Other matters to come before the board in addition to routine business was election of teachers for the new year.

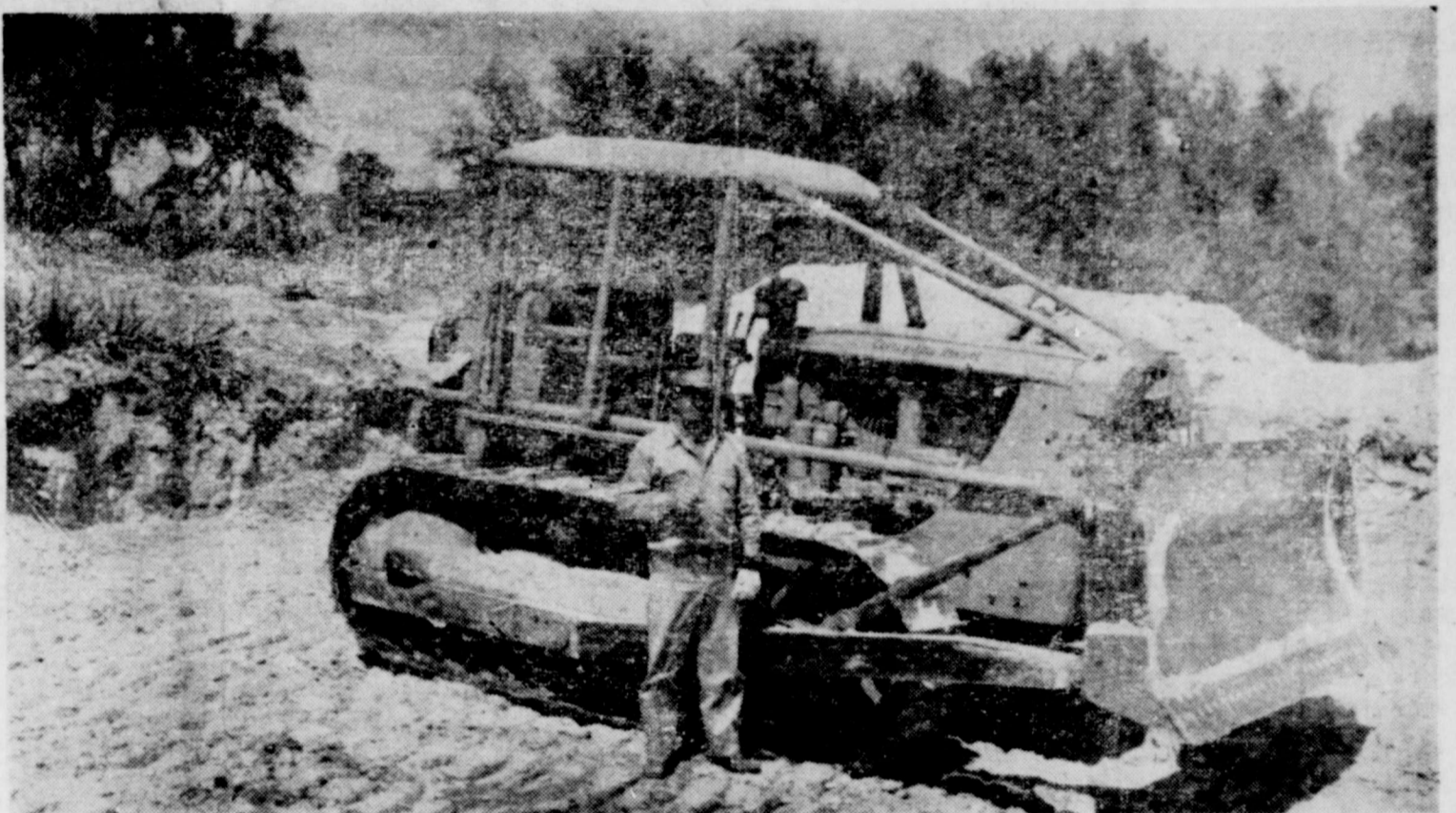
Wilson Opens Realty Business

MARCH OF EVENTS

State Legislators Gunning For Kefauver and Morse | Hostile Action Has Begun In Tennessee and Oregon

WASHINGTON—Two Senate members, Estes Kefauver (D), Tennessee, and Wayne Morse (I), Oregon, are having the slides greased for them by hostile action in the legislatures of their states.

In Tennessee, the forces of Boss Ed Crump of Memphis are taking an effective pot shot against "Chattanooga Estes" by means of a bill providing for a run-off election between the two highest candidates in a primary election, so that one of them gets an absolute majority.

In 1948, Senator Kefauver won a three-way race with 42 per cent of the vote. Object of the proposed law would be to enable Crump forces to "gang up" on Estes, Kefauver supporters say. He must seek re-election next year.

Out in Oregon, a bill introduced in the state legislature would prevent Senator Morse from running as an Independent (which he now calls himself following a split with the GOP after he supported Democratic Presidential Candidate Adlai Stevenson).

The bill would force Morse to run as a Republican, where, GOP leaders believe, they could eliminate him. If he is permitted to run as an Independent, Morse is expected to be a formidable candidate. He does not come up for re-election until 1956, however.

● **IKE: PERSONAL**—Never underestimate the power of a woman—especially when her name is Mamie Eisenhower. For instance, take the matter of President Eisenhower's personal airplane.

Mr. Eisenhower had the plane a whole month before he chose a name for it. One possibility was *The Crusader*, after the chief executive's "Crusade in Europe" during World War II and his "political crusade" of last November.

However, the plane was finally named *The Columbine*, the state flower of Colorado, the First Lady's home state.

While we're on the subject—don't underestimate the power of Dixie, either.

Mr. Eisenhower may have chosen Augusta, Ga., as his vacation retreat because of its unexcelled golfing facilities. However, there's more than a slight chance that the President may also be intrigued by the local atmosphere.

The driveway approaching the Augusta National golf course clubhouse is a long sweep bordered by double rows of giant magnolias. The club home itself dates from the pre-Civil war period. It is abundantly policed on all sides in the best southern tradition.

The clubhouse was once the manor home of the fabulous Berckmans family and original owners of the property were celebrated horticulturists.

If Mr. Eisenhower develops a thick southern accent, it may be due to the fact that he absorbed a bit of the local culture along with his golf.

● **PRESIDENTIAL GAG RULE?**—An unwritten "gag rule" on White House conferences and semi-official events is getting more criticism from politicians than the press.

It has been learned that some administration leaders, including Vice President Richard Nixon, have urged President Eisenhower to loosen the secrecy lid on all White House conferences. Nixon is reported to be urging Mr. Eisenhower to give the public a better view of goings on in the White House that do not involve national security.

Some congressional callers at the White House are resentful of the request that they keep a strict silence on subjects they normally would discuss openly on Capitol Hill.

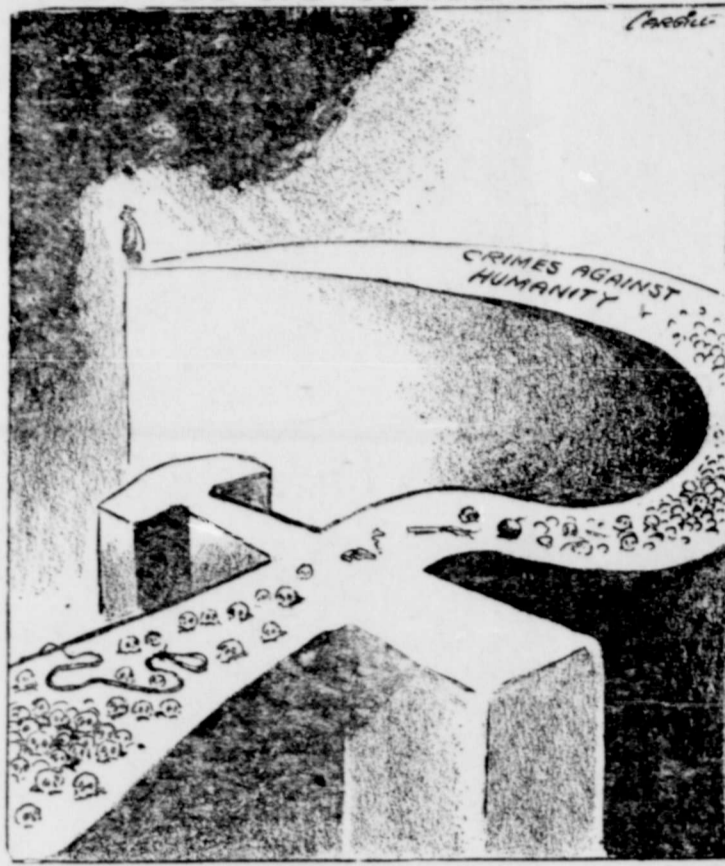
An example of what some spokesmen called "needless" secrecy was a presidential conference that pertained only to foreign trade in general and briar pipe tariffs in particular.

The White House refused to give any information on the conference but the topics of discussion were readily given out on Capitol Hill because the congressional participants saw no reason for the "lid" on the talks.

In answer to a proposal to permit the sale of package liquor on Air Force bases, Albert F. Tucker, Executive Secretary of the United Texas Drys, commented as follows: "Our organization and sponsoring churches and the leaders, civic, community and industrial in the life of Texas, oppose this move to open the sale of a drug that would have disastrous effect upon our military preparedness and efficiency in these times of need for military alertness." The organization takes this stand: "We cannot help but feel that a regulation making liquor available to pilots, navigators and ground crews on Air Force bases would be an invitation to disaster."

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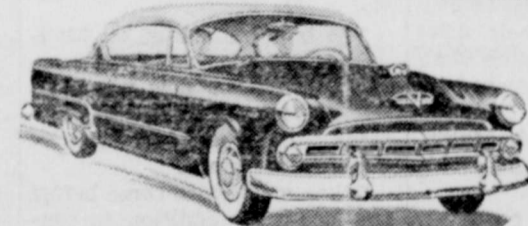

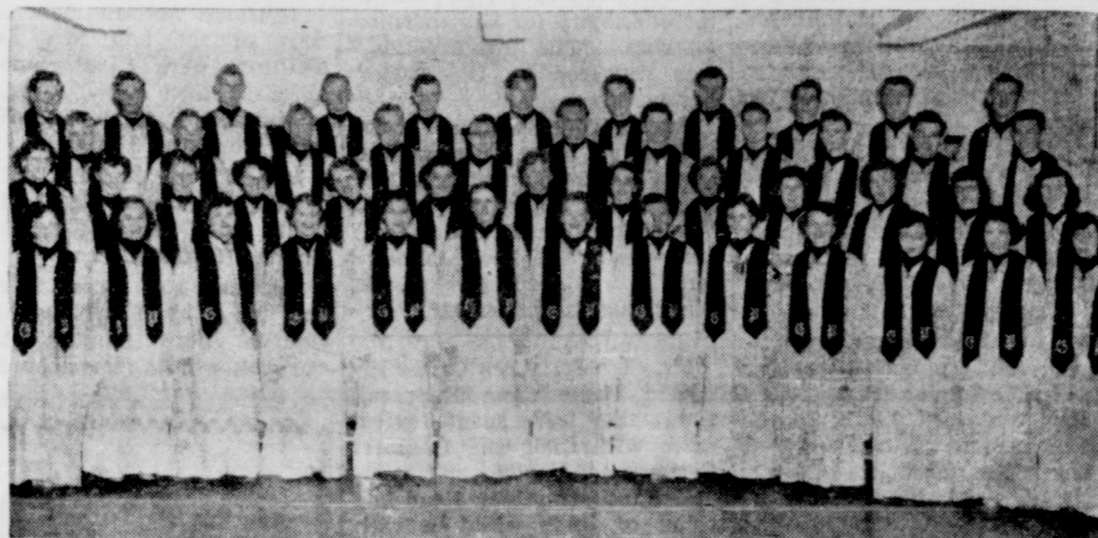

Stuffed Baked Halibut Steak

By ALICE DENHOFF
FISH stories today, starting off with Baked Halibut Steak, with a wonderful stuffing and tangy sauce.

To serve 5, use 2 (10-oz.) halibut or salmon steaks, and sprinkle both sides with 1/2 tsp. salt and dash of pepper. Place one steak in a greased baking pan. Place stuffing on fish, then cover with the other fish steak. Fasten together with toothpicks. Brush top with one tsp. melted butter. Bake at 350° F. for 45 minutes. Serve with hot sauce.

Lemon Bread Stuffing
To prepare the lemon bread stuffing, melt 1 1/2 tbsp. shortening in skillet; add 3 tsp. chopped onion and 1/4 c. chopped celery. Sauté until tender. Four over 1 1/4 c. toasted 1/2-inch bread cubes, adding 1 1/2 tsp. grated lemon rind, 1 tsp. lemon juice, 1/4 tsp. salt and 1/8 tsp. sage. Add 2 tbsp. milk or water, and mix thoroughly.

To make the tomato horse-radish sauce, combine a No. 1 can condensed tomato soup and 1/2 cup prepared horse-radish in small saucepan; heat. Add a 2-oz. can button mushrooms, if desired.

Tuna Loaf
A meat loaf is just dull to many folk, but Tuna Loaf draws many a compliment, we've found.

For 6-8 servings, combine one quart soft bread crumbs, one c. milk, a No. 1 can condensed mushroom soup, 2 beaten eggs, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. paprika, 2 (7-oz.) cans tuna (flaked) and 1/4 c. chopped pimiento. Bake in greased 1 1/2-quart loaf pan in 350° F. oven for 45 minutes.

Swedish Fish Soufflé is another quite unusual fish dish, and a tasty one at that.

Heat 1 1/4 c. top milk (or part top milk, part evaporated milk) with 2 tbsp. butter. Mix 2 1/2 tsp. flour with enough cold water to make a smooth paste. Add to hot milk, stirring until mixture thickens.

Cod or Halibut
Add 1 1/4 c. boiled cod or halibut (skinned, boned and broken into small bits), dash of cayenne, 1/4 tsp. nutmeg and salt and pepper to taste. Cool slightly, then add 4 egg yolks, beating in one at a time.

About 45 minutes before dinner is to be served, beat egg whites until they are very stiff, then fold into mixture carefully. Pour into greased baking dish. Sprinkle with paprika. Set in pan of hot water and bake at 350° F. for 20 to 30 minutes until soufflé has risen and is delicately brown. Serve promptly with egg sauce, cheese sauce or just a heated can of undiluted cream of mushroom soup.

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PARENT PROBLEMS

Don't Neglect Child's Teeth

By GARRY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D.
ACCORDING to the American Dental Association, youths between the ages of 15 and 19 are most in need of dental fillings, having an average of five decayed teeth.
There seems to be no adequate explanation of why young adolescents have more decaying teeth than they had in earlier years. One way of prevention would seem to be constant, regular dental care then and in the earlier years.
Children whose parents have not succeeded from the time these children were very young to win their co-operation with the dentist, are the more inclined to neglect visits to the dentist as they grow older and more independent of parental control and persuasion. And there are plenty of adults still so scared of the dentist as to avoid him indefinitely till there is a dire emergency or they are about to lose most or all their teeth.
Artificial Teeth
Some youths and adults are encouraged in their childish





avoidance of the dentist by the knowledge that they can finally have a lot of their teeth yanked out at once and replaced by artificial teeth which look well.
Most persons who sigh over a dental bill for filling or treating teeth or the gums cheerfully pay several hundred dollars for a set of artificial teeth. As you can see, your conscientious dentist, every time he labors hard to save a natural tooth for you or your child, chooses to decrease substantially his earnings, whereas he could multiply them easily if he would compromise with his conscience. And he may often have to choose the ethical way over the patient's protest.
Try to choose a dentist for your child who will win his confidence and co-operation. Assure your dentist of your willingness to pay him for any extra time for such accomplishment. Try so to cultivate in your child self-reliance, responsibility and co-operation with the dentist that by the time he is eight or ten he will be making and keeping his own dental appointments.

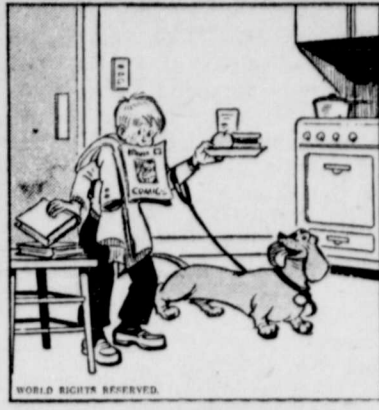

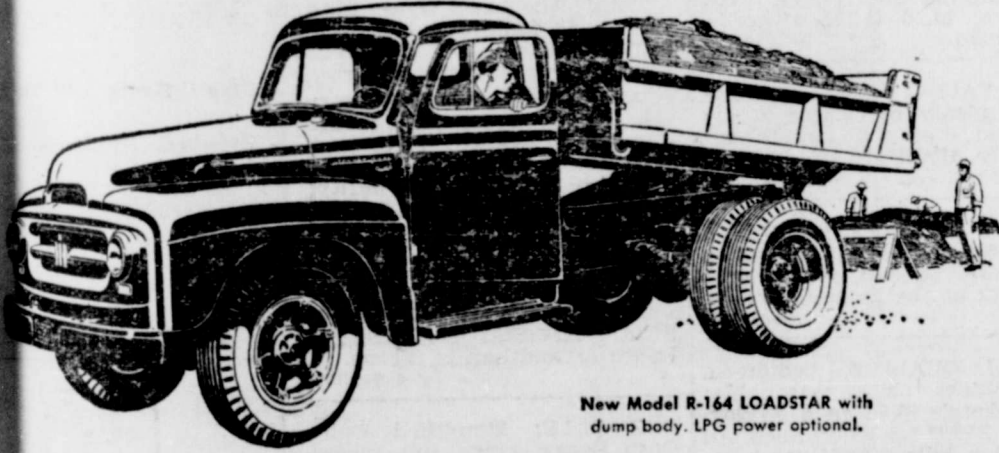

SEED TESTING PROCEDURE

There is an old farm maxim which states, "The harvest is no better than the seed."

You don't have to be a Biblical scholar to recognize the origin and wisdom of that saying. And right now is the time to prepare for sowing good seed in order to reap a high production harvest this fall.

When you buy your seed from a dealer, the Tested Seed Tag required by law on all bags, tells you what to expect in germination quality and seed purity. Yet, what about that last year's crop of seed stored in the bin on your farm? Wouldn't it be a good idea to know as much about the qualities of your farm-grown seed as that which you buy at the store?

If you plan to sell some of that stored seed, the Texas Seed Act says it must be state inspected and tested. But whether you intend to sell it or plant it, a comprehensive test of the seed will pay dividends at harvest time.

Two laboratories are operated by the Texas Department of Agriculture for purity and

germination tests. No charge is made for testing field seed of Texas residents but a fee of 25 cents per sample is levied for all vegetable and flower seed.

To expedite testing operations, a few suggestions are offered to the sender:

1) How to take samples. Only samples of re-cleaned seeds can be accepted. When you have five bags or less of seed, take a sample from each bag. If there are more than five bags send samples from at least every fifth bag, but never less than five bags should be sampled. In sampling bulk seed, thrust your hand or a long probe into the bin in at least seven uniformly distributed spots.

2) Sizes of samples. Send 2 ounces of small seed like white or alsike clover and most grasses; 5 ounces of red or crimson clover, alfalfa, lespedeza, ryegrass, brome, millet, flax, rape or seeds of similar size; 1 pound of sudan grass, sorghum, proso and like sizes; 2 pounds of corn, cotton, cereals, vetches, cowpeas or larger seed.

3) Information needed. Print your name and address, include the kind and variety of seed (the lab does not make varietal identification); the lot number or stock identification; the month and year of harvest and where grown; the test desired (whether purity, germination or both). If the seed has been treated, give name of material and rate of application.

4) Forwarding samples. Samples should be mailed in cloth bags or strong cardboard con-

tainers. Paper bags and ice cream cartons are unsatisfactory since they usually burst in transit. Depending on your location, samples may be sent to either of the following addresses: Seed Laboratory, Texas Dept. of Agriculture, Austin, or Seed Laboratory, 116 Agricul-

ture Bldg., Texas Tech College, Lubbock.
5) Tested seed labels. Labels are 1 cent each and one tag must be attached to each bag of seed offered for sale, showing the complete analysis and other information. Tags cannot be issued for seed tested for ger-

mination only. Include your order for tags along with the samples.

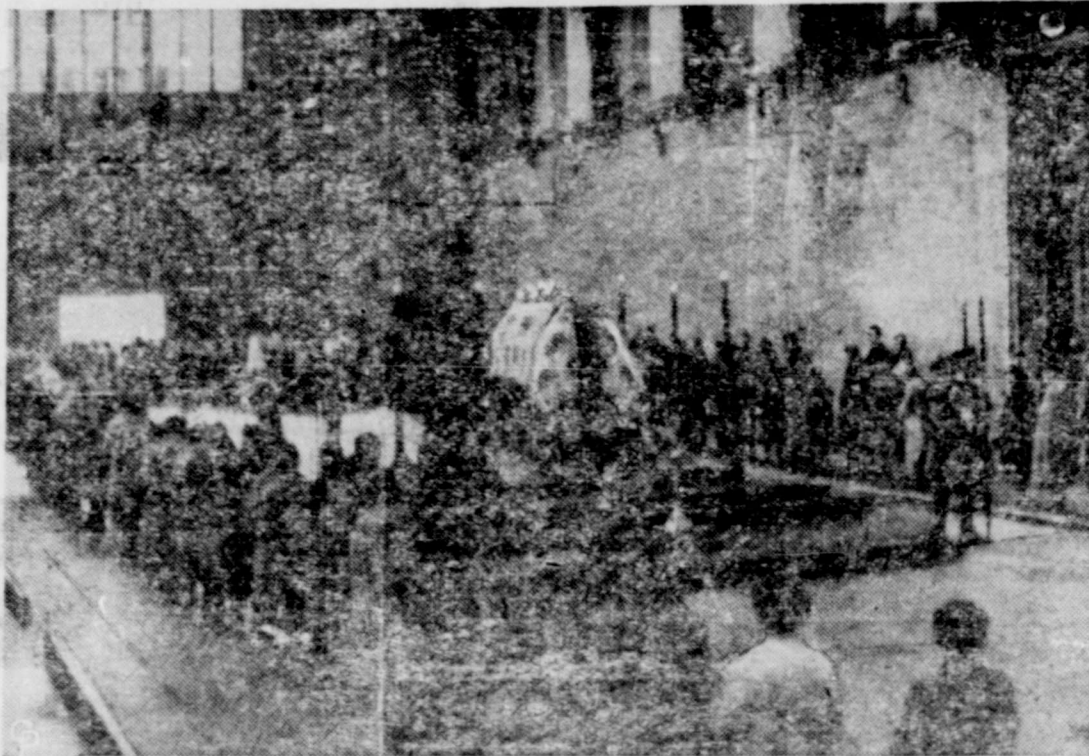
