## Delinquent Taxes To Be Collected

According to announcement by A. M. Pribble, County Attorney, work is getting underway on the task of collecting delinquent taxes in Mills County. Mr. Pribble was designated for the post and instructed to proceed with this job, by the County Commissioners at a recent meeting.

Under the plan to be followed, all parties, who owe taxes that are past due, will be notified of their tax status and will have thirty days in which to make proper arrangement for settlement. If taxes, interest and penalty along with costs are not paid, or settlement is made for same, within the thirty day period, then suit will be instituted for collection.

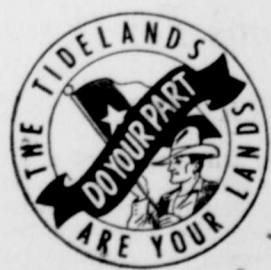

How much of this "air" war of words is "hot" is hard for laymen to judge. But the spectacle of the armed services bickering with each other isn't likely to excite confidence in either. Unification? Hah!

**Demand For Hay Slowing Down According To PMA Office Report**

The demand for hay has slowed down to only a few tons per day according to a report from C. E. Jones of the Mills County Production and Marketing Association. Hay is being ordered at the rate of one and two carload lots every three or four days, with some due to arrive soon.

In reporting on applications for Legume hay, Jones said: "We cannot accept applications for Legume hay unless the applicant agrees to accept mixed hay if Legume is not available. All orders are for Legume hay, but we don't know what type of Legume it will be." The report indicates that in this connection there is no choice and those ordering must take a chance on receiving their pre-

ference or accept what is available.

According to the report the one small car of Alfalfa Hay that was received spoiled nearly everyone. They all want number one Alfalfa, in all probability there will never be another car like it.

The community committee-men (Carpet Baggers to their co-workers) working on the Sign-Up campaign for the new 1953 Agricultural Conservation Practices are gradually covering the entire county in their canvassing, according to the report. Commenting further on this phase of their work Jones stated: "It's like 'Gabriel' blowing his horn, you better hear it and take heed. December 2, is TOO LATE by just one day."

He urges all concerned to make an honest effort to help in the program, and themselves, by contacting one of their committee-men or by writing a card or letter and the staff will do its best to help out.

Mills County PMA Jones states further that the only activity around their office at this time is in Hay and winter Cover Crops and the dry weather has stopped planting of Legumes, and, says Jones: "The thing most needed at this time in this area is a good rain."

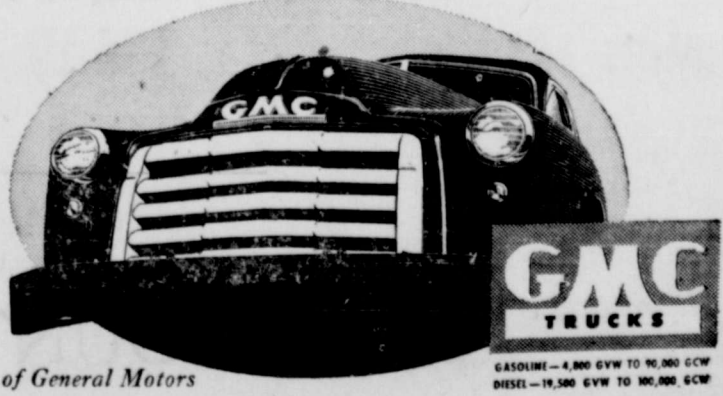

### Need Cited For Winter-Proofing Of Older Houses

The time has come for families living in older houses to make plans for winter-proofing their homes, especially where there are young children and older people, according to O. O. Smith, local lumber and building materials dealer and member of the Public Affairs Committee of the National Retail Lumber Dealers Association.

"Any home which has not been carefully checked for heat loss in recent years can be made more healthful and comfortable and heating bills can be reduced during the period of lower temperatures which lies ahead," Mr. Smith said.

"In addition to making sure that the heating plant is in good operating condition, there are other ways to maintain more even and comfortable temperatures in cold weather:

"Be sure that the ceiling or attic floor and exterior walls are properly insulated.

"Make certain that every door and window frame is well caulked.

"Install weather-stripping on all doors and windows.

"Stopping heat loss with these precautions reduces air movement on cold days, thus preventing drafts and keeping floors warmer, in addition to saving fuel."

### Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District Accomplishment Report

By Charles O. Haenisch  
Farmers and ranchers cooperating with the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District who have deferred their ranges this summer are reaping the reward for their effort. In spite of the dry weather condition the native grasses that have received a rest are increasing in vigor and producing a good seed crop.

In a pasture which has received a complete deferment since July, E. D. Roberson has noticed many of the desirable grasses seeding. In observing these grasses, Mr. Roberson has seen a grass called sprangletop, seeding. This is a native grass in this area, however because of overgrazing it has become very scarce.

Many other choice grasses such as Little bluestem, Sideoats grama, Indiangrass, and dropseed are seeding. The seed produced from these grasses will be left on the range and allowed to make new seedlings this spring. Mr. Roberson is convinced that this is the cheapest way to reseed rangeland that is in need of reseeding.

Charles Butler, near Scallorn, had some undesirable trees pushed about two years ago. These trees are now dead and have formed a natural fence which prevents livestock from grazing the various grasses. In these areas, Mr. Butler reports that Little bluestem, Indiangrass, Sideoats grama, Hairy grama, Prairie dropseed, and other grasses are seeded. In the same pasture where stock has had free choice of the grass, none of these grasses are seeding. Mr. Butler plans to defer his pastures for reseeding his range

as time will permit.

I. B. Burnham is convinced that a limited amount of rainfall will not prevent native grasses from seeding. On rainfall far below average this year his pastures have seeded and improved. Native grasses with root systems from four to seven feet have an advantage over annual plants with root systems of one to two feet in competition for moisture. Mr. Burnham has seen Big bluestem, another scarce grass, seeding this year. He states that one should not sell the native grasses short in their ability to withstand the drought conditions that have existed in this area recently.

Now is the time to begin planning that deferment for next year. The desirable grasses in this area are a vital resource our livestock industry. Good grass produces good livestock. Complete summer deferments is one way in which our native grasses will increase to produce better range for our livestock.

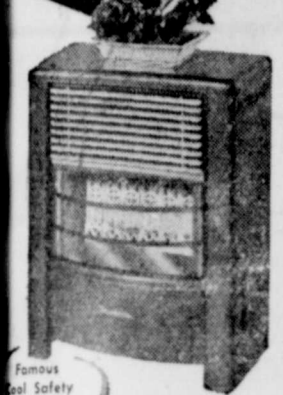
