Eisenhower-Malenkov Confab | Navy Claims Its Newest Jets Possibility Widely Discussed | Are Hottest Fighter Craft Yel

WASHINGTON—Is there a possibility in the near future of a meetng between President Eisenhower and Russian Premier Malenkov? This is a question that every diplomat and foreign affairs observer is batting around with wild abandon at the moment but no one-with the possible exception of the President's immediate circlecan say with any degree of certainty.

Indications, however, are pretty clear that no negotiations toward this end are underway at the moment, although Russia may be setting the stage for an official invitation for President Eisenhower.

Showing remarkable frankness for a diplomat, Secretary of State John Foster Dulles told newsmen recently that even if a meeting were being arranged he would have to evade questions about it until plans were completely set.

That means that the Eisenhower administration definitely will give serious consideration to such a bid if and when it does come through and thatunder suitable circumstances-it might even make

It must be remembered, though, that any meeting between Mr. Eisenhower and Malenkov may actually be in progress or even completed before the public is told about it if the procedure governing wartime conferences between chiefs of state

is followed in this case. • WIDE-OPEN JETS-The Navy claims now that it has hotter jet fighters than anything else in the American or Russian Air Forces even though they are not in heavy enough production for immediate

The new swept-wing naval planes coming off the production lines, however, are the FJ-2 Fury, a souped up version of the Air Force Sabre jet; the F9F-6 Cougar, a faster model of the Panther jet; and the F7U Cutlass, which has a modified delta-wing design and is sup-

posed to be the fastest of the three. The Fury and Cougar should soon appear in Korean skies. The Cutlass, however, will not make its appearance for nearly a year.

The Navy, meanwhile, is gloating over technical advances that have led to the complete elimination of the factors that once made carrierbased planes inferior to their land-based counterparts. The naval air experts point to these developments:

1-Modern jets are made so able to withstand terrific pressures at high speeds that they need not be strengthened for either catapult launchings or landing with abrupt arresting gear. There is no such thing, therefore, as a jet fighter that cannot be launched and received by a carrier.

2-Steam catapults-four of which are being installed on each of the 60,000-ton carriers-can launch fighters at a rate of three to four a minute. This is much faster than they could get off a land field.

 PLAYING POST OFFICE—About 3,000 postmasters' jobs, political plums if ever there were any, may fall to the Republican side of the aisle for recommendation this spring for the first time in 20 years. President Eisenhower is expected to set aside all recent Civil Service

tests to give Republican postmaster-candidates a wider field of endeavor. All 40,000 postmasterships in the nation are under civil service protection but about 3,000 are vacant or filled with temporary appointees.

Most of the previous applicants for these 3,000 jobs. have been Democrats, because the Republicans had little hope of a fair shake in a Democratic ad-

ministration. For this reason, it is expected that President Eisenhower will revamp the current postmaster set-up when Philip Young, dean of Columbia's School of Business until he took over as Civil Service chief,

gets a firm hand on the CSC reins. Postmasterships were previously appointments to a four-year term. In 1933, however, the Democratic administration took the precaution of making them life-time jobs.

Federal Old-Age and Survivors Insurance provides insurance protection to most people who work for a living, either as employees or as self-employed persons. During your working years, you will make social security tax contributions to provide an income for yourself and for your family, in case of your death. More than 66 million persons now have this insurance protection.

Workers wno are already age 65 or over, need have only six quarters of coverage in order to qualify for old-age insurance benefits in the event of retirement from employment or selfemployment. Any worker who has at least a year and half of work covered by social security is insured now, and his insurance protection will last until July 1, 1954. After that, a person status. UNNECESSARY STOCK VALUE LOSSES

A staggering \$19 million is the approximate figuer lost by farmers and ranchmen annually on cattle and hogs sent to market with bad bruises.

According to data compiled by livestock commisions, some 9.8% of all hogs marketed have meat damaging bruises, and 6.9% of all cattle marketed are bruised. This extremely high rate of loss does not include bruise damage to our sheep and

It would be an error to figure that the packer is the one who takes the loss on the bruised animal he buys. Experience has taught him the ratio of damage he can expect on his purchases and he makes his offers accordingly. He knows that on each how this loss will amount to around \$1.59, and on each steer about \$5.88. This is deducted from the price paid to ou, the farmer and stockman. Where do these damages oc-

Most of them occur on the farm in various ways. A shortage of feed troughs and hay racks have the same effect as crowding animals for lack of barn space. The construction of these racks also has a lot to do with the ease with which these animals bruise themselves. Horned animals need a

We know that because of the nature of the animals, a lot of bruises will occur under ideal conditions of equipment and housing. Still we could profit by doing the best we can toward limiting these injuries.

A breakdown of the bruised portions of the steer are as follows: shoulders 19 per cent; backs 12.5 per cent; ribs 9 per cent; plates 3 per cent; hips 35
