City Council Defers Action On Gas Company Petition For Rate Increase

Order that they might give further study and the sentiment of the natural gas users of Goldthwaite, according to the petition of the Lone Star Gas Company for an increase in gas rates here of 13 cents per 1,000 cubic feet was deferred until the regular first meeting in December by the Goldthwaite City Council at its meeting in the Utility Building Monday.

The petition for the rate increase, which also covers commercial customers, was formalized to the Council by representatives of the Lone Star Gas Company. J. B. Knowlton, San Saba, district manager, accompanied by L. C. Byrd, manager, and T. B. Blain, representing the petition, Mr. Knowlton stated that similar rate increases are being sought throughout Lone Star's operating territory in Texas and Oklahoma.

The Lone Star application was supported by information and statistics reflecting rising costs over-all operations, while the price of gas was being held substantially below prewar levels. The new rate would affect approximately 551 customers in Goldthwaite.

The Lone Star manager emphasized that residential and commercial rates charged by Lone Star have not been increased generally within the last five years, but conversely were reduced ten cents per thousand cubic feet in May. He said the proposed new rate is only three cents per thousand higher than the rate charged by Lone Star prior to 1942 reduction.

The proposed rate reduction, Mr. Knowlton said in discussing the application, "the rate per customer (family) would average 60 cents per month or 2 cents a day. Of additional 60 cents paid by customer each month, 32 cents will go to various taxes, leaving the company only 28 cents."

The Lone Star manager declared that "higher rates are needed at once if our standard service is to be maintained

Mills County Joins State And Nation In Electing Ike President

Mills County, which has been virtually a lifetime Democratic county, has joined the State and Nation in electing Dwight D. Eisenhower as President of the United States, according to unofficial election returns as announced by County Clerk Earl Summy.

Total votes cast for President, according to the unofficial returns, in the county was 1,965. Of this number Republican

Candidate Eisenhower received 1,091 while 833 votes were cast for Democratic Candidate Stevenson, making Eisenhower the winner by 208 votes.

Some political observers state that it is the first time in the history of the county for voters to cast their ballots for a Republican Presidential Candidate in a majority, though, there is some speculation regarding that record with some believing there was another time some years ago when Mills County went with a majority vote for the Republican Candidate during a Presidential race. This record will be checked for the press by County Clerk Summy and will be reported at a later date.

Total number of votes cast in Mills County was 2,082. Of this number 15 votes were for MacArthur while approximately 100 ballots were lost due to being incorrectly marked or in such a way that made it impossible for clerks to determine how citizens wished to cast their ballot.

Votes cast on Amendment Number 1 were 498 for with 546 against. This Amendment is with reference to authorizing the State Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages.

On Amendment number 2 there were 475 votes cast for and 548 against. This Amendment is for providing a State Medical Education Fund from which to grant loans or scholarships to students desiring to study medicine.

On the local level there was little interest in the contests for various offices. The only hot race that was evident is that for Precinct Constable in which there were three write-in candidates, namely, Fred Laughlin; Bill Kelso and Grady Tullos. Fred Laughlin seemed to be the victor in this three cornered write-in campaign, receiving 67 votes while Bill Kelso received 18 and Grady Tullos 3.

Official returns will be certified by the Commissioners' Court meeting in regular session next Monday and announcement will be made of their findings. There is a possibility that some slight changes will result in their official returns.

Complete returns from each precinct, of votes cast for Presidential Candidates, will be carried in the next issue of the Eagle.

Moreland stated that this represents all money turned in to him for deposit up to this week. However he pointed out that there are still some reports to be received from some of the workers and it is expected this amount will be increased before the campaign is finished.

Mills County Receives Citation

County Judge, Lewis B. Porter, has received a certificate from the United States Department of Agriculture and the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas showing the county to be an accredited area in the Co-operative Tuberculosis Eradication program.

The certificate reads as follows: "This is to certify that Mills County has been declared a Modified Tuberculosis-Free Accredited Area by the United States Department of Agriculture and the Live Stock Sanitary Commission of Texas cooperating. This certificate is good for three years from November 1st, 1952."

Motive For Opening Grave In Jones Valley Cemetery Remains Mystery

Whether it was for lost or buried treasure or only a prank the motive behind opening a grave in Jones Valley Cemetery by some unknown person or persons remained a mystery to local officials who reported the incident this week. The cemetery is located, in the middle of a sandy field surrounded by large trees, about 25 miles southwest of Goldthwaite, Texas, near the banks of the Colorado river.

Mills County Sheriff, C. F. Stubblefield who investigated after it was reported to him stated that the grave had apparently been shoveled out to the necessary depth to uncover parts of the casket and contents. Nothing was found during the investigation that would serve to point to a motive for the act, which apparently had been committed some weeks before.

In making the investigation

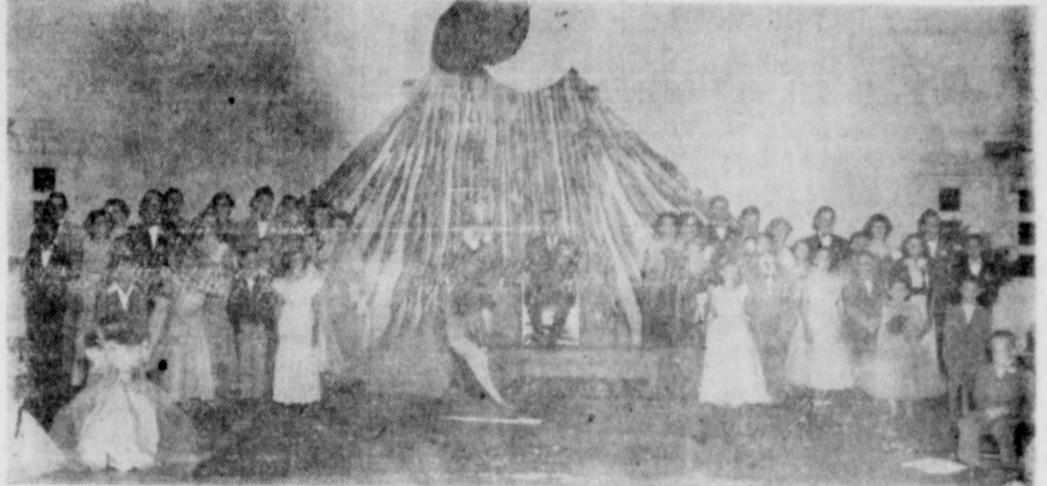
the Sheriff was accompanied by Harve Hale, O. B. Bell and son, Bill, and V. C. Bradford. Some members of the party, the Sheriff pointed out, are "Old Timers" who are familiar with the area in which the cemetery is located.

The grave molested was one of four in the cemetery having Marble Tomb Stones and the stone was inscribed as follows: John Smith, Born 1823, Died 1904. All other markers in the cemetery are of Sandstone.

Sheriff Stubblefield stated that the cemetery, which contains about twenty graves and is in a neglected condition, was used during the early days in this county with some burial records dating back to 1876. It is located in a territory where there has been considerable work done by goldiggers during the years.

The Sheriff and his investigating party reburied contents found at the scene.

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TWO WORTHY PROJECTS In listening to various discussions regarding the projects that have been shouldered by the Lions Club and The Garden Club for the betterment of our community one can't help but agree that they are most worthy.

The Lions Club, as we understand it, has undertaken to do all that the members can to foster the program of getting a swimming pool for our city, while the Garden Club has as its project the development of Goldthwaite Memorial Cemetery.

It would appear that these two organizations will have little to fear in their undertakings since these projects are definitely in line with community building and improvements, that should receive the whole-hearted support of the entire citizenry.

THE SWIMMING POOL

Whether we love to go swimming or not personally, should not be the basis of one forming an opinion regarding the need for a swimming pool in any community. There is a genuine need in every community for their own swimming pool or easy access to one.

Because there is a need doesn't always mean that it is easy for a community to undertake a project of this type and get the job done without considerable aches and pains in developing it to a successful conclusion. One can't expect to promote a community project the type and size of providing a good swimming pool without a lot of headaches, both physical and financial. In fact, it is better for the program to be undertaken with the idea that it is not going to be easy and, with a determination that it will be done for the betterment of the community, knowing that there will be a good many problems to be solved during the course of its development.

The worth of a swimming pool cannot be measured in a financial way. It would certainly be a big job to try and arrive at a figure of, or, financial worth of a swimming pool to any community.

On the other hand the community is faced with the initial outlay or cost of constructing one. This cost figure is no myth — it is a very real and living thing to each of us as we make a contribution to a project of this type of program whether it is physical or financial. It has to be paid for, whether it is on a taxation basis or otherwise.

The real worth is in the recreational, physical development and health building factors that it provides for folks of the community and surrounding area — in our case Goldthwaite, Mills County and neighboring territory.

There has been a lot said about doing things to keep our young folks more interested in their home town. Other towns have the same problems and are faced with the same conditions that we are. Yet there are a good many small cities that have taken the problem seriously and have found that it can be done and be justified as a paying proposition.

It is only natural that our younger folks are looking more for recreational facilities than are older folks. Yet from the standpoint of a swimming pool, it can be enjoyed by young and old alike, and young and old alike will help pay for it.

If the community doesn't provide for recreation then a certain number of folks will seek it elsewhere. That means going out of town or county and spending their money elsewhere. While if you have the attraction you not only benefit from your own folks but, you also have a drawing card for folks from outside.

From the physical development and health building standpoint one can always rebuttal with the fact that, work never hurt anyone, with which we agree, though, we have also learned, the hard way, that "All Work and No Play Makes Jack a Dull Boy."

MEMORIAL CEMETERY

This is a project that by all means should not be neglected. The Garden Club deserves full support in their work on improvement of the Memorial Cemetery.

For in many cases folks from the outside judge a community from the interest shown in providing a place for our departed and besides it should be deserving of the very best from the standpoint of civic pride.

GUEST EDITORIAL

The Economic Guarantee Of Freedom

The left-wingers in and out of the government always take pleasure in sniping at the securities industry. Today, as yesterday, "Wall Street" is a prime target for attack. And the idea is to create the impression that people who buy stocks and bonds are somehow bad citizens, who fatten at the expense of the rest of us.

Luckily, this is not likely to impress anyone with even a rudimentary knowledge of how this country grew, and what keeps it going. The much-reviled shareholders are the men and women who make possible the existence of all the corporations of almost every conceivable size and nature. They provide us with the goods and services that give us living standards far beyond those of any other nation. They employ, at good wages, a very large proportion of our working force. They pay much of the tax burden of government. In time of war or emergency, they produce most of the weapons and supplies needed for national defense and survival. And they provide a fine example of real "public ownership" as distinguished from socialism. Anyone with a little money can buy a share of stock in any one of our leading companies and become an owner—as many millions of typical Americans have done.

Not long ago Bishop Fulton J. Sheen, one of the most eminent churchmen of this country, said, "Private property is the economic guarantee of my freedom. . . . So long as a man has property, something he can call his own. . . . he is free." It seems more than likely that the attacks on our securities industry and other financial institutions has its origin in the enemies of freedom and their dupes—in the minds of those who want to destroy freedom and replace it with some kind of a dictatorship.

Grass Roots Opinion

Montpelier, Vt., Evening Argonaut—Take a look at unemployment. On two occasions it was war and only war that saved the country from severe unemployment. . . . Unemployment in February, 1950, was 4,684,000. This was the highest since August, 1941. Both dates were shortly before the United States went to war. The CIO News commenting on unemployment in April, 1950, said: "The situation is serious." Even after the start of the Korean war, unemployment was a serious problem.
