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PRICED OUT OF THE MARKET

Secretary of Agriculture Benson has told Congress that there should be more flexibility in the agricultural price support programs along with less "running to Washington" at every reverse. He then made this wise observation, "It is possible, I think, to have a support so high that you may price a product out of the market."

It is one thing to have a support program to meet emergencies and prevent extreme hardship. It is a very different thing to have a program designed to keep farm prices at extremely high levels, regardless of what the supply and demand situation may be. That, in essence, is Mr. Benson's position—and it is the only position which can promote the long-run welfare and progress of farmers or any other group.

LOST IN THE SHUFFLE

Writing in the Oregon Voter on that eternal problem, taxation, Ralph T. Moore said, "The idea of taking from each in accord with ability to pay... was irresistible in the days when we had the rich tax. But it is losing its glamour in these days when the poor man finds that he is the fellow with the presumed ability to pay. Somehow the ability part has been lost in the shuffle. Only the pay part remains."

The lowest income tax rate is 22.2 per cent and it applies only to taxable incomes under \$2,000. In other words, those with extremely modest means must pay out almost a quarter of their taxable earnings to the U. S. Treasury — and the rate rises very swiftly thereafter. All other taxes must be piled on top of this levy. The great masses of the people have the most to gain from economy in government.

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Eisenhower-Churchill-Malenkov Conference May Be Imminent | Feelers for Big Three Talk Extended Via Sweden, Others

WASHINGTON—A face-to-face meeting of President Eisenhower, British Prime Minister Winston Churchill and Soviet Premier Georgi Malenkov may be imminent. Intimates of the President say he is receptive to the idea and that he would be willing to go to Berlin for such a parley if Malenkov shows real evidence of good faith.

Diplomatic observers believe that "feelers" on a Big Three conference have been extended through several channels, including the Swedish foreign office.

Should the British-Russian talks aimed at preventing further aerial clashes over Germany prove successful, an Ike-Churchill-Malenkov meeting might be considered a probability instead of a possibility.

Andrei Vishinsky, demoted from Soviet foreign minister to permanent Russian representative at the United Nations, may be by-passed in negotiations looking toward a Big Three session. Mr. Eisenhower is known to have little use for Vishinsky, who has been the most vituperative of all Russians in his verbal attacks on the United States.

Ike reportedly has discussed the conference question with British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden, French Premier Rene Mayer, and two of his best military friends, British Field Marshal Bernard Montgomery and Gen. Alfred Gruenther.

DEADLOCK—One of the most stubborn fights in recent congressional history is still going on between the House and Senate over who is to serve as chairman of the joint atomic energy committee. The outlook for settlement is not bright.

Since the Republicans took over control of Congress in January, a deadlock has existed between the House candidate, Rep. Sterling Cole (R), New York, and the Senate nominee, Senator Bourke Hickenlooper (R), Iowa.

Involved in the prestige of both chambers. There are nine members on each side and neither side will budge. Every ballot so far has turned out to be nine votes for Cole and nine votes for Hickenlooper.

House members are especially determined not to give in. Ever since the committee was set up in 1947, a senator has been its chairman, Hickenlooper in the GOP 80th Congress and the late Senator Brien McMahon (D), Connecticut, in the Democratic 81st and 82nd. Usually, the chairmanship of joint committees rotate between House and Senate members.

FORGOTTEN LEGEND—Vice President Richard M. Nixon is taking up where his predecessor left off in dispelling the legend that the "Veep" is the nation's forgotten man. Just as was true with ex-Vice President Alben W. Barkley, Nixon is sought day after day by swarms of visitors to his Senate Office Building suite.

Nixon's staff is also overwhelmed by an avalanche of mail pouring in daily on the country's second-ranking executive.

Much of the mail comes from Californians who can't get used to the fact that Nixon is no longer their senator—that he represents all the people of the United States now. As an assistant put it, "They think they've got three senators in Washington now, instead of two."

AMMUNITION BLAME—The current controversy over charges of a shortage of ammunition in Korea may stir up a bitter scrap between the Pentagon and Congress.

The legislators are expected to lay the blame on the doorstep of Defense department planners while Army officials, in rebuttal, may argue that if a shortage exists, it is the fault of short-sighted congressional budget-cutting.

One factor in the controversy stemming from complaints by retired Eighth Army commander Gen. James A. Van Fleet is a continuing difference of opinion on how large ammunition reserves should be.

If Congress cracks down on the Pentagon too severely over the problem, the Army may come back with demands for increased funds to build up stockpiles.

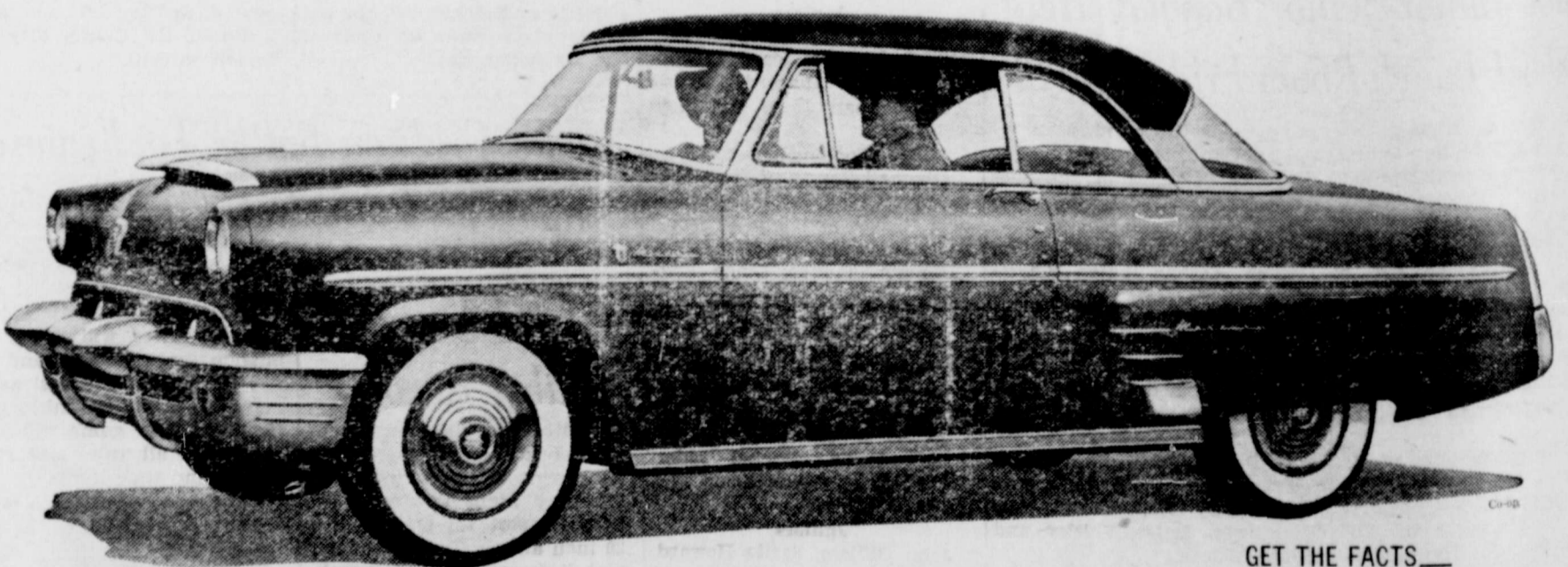

Try Golden Honeyed Chicken

By ALICE DENHOFF
FOR today, dishes with a touch of spring, satisfying, yet light and delightful, such as this chicken special.

To serve 4-5 with Golden Honeyed Chicken, select a nice frying chicken (3-3 1/2 pounds) and cut into serving sized pieces. Season with salt and pepper to suit (a little cayenne is liked by some). Dust with flour. Arrange in flat baking dish or roaster. Melt 4 tbsp. butter and pour over chicken.

Milk-Honey Sauce
Place in hot oven, uncovered, 30 minutes to brown, then reduce heat to moderate. Mix one c. rich milk with 1/2 c. honey—pour over chicken and bake one hour. If desired, add 1/2 c. mushrooms 15 minutes before serving.

Broilers for dinner? Then try them this way.
Split the broilers and spread flat on rack in roaster. Sprinkle with salt and, sparingly, with tabasco sauce. Melt 4 tbsp. butter with 1/2 c. honey and 1/2 c. cream. Place chicken, uncovered, in 450° F. oven. As it oven-broils, baste with prepared milk and honey sauce.
Calf tongue, when properly

cooked, is good, but when prepared this way, it's a real treat.
Cook one tongue in boiling salted water until tender. Drain and skin. Place tongue in roasting pan. Cover with a mixture of 1/2 c. honey, 1/2 c. seeded raisins, 1/2 c. vinegar, 1/4 tsp. allspice, 1/4 tsp. cinnamon, 1/4 tsp. cloves and tsp. salt. Simmer, covered, on top of stove 45 minutes.

Cheese Croquettes
Cheese Croquettes served with Tomato Sauce make a fair luncheon or supper dish.

Mix well one c. dried bread crumbs that have been softened with enough hot water to shape, 2 c. grated Parmesan or American cheese, 1/2 tsp. prepared mustard, 1/2 tsp. salt, a grating of fresh black pepper, a dash of cayenne, one well beaten egg and 2 1/2 tbsp. top milk. Shape into 8 conical croquettes and roll in additional dried bread crumbs. Fry in deep, hot fat until golden brown. Drain on brown paper. Keep hot until ready to serve with sauce.

To prepare sauce, simply heat one c. undiluted condensed tomato soup with one bay leaf, removing bay leaf when heated. Pour over hot croquettes and garnish with scissored parsley.

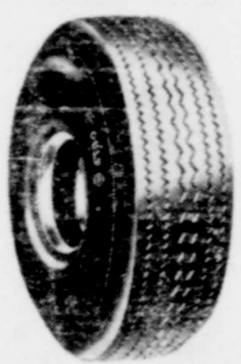

PEANUT MARKETING PROGRESS

Now they've done it! They've taken the peanut taste out of the peanut.

Are you one of the old-fashioned persons who likes peanut butter? Get "hep" neighbor! The modern peanut, aided by a little nutritional hokus-pokus, may soon be available in orange, maple and chocolate flavors. Or for you gourmets who love mexican food—how about a chili flavored peanut snack?

You would hardly recognize the origin of the two "change-lines" called "Peanut Snack" and "Peanut Spread." The products were developed with the aid of the Production and Marketing Administration to create new demands and outlets for the lowly peanut. Preliminary studies show the products are popular with the consumers.

This should be good news for growers around Gorman and other peanut areas of Texas. The yearly demand for peanuts has been known to vary to such a degree that sometimes we can get as much as \$9,500,000 for our crop, as in 1952. Yet, growers can remember other times when the market was so bad that it was more profitable to feed the crop to the hogs. Any new developments which catch the public fancy will give more strength to peanut sales.

Research and marketing officials may have hit a jackpot on this latest revamping of the peanut. Sales reports indicate the "new look" in peanuts proved more popular in some test

areas than the old reliable peanut butter.

Supplies of the new products are not generally available yet. It may be some months before studies are complete and the products appear on the grocery shelves. But once they do, you may buy "Peanut Snack" in orange, maple and chili flavors, packed in a cellophane roll for slicing like bologna. "Peanut Spread" will have the consistency of peanut butter for cracker or bread sandwiches.

Yet, no matter whether you slice it or spread it, the peanut industry may get a shot in the arm.
