

been held in Mills County. Y. B. Johnson, Jr., Advisor to the Goldthwaite Chapter of the Future Farmers of America, which sponsored the event, said that after the payment of all expenses the treasury of the local F. F. A. Chapter was better off by approximately \$150.00.

In addition to perfect performances by the elite of the border collies in Texas, the spectators were entertained immensely by the Master of Ceremonies, Guy Powell, County Agriculture Agent in Kerr County.

At one point when a dog from Cuero, owned by Joe Schwab, was working sheep and having some difficulty in penning them, Mr. Powell challenged anybody in the crowd to go out and do better. There were no takers.

As Joe LeMay of Center City ordered his fine dog Tip to put sheep through first one gate and then another, Mr. Powell remarked to the crowd that "Tip must think Joe LeMay is like the Democrats in Texas, who cannot make up their minds in this election year."
