Committee Announces Survey Results; Next Dollar Day Scheduled For May 2

The dollar day committee, composed of Lewis T. Hudson, Ray Duren and L. C. Byrd, completed the survey which was made to determine whether local merchants are in favor of going ahead and staging dollar or trades days during the next six months period and have announced results as follows: Out of 73 merchants contacted, 55 voted in favor of having trades day once each month while 15 voted against the plan and three failed to get contacted. Thirty-eight of the 55 voting in favor of dollar days voted for having it on the first Saturday of each month, four voted to have it on Monday, two voted for some week day and eleven voted for anytime during the week.

Mohair Price Supports Announced

According to announcement by Senator Lyndon B. Johnson from Washington the Agriculture Department has announced a national average support price of 60.7 cents per pound on mohair for the current marketing year. Last year's support price was 57.2 cents per pound.

Congressman Clark Fisher and Senator Johnson both helped to get mohair included under the support program in the 1949 Agricultural Act. Mohair prices have been above support levels ever since then, so no support action has been necessary, he stated.

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Eisenhower-Malenkov Confab Possibility Widely Discussed Navy Claims Its Newest Jet's Are Hottest Fighter Craft Yet

WASHINGTON—Is there a possibility in the near future of a meeting between President Eisenhower and Russian Premier Malenkov? This is a question that every diplomat and foreign affairs observer is battling around with wild abandon at the moment but no one—with the possible exception of the President's immediate circle—can say with any degree of certainty.

Indications, however, are pretty clear that no negotiations toward this end are underway at the moment, although Russia may be setting the stage for an official invitation for President Eisenhower.

Showing remarkable frankness for a diplomat, Secretary of State John Foster Dulles told newsmen recently that even if a meeting were being arranged he would have to evade questions about it until plans were completely set.

That means that the Eisenhower administration definitely will give serious consideration to such a bid if and when it does come through and that—under suitable circumstances—it might even make the first move.

It must be remembered, though, that any meeting between Mr. Eisenhower and Malenkov may actually be in progress or even completed before the public is told about it if the procedure governing wartime conferences between chiefs of state is followed in this case.

WIDE-OPEN JETS—The Navy claims now that it has hotter jet fighters than anything else in the American or Russian Air Forces, even though they are not in heavy enough production for immediate comparison with the other aircraft.

The new swept-wing naval planes coming off the production lines, however, are the FJ-2 Fury, a souped-up version of the Air Force Sabre jet; the F9F-6 Cougar, a faster model of the Panther jet; and the FTU Cutlass, which has a modified delta-wing design and is supposed to be the fastest of the three.

The Fury and Cougar should soon appear in Korean skies. The Cutlass, however, will not make its appearance for nearly a year.

The Navy, meanwhile, is gloating over technical advances that have led to the complete elimination of the factors that once made carrier-based planes inferior to their land-based counterparts. The naval air experts point to these developments:

1—Modern jets are made so able to withstand terrific pressures at high speeds that they need not be strengthened for either catapult launchings or landing with abrupt arresting gear. There is no such thing, therefore, as a jet fighter that cannot be launched and received by a carrier.

2—Steam catapults—four of which are being installed on each of the 60,000-ton carriers—can launch fighters at a rate of three to four a minute. This is much faster than they could get off a land field.

PLAYING POST OFFICE—About 3,000 postmasters' jobs, political plums if ever there were any, may fall to the Republican side of the aisle for recommendation this spring for the first time in 20 years.

President Eisenhower is expected to set aside all recent Civil Service tests to give Republican postmaster-candidates a wider field of endeavor. All 40,000 postmasterships in the nation are under civil service protection but about 3,000 are vacant or filled with temporary appointees.

Most of the previous applicants for these 3,000 jobs have been Democrats, because the Republicans had little hope of a fair shake in a Democratic administration.

For this reason, it is expected that President Eisenhower will re-empower the current postmaster set-up when Philip Young, dean of Columbia's School of Business until he took over as Civil Service chief, gets a firm hand on the CSC reins.

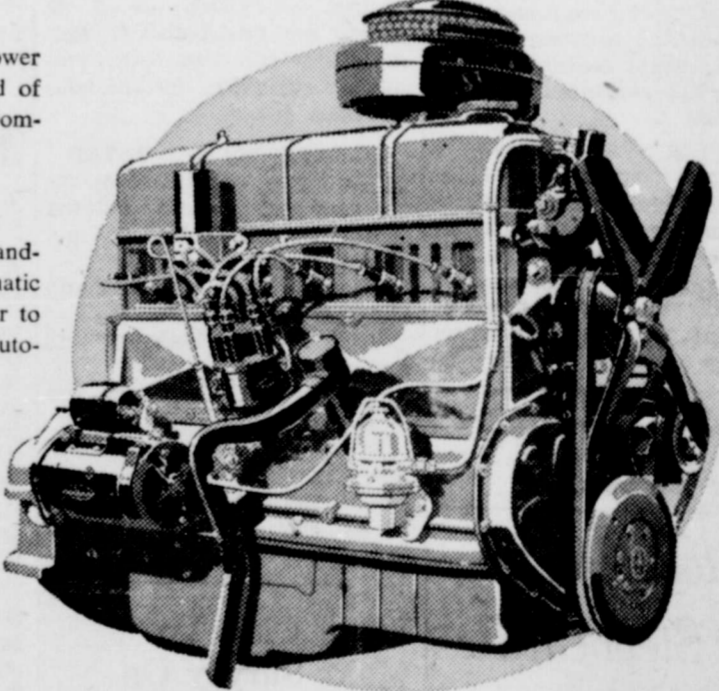

Two Special Southern Dishes With That Fine Creole Touch

TENDER white rice and pink shrimp get together for a treat that is pleasant for eye and palate. Eaters will wordlessly show how well they like this dish when they sail through it.

To serve 6, slowly cook 2 slices bacon, chopped, and 1/4 c. finely chopped onions until onions are tender but not brown and bacon is cooked. Add 1/4 c. tomato paste and 1/2 tsp. catsup; mix thoroughly. Slowly add one c. top milk or cream. Add finely chopped garlic clove, tsp. salt, 1/2 tsp. pepper, 2 c. cooked rice and 1 1/2 c. cooked shrimp. Cover and cook over low heat until shrimp are heated.

Southern Jambalaya

Also with a Creole touch is that popular southern delight, Jambalaya, this one to serve 8. Jambalaya makes a nice buffet special and it isn't a budget-denter.

Melt 2 tbsp. fat in a large saucepan. Add one c. each finely chopped onion and green pepper and 2 finely minced garlic cloves. Cook slowly, stirring often, until onions and green pepper are tender. Add one c. each diced cooked

chicken and diced cooked ham and 12 tiny pork sausages, cut in pieces. Cook 5 minutes longer. Add contents of a No 2 can tomatoes, one c. uncooked white rice, 2 1/2 c. chicken broth, 1/2 tsp. thyme, 1/2 tsp. chopped parsley, 1/4 tsp. chili powder, 1 1/2 tsp. salt and 1/4 tsp. black pepper. Place mixture in a large greased casserole, and bake at 350° F., or until rice is done and liquid absorbed.

Baked Vegetables

Want a nice vegetable dish to lend substance to a skimpy main dish? Then cook quickly in salted water, 12 small young carrots and 1/2 pound small white onions. Drain. Place in casserole. Add 1/2 c. butter and 1/2 c. honey and 2 tsp. hot water, mixed. Bake at 350° F. for 20 minutes. Serves 4-5.

And, for a final note, here's a wonderful honey dressing for fruit salads, and a good one to remember when melon comes around once more. (We serve it in the center of well-chilled melons.)

Beat 1/2 c. thick sour cream slightly with rotary beater. Fold in 1-2 tsp. lime or orange juice, 1/2 c. honey and 1/4 tsp. powdered mace.

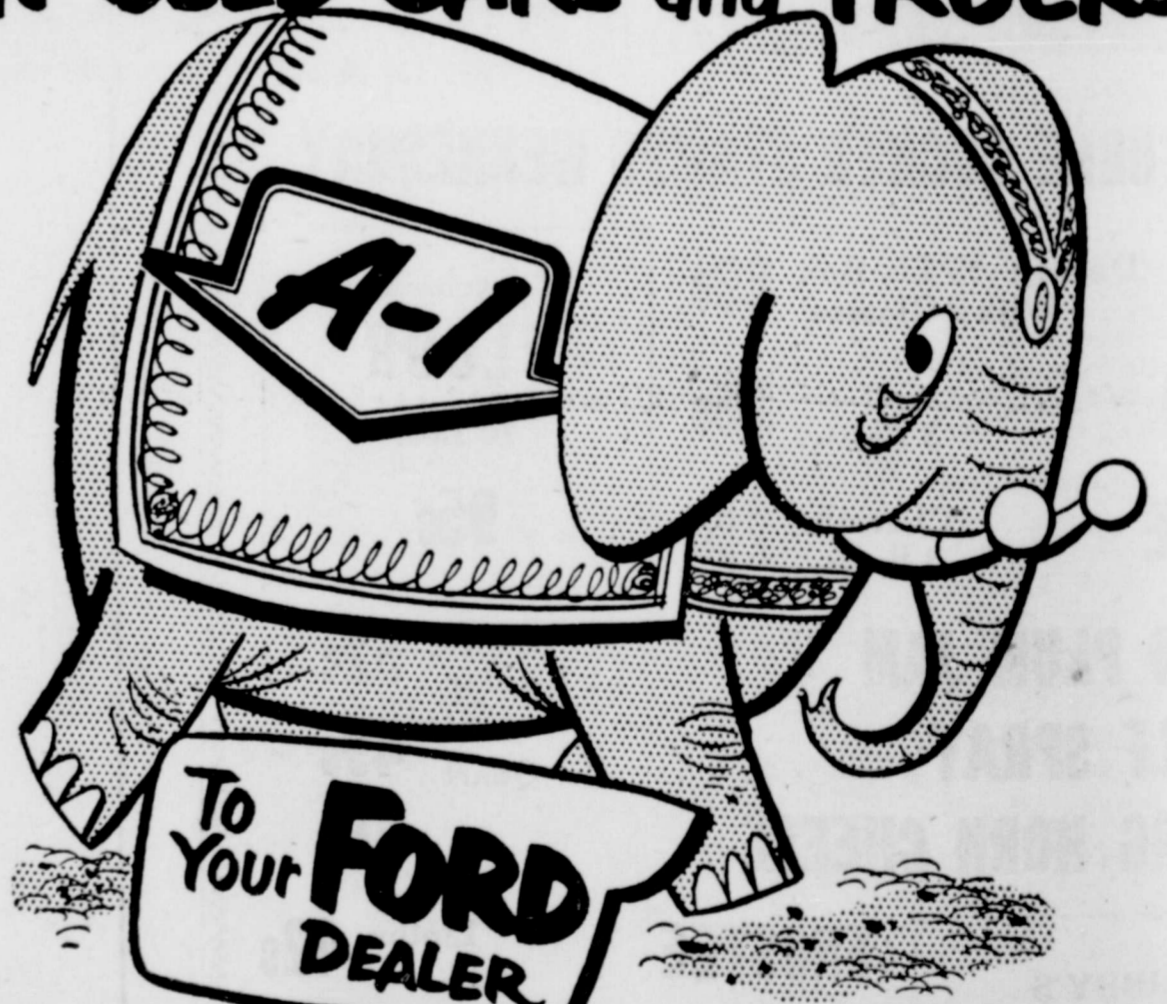

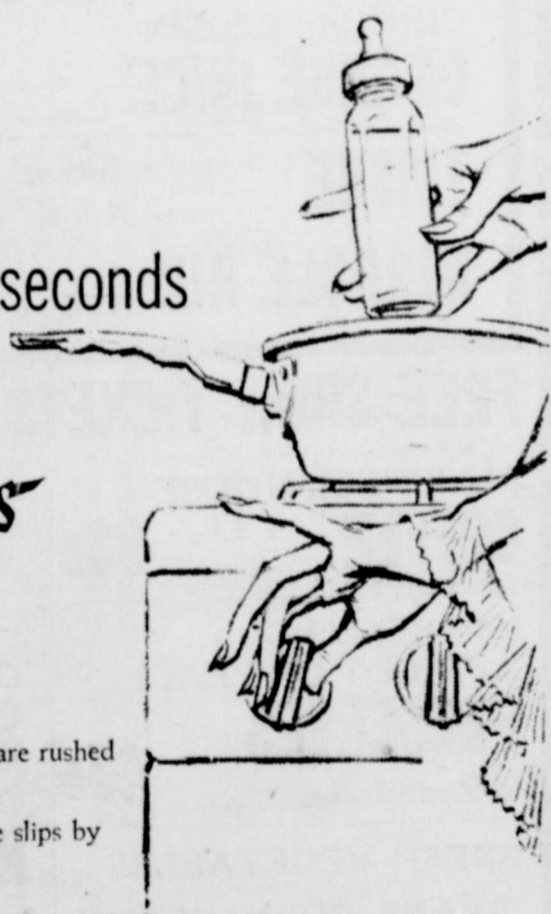

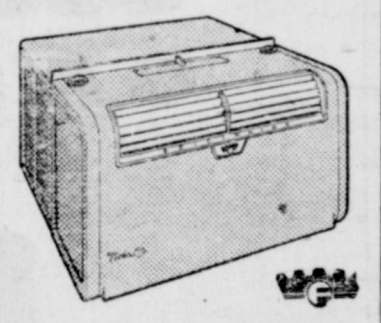

Facts About Social Security

Federal Old-Age and Survivors Insurance provides insurance protection to most people who work for a living, either as employees or as self-employed persons. During your working years, you will make social security tax contributions to provide an income for yourself and for your family, in case of your death. More than 66 million persons now have this insurance protection.

Workers who are already age 65 or over, need have only six quarters of coverage in order to qualify for old-age insurance benefits in the event of retirement from employment or self-employment. Any worker who has at least a year and half of work covered by social security is insured now, and his insurance protection will last until July 1, 1954. After that, a person under age 65 must work an average of six months out of every year to retain his insured status. After about ten years of covered work, a person is insured for life.

This insurance is afforded not only to the qualified worker when he retires at age 65 or later, but also to his survivors in the event of his death at any age. Four out of five mothers in the nation now have the protection of survivors insurance under social security for themselves and their minor children in the event of the death of the family breadwinner.

**UNNECESSARY STOCK
VALUE LOSSES**

A staggering \$19 million is the approximate figure lost by farmers and ranchmen annually on cattle and hogs sent to market with bad bruises.

According to data compiled by livestock commissions, some 9.8% of all hogs marketed have meat damaging bruises, and 6.9% of all cattle marketed are bruised. This extremely high rate of loss does not include bruise damage to our sheep and calves.

It would be an error to figure that the packer is the one who takes the loss on the bruised animal he buys. Experience has taught him the ratio of damage he can expect on his purchases and he makes his offers accordingly. He knows that on each hog this loss will amount to around \$1.59, and on each steer about \$5.68. This is deducted from the price paid to you, the farmer and stockman.

Where do these damages occur?

Most of them occur on the farm in various ways. A shortage of feed troughs and hay racks have the same effect as crowding animals for lack of barn space. The construction of these racks also has a lot to do with the ease with which these animals bruise themselves. Horned animals need a lot of room.

We know that because of the nature of the animals, a lot of bruises will occur under ideal conditions of equipment and housing. Still we could profit by doing the best we can toward limiting these injuries.

A breakdown of the bruised portions of the steer are as follows: shoulders 19 per cent; backs 12.5 per cent; ribs 9 per cent; plates 3 per cent; hips 35 per cent; rumps 12.5 per cent;

and rounds 9 per cent.

On hogs it is: shoulders 13 per cent; backs 26 per cent; bellies 12 per cent; loins .05 per cent; and hams 48 per cent.

How much of this huge loss is due to the human factors of "hurry, hurry—get it done"? Probably a great deal. The old saying, "Haste Makes Waste" is still true, especially when dealing with balky animals.

The dollars lost on bruises never reach your pockets because of injuries received somewhere along the line—either on the farm, in the truck or in the stockyards. But perhaps a little more caution will add more value to your animals.

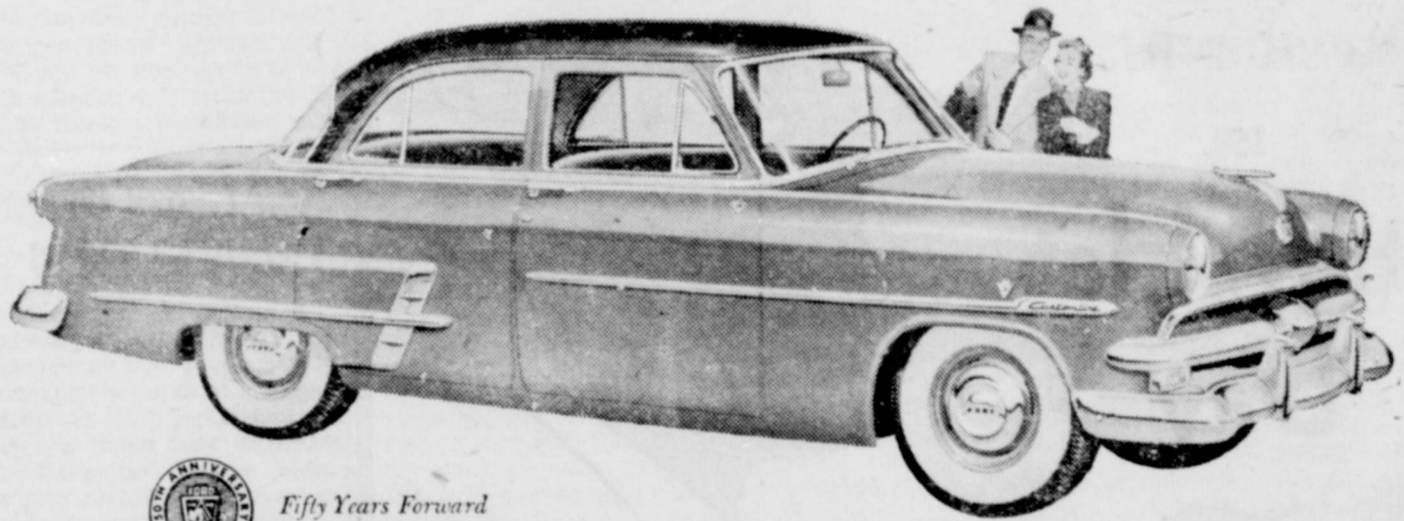
