MORGANS TO ATTEND METHODIST CONFERENCE

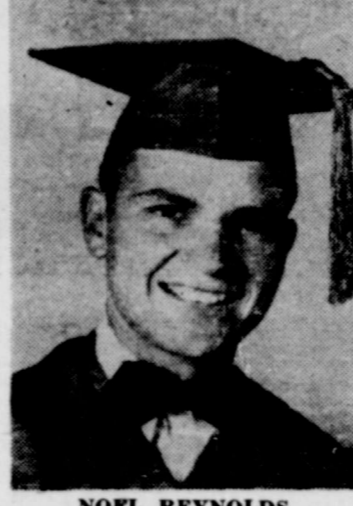
Central Texas Methodist Conference will be held in the First Methodist Church in Fort Worth, June 10-14.

School District Electors To Vote On Building Bond Issue Saturday

Voters of Goldthwaite Independent School District will go to the polls Saturday of this week and cast their ballots on the question of issuing \$190,000.00 in building bonds. The election has been called by the board of trustees after receiving a petition signed by more than a hundred qualified voters of the district, requesting such an election.

The election will be held in the commissioners' court room in Mills County Courthouse, with polling booths open from 8:00 o'clock a. m., until 7:00 p. m. All persons who have rendered property for taxation in the district and have paid their poll tax and are a legally qualified voter can vote in this election.

It has been pointed out that present Goldthwaite school facilities are in such condition that something must be done if our community is to keep abreast of modern education. Due to age and condition our present high school building and our limited obsolete facilities are inadequate. If we are to give our children an equal opportunity we must provide additional room and equipment to bring our school up to date.

A new high school building can be obtained on a sound financial basis without an undue additional tax burden, and if this program is completed it will assure the people of our community an up-to-date school, officials of the district have announced.

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SCHOOL BOND ELECTION IS IMPORTANT

This week Saturday, June 6, is an important day for folks of Goldthwaite Independent School District. It is a day when qualified voters of the district will go to the polls to cast their ballots on the question of whether the board of trustees will be given the go ahead sign for issuing \$190,000.00 in building bonds.

From reports it is indicated that tentative plans for the program call for a new high school building and a number of general improvements and repairs on present buildings.

All those who have expressed themselves on the subject to this writer seem heartily in favor of the building program — stating that there is no question but what the district needs a new high school building as well as doing a lot of repairing and improving of present buildings if the district is to provide educational facilities for the students of Goldthwaite Independent School District and Mills County. Many of these comments have come from folks who took time out to visit the schools during Public Schools Week, some weeks ago, when they had first hand opportunity to see the need for such a program.

School Trustees receiving the petition and calling for special election for building bonds seems the natural course to be followed since voters of the district approved an increase in legal tax limits from \$1.00 to \$1.50 per one hundred assessed valuation, at a special election earlier.

Nevertheless it is an important election and we would urge all qualified voters of the district to be sure and go to the polls and cast their ballot.

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Eisenhower Budget Trimming | Foresee Military Expenditure, So Far Affects 'Little Things' | Foreign Aid Cuts Difficult

WASHINGTON—In its drive to trim the budget, the Eisenhower administration is counting more on the "little things" than on the major items such as foreign aid and military expenditures. These, after all, cannot be cut so easily.

Here, however, are a few of the "little" savings that have been effected recently:

The Commerce department will compile its business statistics from now on without the assistance of a second million-dollar "Univac" mechanical brain. No serious repercussions are expected.

The Fish and Wildlife department of the Interior department will hold off on building six "fish facilities" it had planned. Total saving on this one—\$200,000. The "facilities" were to have included a cold storage plant and warm water ponds.

The Secret Service will probably drop some 30 of its agents shortly at a total saving of \$250,000 a year.

Soil conservation funds, in addition, are to be cut. There will be fewer ship construction subsidies and fewer public power and flood control projects.

These, at least, are the current administration plans. Many of the savings are touchy ones because they are so-called "pork barrel" projects dear to the hearts of some congressmen.

WAR CUT—Despite frequent official statements to the contrary, it is expected that United States defense spending will drop off steeply if a quick armistice can be achieved in Korea.

Fiscal 1954 spending, now pegged at \$46.5 billion, would probably drop to \$35 billion almost immediately with a drop to something like \$30 billion in prospect for the next year. This would give Congress a little room in which to make some real tax reductions without unbalancing the national economy.

Surprisingly, foreign aid spending is expected to continue at a rate of at least four or five billions a year despite the length of the Korean war.

Pentagon experts say that for economic and diplomatic reasons the North Atlantic Treaty military program will have a long tapering-off period.

For one thing, the money has already been committed. For another, there is the fear that any unsettling of foreign economies would play directly into Communist hands.

In other words, the experts say, the American economy is the strongest of the lot and can most painlessly make the transition from war to peace.

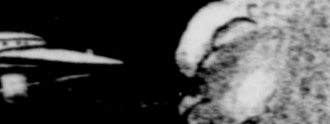
50 YEARS AGO— (Taken From Eagle Files June 6, 1903)

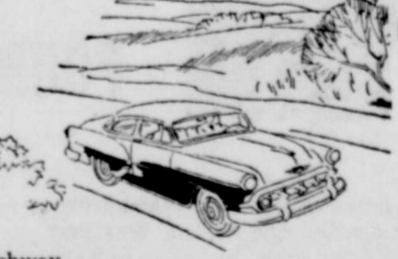

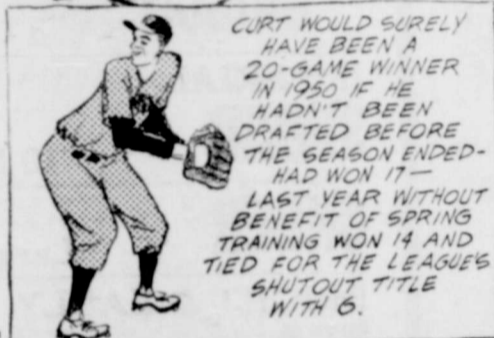

POULTRY POINTERS

Few farms are complete without at least some chickens—both fryers and layers. Even though commercial flocks may not be practical the few extra pennies earned in egg production or the money saved in raising meat for the frying pan really add up in a year's time.

In order to successfully raise chickens for home consumption, or for the market, it is important to look after the "little things" as well as the bigger problems. It may pay dividends to spend a few minutes checking on these profit leaks:

Hang up those empty feed sacks or pile them neatly on a rack. This is the best way to keep used bags in good condition. A few pains in opening sacks so as not to tear them will pay off.

Don't allow birds to waste feed. Use feeders that prevent waste and fill them only 1/2

to 2/2 full.

Make a practice to wipe off light bulbs and reflectors in the pens every so often. It is surprising how much light is lost simply because bulbs and reflectors are filmed over.

Check up on the favorite laying haunts of your chickens. Eggs are lost because birds don't lay them in the nests. Dark corners, under the nests and roosts, should be wired off so birds just can't lay in those hard to get at places where eggs are either broken or get dirty.

Work out a plan to cull and sell loafers if you are trying for good egg production. Non-laying birds are lost to the market because the farmer didn't get rid of them while they were in good condition.

A good poultryman is first

of all a good manager. No matter how big or how small an operation he has, mass production can never substitute for good management.

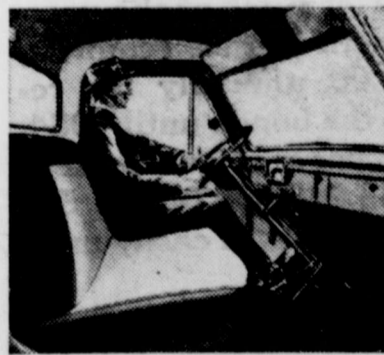

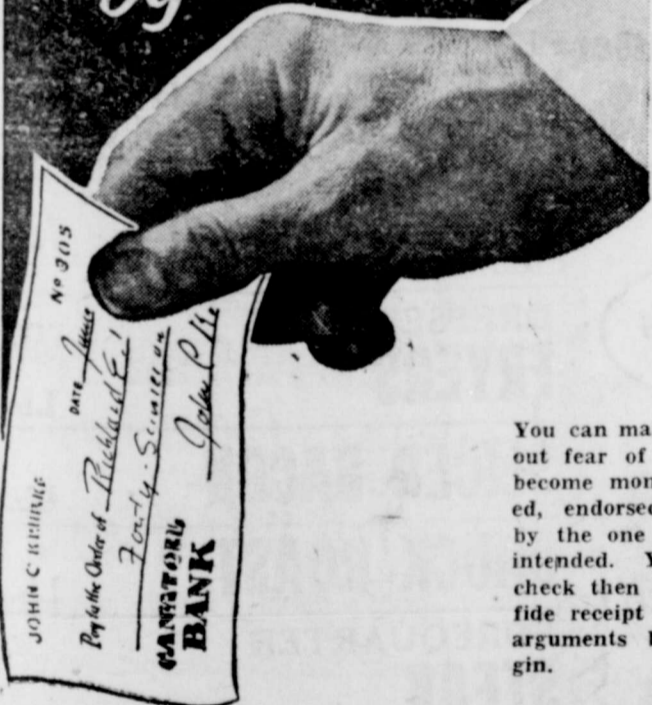

The following is submitted for the purpose of giving information concerning the proposed school bond issue which will be voted upon by the tax payers of the Goldthwaite Independent School District on Saturday, June 6, 1953 in the Commissioners Court Room of Mills County Courthouse. Why Is There A Need For A Bond Issue At This Time?

The present high school building is in a poor state of repair, it has served well for forty years but is wholly inadequate for present day needs, our elementary school built some fifteen years after our high school was constructed must be repaired or else it too will become unsafe, and our furniture is inadequate.

How Will Approval Of The Bond Issue Affect Our Situation?

The proposed bond issue will enable the school district to erect a new high school building with a home-making department, agriculture department, science laboratory, commercial department, music department and sufficient class rooms to accommodate even an increase in school enrollment. Too, the walls of the Elementary School, that was constructed in the late twenties, are poor and leak water when it rains. These walls could be plastered on inside and waterproofed on outside, thus making the building good for another span of many years.

What Is The Amount Of The Proposed Bond Issue?

The tax payers will be asked to approve a bond issue of \$190,000.00 for the new building and renovation of the present elementary building together with new furnishing where required.

Will The Amount Be Sufficient?

It is estimated that the proposed new building will cost \$170,000.00, thus leaving \$20,000.00 for renovation of old buildings and new furnishings.

IS THERE ROOM IN THE NEW PROPOSED BUILDING FOR AN OVERFLOW FROM ELEMENTARY GRADES SHOULD CONDITIONS THERE WARRANT A CHANGE?

Yes, consideration has been given the fact that it may become necessary to move the eighth and even the seventh grade to the new building should an average of fifty pupils be reached in each of the first six grades.

How Will These Bonds Be Financed?

The schedule for retiring the bonds is given below. This schedule incorporates the payment of our present bonded indebtedness of approximately \$90,000.00. You will note that a small amount is due for the top of the bonds and getting

heavier only after a lot of the present bonds are retired thus requiring about \$14,000.00 annually for retirement of all the bonds until 1984. Thus at an average of our present valuation of \$3,000,000.00 the 50c allowable for bonds will easily meet our payments.

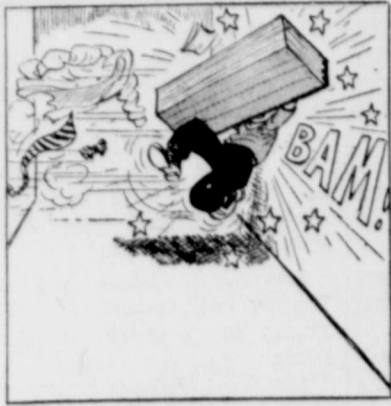

New Fishing Law Passed For Mills County

A bill making it unlawful to take any fish by seine, net or trap in Mills or San Saba counties was signed into law effective May 26, 1953, Game Warden D. W. (Blackie) Bowers has been notified.

Violators are to be fined not less than \$25 nor more than \$200 upon conviction.

Bowers received notification of the new law Wednesday last week from W. J. Cutbirth Jr., assistant executive secretary of the Texas Game Fish Commission.

The Law, House Bill No. 874, as amended, reads as follows:

"Section 1—From and after the passage of the Act it shall be unlawful to take any fish

from any public stream in Mills and San Saba Counties by use of a seine, net or trap. Provided, however, that nothing in this Act shall mean it is unlawful to seine for minnows in said river if such seine is no longer than 20 feet and has

no more depth than 20 feet. "Section 2—Any person who violates any provision of this Act shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than \$25 nor more than \$200."

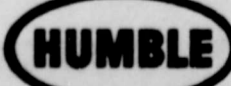

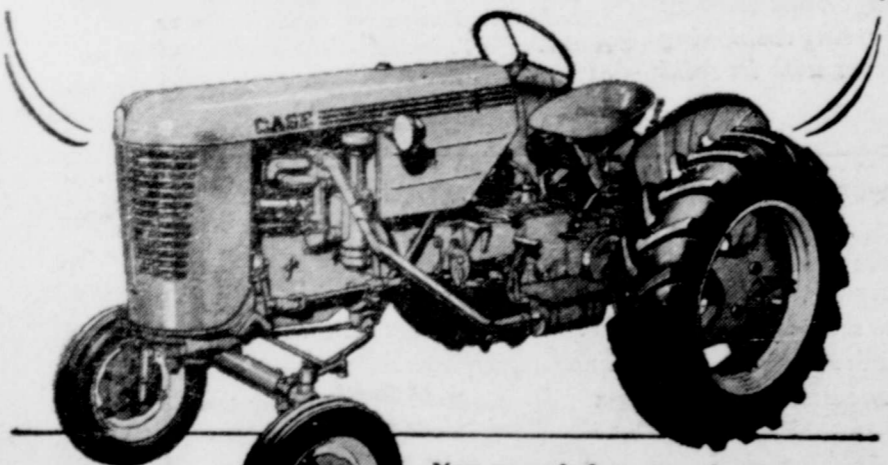
