School Financing Under Gilmer-Akin

Gilmer and A. M. Akin. The sole purpose was an outrowth of demands on the part of the people of the State of Texas for a better school system. In these three short years, our state has risen from about thirty-ninth among the forty eight states to where there are only about six or seven states that rank higher than our State of Texas, educationally.

Something was said in my article last week about factors that determine the amount of money that comes from the state to defray the expenses of the many districts within the state of Texas. ADA was explained as a very important factor and the response of our people has been very gratifying toward this explanation. I have been asked. "Just how is our school financed and what part is borne by the local tax payer?'

The detailed explanation on school financing would involve a lot of space but in brief, the school board sets up a budget of operating in August, for the entire school year. This is done after much planning and discussing of the situation. They first determine how many teachers the State permits them to hire on the Minimum-Foundation Program. This number of teachers have their salary paid for at a given schedule by the State. Local boards are not allowed to go below the Minimum salary schedule and draw any state money what-so-ever. Our daily attendance last year averaged 478.73 thus we were the annual Christmas party and allowed to employ 19 class room that he was happy to do that teachers, an agriculture teachto get the ball started rolling er, a homemaking teacher and a superintendent. These salaries are set by the State and paid by the State.

slightly more than \$8,325.00 for th's year. Thus our tax payers must pay at least this amount as a minumum. Anything in the way of repairs an up-keep on cur buildings, books purchased for the Library or class room work, physical equipment, janitorial work, equipment, fuel, telephone, insurance, etc., must be in addition to the two amounts above mentioned. Each of these items have advanced quite a bit in recent years and our local income had decreased bcause of lower valuations of property within the district. Thus, we are faced with a shortage of funds as any local business would be faced with on the same volume of business if their selling prices were not greater than their cost. In 1950-51 school year we had a district valuation of \$2,570,300.00. This rose in 1951-52 school term to \$2,826,984.00 but decreased this year to \$2,810,361.00. Thus we have less local income this year than we had last year

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TAXES COST MORE THAN FOOD

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Ask the average man what his chief family expense is, and he'll probably reply food.

But he'd be wrong. The Chamber of Commerce of the United States points out that the average family's tax bill is greater than its combined food and clothing budgets.

For fiscal 1952, the total tax bill is around eightysix billion, five hundred thousand dollars, of which sixty-two billion, one hundred thousand dollars consists of Federal taxes and the rest state and local levies. That amounts to five hundred million dollars more than the Department of Commerce says we spent for food and clothing in 1951. Prospects paint a darker picture for 1953 when the Federal tax may jump seven billion dollars.

So many of our taxes are collected as a hidden part of the cost of all the things we buy that most people don't realize the magnitude of the load. In 1939 all taxes averaged less than \$400 per family --today the figure is close to \$2,000.

The Federal debt now totals two nundred, sixty billion dollars, which means that the average Federal mortgage on each family is \$5,860, in addition to state and local debt mortgages. We will never be able to reduce our debt mortgages and tax liability until government cuts wasteful spending and keeps expenditures within the limits of its income. Amen!




