Record Vote Expected As Mills County Turns Out For Election

Mills County is expected to follow the trend of the nation when it turns out for the General Election next Tuesday, November 4th, by casting a record vote. Polls will be open from 7:00 a. m. until 7:00 p. m. at the regular polling places in all precincts, according to announcement by W. E. Summy, County Clerk.

There are near three thousand eligible voters in Mills County, based on calculations by the County Clerk, which shows that there are approximately 2,300 poll taxes paid and there are an approximate 500 or more who are exempt.

ABSENTEE BALLOTS

The County Clerk has announced that Friday, October 31, at midnight is the deadline for casting absentee ballots whether they are cast by mail or in person at the Clerk's office in advance of that date. Absentee ballots mailed must bear postmark before midnight October 31.

To date more than fifty voters have cast their absentee ballot and Mr. Summy said that a good number of ballots are still out. It is expected that a possible 100 votes will be cast absentee before the final deadline.

ELECTION NIGHT

As has been the custom, and a requirement, the public will be kept informed as returns are received at the Clerk's office on Election night a large bulletin board will be set up on the band stand in the Court-house Square on which returns of Mills County will be posted as fast as they are received.

In case of rain, (what are we talking about) the bulletin board will be set up inside the Courthouse halls for the convenience of those who turn out for the election party.

While the Clerk's office will be open until a late hour it is possible that not all precincts will be reported that night—some may not be in until the next morning, Mr. Summy stated.

Quarter Horse Sale Held Here

What is reported the first all Permanent Registered Quarter Horse sale in Texas was held in Goldthwaite at the Mills County Commission Company Tuesday of this week with a record crowd in attendance. It was a private sale sponsored by C. D. Bruce of Santa Anna, Mrs. Frank Black of Junction and Gene and Jeanette Hensley of Santa Anna.

S. D. "Sig" Jernigan of the Commission Company where the sale was held reported a more than capacity crowd with prices as very, very favorable.

Fifty-four head of horses were sold. Out of this number thirty belonged to Bruce while Mrs. Black had sixteen and the Hensleys eight head.

According to reports the Bruce horses, due to the famous blood line of "Little Joe" which has been concentrated in their breeding, brought a most favorable price with the 30 head averaging \$318.00.

The highest price paid for a single head from these belonging to Bruce was \$2,960.00.

Average prices for the smaller number belonging to Mrs. Black and the Hensleys were reported some higher.

Observers at the sale estimated the attendance at over four hundred, lovers of horses, from an estimated thirty or more states.

Lone Star Gas Company Petitions Council For Increase In Rates Here

Members of the Lone Star Gas Company Tuesday of last week petitioned the Mayor and Councilmen of Goldthwaite for an increase in local gas rates of 13 per cent per one thousand cubic feet according to Mayor Char- Wilson.

They ask emergency action at the next regular City Council meeting which will be held Monday night, Nov. 3, at 7:30 p. m.

According to figures submitted by the Lone Star to city officials, the 13-cent per thousand cubic feet increase asked will mean an average increase of 18 cents per month per customer in Goldthwaite. Minimum monthly bill will be increased to \$1.53, which is proposed rate for first m.c.f. This rate scales down for commercial users to 48 cents net for all over 25,000 cubic feet.

Lone Star Gas Company figures show an operating loss in Goldthwaite for 1951 of \$1,806.58. The new proposed rate if granted by the City Council is expected to bring a return to the company of 16 per cent on an investment in Goldthwaite of \$94,907.03, depreciated, the gas company figures show.

Lone Star is asking for this rate increase all over its system in Texas.

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NOW COMES THE ELECTION

This is the last week, or go 'round, before the general election on next Tuesday, November 4th., when all good American citizens are supposed to take their birthright seriously and go to the polls and cast a ballot.

Since in this State and many other Southern States most of the actual selecting of candidates for office is done with primary elections there remains little controversy on the local level — though a major issue still rests before the voters on the National level, that of voting for presidential candidate.

This writer has for many years been politically independent, giving study and consideration to men of all political parties and credit when and where it is due or deserving. With that philosophy in mind we will make a few observations and comments regarding the National Election and the responsibility that rests on the individual voter, especially heavy, at this time.

Early this month Governor Stevenson in a speech on the West Coast, is reported to have said: "Corruption in Government is the fault of the people. Office holders often serve you better than your indifference and apathy deserve. A government is a fair sample of the ethics and morals of the people. No better; no worse."

According to that reported statement he is accusing the people of being at fault in the condition that exists today with respect to the irregularities that have been coming to light in our Federal government. The people, naturally means you and I, the average man and woman on the street, in the store, on the farm or ranch, in the factory and everybody else. Remember that means everyone regardless whether they are Democrat, Republican, Independent, Socialist, or otherwise.

Now, if the people are guilty of the picture then it is high time that they start waking up and doing something about it.

In our opinion the average man and woman casting their ballot in electing officials to represent them in the Federal government do so with the idea that those elected will represent them and the rest of the people with honesty and fairness, as public servants. If the majority voters do not feel that way about the matter then they wouldn't send these representatives.

It seems to us that the average voter will resent such an accusation because:

The average folks did not know that Harry Vaughn would be appointed as an aide to the president. In fact we did not even know there was a Harry Vaughn until he was exposed for dispensing favors and special privileges out of the back door of the White House.

The people did not appoint Merle "Mink Coat" Young, the former Kansas City Grocery clerk, to high office where he approved millions of loans to unworthy borrowers for a fee, nor did they appoint his wife to the White House staff nor provide her with a \$9,500.00 mink coat which has become famous nation-wide.

The man on the street did not appoint communists to high places in the State Department, nor did he try to protect and defend them when they were exposed.

The average voter wasn't responsible for the tax scandals and graft and corruption in the Tax Department of the United States — all he did was pay taxes.

The people had nothing to do with, nor did they know about, the wholesale larcenies of grain from Federal storage plants.

If there is anything the average person is guilty of it is of placing too much confidence in their elected representatives and of failing to distinguish the blandishments of the ruthless demagogue from the less colorful wisdom of the patriot and of innocently allowing ourselves to fall victim to the professional politician, who, with the aid of a host of script writers, policy makers, voice trainers, personality coaches, publicity experts and a good tailor, has studiously created the trap into which it has been planned that we shall fall.

The average person had no power to investigate, apprehend or prosecute and therefore could take no action to protect or defend himself from this mess of corruption.

It isn't a case of indifference or apathy on the part of the American people; it is a case of lack of opportunity to take action until Election Day.

Next Tuesday is Election Day — the day for the American people to speak.

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GUEST EDITORIAL

Rotation In Korea

Nobody who knows anything at all about the fighting in Korea would wish to keep a single man there any longer than necessary.

But Gen. Mark Clark, who has the direct responsibility for fighting the war, recently was faced with a tragic problem. In this election year, he wasn't getting enough replacements from the United States.

To maintain a safe combat strength, and to protect the men whose lives would be in additional jeopardy if their forces were seriously reduced, he added a half-month to the nine months of combat duty which has been required before a GI could come home.

This order was issued in September, but not published until this week. Immediately, two weeks before the election, it was rescinded by Washington.

So the men in combat will get to come home on time. But what of the men not yet eligible for rotation? Will their danger be increased because their forces have been reduced? Washington doesn't say.

Another Look

At The Record

The Congress that enacted the McCarran bill in 1952 has been constituted as follows:

House: Democrats 228, Republicans 206, Democrat-Liberal 1, Independent 1.

The author of the McCarran bill is a Democrat.

No bill offered to that Congress can possibly have become law without being in the main a Democratic bill.

Yet the President of the United States, after first damming Eisenhower as a Jew-Catholic hater, now says that he was misquoted. But he insists that so long as Eisenhower and the Republican party do not condemn the McCarran bill, they are linked to subversive forces. Actually there is nothing wrong with the McCarran bill, which merely limits immigration.

There is a lot wrong with Truman. According to one reporter who has traveled on the Truman train, the President has an odd psychological or perhaps psychiatric approach to what he says. He believes it at the moment. It makes no difference whether he is misquoting history, as he has done, or just blindly hitting out, he believes it at the time. He also believes that the ends justify the means. He thinks his opponents should be defeated. How is unimportant.

That will explain Truman, the man made by the Pendergast machine. It will explain Truman, the man who pardoned fifteen of his Pendergast buddies and bullies convicted of vote frauds. It will explain Truman, the man who fired Maurice Milligan, an honest prosecutor, who convicted those men. And it explains the Truman who can brazenly take the stump to vilify a great soldier and do it in language better suited to the gutter than the White House.

And it also must explain Truman who, with the full power of control of the Congress and the White House and, in some respects, of the courts, blames everything that happens on the party that is not in power.

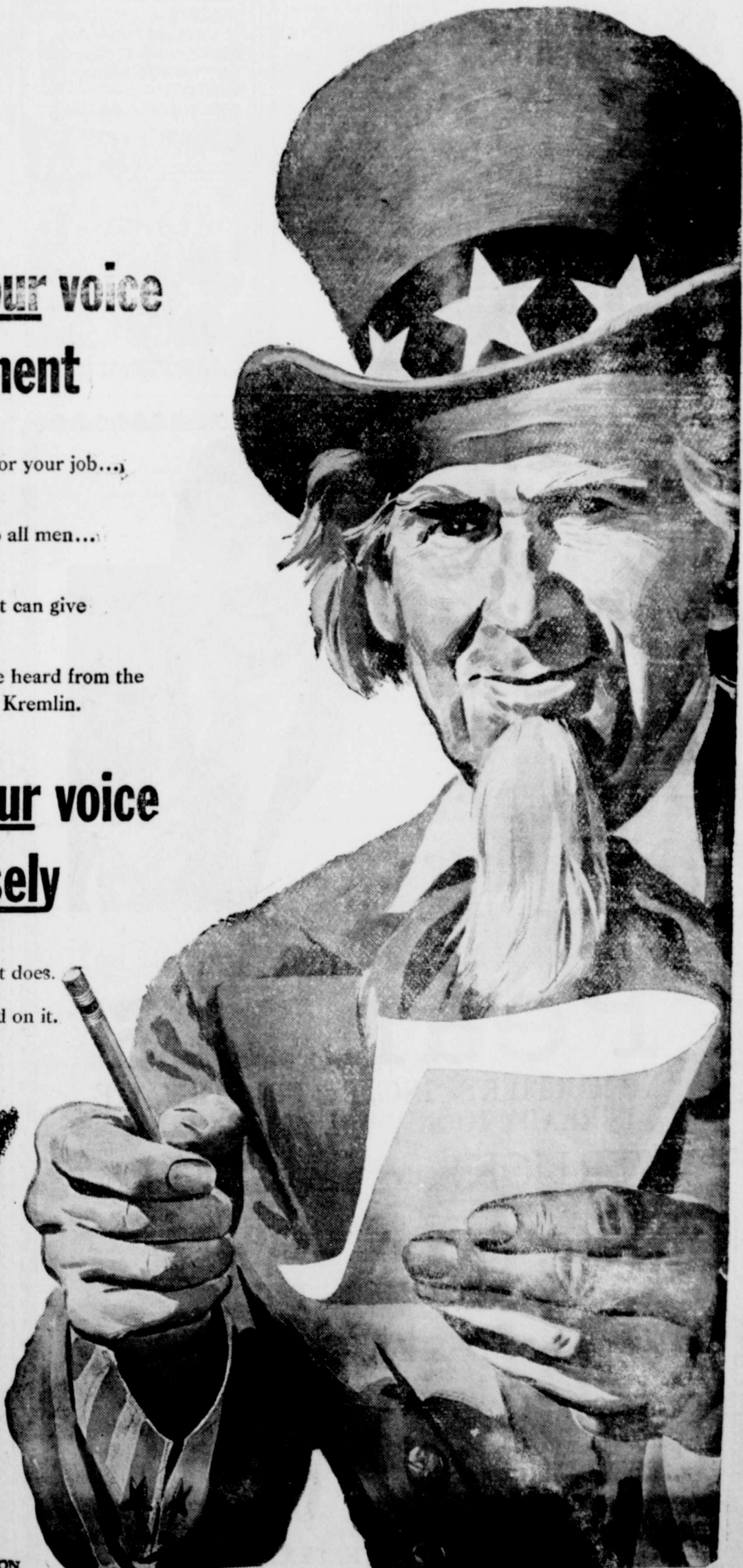

RUSSELL IS THE GEORGIA SENATOR FOR WHOM GOVERNOR SHIVERS AND TEXAS DELEGATION VOTED UNANIMOUSLY ON ALL BALLOTS AT DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION IN CHICAGO

Senator Dick Russell of Georgia, the man the Texas Delegation headed by Gov. 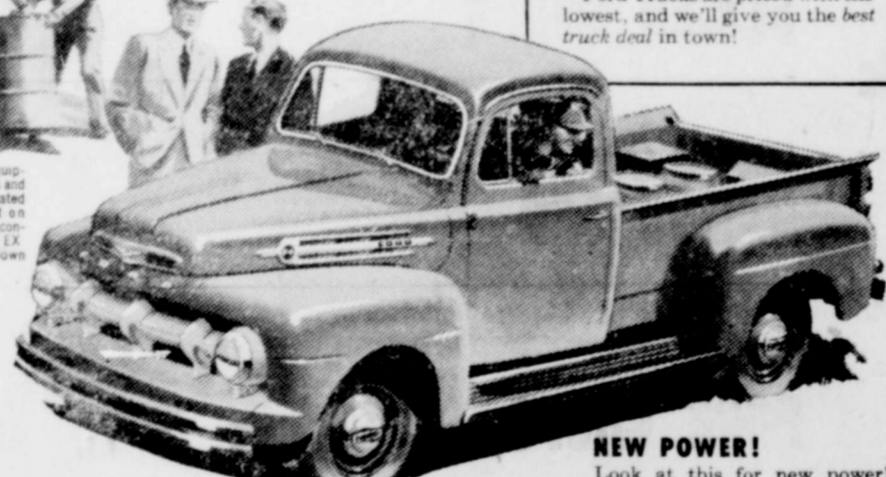

The P. M. A. Office has just received word that two carloads of mixed hay has been shipped from Sparta, Wisconsin. According to Y. E. Hoover of the Santa Fe Railway Station, the hay should arrive here Thursday or Friday of this week. You people who have applications in will receive a card notifying you when to pick it up.

The State Office has advised us that it will take up to six weeks to make deliveries of the hay that is ordered now. There is no shortage of hay nor is there a shortage of cars. This is the critical time of the season for corn harvest in the North. The people are working

like beavers to get their corn harvested before the first killing frost. In a few weeks the corn harvest will be over and they will take up the Emergency Hay Program again.

Reports from the surrounding counties about the "dark hay" from "up North" is that it is much better than it looks. The people who have fed some of it are ordering more.

We of the P. M. A. Office and our committeemen are trying desperately to contact every land owner or operator in Mills County and since we all know the EAGLE is well known throughout this state and many other states, we are using this means of reaching you. We shall

endeavor to get every owner and operator signed up for the 1953 Agricultural Conservation Practices Program. If only one operator answered this plea, we shall feel justified in our efforts. We are visiting, writing letters, telephoning and sending word by friends to reach everyone interested in the program.

Of the 1200 farms and ranches in Mills County about 95% have already signed up, thanks to a fine bunch of hard working committeemen. We don't know for sure, but we have an idea Mills County will not be the last to finish and they could be FIRST.

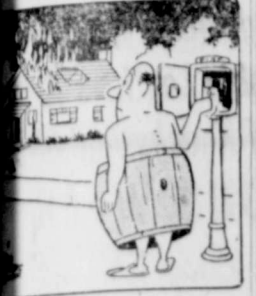

Social Security Extends Help To Bury Servicemen

When the body of a serviceman who died overseas after June 24, 1950 is brought to the United States for reburial, the Social Security Administration may repay part of the cost of the reburial in certain cases, according to James B. Marley, Manager of the Austin social security office.

Ordinarily, a claim for the social security lump sum for burial expenses must be filed within two years after death. Recent amendments to the social security law, however, provide an extension of the time limit in cases where the body of a serviceman who died after June 24, 1950, is returned to the United States for reburial. In these cases the reimbursement may be applied for within two years of the date of burial or reburial rather than within two years after the date of death.

Where the serviceman is survived by a widow this provision will not ordinarily apply, since in these cases the lump sum is paid to her regardless of who pays the burial expenses.

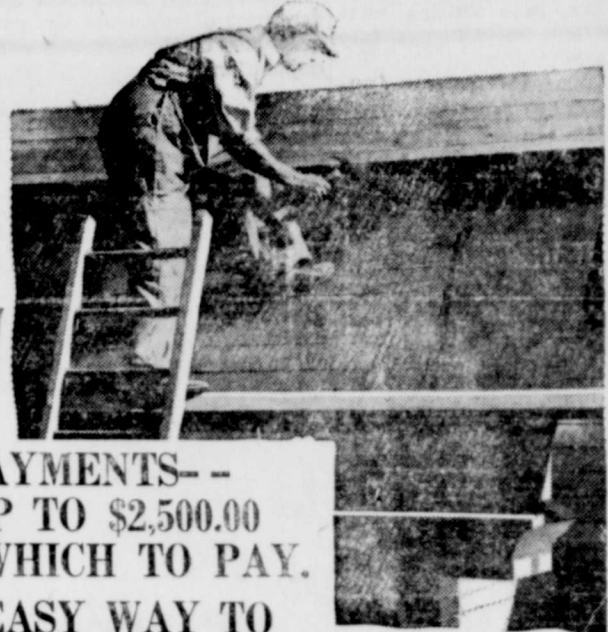

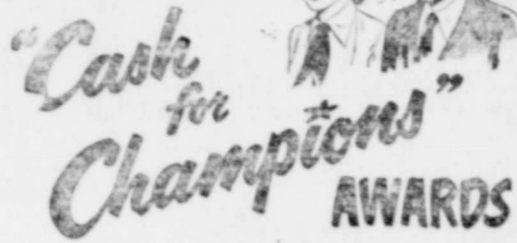
