## David Watters Is New Supervisor Of Soil District

David Watters of Pleasant Grove, who last year was named the outstanding farmer in the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District, was elected last Tuesday night to succeed Willis A. Hill as Supervisor for sub-division number 4 of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District.

Nearly 50 farmers and ranchers attended the meeting at which Chairman Anson Oden of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District praised the great contributions that Mr. Hill has made to the vital cause of soil and water conservation. Except for a brief period during which M. L. Jernigan served in his stead, Mr. Hill has been a Supervisor of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District for ten years.

At Tuesday night's meeting in the District Court Room at the Mills County Court House Mr. Oden expressed gratitude and appreciation to Mr. Hill for his devoted service.

Mr. Watters, whose election to succeed Mr. Hill was acclaimed by his friends and neighbors, was named last year as the outstanding farmer in the entire Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District in the course of bestowing awards in the annual "Save Texas And Save The Soil" program of the Fort Worth Press. On his own land Mr. Watters has consistently practiced soil and water conservation and his example and advice have been of great assistance to many others.

The area that Mr. Watters will serve in his new post as Soil Conservation District Supervisor in Mills County lies south of highway 84 and south of the Blanket Springs road in the Mullin area.

## Commissioners And Texas Highway Engineers Recommend Road Program

Robert J. Milligan, District Engineer, and Thomas W. Smith, Senior Resident Engineer of the Texas State Highway Department, met last Monday morning with the Mills County Commissioners Court to discuss next year's program involving the application of federal aid to further development of farm-to-market roads.

After the meeting Mr. Smith said that the discussion included locations to be selected for farm-to-market road construction and improvements. The Commissioners voted to recommend the following projects under both federal and State aid funds:

A stretch of 3.30 miles of road from the Regency road to continue F-M road number 574 to the Ridge schoolhouse.

A stretch of 4.25 miles of road southward from Mullin to con-

tinue the Democrat road number 575 to the Sleepy Hollow road.

Both of the above would be built with State aid.

Use of federal funds would be applied in the following:

A stretch of 4.15 miles beginning at the north end of F-M road number 595 to run northward to F-M road number 1642 at Democrat.

Another stretch, beginning at the western end of F-M road 1642 and running westward for 3.3 miles. F-M road number 1642 runs directly northward from Mullin.

The motion to make the above recommendations was by Commissioner K. B. Henry. It was seconded by Commissioner Fred W. Wall. They and County Judge Lewis B. Porter voted "for" on the motion. Commissioners Jess Y. Tullos and J. Frank Davis voted "against"—not because they oppose the proposed F-M road construction but because they differed with the other Commissioners on the timing of

## Big Baird Bears Play Here Friday Against Eagles

Bears from Baird, big bears, will invade Goldthwaite Friday night to play the Eagles—8:00 o'clock at Eagle Field.

Coach Ray Akins, pleased with the workouts of the local players this week, said "we have an even chance," when he was asked about the prospects for Friday night.

In anticipation of the arrival of the Bears, football morale was soaring in Goldthwaite, partly because on Tuesday night the Eagles or Juniors defeated their opposite numbers from San Saba here to the tune of 28-14. Two Eaglet touchdowns were scored by Quarterback Bobby Elliott and two by Right Halfback Charles Head. Elliott kicked two of the extra points and the other two were kicked by Left Halfback H. T. Vaughn.

On Friday night of last week the Lometa Hornets came up to Goldthwaite and, according to the book, they beat the Eagles 15 to 7. There will, however, be argument over that game for a long time to come. Witnesses on the goal line saw Eagles' Wayne Wicker score a touchdown after the ball had been snapped and before any official had signalled anything about the game being over. Two officials disagreed with the referee, who denied the Eagles the right to try for the extra point. Many a Goldthwaite gridiron fan believes firmly that the score last Friday night should have been Lometa, 15, Goldthwaite, 13—and that it might have been 14 for Goldthwaite if the try for the extra point had been permitted.

In recruiting, Mrs. Duren was assisted by Mrs. E. T. Fairman, Goldthwaite Chairman; Mrs. Hollis Blackwell, Rural Areas Chairman; and a host of other volunteer workers—many of whom will continue their service during the Thursday afternoon visit of the Bloodmobile.

At a meeting of the Goldthwaite Lions Club on Tuesday night Mr. Smith expressed gratitude for the splendid Mills County response to the call for blood donors for the sake of the Armed Services Program, the Home Defense Mobilization Program, and for blood transfusions in civilian hospitals.

The Bloodmobile unit was scheduled to be stationed from noon until 6:00 o'clock on Thursday afternoon at the First Baptist Church. It will be accompanied by technicians who will be assisted by a corps of volunteer workers. Mr. Smith said on Wednesday that no person who had registered as a blood

## Aldermen Renew W. C. Barnett's Contract Monday

The contract of Goldthwaite City Utilities Manager W. C. Barnett was renewed for a term of three years from next January 1 by a unanimous vote of the Aldermen at a meeting of the City Council last Monday night.

Alderman Jesse Moreland, President pro tempore of the Council, presided over the meeting at which Mr. Barnett's contract was renewed in the absence of Mayor Charlie T. Wilson. All of the other Aldermen—Everitt Holland, Carl Letbetter, George R. Gilbert and J. D. Harper—were present, as was City Secretary Raymond Summy.

During the decade that Mr. Barnett has been City Utilities Manager tremendous progress has been made in providing Goldthwaite with adequate and efficient electric, water and sewerage services. Mr. Barnett is City Treasurer, too, and he serves also in many civic and Church activities.

Alderman Moreland, who signed Mr. Barnett's new contract in the name of the City of Goldthwaite, and other members of the City Council said that in the course of the discussion last Monday night high tribute and appreciation was paid to Mr. Barnett for his services to the City and its progress.

In addition to the renewal of Mr. Barnett's contract, the City Council authorized the building committee of the Jennie Trent Dew Library to proceed with alterations to provide a separate entrance to the Library's club room at a cost not to exceed \$375.00. The new entrance will be where a window now exists and it will be made to conform to the architectural lines of the colonial structure.

The Aldermen also appointed Mrs. V. C. Bradford and Mrs. J. M. Campbell as new and additional members of the Library Board.

At the Council meeting the Aldermen approved the City tax roll and heard from Mr. Barnett a report on last week's arrival and installation of a new pump for the city's water well near the junction of the Brownwood and Priddy highways. While the new pump was on its way to replace one that wore out after some seven years of continuous service, the well was cleaned.

The Aldermen also transacted routine business, including approval of the payment of bills, and engaged in informal discussion of a wide range of city problems.

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TRUMANISM ISSUE FOR NOVEMBER 4

In a radio broadcast that was impressive because of its obvious sincerity, Governor Allan Shivers made some important Texas political history on Thursday night of last week. He said that on the basis of principle he could not contribute to the perpetuation of Trumanism. Accordingly, on November 4, Governor Shivers will vote for Dwight D. Eisenhower - as will millions of other Americans, including ourselves.

By taking his stand so forthrightly, Governor Shivers now has joined Governor Kennon of Louisiana and Governor Byrnes of South Carolina. They also see Trumanism as the issue and they can see only a continuation of Trumanism if Adlai Stevenson were to be elected.

The earnest talk by Governor Shivers to his fellow-citizens in Texas on Thursday night of last week was a vast improvement over the earlier intimation that he might "go fishing" on election day. As we have written here, going fishing isn't fighting. And there is plenty for American citizens to fight for by using their influence at the ballot box on November 4. Governor Shivers broadcast four reasons for opposing Adlai Stevenson. They were:

- 1. He is too closely associated with the Truman crowd to be able to clean up 'that mess in Washington.' 2. That association, and the obligations incurred during a hard campaign, would lead almost inevitably to a continuation of the bungling Acheson foreign policy, a continuation of Communist-coddling in high places, and other features of the corrupt Truman administration that have sickened the people of America. 3. It would mean a continuation, if not, indeed, an acceleration, of the trend to the left that is carrying us swiftly toward socialism in many forms and guises. 4. It would mean the retention and perhaps the expansion of the strange and disturbing 'paramount rights' doctrine under which Mr. Truman felt free to claim the Texas tidelands—a dangerous doctrine and a brazen action upon which Mr. Stevenson has already placed his stamp of approval. There were some other paragraphs in the speech by Governor Shivers that deserve the thoughtful consideration of his fellow-citizens. They were: I take this stand with full realization that I will be bitterly criticized for it. To those critics who sincerely disagree with me, I say: This is a free country; you have a right to your opinion; I hope you will grant me the same right. To those who are not sincere, but who seek to further their own purposes by attacking me, I say: There is nothing, in the way of political preference or personal gain of any kind, that you can offer me, or threaten to withhold from me, that will sway me from this conviction. I believe that in voting for Eisenhower I am giving my children and your children the best chance to grow up in a country that is as free and as strong and as appreciative of individual talent and initiative as the country that gave us our chance.

GUEST EDITORIAL

Adlai the Magnificent Commits his Added Deal To Truman and specially The Truman Tidelands steal. Our Captivist partisans Would make, on every count. The Tidelands dispensable And Truman paramount. But Rayburn revisionists Would make the Tidelands Stand To mean an ambiguous "Upon the other hand."

The talk is now that the captive Democrats are going to get Governor Stevenson to helm and have a little on his stand about the Texas tidelands. Just a minute, gentlemen. Let's get down the written words of Candidate Stevenson: "I stated publicly, both in Houston and Dallas, that the base from which I must necessarily start is the Supreme Court decision holding that the paramount interest in oil discovered beneath these submerged lands is vested in all the people of the United States. "I accept and abide by this ruling in common with all Supreme Court decisions. The present question, therefore, is one of wise national policy in the disposition of national assets; and it does not seem wise to me to set in motion a practice of blanket cession of these or other national assets to the individual states. I agree, therefore, with the President's veto. He agrees with Truman. Well, what did Truman say?"

"First in 1947, in the case of California, then twice in 1950, in the cases of Louisiana and Texas, the court held that the submerged lands and mineral resources underlying the open waters off the coast of the United States are lands and resources of the United States and that the various coastal states as such do not have and never have had any title to property interest in such lands, or resources, Texas, of course, before it became a state and while it was an independent republic, had whatever rights then existed in the submerged lands off its coast, but the Supreme Court ruled that any such rights were transferred to the United States under the Annexation Agreement when Texas entered the Union."

The decree of the Supreme Court in the Texas case declared that the United States is now "possessed of paramount rights in, and full dominion and power over, the lands, minerals and other things underlying the Gulf of Mexico..."

Mr. Justice Frankfurter says: "It is relevant, however, to note that in rejecting the California claims of ownership in the offshore oil, the court (Supreme Court) carefully abstained from recognizing such claim of ownership by the United States. This was emphasized when the court struck out the proprietary claim of ownership of the United States from the terms of the decree proposed by the United States in the California case." (The words "paramount rights of proprietorship," as drafted by the Attorney General in the decree were changed to "paramount rights," with "of proprietorship" striken out. The Texas decree follows the California decree.)

Truman in his veto says that Uncle Sam owns the tidelands and the oil under them. Frankfurter says the Supreme Court refused to say that. Stevenson says he "agrees with" Truman. Can he now back up on what he said?

In his Baltimore speech, Sept. 24, Stevenson said: "I do not profess to know all that is good for all the people. I do know that one of the sternest and most helpful guides to my thinking has been the insistence that I am not going to support anything just because some special group wants it. Their wanting it, of course, doesn't make it bad, but their wanting it isn't enough. I could illustrate that, I think, in a variety of ways—perhaps more conspicuously by my attitude on tidelands oil."

As a news story in the Eagle reported last month, Miss Annie Laurie Pletsick of Goldthwaite now is on a year's leave of absence from her teaching post at Alvin. That leave of absence came about because Miss Pletsick was selected by the Ford Foundation to spend a year studying international relationships with the objective of preparing a guide book that all over the United States may be used by both teachers and students in striving for understanding among the peoples of various nations.

Of all that we need so badly, we need most understanding among peoples so that we may live at peace. We are getting deeper into war and the danger of more war every day, but if civilization on this planet is to survive there will have to be an end at some time to the tragedy in which we find ourselves. That is why the work that Miss Pletsick is doing now is so important.

The fact that the Ford Foundation selected Miss Pletsick to be the recipient of one of its fellowships from the Fund for the Advancement of Education is an honor not only to her, but to Goldthwaite as well. This week the editor finished and mailed the article that he writes every year for the Annual of the Book of Knowledge, which is published by the Grolier Society in New York. The article was on Asia, where the editor lived for so many years, and as he wrote it he kept thinking amidst the gloom of the words that perhaps he had to commit to paper how fine it was that persons such as Miss Pletsick are working to avoid in the future a repetition of the tragedy that now, in one way or another, has disrupted the lives of all of us.

As the editor was thinking about war and human misery and the lack of international understanding and of what persons such as Miss Pletsick are trying to do in behalf of a better future, there came from Dr. Clarence H. Faus, President of the Fund for the Advancement of Education, a statement clearly their teaching assignments in broad perspectives particularly in relation to increasing complexities of society. 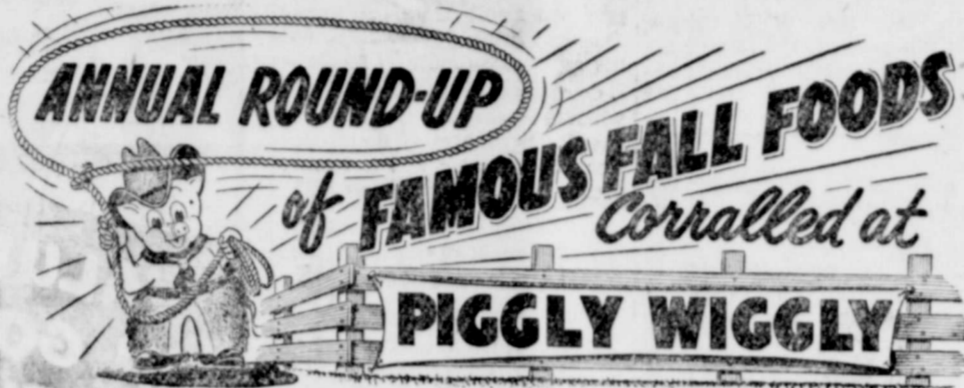

"Final recommendations for awards were submitted to the Fund by the National Committee on High School Teacher Fellowships under the chairmanship of Mr. Lester W. Nelson, Principal, Scarsdale (N. Y.) High School. Other members of the Committee are: Omer Carmichael, Superintendent of Schools, Louisville, Kentucky; William H. Cornog, President, Central High School, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania; Marcia Edwards, Assistant Dean, College of Education, University of Minnesota; Matthew P. Gaffney, Superintendent, New Trier Township High School, Winnetka, Illinois; Paul A. Rehmus, Superintendent of Schools, Portland, Oregon.

"Of the 193 recipients, 90 are men, and 103 women. The highest number of awards was in the literature, music and art fields with 71, followed by the social sciences with 70, the natural science and mathematics with 30, plus several awards in agriculture, accounting, library work, physical education, and guidance. The breakdown by states in order of frequency shows New York first with 24, followed by Ohio (16), Pennsylvania (15), California (14) and Texas (11).

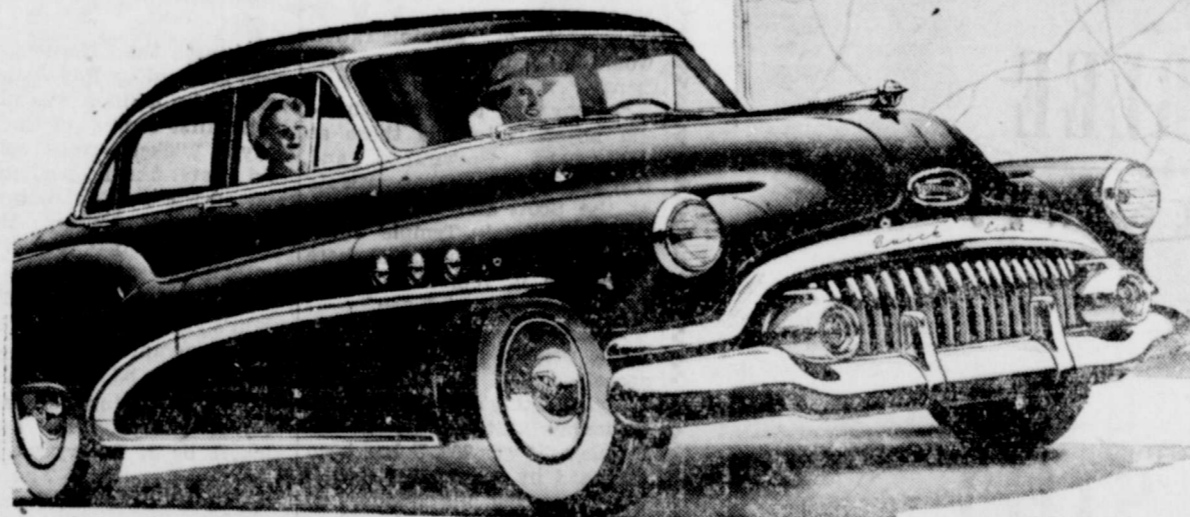

donor had asked to have an appointment change. That, he said, greatly facilitated organization for the Bloodmobile visit.

In connection with the American Red Cross blood donor program, Dr. M. A. Childress last Friday attended a meeting of the Regional Medical Advisory Committee to the Regional Blood Center at Waco. He was a delegate from Mills County. Upon his return Dr. Childress said that one of the most important decisions reached at the meeting provided that any resident of a County participating in the Regional Blood Center may obtain blood anywhere if needed. Mills County is a participant.

"For example," Dr. Childress said, "a resident of Mills County, if injured in an automobile accident and hospitalized in Los Angeles, St. Louis or anywhere else could obtain blood immediately, if needed, and it would be replaced by the Regional Blood Center at Waco. The cost of administration would be paid for by the patient."

"In our own area, participating hospitals include those at San Saba, Brownwood and Lampasas. Mills County patients at the Scott and White Memorial Hospital in Temple would be able to obtain blood there and have it replaced by the Regional Center at Waco."

The Waco Center, Dr. Childress pointed out, already is operating.

Mills County's quota for the Thursday visit of the Bloodmobile unit was 200. It has been exceeded by 14. All registrants have received instructions on their appointment cards.

### Quarantine Imposed Because Of Anthrax

Anthrax, which made its appearance about three weeks ago in the Will Boykin herd of cattle southeast of Star, caused a quarantine to be imposed on all adjoining places. Dr. D. R. Kerby, Goldthwaite veterinarian, said this week that prompt steps were taken "to vaccinate everything" after Mr. Boykin had lost seven cattle and calves.

Dr. Kerby said that so far no order of compulsory vaccination had been issued. He said that wherever anthrax is found the place will be quarantined for 21 days after the last death loss or the last vaccination. Although there have been livestock deaths on places other than Mr. Boykin's the presence of anthrax had not been confirmed, Dr. Kerby said. There were however, vaccinations as a precautionary measure.

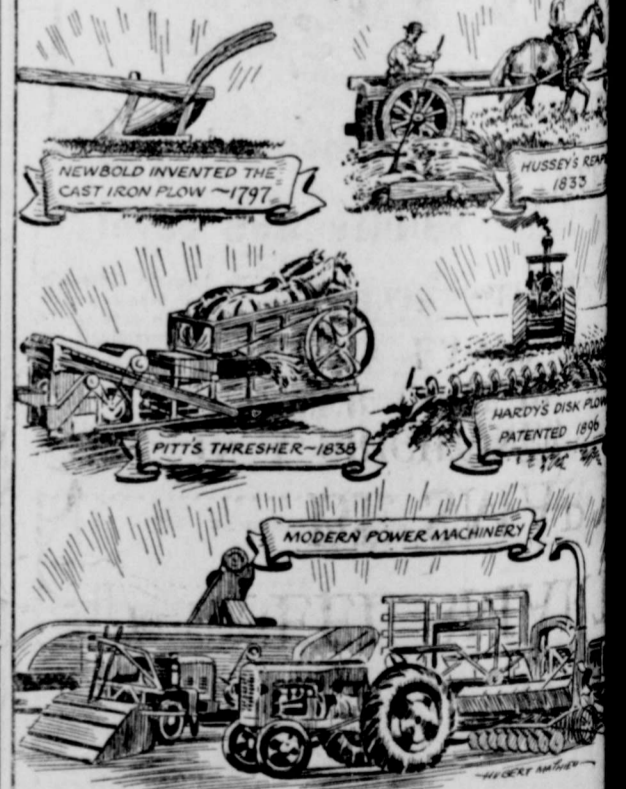
### Mullin Football
