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Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

General Collins Pictures Immense Aid Given Allies Supplies Shipped Overseas Total Five Million Tons

WASHINGTON-A concrete picture of just what foreign military aid really means was given senators by Gen. J. Lawton Collins, retiring Army chief of staff.

Collins said that since 1950, it has meant that the Army has shipped to the Allies overseas five million tons of supplies that included:

Almost 25,000 tanks and combat vehicles; more than 65,000 radios and radar items; almost 25,000 pieces of artillery; more than 130,000 motor transport vehicles, and almost one and a half million small arms and machine guns.

● EAST IS EAST-On domestic matters, President Eisenhower and Senate leader Robert A. Taft seem to be working together very harmoniously.

However, in the field of foreign policy they are very obviously poles apart and from all indications will stay that way.

The tip-off came in Mr. Eisenhower's blunt statement to a news conference that Taft's opinions on the advisability of taking future action in Korea without regard for the United Nations specifically did not represent administration thinking.

Taft, though, wasn't back-tracking. If anything, his subsequent statements reaffirmed his own views in even stronger language.

● BASEBALL LEGISLATION-Many legislative authorities in Washington predict the friends of baseball in both houses of Congress will start a drive to have legislation passed to specifically exempt baseball and all other professional sports, from all provisions of federal anti-trust laws.

The impetus behind this drive is the recent decision of the Supreme Court to review its 1922 decision in which baseball was termed a sport rather than a business.

The question of the status of professional sports, particularly baseball, has come to the fore in recent years through a number of court cases charging that certain parts of baseball player contracts, or a restriction of baseball television or radio broadcasts, are restraints of trade and violations of anti-trust laws.

● AIR CUT-Air Force brass in the Pentagon are circulating the story that President Eisenhower himself is behind the \$5 billion cut in Air Force appropriations.

They believe that the President, who was a ground general during his Army life, feels the Army must build up its armored force to a point where it might have a chance against the highly-vaunted Russian juggernaut.

They say he thinks American armored forces are woefully inadequate and that the North Atlantic Treaty countries, which were supposed to build up great ground forces, have not met their obligations on this score.

● RUSSIAN GI-An American who associated often with the Russians during World War II says the Russian soldier "is the most naive and the most uninform individual" he ever met.

Former Senator Harry P. Cain (R), Washington, declared he was also impressed with the "childlike" attitude of Russian officers.

Cain, a former Army colonel, saw service in North Africa, Sicily, Italy, France and other Western European countries. He served also at Eisenhower's supreme headquarters. Cain came to know the Russians quite well. He said he ate and talked with them many times in an effort to find a way "to resolve the great and trying problem of peace and war."

THE DWINDLING RAINS

Texas' below-average rainfall has had this result:

Feed crops and pastures are deteriorating over most of the state as moisture reserves run out. Dry conditions are now general over Texas.

Temperatures of 100 degrees and above have fired maturing feed and wilted late crops. In the west and northwest, dry-land feed and cotton are barely holding on.

Early corn in the north and east has suffered. Late corn desperately needs rain.

Plains area sorghums have been burned by hot dry winds and much of the acreage has been lost to blowing sand. Continued drought has hurt commercial vegetable crops in all areas. Scattered showers have brought only temporary relief. Both surface and subsoil moisture is depleted in a great many areas.

What has been our rainfall this year which has caused such a dismal picture?

The state's average rainfall is 45.37 inches. The last "good year" was in 1950 when the average was 40.22 of rain evenly distributed.

In 1951, the first onset of the present drought, only 27.23 inches of rain fell. The following year, 37.06 inches were received but it was poorly placed—most

of it soaked East Texas and left other areas dry.

The most recent 1953 report revealed that we had received some 10.21 inches of poorly distributed rain. At the same time last year an average of 10.32 had fallen. The normal at this period of the year is 12.03 inches.

With the exception of one month, the Upper South High Plains area has gone some 33 months without receiving the normal amount of moisture. Some South Texas and Western Plateau states have been below average for 24 months.

Weather experts estimate it would take two months of "very wet weather" to restore some of these counties to normal crop and pasture conditions.

There is little, if anything, that we can do to remedy the situation. The farmer and rancher can only keep his eye on weather developments and make his plans accordingly.

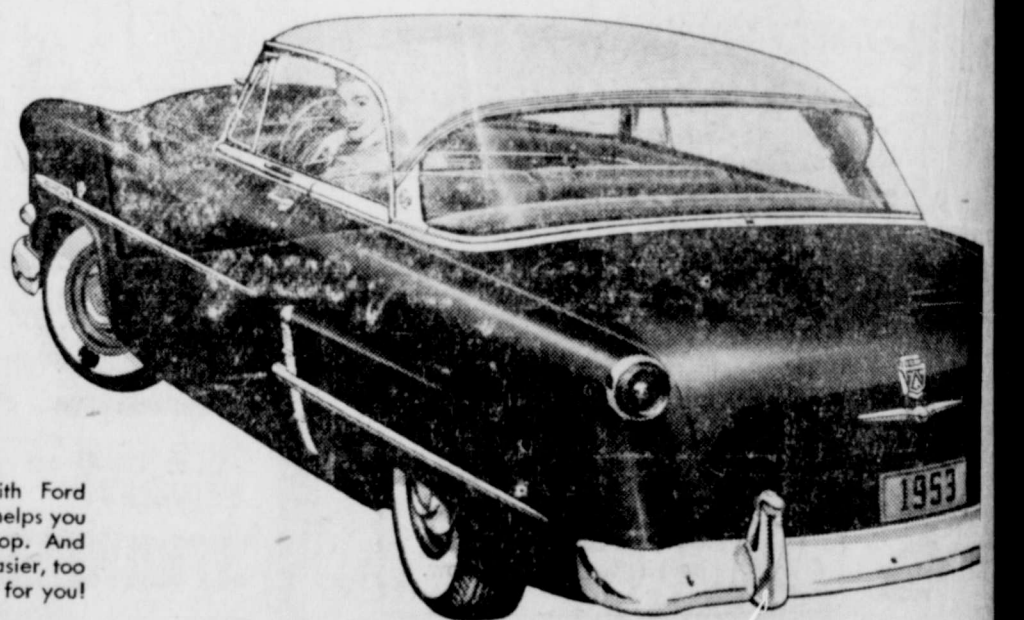

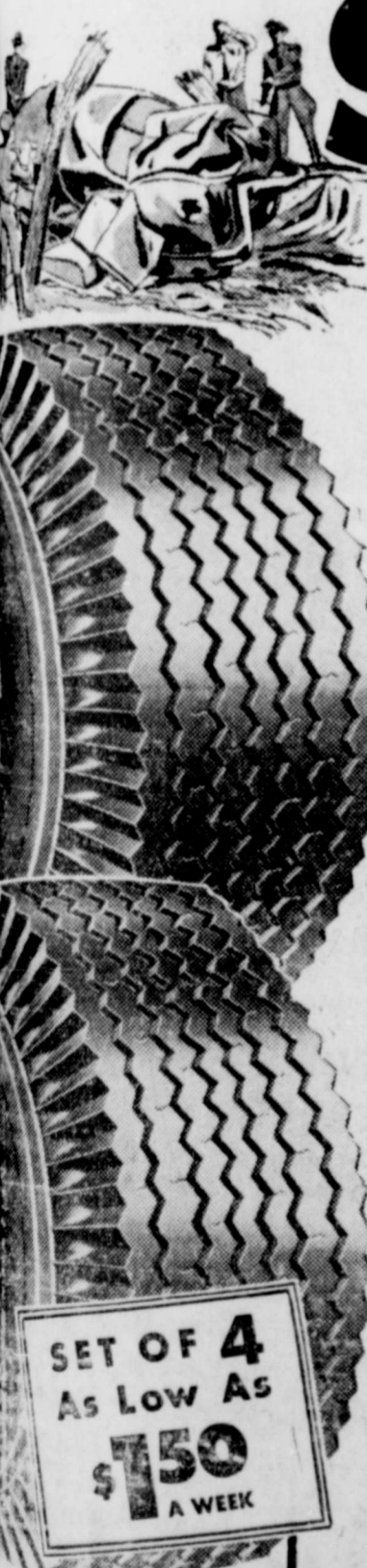

Early Days In Goldthwaite Are Recalled By One Of Pioneer Settlers

The first time I ever saw Goldthwaite, I was very small. Everyone at that time went in wagons either drawn by horses or oxen. My father let me come with him to see the city.

All buildings were either brush arbors or tents with cloth tops, plank walls and plank floors. We came over the mountain east of town. There were no buildings on that side of the railroad. We had to drive down one corn ridge as it was all in a field.

The first thing I saw after crossing the railroad was a little three room house, located right where Wyatt Berry now lives. I think Lawyer Williams lived there. They had a little canary bird in a cage that was hanging on the porch. My father stopped and let me see the bird.

Two of my brothers, Ben and Henry Virden, helped build the railroad from Lampasas to Goldthwaite. Henry is still living.

The first reunion ever held in Goldthwaite was held on the hill in front of Barnett's place. They had a brush arbor for the speaker and band, which was from Lampasas. A lady wearing a purple dress played in the band. I thought the dress was the prettiest one I had ever seen and longed to grow

up so I could have one like it. I think the speakers were Brother Harralson and Lawyer Williams. I do not remember the others.

The first time I ever attended church at the Methodist Church in Goldthwaite, three couples from Pleasant Grove rode horseback to Goldthwaite to hear Joe Bloodworth preach. He preached here two Sundays, at Center City and Pleasant Grove one Sunday. We liked him very much. Goldthwaite Methodist Church was very small, had homemade seats and a small organ. There was no choir at that time.

In later years we settled in Goldthwaite. My husband was in the marble business. His first shop was where Luther Booker lives. Ben Geeslin was sheriff and lived in the jail. Edward and Frank Geeslin were little boys then and they were my husband's helpers from early morning until he closed the shop at night.

We owned several places in Goldthwaite before we settled on the side of the mountain close to Frizzelle's. We have been near neighbors for 57 years and I would not trade them for any others. Since I have lived here so many of my dearest friends have passed on, which is a reminder to us that we must also be ready to pay the debt when our time come.

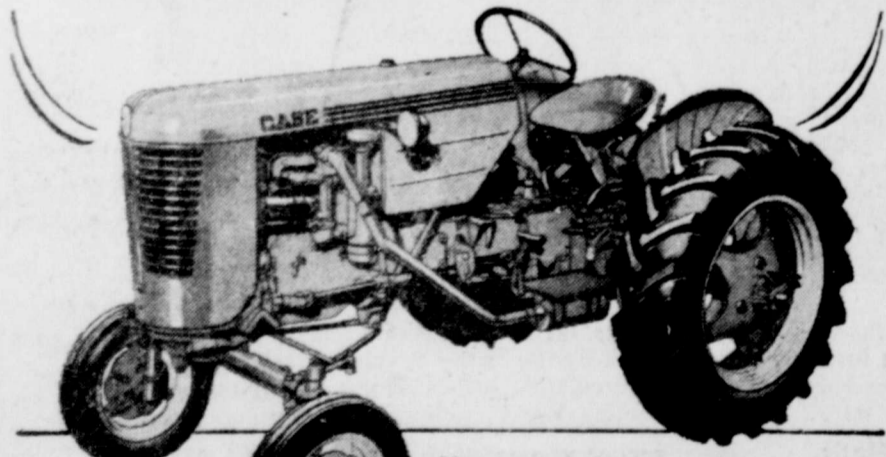
