Goldthwaite Takes Another Grand Championship At Houston Show

Goldthwaite and Mills County chalked up another mark to the long list of honors in exhibiting grand champion and reserve champion calves in Texas Livestock Shows during the past six years when "Prince Bob," 1205 pound Hereford, exhibited by Johnny Wigley, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fisher Wigley, was judged Grand Champion of the Houston Show last week Thursday. Before receiving the top title of the entire show, "Prince Bob" was given first place in the Heavy Weight Junior show, champion Hereford of the Junior show and champion steer of the Junior show.

Johnny Wigley, proud exhibitor of the grand champion, walked away with what is declared as the world's record price ever to be paid for a prize winning steer by an individual when he received \$18,800.00.

This latest achievement for Mills County youths added to the list of honors since 1947, when Jim Bob Steen showed the grand champion at the Houston show, brings the total to four grand champions and three reserve champions during the six year period, at the Houston Show alone.

Goldthwaite Takes Another Grand Championship At Houston Show

According to announcement by Bob Steen, president of the Mills County Livestock Raisers' Association and George Reese, County Agent, approximately \$76,500.00 has been brought into Mills County for grand champion and reserve champion steers from the Houston show since 1947, or nearly \$100,000.00 from all shows for the top winners. It is estimated that in the neighborhood of a quarter million dollars has been brought to this county for all show calves during that period.

OTHER WINNERS

John Dean Stark exhibited the Reserve Champion Angus of the Junior show which was also declared first place winner in the light weight Angus division.

Other winners in the heavy weight junior show from Mills County were Wayne Poe, second place and Robert D. Jordon, twelfth place.

Other honors going to Mills County members at the Houston show were as follows: John Howard Owens, third place, Heavy Weight Angus and third place, medium weight Angus Robert D. Jordon, seventh place,

light weight Hereford junior show; Billy Mac Newton, seventh place, light weight Angus. Billy Mac Newton was also awarded a \$50.00 pair of hand made boots for the best dressed scramble calf while George Reese received second best county agent's scramble steer award.

In the open class Bobby Zane Egger exhibited the first place winner in the heavy weight Hereford steer division, champion Hereford steer and champion steer of the open show. Fifth place light weight Hereford and reserve champion Hereford steer of the open show.

Mills County also took third place in the car load lot.

Lions Club Committee Presents Facts About Swimming Pool Project

(Editor's Note: The following article has been prepared by the Lions Club Swimming Pool Committee and is being presented here as a public service so that interested citizens may become better informed on the proposition.)

A few years ago a group of interested citizens of Goldthwaite, realizing that most towns in this section of the state had, or were acquiring, a swimming pool, began to make investigation into the possibility of such a pool for Goldthwaite. This project aroused the interest of the local Lions Club and a committee was appointed to secure definite facts and figures to form the basis for a decision to proceed with such project or eliminate it.

The first investigation made by the committee reflected that the probable cost of a swimming pool of approximately 40 feet by 75 feet in size would be

in the neighborhood of \$40,000.00 and would require considerably more water than the town of Goldthwaite could afford. However, more detailed investigation by this committee, including trips to numerous pools, contact with the State Health Department and with the Texas Beach and Pool Association of Texas disclosed that a pool of sufficient size to accommodate the population of Goldthwaite and Mills County could be constructed for approximately \$15,000.00.

It was also learned that with recent developments in filter plants and systems where the water was recirculated and treated the amount of water needed could be held to a fraction of the former amount required. A pool the size of 40 feet by 75 feet with a graduated depth of from about 2 feet to ten feet will require 120,000 gallons of water to initially fill it. The additional water required during the season to keep the pool filled would not exceed 1,200 gallons per day, which is about the same as is now being used by some of our single water customers. The pool would be initially filled during the beginning of the season, perhaps the early part of May, at which time the supply of city water would far exceed the demand. The only additional water required throughout the season would be that amount of water as would be required by the addition of one good size water customer. In other words, water will not present any particular difficulty in so far as this swimming pool project is concerned.

The next question that this committee had to consider was the method of financing this project. After giving careful consideration to all possible phases of financing, it was determined that the best and fairest plan would be one that would not be a tax burden to the people of Goldthwaite but one that would be financed from the net operating profits of the pool. Hence the committee determined that the issuing of revenue bonds by the City of Goldthwaite would answer the problem of financing. Revenue bonds being obligations issued by the City of Goldthwaite against the revenue of the pool and in no wise ever to be a charge upon the tax revenue of the City.

This committee further determined that the ownership of the pool by the City of Goldthwaite would be advisable because the citizens of the City in electing their aldermen would in effect retain the control and management of the pool at all times for the benefit of the whole community. In addition the City is already an existing corporation upon which is now conferred by law the authority to issue revenue bonds, and operate such projects, and its liability in certain respects is limited.

This committee has attempted to bring to the attention of the general public of this community through these columns a conclusive and factual statement in regard to this swimming pool project. We feel confident that questions will arise in the minds of many that are not definitely answered in this report. We therefore invite you who have such questions to write them on a slip of paper and drop them in a box that will be provided for such at the Goldthwaite Eagle Office. These questions will then be answered by the committee in the next issue of the Goldthwaite Eagle. It will not be necessary that your question or questions be signed.

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MILLS COUNTY DOES IT AGAIN

When word came last week that Johnny Wigley won the grand champion award with his steer, "Prince Bob" at the Houston Livestock Show it marked another credit to the long list of Mills County accomplishments in the field of producing winning show calves.

With this award Mills County has won four Grand Championships and three Reserve Championships in the Houston Show since 1947 — that is according to information furnished us by those who have been working with the project during the years.

A record that all folks of the county can well be proud of from the standpoint of the honor coming to this area, what it has done for the boys and girls in the county in fostering the program of 4-H and FFA work, and last but not least also what it means from the financial side, in bringing show money into the county.

Then there is also the honor of Johnny's calf selling for \$18,800.00, a price that is pegged as the world's record price ever to be paid for a grand champion show calf.

At times it seems too bad that more can't be the first place winner, yet that is the life of the show business. There can be only one grand champion. But when you check the records there are many other creditable awards that were won so far this year at the Chicago, Fort Worth and Houston shows and we feel certain that there will be more brought back to Mills County from the San Antonio and San Angelo Shows before the spring show tours are over.

BUILDING A SWIMMING POOL

As most of our readers have read in last week's Eagle, definite steps are being taken to build a swimming pool and park for Mills County.

The Lions Club has had a committee working on the project for over a year and now the city council has called a special election for the approval of \$15,000.00 in Revenue Bonds to finance the project.

Right at this point we would like to point out that folks should not confuse a Revenue Bond with a General Obligation Bond. A Revenue Bond is a bond where interest and principle for retirement of same comes solely from revenues of the project or asset that is secured or constructed from the proceeds of the bond issue. A General Obligation, or Tax Bond, is a bond that is paid for through taxation.

The Swimming Pool-Park project is to be secured and constructed through a Revenue Bond Issue — therefore will not be a tax liability for property owners or taxpayers of the community.

"We enjoy reading the paper so much that we never have time to notice the expiration date," said Mrs. W. J. Strickland, as she walked into the office the other day to renew their subscription. Then came along Tom Booker with this statement: "Guess I'd better renew my paper for another year; it isn't much good, but, I can't get along without it as I have been reading it for the past thirty-five years." I told Tom with a testimony like that he can count on me to take him along to the Revival Meeting next Summer. Then there comes the note from H. H. Faulkner, down McAllen way, saying: "Enclosed check for renewal of paper for another year. I have been taking the Eagle close to fifty years."

you a 1,000 yen note. It is worth about a dime in American money . . . I hope it (this letter) has been interesting."

Johnson who have been working along the side of these boys and girls, who are in a great measure responsible for bringing such high honors to Mills County. Bob and George were in Houston while Y. When word came to the Eagle office from Marie Moore of the Houston Chronicle about Johnny winning and what he received for Prince Bob things really started buzzing in Goldthwaite. It was something wonderful and in some respects even better than many had hoped for—although we in Mills County have come to hope big.

In commenting on the situation by a number of local citizens the fact was mentioned that Cecil Williams should have a ribbon also—cause he hauled the Champion to the show. We'll have to see about that.

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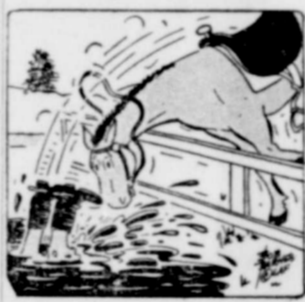

Red Cross Blood Program To Aid In Supplying Rare Gamma Globulin For Prevention Of Polio-Paralysis

At request of the Office of Defense Mobilization, the American Red Cross has undertaken the task of making available all the blood-derived gamma globulin possible for use in prevention of paralysis in polio victims.

Although the nation's fractionation laboratories will be working at full capacity, there will not be enough gamma globulin for all children in anticipated epidemic areas next summer. This means the limited supply will be allocated and distributed by an agency designated by the Office of Defense Mobilization.

WHAT IS GAMMA GLOBULIN?
Gamma globulin also referred to as immune serum globulin is that part of human blood that contains antibodies built up in the bloodstream as a result of the body's fighting disease. These antibodies remain in the bloodstream and can be separated from the whole blood and concentrated for injection into patients suffering any of a variety of diseases.

This vital substance, used in the polio experiments conducted by the National Foundation For Infantile Paralysis, was for the past two years furnished free of charge by the American Red Cross. The experiments which were held in Provo, Utah; Houston, Texas; and Souix City, Iowa, as a part of the National Foundation's total research program, have demonstrated the effectiveness of the gamma globulin treatment in preventing the paralysis that often accompanies polio.

The test involved some 55,000 children above the age of one year. Paralysis in children receiving the gamma globulin was markedly reduced, but not completely eliminated.

The National Foundation esti-

mates that at least 150 Counties in the nation may be expected to suffer a polio epidemic each year. It is not possible to estimate the total number of children who will be exposed to polio throughout the country, but past experience indicates that at least two million youngsters may be exposed in epidemic areas alone in 1953.

It takes slightly more than one pint of whole blood to make one dose of gamma globulin. Collecting and processing the two million pints of blood needed for this preventative will cost the Red Cross more than \$7,000,000.00 in 1953.

A safe new vaccine against polio was announced by Dr. Harry M. Weaver, Director of Research for the National Foundation For Infantile Paralysis, at a meeting of the Foundation's Trustees on January 26th of this year. The announcement of the discovery does not preclude the use of gamma globulin as a temporary preventative of paralysis. Additional field tests will be necessary to prove the effectiveness of the vaccine. These tests will be conducted by the Foundation this year.

A National Blood Program, under the Office of Defense Mobilization, will be responsible for the mobilization of the nation's blood resources to keep blood readily available to meet the needs of the Country—both military and civilian. To meet the total needs for 1953, the Red Cross must collect five million pints of blood.

The next Bloodmobile visit to Goldthwaite will be April 3, 1953, and Mills County has been given a quota of 154 pints of blood. While the National Blood Program has been established under the direction of the Office of Defense Mobilization, with three major participating agencies—the American Red Cross, the Department of Defense and the Federal Civil Defense Administration—it is not the job of any agency or combination of agencies. It is the job of the American people.

The National Blood Program is a total blood program, designed to benefit the entire population; therefore EVERYBODY must take part to make it a success.

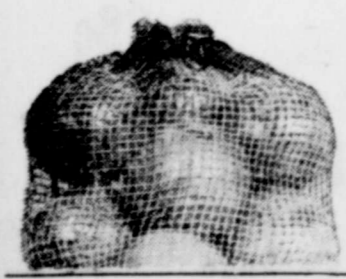

PARK AND SWIMMING POOL
REVENUE BONDS.**

AN ORDER CALLING AN ELECTION FOR THE PURPOSE OF SUBMITTING TO THE PROPERLY QUALIFIED VOTERS OF THE CITY OF GOLDTHWAITE, TEXAS, THE PROPOSITION OF THE ISSUANCE OF NOT TO EXCEED \$15,000.00 PARK AND SWIMMING POOL REVENUE BONDS OF SAID CITY AND ENCUMBERING THE CITY'S PARK AND SWIMMING POOL AND THE REVENUES THEREOF FOR THE PAYMENT OF PRINCIPAL AND INTEREST ON SAID BONDS; PROVIDING FOR THE GIVING OF NOTICE OF SUCH ELECTION, AND PRESCRIBING CERTAIN DETAILS IN CONNECTION THEREWITH.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Goldthwaite, can secure an adequate Park and Swimming Pool for the said City without the imposition of any tax burden on its citizens or their property, by the issuance of Revenue Bonds payable

solely from the net revenues of said Park and Swimming Pool, and

WHEREAS, all of the said Revenue Bonds when issued will contain substantially the following provisions: "THE HOLDER HEREOF SHALL NEVER HAVE THE RIGHT TO DEMAND PAYMENT OF THIS OBLIGATION OUT OF ANY FUNDS RAISED OR TO BE RAISED BY TAXATION."

WHEREAS, according to the provisions of law said revenue bonds shall never be a debt of the City of Goldthwaite, but solely a charge upon the properties of the said Park and Swimming Pool so encumbered, and

WHEREAS, said project when financed by the issuance of said Revenue Bonds are declared by law to be self-liquidating in character and self-supporting by charges other than taxation, and

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined and does hereby determine that it is to the best interest of the City and its Citizens that an election be held in said City on the date and for the purpose hereinafter mentioned.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GOLDTHWAITE, TEXAS:

I. That a special election be held in the City of Goldthwaite, Texas, on the 7th day of March A. D. 1953, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

SHALL THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GOLDTHWAITE, TEXAS BE AUTHORIZED TO ISSUE REVENUE BONDS IN THE MAXIMUM AMOUNT OF \$15,000.00, BEARING INTEREST AT A RATE NOT TO EXCEED 5% PER CENT PER ANNUM, MATURING SERIALLY WITHIN 20 YEARS FROM THEIR DATE IN INSTALLMENTS TO BE DETERMINED BY THE SAID CITY COUNCIL TO PROVIDE FUNDS TO BUILD AND PURCHASE A PARK AND SWIMMING POOL FOR SAID CITY; TO BE ISSUED IN ACCORDANCE WITH AND SECURED IN THE MANNER PROVIDED IN ARTICLES 1111 TO 1118, BOTH INCLUSIVE, OF THE REVISED CIVIL STATUTES OF TEXAS OF 1925, AS AMENDED; SAID BONDS TO BE SECURED BY A PLEDGE OF THE NET REVENUES FROM SAID PARK AND SWIMMING POOL AFTER DEDUCTION OF REASONABLE OPERATING AND MAINTENANCE EXPENSES; EACH BOND

TO BE CONDITIONED THAT THE HOLDER THEREOF SHALL NEVER HAVE THE RIGHT TO DEMAND PAYMENT OF SAID OBLIGATION OUT OF ANY FUNDS RAISED OR TO BE RAISED BY TAXATION.

II. That said election shall be held in the regularly established election precinct of said City (all of said City being included in one election precinct), at the District Court Room in the Court House in said City. The following named persons are hereby appointed the managers of said election: Miss Lucile Conro, Presiding Judge

Mrs. John L. Patterson, Judge
Mrs. Eula Nickols, Judge
Miss Pauline Booker, Clerk.

III. That said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas governing the issuance of municipal bonds, and only qualified electors of the City of Goldthwaite, who own taxable property in said City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be qualified to vote.

IV. The ballots of said election shall have written or printed hereon the following:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF PARK AND SWIMMING POOL REVENUE BONDS."

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF PARK AND SWIMMING POOL REVENUE BONDS."

Each voter shall mark out with ink or pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other indicating his vote.

V. That notice of said election shall be given by posting and publication of a copy of this order, at the top of which shall appear the words, "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR PARK AND SWIMMING POOL REVENUE BONDS."

Said Notice shall be posted in three public places in said City of Goldthwaite, one of which shall be at the City Hall of said City, not less than

twenty (20) days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and to be published on the same day each of three successive weeks in the Goldthwaite Eagle, a newspaper of general circulation published in the City of Goldthwaite, Texas, the first of said publications to be made not less than twenty days prior to the day set for said election.

We, the undersigned, do hereby certify that the above and foregoing is a true and correct copy of a Resolution and Order which was duly passed and ap-

proved by the City Council of the City of Goldthwaite, Texas, sitting in regular session, on the 2nd day of February A. D. 1953.

Mills County Red Cross Chapter Has Information On European Flood Relief

The Mills County Chapter of The American Red Cross has received the following information from National Headquarters in Washington, D. C., on relief procedures for victims of the European flood.

Robert C. Lewis, Director of ARC Operations for the European Theatre at Fsslingen, Germany, is extending all needed assistance to American Service men and their families in flooded countries.

The American Red Cross has made a contribution of \$100,000 for procurement of emergency supplies for flood refugees in the Netherlands. The American Junior Red Cross is prepared to ship 60,000 gift boxes and 50

school chests containing first aid and school supplies valued at \$200,000 to the Netherlands. Dutch authorities have announced that an ample supply of clothing is on hand for the emergency period.

National Red Cross headquarters has queried the League of Red Cross Societies in Geneva, Switzerland as to the need of victims, pointing out that the ARC is prepared to give assistance upon request. National headquarters also inquired specifically whether disaster relief personnel are needed and what supplies are needed.

Air Force headquarters in Washington is releasing notification of casualties as they are received. For other flood information, see Red Cross Chapter.

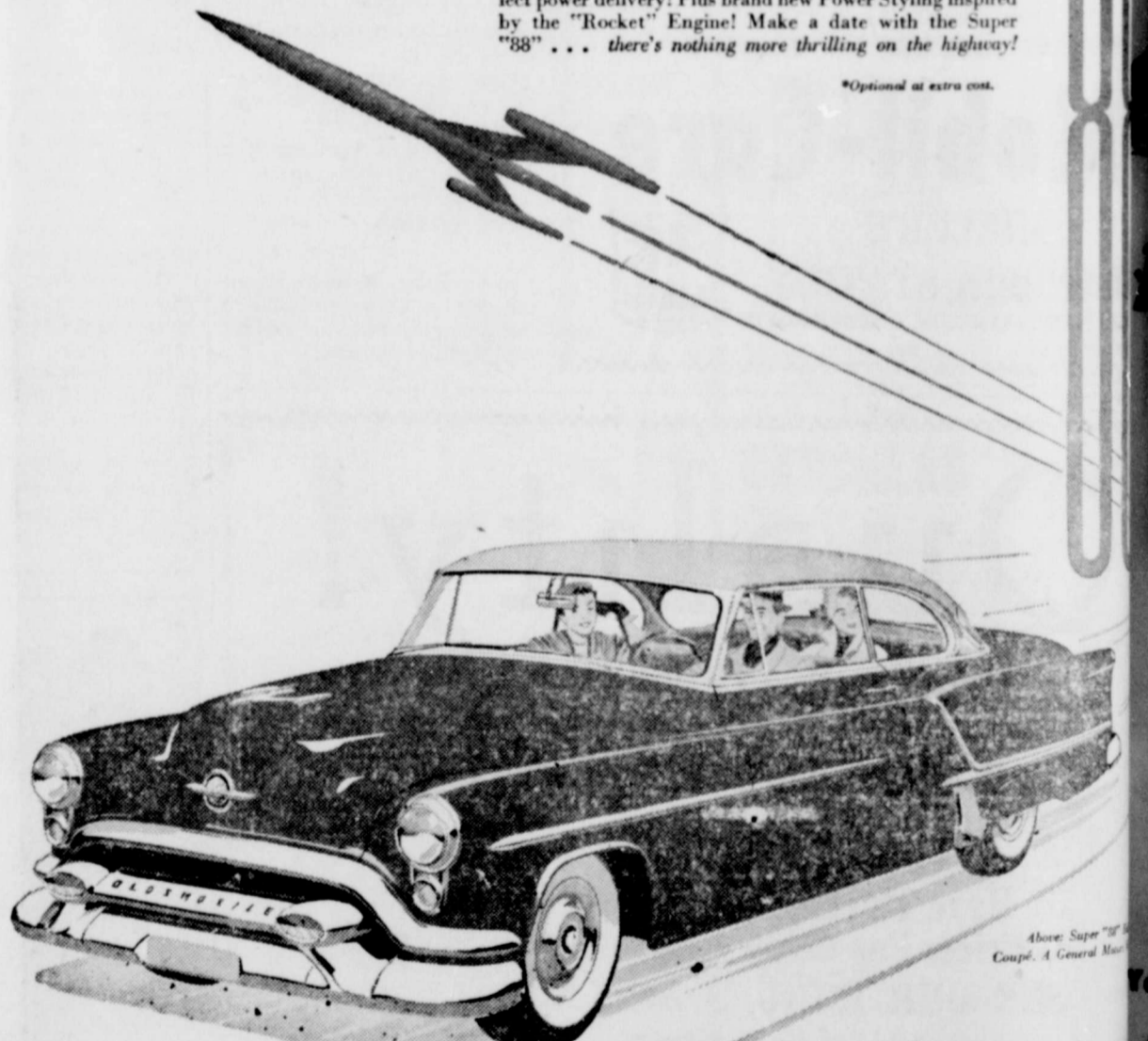

Census Records Used As Substitute For Birth Certificates

Persons lacking birth certificates or other legal evidence of citizenship, age or family relationship can obtain transcripts of their personal census records which are, in most instances, acceptable substitutes, according to District Supervisor James M. Hamilton of the U. S. Census Bureau.

More than 100,000 Americans turned to the Census Bureau for such evidence in 1952. They needed proof of identity or age for Government and defense jobs, Social Security, passports, the Armed Services, and in connection with insurance and estate cases.

Supervisor Hamilton pointed out that personal information recorded by the Census Bureau is entirely confidential and may be furnished only upon the written request of the individual to whom it relates or his legal representatives. The normal fee is \$3.00 for searches of two censuses for one individual, each application being handled in regular turn which generally requires approximately 30 days to complete service. Expedited handling is furnished for a \$4.00 fee.

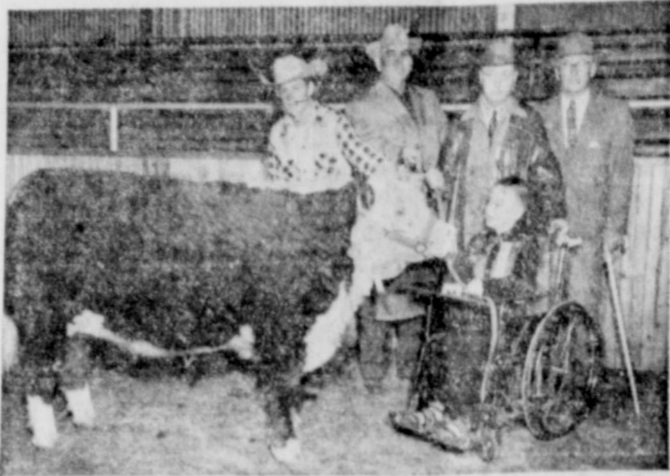
Brother Dickson is Vice President and assistant Bible teacher of the Men's Downtown Bible Class that meets each Sunday morning at the Melba Theatre.

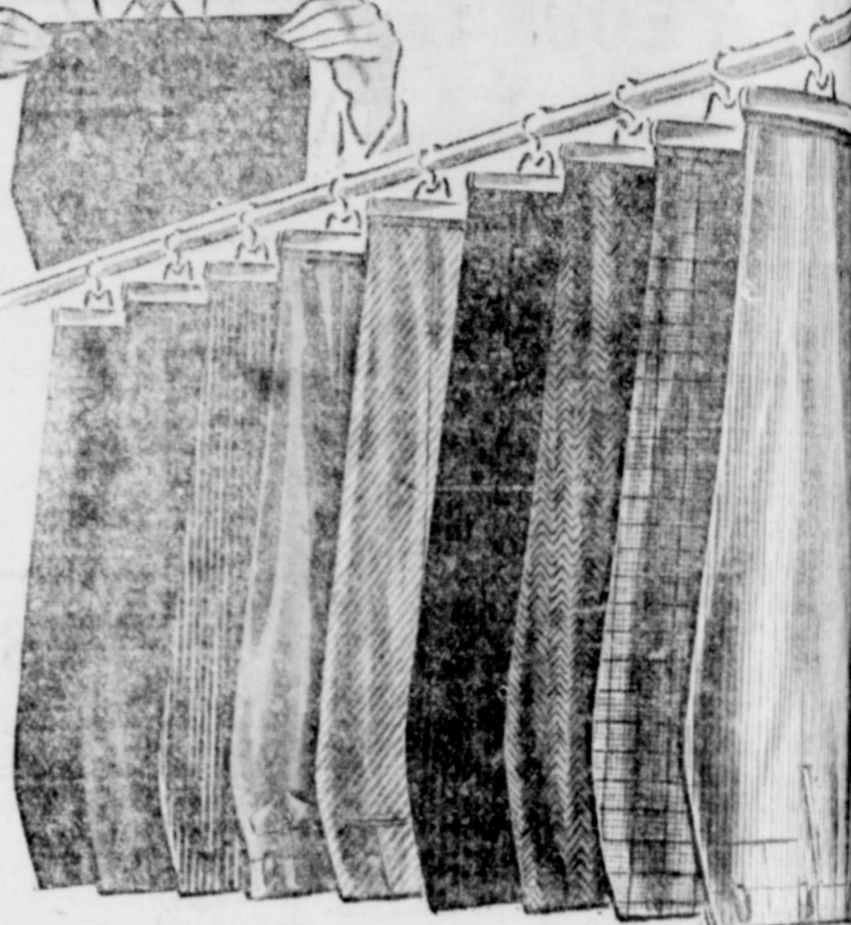
