Goldthwaite, his full-time Ministry included service in Churches of Christ at Alto, Rusk, Grapeland, Italy, Maypearl and Plano. For two years he was a special evangelist at his home Church at Irving. In the course of his career Minister Finley was instrumental in establishing Churches at Royce City, Alto and Plano.

Minister and Mrs. Finley came to the Church of Christ in Goldthwaite in mid-February of 1951. In December of the same year his resignation because of grave illness was announced by Elders C. A. Womack, J. R. Parker and P. L. Hancock. Several times during the past eight months Minister Finley was hospitalized in Dallas and between periods of hospitalization he lived at the family home at Irving.

For the funeral services, which were attended by Mr. and Mrs. Allen W. Hardgraves of Goldthwaite, the pall bearers were elders of the Church of Christ in Irving.

## Martha Carolyn Graves Recounts Summer At National Music Camp

Editor's Note: Martha Carolyn Graves, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. T. C. Graves, returned to Goldthwaite last week after having spent the summer at the National Music Camp at Interlochen, Mich. Since the camp has no rival anywhere in the world, the Eagle asked Miss Graves to write the following account of it.)

This was the Silver Anniversary summer for the National Music Camp at Interlochen, Michigan. The camp now consists of 250 buildings and has an enrollment of 1,073, not including the 575 who were enrolled in All-State groups. It started 25 years ago with a fisherman's lodge and no financial backing, but from so small a beginning it has become the dream and ideal of many a music student.

The National High School Orchestra, which is the largest and youngest in the world, this summer consisted of 250 of the students at Interlochen. During the eight weeks of the camp season, the orchestra was presented in eight concert performances and on eight radio broadcasts.

At Interlochen, the National High School Band gave a concert every Sunday afternoon. The Band had 165 members.

There were five major choirs in Camp. I was a member of three of them. We were presented in eight performances and on six radio broadcasts during the season.

There were 160 students of High School age in the High School Choir. Eighty-five girls made up the membership of the High School Girls' Choir and there were 500 voices in the Festival Choir. The Intermediate and University Choirs were the major choirs. At Church Service every Sunday there was a combined choir that sang one or two anthems for the service.

At Interlochen the piano department was headed by Dr. Dorsey Whittington. I was one of his pupils. The Camp also had an operetta workshop which presented Gilbert's and Sullivan's "Yeomen of the Guard."

The University Opera department presented many operas during the eight weeks season. One of them, "Don Fortunno," was performed in its world premiere.

In addition to the strict musical departments of the National Music Camp, many other de-

partments offered study in other arts. The dance department was one of the most important at the camp. The drama department—also a major activity—presented several one act plays and it brought the season to a climax with the play, "Stage Door," by Edna Ferber and George A. Kaufman.

Also outstanding was a skating concert: There were major classes in painting, ceramics, electronics, piano tuning and radio and speech.

The recreational classes of the camp also were stressed. Special awards were presented to outstanding campers. I received the Girls' Certificate for being the most outstanding camper in intermediate tennis. I also received two Red Cross swimming cards and I was a member of the group that passed, a special 20-minute camp swimming test. I belonged to the Hiking Club, one of the many recreational groups.

The season of 269 programs was climaxed with the traditional performance of "Les Preludes," in which almost every student in camp participated.

Immediately after the performance of "Les Preludes" we all returned to our cabins to tell our new friends "good bye" and then we boarded trains, airplanes, buses and cars for the return journeys to our homes.

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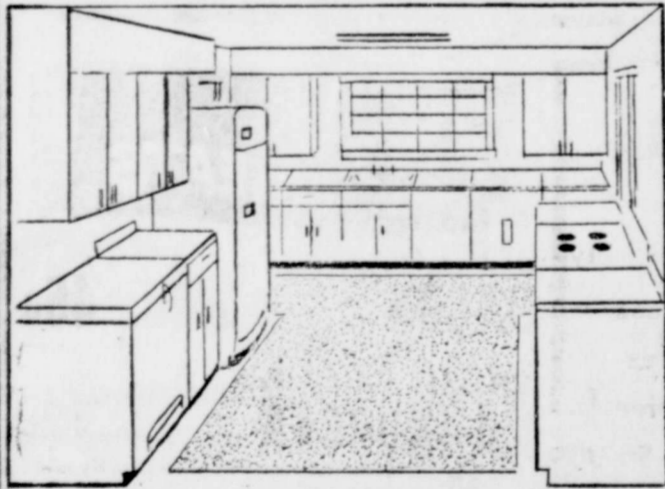

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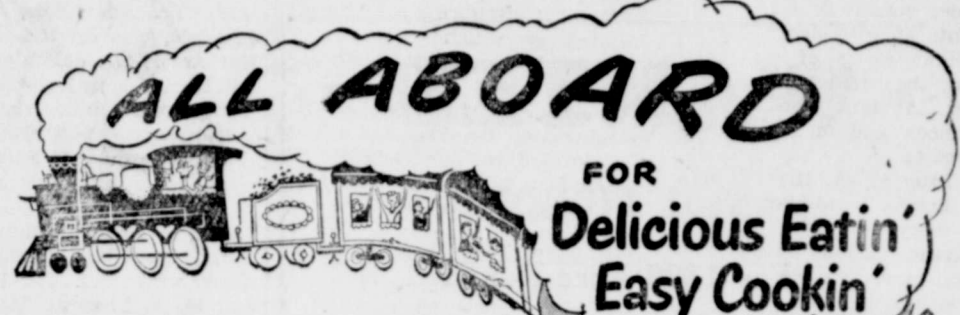

- VI. Thou shalt not kill in any way, even the smallest, the curiosity of a little child, yea, though it seem often the curiosity of a cat and never-ending.
- VII. Thou shalt not suffer any unkindness of thought or action to enter the door of thy classroom.
- VIII. Thou shalt not steal time from thine own hours of leisure by putting off work so long that it fitteth not into its rightful schedule.

 A parallel weakness in strategy on an enthusiastic organization, such converts from the Republican ranks are not worth both-ering about.  
 It is a peculiar campaign to date and the victory yet may be based on the comparative totals in the box score of errors—it may go to the nominee who has muffed the ball fewer times than his opponent. For both nominees seem to be taking their advice on campaign strategy from those who apparently do not know what the statistics, the trends and the organization activities of the past campaigns really mean in terms of vote getting in 1952.

1. The Goldthwaite High School was built in 1913. It has in it the same furniture that was installed nearly 40 years ago and the ravages of time and the busy work of pocket knives down through the years have taken their toll.

2. The Grammar School was built in 1928-1929, with the west wing added in 1946. The gymnasium, virtually new, was built in 1949.

3. Temporary structures house the band and the department of vocational agriculture and the lunchroom leaves much to be desired by way of both space and facilities. The building of the department of vocational agriculture at present is adequate but the school authorities are handicapped for classroom space in the High School building.

4. This year the High School has only nine teachers, including the Principal, and the overall number of faculty members has been reduced because last year the average daily attendance was not kept as high as it might have been.

Mr. Jones pointed out that if all local school taxes are collected the "take" amounts to only approximately \$15,000.00, of which about \$10,000.00 is expended for servicing bond issues. He pointed out that refinancing or refunding of the bonded indebtedness could result in an annual saving of \$2,000.00.

"If we had such an amount available to us each year we could do a number of things, such as re-plastering the Grammar School auditorium," Mr. Jones said. "Our band house sorely needs acoustical tile. . . . It is inadequate now for the job that Mr. Reed is trying to do. . . . We need a new roof on the Grammar School. . . . Instead of turning the water off, it now turns it in."

In detail, Mr. Jones read the budget of the Goldthwaite Independent School District. It showed that for the 1952-1953 year expenditures will total approximately \$120,000.00 — with the State of Texas providing \$94,542.00 for the minimum operation program and with other money coming from the State to provide for maximum operation.

Breaking down the cost of operating the Goldthwaite School, Mr. Jones said that \$8,592.00 would be spent for administration; \$67,759.59 for instruction, text books, library books and teaching supplies; \$4,550.00 for plant operation; \$1,600.00 for plant maintenance; approximately \$14,000.00 for transportation — all aside from such items as lunchroom expenses.
