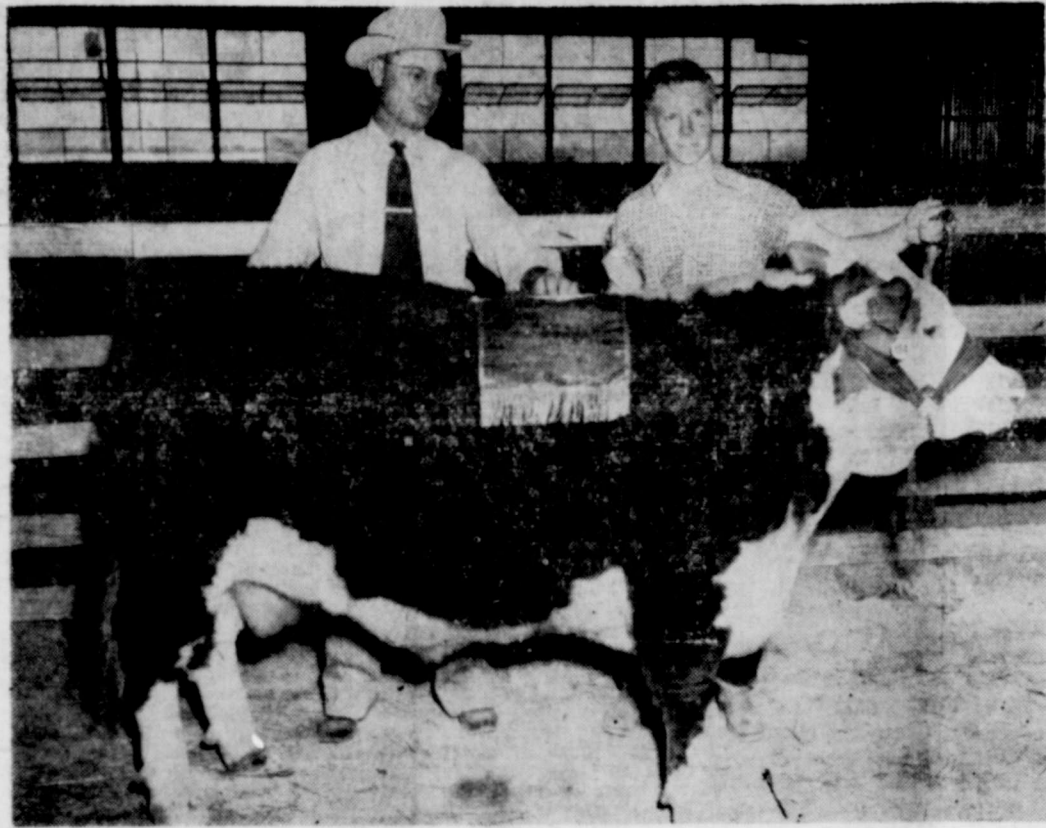

## 4-H BOBBY ZANE EGGER DOES IT AGAIN!

The photograph was made immediately after Bobby Zane had won the Grand Championship at the Centex Fair at Temple — the first such title ever to have been won by a Mills County contestant. Mills County has won many other such Championships elsewhere, though.

Against what the Temple Daily Telegram described as "the toughest competition in fair history," Bobby Zane Egger of Star, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Egger, took the steer Grand Championship at the Centex Fair on Thursday of last week. Bobby Zane, who is a Mills County 4-H Club member, won his Grand Championship with a Hereford named Aster. The steer, which weighed 1,120 pounds, was bred on the Egger farm by Bobby Zane and his father.

The steer was sold last Saturday for \$1.00 per pound. It had been kept off feed and water before the sale and so, when sold, it weighed 1,105 pounds. To win the Grand Championship at the Centex Fair Bobby Zane Egger eclipsed Charles Allison of the Lometa Future Farmers of America. Young Allison won the Reserve Championship with an Aberdeen-Angus steer that weighed 930 pounds and which, according to the Temple Daily Telegram, "might have won the grand honor in any year but this one."

For the judging last Thursday Mills County Agriculture Agent George G. Reese was present to witness Bobby Zane Egger's triumph over 75 entries in a show that was judged by Frank Jordan. In its news story of the Centex Fair last Friday morning the Temple Daily Telegram also described Bobby Zane Egger's winner as "the highest quality steer ever shown at the Centex Fair." Bobby Zane Egger, who now is 17, won the Grand Championship at the Houston Fat Stock Show and Livestock Exposition in 1950. At Temple last Thursday he won the Hereford division honors in the preliminary events before going up to take the top title.

## 136 Register As Blood Donors But 200 Are Needed

On Wednesday of this week 136 volunteers had registered to be blood donors when the Bloodmobile unit of the American Red Cross comes to Goldthwaite on October 9.

"We need 200 registrations," said Brian Smith, Executive Secretary of the Mills County Chapter of the American Red Cross. "That means we are asking only one out of every 30 in our County population to register. A pint of blood and an hour of your time are all that are requested, so please help us to exceed our quota during the coming week."

Efforts to recruit additional blood donors are being continued under the direction of Mrs. Warren P. Duren, County Chairman; Mrs. E. T. Fairman, Goldthwaite Chairman; and Mrs. Hollis Blackwell, who is in charge of recruiting in rural areas.

Voluntary registrations may be made at Church services and Club meetings and at the Goldthwaite Post Office, the Mills County State Bank, the Hudson and Clements' Drug stores, the T. M. Glass Insurance Agency and with Mr. Smith at the Fire House.

Mr. Smith pointed out this week that although Mills County will not officially be a part of the program of the Regional Blood Center at Waco until after the October 9 visit of the Bloodmobile Unit to Goldthwaite, Mills County patients who have required transfusions already have received them at hospitals in San Saba, Waco and Burnet.

"We have drawn in advance and now we must replenish the account," Mr. Smith said.

Rainfall so far this year has been 18.06 inches, according to official measurements made in Goldthwaite by Harry Allen for the U. S. Weather Bureau.

This year's precipitation so far has been 5.40 inches less than normal, also according to Mr. Allen's figures. But, as always, he points out and emphasizes that the amount of rainfall always varies from place to place in Mills County. Mr. Allen said that only the other night, it rained more on his house than it did on his garage!

As for rainfall during the past week, here is the story as told by Mr. Allen's official figures:

Precipitation on Wednesday night of last week and early Thursday morning was .63 of an inch. The rainfall last Sunday night was .48 of an inch and on Tuesday night it was .03. But take Sunday night's precipitation, for example: That .48 of an inch last Sunday night was measured by Mr. Allen at his home on the southwest edge of Goldthwaite but at the same time the rainfall in the center of Goldthwaite measured one inch.

This month, so far, Mr. Allen has measured 4.40 inches of rain, which is a departure from normal of plus 1.12.

Total rainfall last year as measured by Mr. Allen in Goldthwaite was 20.09 inches, a departure of 10.05 inches from normal on the minus side. (Continued on Back Page.)

## Three Carloads Of Emergency Hay Arrive, More Are Due This Week

Three carloads of emergency hay for Mills County farmers and ranchers who still are coping with the effects of prolonged drought arrived in Goldthwaite this week.

Charles E. Jones, Administrative Officer of the Production and Marketing Administration of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, said that from three to five additional cars would arrive this week.

So far, a total of 16 cars filled with emergency hay has been ordered by the Mills County P. M. A. Committee. Orders still will be received by the Committee at the P. M. A. office in the Court House.

All of the hay that has arrived and that will arrive in the near future is number two grade — one third legumes and two-thirds grass. Those who have ordered number one hay — 75 per cent legumes and 25 per cent grass — will have to wait for some time because of priorities for such fodder in other states, Mr. Jones said.

The hay that has arrived so far has been trucked away immediately by those who asked for it in the order of the placing of their applications. The mixed hay is paid for by applicants at \$32.00 per ton and the vast majority of those who ordered it are well pleased with the deliveries, Mr. Jones said. He personally helped to unload the cars that arrived on the Santa Fe railroad siding in Goldthwaite this week.

Each car contains approximately twelve tons of hay. Mr. Jones said this week that recent rains, which give promise of winter grazing, have resulted in a sharp reduction in the number of applications for emergency hay.

## Paving Between Star And Lometa Assured By Deeds

Final hurdles in the way of a two-lane, hard surface farm-to-market road connecting Star and Lometa were cleared this week.

County Judge Lewis B. Porter said that he, Commissioner Fred V. Wall and Texas Highway Engineers Robert J. Milligan and Don L. Hook had met with land owners and had completed the right-of-way for the highway.

"The new road is assured," Judge Porter said. "It will include a concrete bridge across Bennett's Creek, thus relieving the County of responsibility for the bridge as well as responsibility for maintaining 7 1/4 miles of road."

Judge Porter said the farm-to-market road, for which bids will be asked soon, is badly needed and will serve a considerable farming and ranching area that has been handicapped because of lack of an adequate highway.

BOBBY ZANE EGGER'S CHAMPION

It was with great pride in Temple last Friday that we bought a copy of the esteemed Temple Telegram and saw spread all over the first page the news that with his Hereford, Aster, Bobby Zane Egger, a Mills County 4-H Club member, had won the Grand Championship of the Centex Fair. The news story of the victory by the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Egger said that it had been achieved in the face of the toughest competition in Centex Fair History.

The news story in the Temple Telegram went on to say that "even the Angus breeders in the crowd shook their heads in admission of what was probably the highest quality steer ever shown at the Centex Fair." The Angus people got into the act because Bobby Zane Egger's Hereford beat out an Angus that won the Reserve Championship and that was exhibited by Charles Allison of the Lometa F. F. A. If it had not been for Bobby Zane Egger and his Hereford, the top honors of the Centex Fair would have gone to the Lometa Angus.

Again, we congratulate Bobby Zane Egger, who won the Grand Championship at the Houston Fat Stock Show and Livestock Exposition in 1950.

And, we think, full honor, recognition and gratitude also are due of County Agriculture Agent George G. Reese. In a three column picture on the first page of last Friday's Temple Telegram, Mr. Reese was shown with Bobby Zane Egger and the Grand Champion Hereford. Without the interest of the adults who work so devotedly with our 4-H and F. F. A. members, the triumphs that come to Mills County with such regularity would not be possible.

(Taken from Eagle Files of September 27, 1902.)

The election Thursday resulted in a victory for those favoring incorporating the town. There were 95 votes polled favorable to the proposition, while only 44 were cast against it. The election returns will be made to the County Judge, who will issue a proclamation within twenty days declaring the city to be incorporated and setting the time for holding an election for a mayor, city marshal and five aldermen.

Messrs. A. J. Gatlin and J. C. Street have combined their financial interests and business ability and will conduct the mercantile establishment heretofore owned by Mr. Gatlin. In the deal, Mr. Street sold an interest in his Indian Territory ranch to Mr. Gatlin. The firm will employ the assistants that have been employed in the house heretofore. This is a strong firm and one that will be a decided advantage to the town. We are all glad that Mr. Street has re-considered his plan of moving away from Mills County, and hope he and Mr. Gatlin will prosper in business and never again think of leaving Goldthwaite.

GUEST EDITORIAL

(Editor's Note: As a contemporary remarked the other day, Adlai Stevenson is the first chronic wise cracker ever to run for the Presidency of the United States. Another wondered whether Adlai thinks his competition is Bob Hope! Since Governor Stevenson's quips have caused so many raised eye-brows, we reprint below two guest editorials on the matter.)

FROM THE DALLAS MORNING NEWS

Adlai Stevenson broadened his campaign Monday. Some caustic customers have remarked that the wise-cracking Governor is running against Bob Hope. Monday he made it clear that he is running against General Eisenhower, Bob Taft and Harry Truman. On the Vatican ambassadorship, Stevenson tossed a pet Truman policy out of the window. He dropped another like a hot potato when he refused to endorse strict party regularity. (He said he would not endorse all Democratic candidates. You're right on that, Governor; Texas does not, either.) He toned down on Taft-Hartley and said he would like revision masked as "repeal." He tried to phrase his idea less crassly than that, but that is what it means. The Governor tried to belittle Taft's open advocacy of the man who defeated him for nomination. Describing the agreement of the body, even if it hurts those who say that "another little old '40 or 50 million dollars for us won't put much of a dent in the budget."

The Governor finds Taft-Hartley a difficult item. The Democratic platform advocated repeal, although the law could never have reached the statute books without strong Democratic support, most of which will be back in Congress. Stevenson knows there will be no repeal of Taft-Hartley if he is elected, but he went in heavily for verbal duplicity in his statement Monday. Like Eisenhower, he is for sensible amendment but, he says, as the law itself is a "political symbol," it is better to revise and call it repeal.

More and more it becomes evident that the Congress will have to face Harry Truman in substance, not in the shadow on the hustings. Truman put it that Stevenson had to campaign on the Truman record. There was no other issue. If the Democratic party has been corrupt, the Governor still wants to put it back in office. But now he finds it necessary to say that Truman has erred on essential points of policy.

Looks as if Banquo's ghost has its seat at the table.

"I can't be amusing in this business because these are not laughing matters," Dwight Eisenhower told an Indiana audience on his current whistle-stop campaign. "As we face the issues of this campaign I see nothing funny about them."

At about the same hour in Springfield, Gov. Adlai Stevenson — asked whether he considered himself to the right of President Truman — said "I don't know about my latitude and longitude."

That probably got a big laugh. Mr. Stevenson's wise-cracking generally do; he is undoubtedly the greatest master of the quip to run for president in 40 years.

If this were a national contest for the best after-dinner speaker, Governor Stevenson would get our vote.

But this is a contest for the highest office in the land. We are about to choose the man who will lead us in one of the gravest periods in our national history.

And there is nothing funny about it.

Governor Stevenson was asked whether he considered himself to the right of President Truman. That's a fair question, and a lot of Americans would like to have the answer. But they won't get one from Mr. (Continued on Page 9.)

The Eagle's Aery

Last week when State Senator Carlos Ashley came to Goldthwaite to speak before and to entertain the Lions Club, he also took some time out for serious talk about the next session of the Texas Legislature. Mills County is in Senator Ashley's 16th Senatorial District. He is gravely concerned because of the increasing demands on the public treasury and he hopes that when the Legislature meets his constituency, including Mills County, will support him in his efforts to work for economy rather than for more spending.

Senator Ashley told the editor that the chief trouble encountered by the law-makers comes from highly organized and powerful pressure groups and from people who say that economy is all right for the other fellow but ought not to apply to those who clamor for the spending. In other words, East Texas wants economy everywhere except in East Texas and West Texas or South Texas or the Panhandle or the South Plains would be all for economy if there were an appropriation up for the 16th senatorial District — our own, which includes 18 Counties — and which stretches from Brown County to the Rio Grande. The problem of the men in the Legislature, Senator Ashley said, is to act on the basis of what is best for everybody, even if it hurts those who say that "another little old '40 or 50 million dollars for us won't put much of a dent in the budget."

On the same day that the editor was discussing this problem with Senator Ashley the mill brought a statement from Lieutenant Governor Ben Ramsey, who also is gravely concerned over the way in which Texas runs its financial household. Senator Ashley told the Goldthwaite Lions that we have too much government and too many law-makers who want to regulate the daily lives of the citizens in every way possible, no matter what the cost. Accordingly, Lieutenant Governor Ramsey's statement, especially in the light of what Senator Ashley had to say here, is of vital importance to citizens and taxpayers generally. The statement by Lieutenant Governor Ramsey follows in the paragraphs below.

A little waste here and a little inefficiency there are adding up to a big bill for Texas taxpayers.

Every so often, a successful business must take stock of methods and its operations to see if departments are coming careless and if the economical systems are being used.

The Texas state government is a big business. It is getting bigger all the time. Annual cost of state government are about \$600,000,000 (that's since World War II). There are strong pressured demands for highways; some \$30,000,000 more for state education; state level, \$163,500,000; for another \$100,000,000 a year for school buildings, etc.

We must cut out the wastes, the duplications, the unneeded motions. Every cent spent should get value received. When we do that, we are going to find that we have a large sum of money that can be put to constructive use.

And, in addition to that, we must guard against the tendency to raid the treasury every time we get state finances in fairly good shape. We saw a huge war time surplus wrecked in a very few days.

Recently it was proposed that the state help with its share on a research project to find out what caused the shipmen's pants. Private enterprise already has done research on the shine on the seat of men's pants; the domino players in San Augustine made a conclusion long ago that the shine was caused by steam down too much.

The state government cannot be expected to finance projects that should be pursued by private industry.

We are doing private industry no service when we take on one of its functions.

We are doing the public service when we do that because our tax money must come to a large extent, from business and industry. Elimination of function of private enterprise cuts off its tax contribution and in turn would put an additional burden on the citizen.

The next Legislature has tremendous responsibility. I hope that every member of the Legislature will regard its office as a trust to reduce waste of the money we already have and to resist treasury raids.

Legislators will need the help of the public to do this. Every citizen should think twice before asking for money from taxpayers.

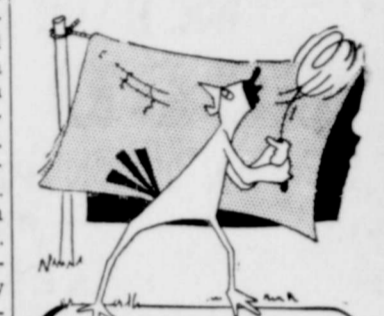

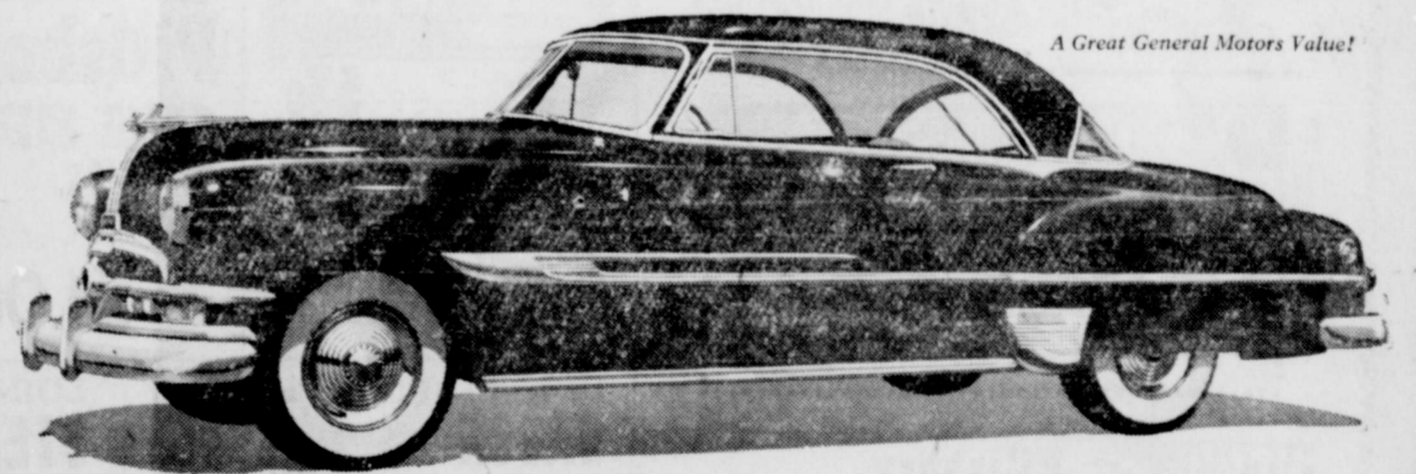

Beaumier and Duke are members of the State Democratic Executive Committee. Other members who attended the organizational meeting here were Fred Brown, Mineral Wells; Taylor Glass, Austin; Peyton McKnight, Jr., Quitman, and Lynn Smith, Gonzales.

Most of those who attended the first meeting were leaders at the State Convention in ordering the names of the National Democratic nominees placed on the Texas ballot, while at the same time urging Texas Democrats to vote for Eisenhower.

The group selected Weldon Hart and John VanCronkrite, Austin public relations men, to assist Gilmer in directing the campaign.

### Sheep Dog Trials At Ball Park Saturday Night Offer Fine Show

(Continued From First Page.) will have a better understanding of the work by the dogs and the scoring if they are familiar with the rules and regulations.

Accordingly, the factors on which the dogs will be scored are contained in the following paragraphs:

**OUTRUN:** May be directed to either side of the sheep—should be as fast as possible and should follow a circular course that will put the dog behind the sheep when Outrun is finished. After two-thirds of the distance is covered, the dog should slow down and creep up on the sheep so they will scatter before the lift. The Outrun should end with the dog stopped or almost stopped behind the sheep with the sheep still bunched and the dog in perfect control of the whole group.

**LIFT:** The dog should rise and slowly move the sheep off in one bunch toward the handler. If the sheep do not move at first, the dog may "rough" them a bit to get them moving. He must not allow them to scatter and must rough them by hurling his body against the sheep rather than charging one sheep with his teeth. Biting is discriminated against.

**FETCH:** Should always be in a

straight line toward the handler with the sheep and dog on good terms. The dog should be in control always with the sheep in his "eye" always ready to cut off an escape but never interfere with the steady forward movement of the sheep. The sheep should come along in a steady manner with heads always facing "homeward."

**DRIVING:** This is the most difficult part of the trial course for the dog does not like to move the sheep away from the handler. A top dog, however, must have the ability to "drive" as well as to "fetch." The dog must drive the sheep through the two sets of gates. This should be done with as little lost motion as possible with the sheep always in the dog's "eye" and the dog always in control.

**PENNING:** On completion of the "Drive," the handler will proceed to the pen and leave the dog to bring the sheep up for penning. The handler opens the gate and takes his position in the allotted space. The dog must work the sheep into the pen unassisted except by commands.

**STYLE:** Points are allowed for "style" to distinguish the fine points of "expertness" among dogs at work.

No one objects to an occasional light touch. But the interesting thing about the Stevenson quips is that they are substitutes for answers to important questions in the minds of the voters. We don't think the American people are going to be satisfied with these substitutes, even though they may laugh at them. We think they are going to be more impressed with the seriousness of Dwight Eisenhower, who is no orator but who is spelling out the issues of this campaign in plain, blunt language and is telling the people what he proposes to do about them. As he said in Indiana, "the greatest problem we have today is how to prevent World War III by winning this cold war and stopping the fighting now going on." And there is nothing funny about that.

**Baptist Offerings Sunday To Aid Texas Missions, Western Churches**

At both Services of Worship at the First Baptist Church of Goldthwaite next Sunday offerings will be taken for the Mary Hill Davis fund to aid Texas and western missions. It was announced this week by the Rev. J. T. Ayers, Pastor. Brother Ayers said that the goal of the offerings, to be taken in Baptist Churches throughout Texas, will be \$1,110,000.00—of which \$110,000.00 will be used for the city mission program in Texas. The remainder will be added to the capital assets of the Western Loan Corporation, which provides funds for the construction of Baptist Churches in areas where there are none or where they face a struggle to become established and to carry on.

In the west, outside of Texas, there are 1,500 cities and towns that have neither Baptist Churches nor Baptist parsonages, Brother Ayers said. He pointed out that in some areas it is not possible for Baptists to

borrow money for Church construction and he added that in at least two of the western states 79 per cent of the people belong to no religious faith. Brother Ayers said also that in western States outside Texas there now are 300 Baptist Churches that have no Church buildings in which to worship. He added that unless aid is given immediately "there will be at least 500 homeless Churches in the territory to which our Southern Baptist people have dedicated the gospel appeal."

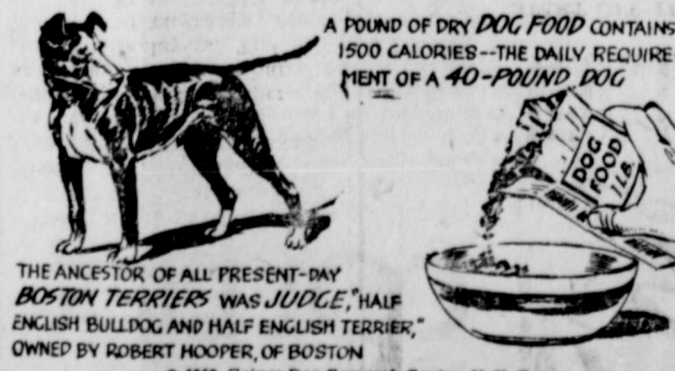
