> In 1880 he moved to this section and settled near Brushy Gap and later lived near Pompey Creek. He operated a hotel and grocery business in Mullin for some time. He had purchased the hotel from a man whose surname was Mullin, believed to be the namesake of Mullin.

As a boy he knew the Harrel brothers at Georgetown. He broke horses for Bill Langley. Sam Bass and the Harrels. Uncle George is about the last

living pioneer in this section. Mr. Ethridge, always active in politics, related an event in his life at the time of the Sheriff's race of 1893. George Cunningham was opposed by Ben F. Geeslin of Center City Mr. Cunningham, a Democrat, was the first Sheriff of the County, organized in 1887. Mr. Geeslin, a rancher, was supported by the newly- organized Populist Party.

At this time, Webb Christian, brother-in-law of Mr. Cunningam, made a \$500 wager with Uncle George that Mr. Cunningham would win over Mr. Geeslin. Mr. Ethridge put up cash for his stake, while Mr. Christian wished to post a check on an Alvarado bank. Mr. Ethridge withdrew his bet rather than hold the check. Election returns showed Ben F.

Geeslin to be the new sheriff. When Uncle George came to this section of Texas, there were still a number of Indians here. People kept locks and chains on their corrals and cabins. The Redmen seemed niost interested in getting horses, leaving cattle pretty well alone. During these early times Williams Ranch was the main town in the County, having a hotel operated by Captain Hutch, several stores and saloons and a steam-powered flour mill owned by Eli Fairman

Uncle George was a cowboy, spending most of his life in the saddle driving, rounding up and oranding cattle. One thing he ie noted for is his appetite. His favorite foods are beef steak and biscuits. He credits his long life to his healthy appetite and states that he always ordered a half dozen eggs for a meal. Despite this fact, his mother never owned a cookstove and prepared three meals each day upon an open fireplace.

He related that buffalo hunts were quite popular and often the kill of a single hunt amounted to 75 or 100 buffalo. A favorite hunting spot was the area where Coleman is now located. Puffalo hides sold for \$1.00 each. It was a common sight to see 500 buffalo in one

After this long and colorful life, Uncle George's eyesight and hearing are impaired but his memory is almost unbe-

He lives with one of his sons, Fred Ethridge of Mullin, and has four other surviving children, Dan Ethridge of Morgan. Bob Ethridge of Palacios, Mrs. Ray Forsythe of California and Mrs. Ella Gist of Arizona.



HRISTMAS just couldn't help being the event of events in Norway when grandmother was a girl.
Without exaggeration, preparation
for Christmas actually began six
months before December 24. Everything which was used—food, clothing, household furnishings—was prepared in the home. Even the leath-

er for shoes was tanned from hides raised on the homestead.

The cloth for apparel, from the skin out, was woven on hand looms. Cobblers came to the house and made the shoes; dressmakers and tailors came. Everyone in the household had to have a new wardrobe for Christmas and, since tailors and cobblers and dressmakers could not be at all places at once, it was necessary to get an early start.

When the butchering was finished—in October or November—the suet was melted and the candles were made. The children always had a hand in making the little ones for use on the Christmas tree. And they usually made one which had three prongs which, placed at the very top of the tree, represented the three wise men.

Yule Tree Business Figured in Millions

CHRISTMAS TREES are a multimillion dollar business. Throughout the nation, some 15 million trees are supplied to the holiday demand. Prices range from \$1 to \$5, and that

adds up to real money.

A Christmas tree, in the lake states, is usually a balsam or a spruce. The same is true in New England and the Appalachian section. Elsewhere in the country, virtually all kinds of evergreens are used.

The lodgepole pine and Douglas fir are frequently used in Colorado. On the Pacific coast, it is principally Douglas fir.

In Maryland, Virginia and Washington, D.C., a scrub pine takes a trimming.

In other localities, white pine,

southern pine, hemlock, red and white cedar and redwood are used. The business of harvesting this annual crop begins in the fall, when cutters go into the woods after trees. It continues as truckers bring huge loads to metropolitan markets.

In most cases, Christmas tree harvests are actually a part of good forest management.

Many land owners manage their swamps to make them yield a crop of trees year after year. Thinning operations are another source of Yule trees



Your Poinsettia Will Bloom Next Christmas

THE POINSETTIA has long been a popular Christmas plant but probably few people have given much thought to the fact that it does come into bloom each year only at

The poinsettia is one of a group of plants known as short day plants because it will bloom only in the sea-son of the year with short day length periods, preferably 10 hours or less. That is why it is always in bloom during the Christmas season and not luring the summer. It could be prevented from blooming now by lengthening the daylight period to 5 hours by means of artifical lights.

Flower growers have learned how o bring garden chrysanthemums nto bloom any month of the year by using shading cloth to shorten the days and artificial lights to lengthen the days. The chrysanthemum is also a short day plant.

How can one keep a poinsettia plant until next season? After its usefulness is over, place it in the asement or some dry place where it will not freeze. Do not water it, or at least very little, and let the soil dry up. Next May bring the plant out, cut the stem back about two thirds, wash the old soil off the roots and re-pot in new soil. From then on handle it like any other pot July and rooted will give you good Christmas bloom.



Chemical Solution Protects Christmas Trees From Flames

To fireproof your Christmas tree which is still a hazard even wit lectric lights, select your tree tour six days before you intend to ecorate it. Then weigh the tree and buy one-fourth as many pounds of ammonium sulfate as the tree in most stores that sell seeds and fertilizers.

Much Christmas mail going over seas is handled in cooperation with the postal systems of other nations But in the United States and its possessions, in U.S.-trusteed islands in the Pacific and among U.S. servicemen in all parts of the world, delivery of holiday greetings is strict by a United States affair.

The army takes over, through its army post office, for troops serving outside the United States, be they in Germany, Korea, or somewhere on the way. The navy handles mail for its men on ships at sea and at naval stations anywhere on the globe.

Best known special Christmas business done by any post office is that of Santa Claus, Indiana.


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



Christmas Trees Can Be Put to Many Uses After New Year's

There are a number of things you can do with your Christmas

ing it.

If it is a fir, for instance, it can be anchored in the back yard—perhaps in a corner of the garden— and used as a bird feeder the re-mainder of the winter. Pieces of suet and little feed bags may be tied to the branches. A container of water should be placed beneath the tree and kept filled so the birds will have a drink every day.

Or, cut off the branches and place them, curved ends up, over flower beds when the ground is exposed. An evergreen mulch helps prevent the soil from heaving dur-



Long branches may be built into little lean-tos to protect tender shrubs from sun scald.

The needles of a Christmas tree can be sprinkled beneath acid-loving plants such as laurel, andro-meds, rhododendron and blueberries.

If the needles on the tree are

still firm, use the branches in an outdoor windowbox. Moisten the soil in the box. Then push the cut ends of the branches down to the bottom and tamp the soil firm around them. This will generally give you greenery all winter.

If you must burn your Christmas tree, don't toss it into a fireplace. Cut off the branches and burn them safely one by one.

And remember, a Christmas tree

tossed into the street can become pick it up and make a bonfire of it in a vacant lot.



Christmas and the days of Advent that go before it occur at the time of the winte solstice, when the days cease t grow shorter, and begin to length: furthest from zenith, begins to clim again. The period was one of fest val in many parts of the world, an was held sacred by many religions. Then occurred the Roman Satur nalia, with its wild excesses, and the people of the north, too, had a grea midwinter feast with days of hearty eating and deep drinking. It was only natural that some of the old pagan rites peculiar to the season should be held over and incorpo-rated into the rejoicings of Christ-

From the Saturnalia came ban quetings and dancings and riotings in masks and the giving of gifts. Our Christmas dinner and Christmas presents and Christmas cards and the wearing of Christmas masks in various parts of the world date back to the Saturnalia. The mid-winter feast of the northern peoples was called Yule, hence our Yuletide and Yule log. The burning of the Christmas log descends from northern tree worship. So does the Christmas tree. The ancient Druids gave Christmas its holly and mistletoe.

Santa Claus seems to date from later Christian times. He is good St. Nicholas, of course. The hanging of stockings comes from the legend that the saint, among his other charities, used to provide doweries for poor girls. The older form of the Christmas stocking custom was for pool girls to hang up stockings in the hope that benevolent St. Nicholas would place marriage portions in them.





The child who takes part in the Santa game doesn't have to wonder on Christmas morning why Santa didn't like him well enough to bring the expensive toys that were ordered from the North Pole, the psy-

chologist points out.

'Silent Night' Hymn Song From Heaven

"Silent Night" is often called the "Song from Heaven" because the story of its inspiration and composition is one of the roost beautiful Christmas stories in existence.

On December 24, 1818, in the Austrian village of Hallein, as Father Joseph Mohr sat reading his Bible, there was a knock at his door. It was a peasant woman who wanted the priest to visit a poor charcoal maker's wife to whom a child had been born. The parents had sent her to ask the priest to come and bless

Father Mohr was strangely moved by the visit to the mother. And that evening as he returned to his home saw that the dark slopes of the Alps around the village were aligh



with torches of the mountaineers on their way to church. To him it was a Christmas miracle.

Later, as he tried to put down on paper his feeling and experience the words kept turning into verse. When dawn came he found he had written a poem-a beautiful and moving poem.

On Christmas Day his friend, Franz Xaver Gruber, music teach er in the village school, composed music to fit the verses.

Village children heard the priest and teacher singing the song and learned it. From there it spread throughout the world. Today, it is regarded as the greatest Christmas hymn and wherever there are men of good will they sing:

"Silent night, holy night-All is calm, all is bright, Round you Virgin, Mother and Child;

Holy Infant, so tender and mild, Sleep in heavenly peace."





GEOGRAPHY comes down the chimney on Christmas Eve.

In the flood of toys soon to spill out into the nation's living rooms will be the touch of many different

will be the touch of many different lands. Beside a teddy bear, replica of Australia's marsupial furred koalas, perhaps will stand a carved wooden farm scene from German Bavaria, a South American gaucho doll, or a miniature pagoda made in Japan.

Similarly, the United States, now the world's leading toy maker, sends abroad its wild west costumes, its shiny playtime trucks and cars and earth-moving equipment, its smallscale railroads and sky scrapers to delight children all over the globe.

Toy industries in Germany and Japan are on the upswing again. Germany was among the first nations in the world to make tin horses on wheels, engines that ran, animals that walked, birds that sang. Now U.S. buyers go back to cities such as Nurnberg for the output of ingenious middle-aged inventors

New toys that startle the world often come from Europe. One such is a German duck which, when set on an incline, proudly walks down the slope. Another is a recent gadget from Denmark called a "tippe top," a wobbly sphere about the size of a small apple that suddenly flips upside down and continues spinning on its stem.

Winston Churchill was intrigued by the top when he first saw it. In Stockholm, the King of Sweden, a cabinet minister and an atom physicist, a Nobel Prize winner, got down on their hands and knees at a banquet to study the mysterious flipflop action.

As a mirror of mankind's culture, toys reflect the progress of civilization. Yet an amazing similarity can sometimes be seen between the toys of long-forgotten eras and the play-lines of today.

No one knows for sure who made the first doll, but it can be assumed the earliest figures were sacred gods and ancestor images. These doll-like forms were not toys for the delight of children, but solemn religious figures that preserved the tribe from harm.

Then, somehow, somewhere, a change took place. Dolls became a toy for girls and the most popular Christmas toy of them all.

Dolls have been discovered in

Dolls have been discovered in Egyptian tombs and ruins, some even had real hair; some were ivory, carved by craftsmen for a king's daughter; others were made of straw by an overworked mother in a peasant's hut.

In ancient Greece dolls were played with and cherished by little girls until they were ready to be married. Then (their dolls were taken to the shrine of a favorite goddess) and, often with tears, presented to her. The Roman children played with dolls, too, but after the fall of the Empire there came a long period in which there is no record of dolls.

Not until the thirteenth century when dolls were made in Nuremberg and dressed in the fashions of the times did little girls again play with dolls. They were here to stay.

By and by in Europe, the French
fashion dolls became all the rage,
not for children to play with but as
models from which fine ladies could
pattern their own modish costumes

In America, the Indian children had dolls of their own made of raw-hide and feathers and wood. Pioneer children had dolls much like these, and some were made of braided cornhusks, or nuts, or corncobs, or rags, and were dearly loved in spite of their plainness.

Much later, lifelike dolls were imported from Germany, where the doll industry had reached enormous proportions. These dolls had fine china heads with carefully painted faces and kid bodies that were jointed at the arms and legs. Later there came the Japanese-made dolls, which were inexpensive enough for almost any child to own. Then the American-made dolls began to appear—the special dolls, the kewpies, Buster Browns, teddy bears, Patsy dolls and Shirley Tem ples and phonograph dolls, with all the host of others that have followed and which are still to come. 



Bethlehem Rites Feature March To Nativity Cave

CHRISTMAS is observed in Bethlehem on December 25 by the Roman Catholics and Protestants, on January 6, by the Greek Orthodox and affiliated churches, and on January 18 by the Armenians. All Bethlehem, however, turns

All Bethlehem, however, turns out on December 24 for the arrival of the Patriarch of Jerusalem—Cardinal of the Holy Land—who each year brings an ancient effigy of the Infant Jesus to Bethlehem which he lays in the manger within the cave where Christ was born.

Dramatically the procession approaches: heralded by a single horseman, his banner streaming aloft. A corps of native police mounted upon fiery Arabian horses foliow and then another single horseman upon a prancing black steed carrying the cross on high; the Patriarch in his cardinal and ermine, mitred bishops, clergy in embroidered vestments and white robed acolytes — swinging golden censers—precede the jeweled pavilon of the Holy Child. Magnificent corteges of government officials, foreign embassies, bands, religious organizations follow, and finally, American made automobiles mingle with native two-wheeled carriages.

with native two-wheeled carriages.

The procession enters the Church
of the Nativity. The public is not
permitted to witness the actual
placing of the effigy, as that part of
the Church—built above the Cave of

the Nativity—is under the jurisdiction of the Greek Orthodox church.


The grotto-like Cave of the Nativity in no way conforms to the modern conception of a "stable;" in biblical times, however, shelters for man and beast were hewn into rocky ledges—thus, the Stable of Bethlehem.

On Christmas Eve, members of all denominations assemble to sing carols above the birthplace of the Holy Child before midnight mass is solemnized in the Church of the Nativity.

Ewald began running contour lines in 1950. All of the farm areas needing contour farming are now converted. He has also established a game refuge. Other good practices included strip cropping, terracing and the addition of needed fertilizers.

History of Christmas Seals

do you ever wonder how it started? It was born in Denmark, home of the fairy tales of Hans Christian Anderson.

Einar Holboell, a Copenhagen pestal clerk, was sorting mail one snewy afternoon before Christmas, 1903, when he thought of the idea of a penny stamp to swell a fund for children's hospitals.

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Authorized by King Christian, the first Christmas seals were sold in Copenhagen in 1904.

Copenhagen in 1904.
Holboell's scheme outgrew his wildest imaginings, for before his death in 1927, he lived to see it spread to 45 countries, including

Korea, India and French-Indochina
The seals found their way to
America on letters and packages
and first attracted the attention of
Jacob Riis who wrote an article
about them. Few people, however

were interested in the idea. Then, in the autumn of 1907, Emily Bissell, a public health worker, concerned about the fate of a small sanatorium, recalled the article and sat down to sketch America's first Christmas seal, a wreath of holly encircling the words "Merry Christmas."

With 50,000 stamps printed and no where to sell them, Miss Bissell at last enlisted the aid of a columnist on a Philadelphia newspaper. The idea caught and within a few weeks

The first nation-wide sale was held the following year and was backed by newspapers all over the country, religious and civic groups, and sponsored by the American Red Cross and the National Tuberculosis association.

'Hansel and Gretel' Join the Procession

The original score of "Hansel and Gretel" was composed by Englebert Humperdinck as a Christmas piece The musical fairy tale created

a sensation.

Since Humperdinck was one of Wagner's most intimate assistants, his formenos have been dubbed "Larsarv rhymes—Wagnerian style" and since fairy tales and nursery rhymes are appropriate at Christmas, "Hansel and Gretel" has joined the procession of traditional Christmas music.




the visit of the shepherds...
