the board to call an election for

a new high school along with  
furnishings and fixtures and a

Apparently this special elec-  
tion for approval of the bond  
issue is the natural step to be  
expected by residents of the  
district since the increase of tax  
rate from \$1.00 to \$1.50 per hun-  
dred dollars assessed valuation  
was given approval by the tax-  
payers of the district at a spe-  
cial election several months  
ago.

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**"NO STOCK EXCHANGE IN MOSCOW!"**

Some time ago, G. Keith Funston, president of the New York Stock Exchange, pointed out one fundamental difference between freedom and communism when he said: "There's no Stock Exchange in Moscow!"

The Labor Union, a newspaper that is owned by member organizations of The American Federation of Labor, used the phrase as a title for a feature editorial. It quoted statements made by Mr. Funston in which he urged widespread stock ownership as a means of giving our people a direct and tangible stake in our system of doing things. Then the paper said: "... your right and privilege to become an owner of American business, if you so choose, is one of those precious rights you enjoy and take for granted. And it's a right that you certainly wouldn't have if this country was controlled by communists."

"And, even if you don't own stocks and never intend to, you must never forget that you still have a tremendous stake in the American free enterprise system."

"Because, if you work for a living, somebody invested the money that started the business going. The chances are there are stockholders who have put up the money, provided the plant and the tools that make your job possible."

"It's the way the American system works. And it's the most successful economic system ever known on earth."

Capital and labor have their conflicts. But they have one great thing in common — and that is the duty and privilege to keep this free system of ours strong and secure.

MARCH OF EVENTS

Peace To Bring Break In Current Prosperity? Business Outlook Good, Reports Congress Group

WASHINGTON—Would peace in Korea produce a "bust" in the current high level of prosperity in the United States? A simple question, but one which is giving the President and Congress a lot of headaches.

The fact is that more than two-thirds of Uncle Sam's budget is devoted, directly or indirectly, to defense. Government officials fear that a drastic cutback in defense spending might cause a recession. Wall Street's initial reaction to Red peace feelers sent stocks into a steep nose dive. The market has been "bearish" ever since.

The government's present budget calls for the spending of almost \$47 billion on direct defense this year alone. Add to this huge sum the staggering totals projected for the years immediately ahead in building up America's defenses and you have possibly the key to the lush prosperity the country enjoys today. Defense spending is a big factor in the fact that more than 61 million Americans are now employed. If this fantastic sum of money were to be suddenly withdrawn from circulation the result could easily be panic or depression.

Considerable relief from the anxiety which many government officials felt is afforded by a study of the staff economists and advisers of the joint House and Senate committee on the economic report. According to this study, there need not be any "bust" after Korea—if everybody will keep calm and avoid a "psychological panic."

POINTING OUT that "SCARE BUYING" immediately after the outbreak of the Korean conflict in June, 1950, forced prices for thousands of items up far above what they should have been, the report says that a Korean truce might do just the opposite.

"In spite of the bearishness of the stock market over the possibility of a Korean truce, the present outlook for private business activity and continued high levels of production and employment remains good," the joint committee study declares.

The public should keep in mind that a "truce" is not a "settlement," the report says. Even a cessation of the Korean fighting would not by any means end our troubles with the Soviets.

"It is assumed that the recent shift in Soviet policy is only a temporary tactical maneuver, not a fundamental change in long-term strategy, so that United States economic policy should continue to be based on the long run needs for defense," the report continues.

MANY MILITARY LEADERS FIGURE that the present Russian flirtation with the dove of peace is a calculated move to do two things: (a) cause a relaxation of America's rearmament effort, and (b) cut back defense spending and cause unemployment and/or depression in some key U. S. industries if not the whole economy.

Peace and full employment are highly compatible, the report says. There are and will be many opportunities for growth and investment in a peacetime economy.

Really, the economic planners say, the end of fighting in Korea won't make much difference in the defense picture—only about 10 per cent of our present military effort, between four and five billion dollars' worth, is directly earmarked for Korea.

The taxpayer won't feel much of a relief even there, assuming an armistice, because we would have to train South Korean troops to the point where they would be capable of defending the country against another sneak attack, and then there are the thousands and thousands of troops and mountains of supplies now in Korea which would have to be moved—either to Japan or back to the United States.

The "gross national product" of America is now a whopping big, record \$360 billion. The lopping off of less than \$4 billion wouldn't have much effect on business. The only real danger, the economic prophets predict, is an unjustified scare psychology which might result in widespread retrenchment on the part of business when what is needed is expansion.

**TODAY'S Menu**

**Many Ways to Use Canned Peas**

By ALICE DENHOFF  
WE don't know how often we've reached for a can of peas and added them to a dish to make it better or more nutritious, or used them when thrift is in order.

For a budget first course, for instance, we combine 1 1/2 c. liquid from canned peas with 1 1/2 c. tomato juice. Well chilled, with a dash of tabasco and served with crisp crackers, it makes a nice meal starter.

And for a low-cost but tasty sauce that's fine with a meat, salmon or vegetable loaf, melt 3 tbs. butter in saucepan. Blend in 4 tbs. flour, 1/2 tsp. salt and add gradually 1/2 c. milk and one c. liquid from canned peas. Place over low heat and cook until thick and smooth, stirring constantly. Add 1/2 c. drained canned peas and heat 5 minutes longer.

With Scallions  
For something different in the vegetable line, cook one c. of scallions, cut in one-inch pieces, in boiling salted water for about 5 minutes, or until tender. Drain. Add one c. of drained, canned peas, cover and place over low heat 5 minutes until hot. Serve with melted butter.

Nice with broiled chops or hamburger patties is this stuffed tomato idea.  
Remove one inch from blossom end of tomatoes and scoop out part of pulp. Fill tomatoes with drained canned peas, and place

on broiler rack 3 inches from heat, broiling 10 minutes.  
Now that salad time is here, we'd like to tell you that drained canned peas give a grand flavor to crisp salads.

For example, combine 2 c. peas with one c. flaked tuna or salmon and 2 c. crisp, raw cauliflowerets. Serve on crisp lettuce or chloicy with French dressing, or just a mixture of oil and vinegar or lemon juice.

For a glamour touch on a vegetable plate or for a nice accompaniment for a roast, combine one c. of mashed canned peas with 2 c. hot mashed potatoes. Season well. Heap in mounds on a baking sheet and brown lightly in a moderate oven for 10 minutes.

Then there's our favorite vegetable, cauliflower, done with peas. Remove outer leaves from a firm head of cauliflower. Let stand in salted water for 15-20 minutes, then wash and put whole head into boiling, salted water to cover. Let boil uncovered for 20 minutes, or until cauliflower is just clear and tender, but not darkened. Drain and place on shallow vegetable dish.

Place around cauliflower contents of a No. 2 can large-size peas that have been heated, arranging as a border. Over the cauliflower pour a sauce made by melting 3 tbs. butter, adding 2 tbs. flour, and stirring until it thickens. Garnish with finely chopped parsley. Serves 6.

### Farmers Are Urged To Have Wheat Acreage Data Ready For PMA Visit

Chairman Luther Soules today announced that Mills County PMA committeemen will call upon farmers, who have not to date reported information necessary to make equitable wheat acreage allotments on their farms for the 1954 crop. He urges all farmers who have not reported, to have ready and available, when the PMA man calls, a legal description of their farms, the number of acres that were in wheat on their farms in 1951, '52 and '53, and the number of tillable acres in the farms.

The information must be collected at once in order that the Secretary of Agriculture can carry out the law on allotment programs. The legislation directs him to proclaim by July 15 a national wheat acreage allotment for the 1954 crop of wheat. Acreage allotments must be proclaimed each year unless the Secretary finds that a national emergency exists or a material increase in exports is expected. Secretary Benson has stated that he will make no final decision on 1954 wheat controls until the latest possible information is available before the deadline.

The national acreage allotment for the 1954 crop must be that acreage, which at the national average yield, will produce enough wheat-plus the carry-over - for a normal year's

domestic consumption and exports plus 30 per cent. This is apportioned among the States, then among the counties in the State according to average acreage seeded to wheat during the 10 preceding years.

Mills County's wheat allotment is apportioned among farms on the basis of (1) tillable acres, (2) crop rotation practices, including acreage planted to wheat, (3) type of soil, and (4) topography.

Under the allotment program only producers who comply with their wheat acreage allotment would be eligible for price supports at full 90 per cent of parity.

**PARENT PROBLEMS**

**Modern Labor-Saving Devices Take the Burden Off Mother**

By GARRY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D.

MANY mothers would have more time, energy and emotional poise to be lovely with their children and enjoy them more if drudgery about the house could be reduced. While it might be ideal if all young mothers could have modern tools and equipment and adequate domestic help, not nearly all can afford them, of course.

Yet the mother can have some help from the father if he senses the burdens she has and appreciates her as a precious person and companion. Whether she has domestic help and equipment is oftentimes determined by her husband's attitude.

**Father Should Help**

But one thing is certain — far more fathers than do so could lighten the mother's load by sharing more in the household work and care of the children and by providing her with labor-saving devices. Often, indeed, investment in help and equipment is financially wise, as it may prevent or reduce medical expenses, not to mention needless fatigue and physical suffering.

Of course, domestic help is hard to get, but easier to get where there is good equipment, such as electric washer, drier, ironer, mixer, vacuum cleaner, garbage disposal, dishwasher, and the like. Mrs. Myers says that of

these gadgets, she prizes most highly her dishwasher, drier and garbage disposal.

Where there are several young children, the help from a drier is enormous. See the advantages it offers over hanging up clothes outdoors on a cold and windy morning.

**Relative Values**

Whether such conveniences can be had or not is often a matter of relative values placed on family purchases. Some families could afford to cut on expenditures on tobacco or liquor or the like enough to acquire some of the labor-saving equipment.

Mothers of children over six, without adequate equipment or domestic help, could greatly lighten their loads if they properly trained these children to help about the home. Sometimes, these children get better training in responsibility than those in homes amply equipped. But this need not be. Where there are gadgets, somebody must be responsible for operating them, and wise parents see that children old enough do learn to take this responsibility.

Mothers of young children should be very vigilant in protecting them from the perils of gadgets, especially from grinders and mixers in the kitchen. Safety demands that these children learn early the meaning of "No" and automatically avoid such dangers.

**LIVESTOCK PEST CONTROL**

Livestock pests cost the nation an annual loss estimated at over half a billion dollars. Who bears the brunt of this loss? Everyone does—the farmer and the consumer pay higher prices for necessary goods due to wasted feed, damaged hides, and both lowered quality and reduced output in such essential animal products as meat, milk, eggs, wool and leather.

The common fly is a real culprit in this respect. He cuts deeply into beef and milk production. Insects keep pastured animals from grazing adequately when feeding costs are the lowest. Cattle grubs do much damage to hides and may also reduce output of beef and milk. Also high on the list of "profit robbers" are ticks, lice, screwworms, and sheep ticks which take an immense toll in unproduced meat and fibers that should go for food and clothing. Infested animals are "discontented and cannot produce good quality meat."

Fortunately, most of these losses can be reduced or eliminated. Individual farmers can do much to protect their own livestock but community cooperation can do even more. United action makes for better eradication.

To successfully control insects, farmers and ranchmen must know what pests attack animals, what insecticides to

use, the correct formulas and methods of application. County agents, entomologists, veterinarians and other specialists can render important service in providing information and leadership to get the more harmful livestock pests in hand. A number of bulletins also are available for research and study.

**FORCE TROOPS, FMFPAC** (Camp Pendleton, Calif.) — Month-long maneuvers have ended, leaving Private First Class Billy Joe Maxwell, Goldthwaite, Texas, and his fellow Marines much wiser about battle tactics and atomic warfare.
