Counting Time Is Under Way Again

In the past, all school districts in Texas will take the census in March. It is estimated that every child born after September 1, 1947, be enumerated in the school district of his residence according to announcement of John L. Patterson, superintendent.

Each district will take the census to be taken in March. The Superintendent of Schools of each district is glad to enroll any child who has been overlooked.

Children who will be six years of age on or before September 1, 1953 are urged to be sure that their names are enrolled in the scholastic census 1953-1954.

A special election to approve \$15,000.00 in Revenue bonds, for a Swimming Pool-Park for Goldthwaite and Mills County, will be held Saturday of this week. The election will be held in the District Court room of Mills County courthouse from 8:00 a. m. until 7:00 p. m.

This election was called by the city after a large number of citizens had presented a petition asking that the matter be brought before the voters for a decision. In calling the election city officials decided on the revenue bond issue for financing the project since it does not constitute a tax liability on local taxpaying citizens or the city. Stolen Sheep Recovered Here Last Friday

Acting on a tip from some local citizen officers were successful in recovering a truck load of sheep which were reportedly stolen in the Gatesville area, according to an announcement by Sheriff C. F. Stubblefield. They were located at the Mills County Commission Sales Ring during the Friday sale.

The two men involved were turned over to the Sheriff of Coryell County.

In addition to the truck load of sheep one cow has also been recovered in Brown County, which was reportedly taken from the same area in Coryell County as the sheep, the Sheriff stated. He also said that sheep which have been taken from that area were being brought to the local sales ring and to the Fort Worth market.

In making the announcement the Sheriff expressed his appreciation to local citizens for reporting on suspicious activities, which is a big help to officers. He also said that reports have been coming in about sheep being missed in Mills County. Officers are working on the cases.

project will be constructed by funds secured from the sale of these bonds and the entire indebtedness, interest and principle, will be retired from the revenue proceeds of the project.

The project was spearheaded for the past year by the local Lions Club and the committee in charge has done much during recent weeks to answer questions local citizens had in mind about the undertaking. It has been pointed out that it will not effect our water supply and will not cause a shortage. Revenue bonds will not be a burden on taxpayers. The pool will be build under State Department of Public Health Supervision and specifications. The Pool will be operated by persons delegated by the city council whose members are duly elected representatives of the voters of the community.

In order to be eligible to vote in the election Saturday one must be a citizen 21 years of age, living within the state one year and within the city for six months. Must have a 1952 Poll Tax and must have rendered taxable property with the city for the year 1952 and, or, 1953.

"Stub" Stubblefield, was quite proud when he read a story in the papers a few days ago where a young fellow, who is working on his first love of becoming a police reporter, was instrumental in Houston police "Getting Their Man." The young man, 19 years old, is Barry Braden of Houston, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Braden of that city. He is a nephew of "Stub"—Mrs. Braden, he informs us, is his baby sister. The story related how Barry used a policeman's automatic in fatally wounding a man police said was involved in a grocery store robbery. Barry Braden was with Police Accident Investigator Don Moffett when they gave chase. Moffett said he had met Braden at a fire and that Braden had asked for a ride to police headquarters. Moffett said he and Braden heard a police radio broadcast on the grocery store robbery and headed for North Houston to investigate. It was Braden who spotted the automobile described in the police broadcast. Moffett said that

during the \$6-million chase he asked Braden if he could use a gun. "Yes," Braden replied. "Let me see it." "I gave Barry my .38 Smith & Wesson," Moffett said. "I told him he might have to use it. Agriculture Census Shows Increase In Pecan Trees For Mills County

Figures from the 1950 Census of Agriculture show that the number of pecan trees of all ages in Mills County increased from 37,223 in 1945 to 96,211 in 1950, according to James Hamilton, District Supervisor at Fort Worth, Texas.

In 1950, Mills County ranked 10th in the nation in number of pecan trees of all ages, and

98th in the number of pounds of pecans harvested the previous year (1949). Tabulations show that there were 174,637 pounds of pecans harvested that year.

Supervisor Hamilton also said that out of 100 counties leading the nation in number of pecan trees of all ages, 44 were located in Texas.

Comanche County ranked first in the state in number of pecan trees of all ages, and San Saba County ranked first in the state in pounds of pecans harvested.

We were glad to have Mrs. Taylor Duncan and Annette back at Church Sunday.

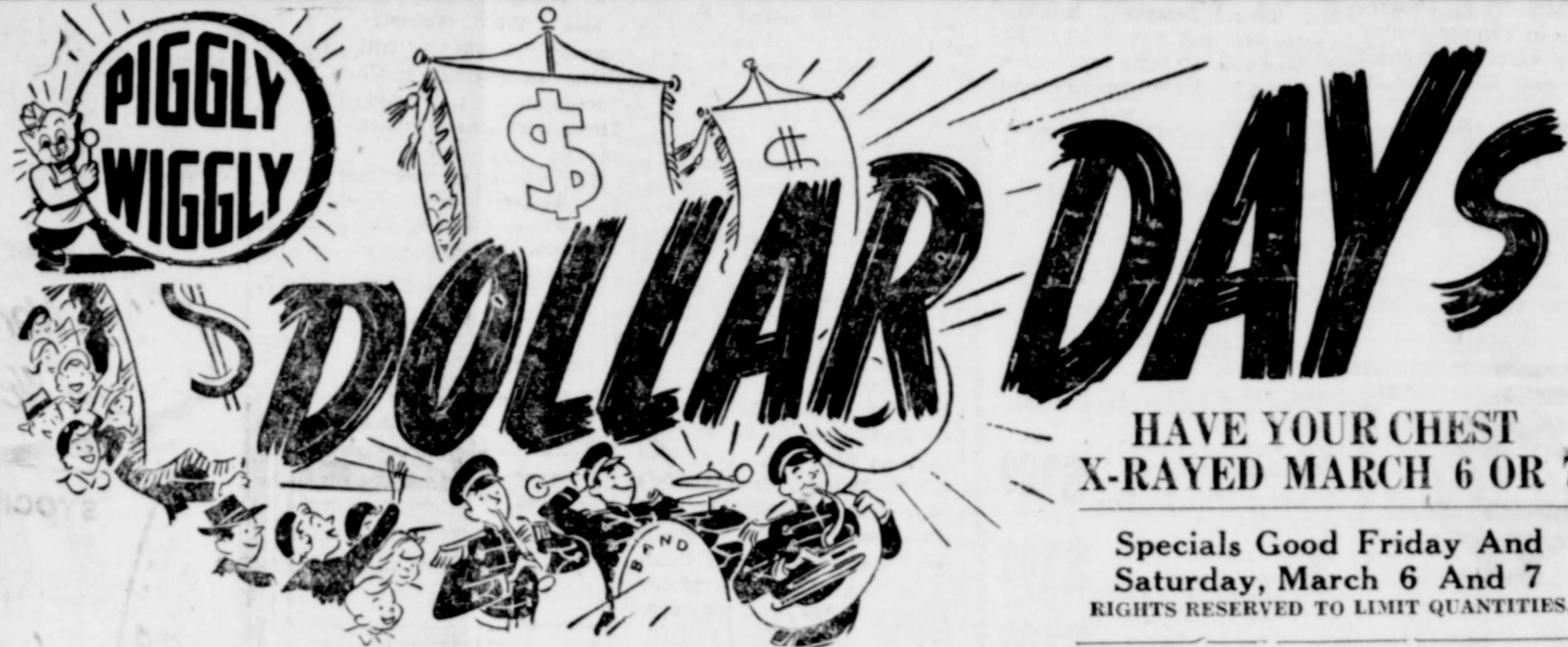

Next they entered the Goldthwaite Electric Company about

dark, where they broke a glass out of the back door and rifled the safe, which had been left open, taking only cash amounting in the neighborhood of \$30.00.

At the Drug Store approximately \$35.00 in cash and a number of other small items were taken. Most of the cash was recovered.

Foster is being held in the county jail and will be held over for the grand jury, according to Sheriff "Stub" Stubblefield.

As the Eagle was getting ready to go to press Wednesday afternoon, Sheriff Stubblefield reported that Henderson was picked up Tuesday night at Ardmore, Oklahoma and that

he is being held at Oklahoma where he is with cat theft. It is expected that he will be brought here to face charges.
