Up to yesterday afternoon 4,420 bales of cotton had been received at the public yard here. On the same date last year 3,867 bales had been received and the 1900 receipts were 8,278.

The Big Valley Canal and Irrigation Co., of Big Valley, closed a contract Saturday with Mr. J. D. Cudney, representing Kellett-Chatham Machinery Co. of Waco, Texas, for the largest irrigation plant in West Texas, consisting of a centrifugal pump capable of pumping 7,000 gallons of water per minute 50 feet high and having an 18 inch suction and discharge pipe. This pump will be operated by steam plant consisting of 200 horse power boilers and a 17 horse power engine.

### Brown-Mills Soil Conservation News

By ROGER POWELL

The supervisors of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District have found that contour cultivation on a sloping field is the first step in applying a complete coordinated soil conservation plan on your farm. Experiments have shown that terraced and contoured fields have allowed only 7.8 per cent of the water that fell to run off, holding the remainder to penetrate into the soil.

Supervisors point out that terracing is not a cure-all for erosion, nor a substitute for other conservation measures. Facts

have shown that considerable inter-terrace erosion takes place during heavy rain storms creating the need for cover crops, crop rotation and stubble mulching.

When terraces are built, it should be remembered that the success or failure of the system depends upon the outlet. The drainage outlet is really the nerve center of your terrace system. The most desirable type of terrace outlet is a native pasture. At times, this type of outlet is not available and the farmer must resort to a constructed waterway. The size of the waterway should be sufficient to carry all excess run-off in an efficient manner.

Cooperators of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District in the past have had good results in vegetating the waterways with both introduced and native grasses. Bermuda grass, a fast growing fibrous rooted sod-grass, has been the best protection in the deeper soils. In the shallow soils, the native bunch grasses have been used with success. For the past three years, plantings of King Ranch bluestem, an introduced grass, have been tried and found to be successful in waterways. Its ability to make a fast growth makes it a desirable grass for this purpose.

Good vegetative cover is essential in all waterways and terrace construction should be postponed until satisfactory cover is present.

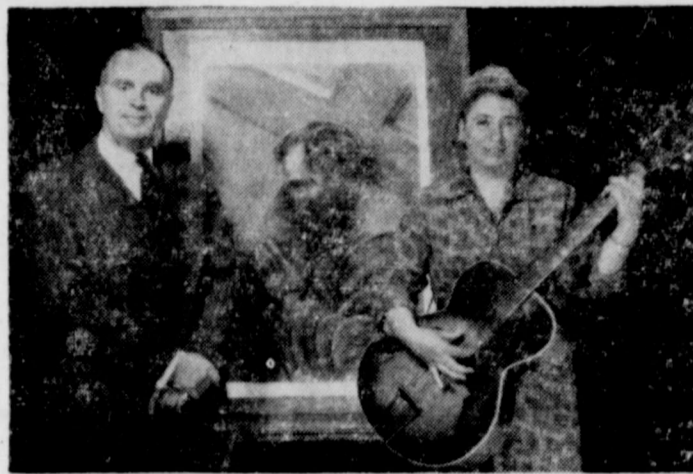

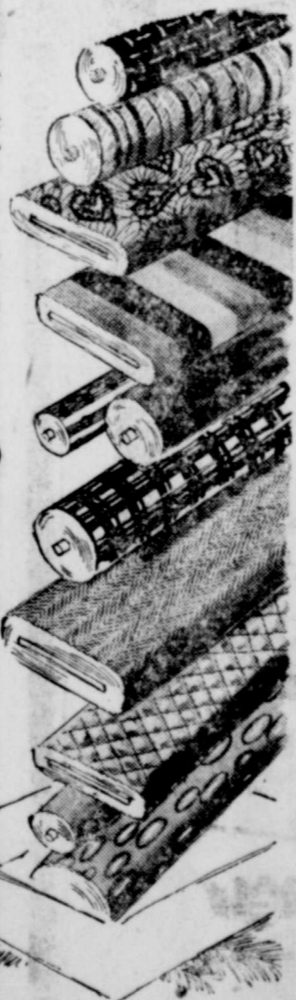

**Girl Scout Leaders Hear Activity Report**

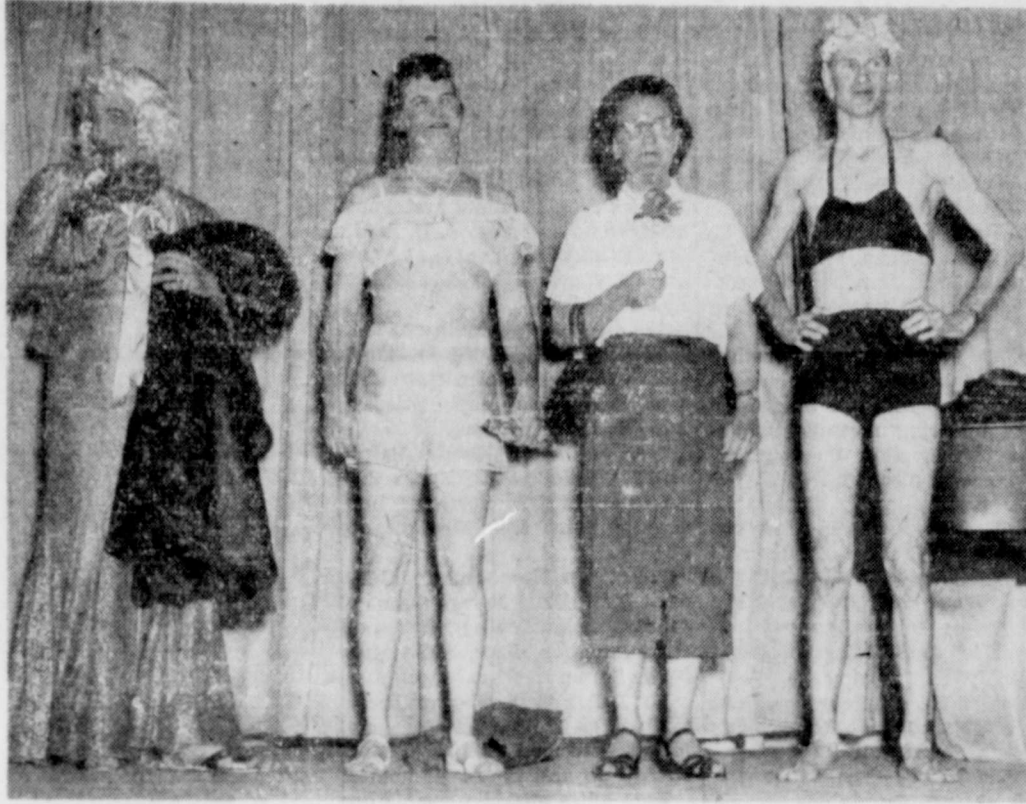
