

ROLLING UP OUR SLEEVES

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This is our last chance for an effective appeal for the registration of blood donors for Thursday of next week, when the Bloodmobile unit of the American Red Cross will come to Goldthwaite.

All over America citizens are "rolling up their sleeves" as they give a "pint of blood and an hour of time" so that the wounded, whether military or civilian, may live.

It is not as easy as it may seem at first thought to obtain the needed blood donors. Although only one out of about every 30 persons in Mills County has been asked to volunteer, there are many who are not eligible, either because of physical handicaps or because of illnesses in the past, the traces of which still can be found in the blood stream. Yet, there is no substitute for the blood that is so sorely needed on the battlefields of Korea and in our hospitals at home. It has to come from those who are able to give voluntarily. When the life of a human being hangs in the balance and blood is needed, nothing else can take its place.

Right now the need for blood is urgent. In hospitals, at home and overseas, many persons require as many as four or six transfusions during delicate operations. And blood MUST BE THERE when it is needed

Too many of us do not think about it very often but the war has been raging in Korea for 28 months now. In that period of 28 months United Nations casualties have reached 118,569. Remember, please, that more than 90 per cent of the troops that have been engaged and that are engaged on our side in Korea are Americans. Nearly 100 per cent of the cost of the war in Korea has been financed by America. Battle deaths total 20,830. In addition to the known captured, 9,393 Americans are missing in Korea.

There is many an American in Korea who is sick at heart because he has all too many good reasons to believe that the hardships he is enduring have been forgotten here at home.

One way to let our men in Korea know that they have not been forgotten by some of us, at least, is to see to it right here in Goldthwaite that when the Bloodmobile unit of the American Red Cross is stationed at the First Baptist Church next Thursday afternoon there will be an outpouring of volunteers anxiously willing to DO THEIR PART.

A number of persons have been working in every community in Mills County to recruit blood donors for next Thursday afternoon. Their work has been unselfish. Their motive is the knowledge that whenever they recruit a blood donor, they make it possible for somebody else to live.

If you have given blood before, you know that giving is neither difficult nor distressing. Donate again and tell your friends and neighbors about your experiences. Let them share the wonderful feeling Americans get when they roll up their sleeves and
