## County Wide Barbecue Thursday Eve; Judge James K. Evetts Is Speaker

The county-wide barbecue which has been in the making for the past several weeks will be held Thursday evening (today) at six o'clock in the park area near the new municipal swimming pool in Goldthwaite. Although the pool has been open for business since July 10, this will mark the official opening and dedication of the pool and park and serve to give folks of Mills County an opportunity to see the project as it has been developed to date and the possibilities of further development.

## Work Started Monday On New P. O. Building

Construction of the new building to house the Post Office, in Goldthwaite, got underway Monday morning of this week. The building is being erected on lots located on the corner of the Parker and Fourth Streets intersection, on the northwest corner of the Courthouse Square.

Legal details concerning the construction contract were closed Thursday of last week, according to announcement by Wm. G. Yarborough, attorney, who represented parties involved. In making the announcement he stated that while contracts were completed Thursday, in keeping with an old superstition in the construction business not to begin a building on Friday, work was delayed until Monday morning.

Oscar T. Burns is the owner of the new building and has leased it to the Post Office department. W. T. Barnes, Barnes Construction Company, DeLeon, Texas, is the contractor with Tom L. Hill supervisor of the project.

District Judge Jim Evetts will be the principal speaker for the occasion, according to announcement by the swimming pool board of trustees. The program will be presented in the park and Free Barbecue with all the trimmings will be served immediately following the program.

Members of the city council, the swimming pool committee and a large number of interested citizens have been putting forth much effort for a number of weeks, and especially the past three days, getting the pool and surrounding park area shaped up as much as possible for this event.

Although the Lions Club spearheaded the barbecue, the entire community has given it full support with committee work details delegated over a large number of volunteer workers.

Members of the general committee are: Grady Carothers, Charles Conrad, Dr. T. C. Graves, Cecil Bradley and Jesse Moreland.

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**ZOOS ARE SECURE**  
This brief but significant little item appeared on the editorial page of the Coatesville, Pennsylvania, Record: "Four zoo-reared timber wolves, members of a normally proud and resourceful species, were reduced to raiding garbage cans when released on a wooded island in Lake Superior recently. The security of life in the zoo apparently had deadened their initiative and they could no longer depend on their hunting instincts to provide food. Which should teach a moral: 'People, too, can be pampered and petted too much.'"  
That is a telling commentary on the "cradle to the grave" security philosophy. What it always produces is the deadly security of the zoo or the jail.

**TYPICAL EXAMPLE**  
The following brief editorial appeared in the Herald and Clipper, Marcus Hook, Pennsylvania: "The Government Accounting Office recently reported that the purchase of two baffle plates for \$2.79 by the New York Post Office was listed and documented by nine papers, bearing 24 signatures or initials, and 20 datings, and that the documentation took four months to process."  
"This is but one of the typical examples of bureaucracy, which closely resembles what old soldiers refer to as Army red tape. . . . The only thing we can do is to point out this one example in the hope that it will disgust the right people as much as it disgusts us."

**Bermuda Confab Jinxed?** | **New Developments During**  
**Now Looks That Way!** | **Delay Changing Outlook**

WASHINGTON—Some diplomats are beginning to look on the Bermuda Western Big Three conference as a jinxed affair. It has now been postponed twice—once to allow the French time to select a new premier, and a second time because of British Prime Minister Sir Winston Churchill's health.  
The two postponements mean at least a seven-week delay during which time world events, particularly in Korea, have placed an entirely different light on what may be accomplished when the talks are eventually held.  
Some diplomats take the view that the delays may serve to keep the Korean situation from becoming further agitated and that there is no need for a speedy Bermuda conference in view of present truce difficulties.  
When the conference was originally announced there were high hopes for a speedy truce, but Korea's President Syngman Rhee's release of anti-Communist POWs has erected a monumental roadblock to this accomplishment. The new delay has given Western Powers time to wrestle with the thorny problem of how to achieve a truce without Rhee, while trying to make the hard-bitten old Oriental patriot change his mind.

● **FBI FUNDS**—Despite current economy drives and next year's congressional elections you can expect a concerted effort to appropriate more money for the FBI in 1954.  
The drive for extra funds will not be pushed by the bureau itself as much as in Congress where members are astounded at the burden each G-man carries. Year after year the Justice department asks the bare minimum for J. Edgar Hoover's agency and Congress promptly approves what is asked.  
But in House testimony recently, Hoover explained—it was not a complaint by any means—just how it is possible for the FBI to exist on so little as it does.  
He said his agents worked a total of 2,849,016 hours of voluntary, unpaid overtime last year that could have cost the government \$9 million or more above salary payments.  
In addition, each agent is responsible for an average of 20 cases. In 1950, Hoover testified, it was 15 cases per man. He added: "A proper load would be 16 cases a man."  
This testimony shocked congressmen. Many of them promptly vowed to see what can be done about improving the FBI's lot next year.

● **TESTING TERMITES**—Congress was recently fascinated to find that the government's odd and far-flung undertakings include an "experimental cemetery."  
It has maintained in the canal zone by the Smithsonian Institution as part of the program for termite study and control. The "cemetery" consists of rows of upright posts which look like gravestones, half buried in the soil.  
They have been used in over 35,000 tests to find out which of 42 species of termites eat different kinds of wood treated with various repellents and poisons. One of the insects even eats lead.

● **INCOME BOOMS**—Americans are making more money than ever this year. The Office of Business Economics said personal income is now at the annual rate of \$281 billion, a rise of \$4 billion during the first three months of the year over the preceding quarter.  
Wages and salaries provided the greatest source of income for Americans in general. The annual rate is now \$192 billion. Of the \$4 billion rise in the first quarter of 1953, approximately \$3.5 billion represents increased wages and salaries.  
However, before you get too optimistic, the government also reports that living costs have been inching back up to all-time highs in the past few months.

Mid-June index of prices received by Texas farmers for their products dropped 5.7 percent from the previous month, according to the Department of Agriculture. ## TODAY'S Menu

### Spicy Sauces for Barbecues

**BARBECUES** are in full bloom—in backyards, on picnic grounds, just everywhere in the open when good fellows and amateur chefs get together.

As for the job itself, there are two kinds. One is the classic type redolent of the West, with a deep pit dug in the ground and a large cut of meat roasting slowly on a revolving spit. Then, for most of us, there is the small-scale barbecue to suit those sites where the great open spaces are not so wide. These small-scale barbecues feature hamburgers, steaks and franks broiled across a charcoal grill.

**Rump Roast of Beef**

A truly traditional barbecue is a time-taking task, but it's all part of the fun. A rump roast of beef about 12 pounds makes a royal barbecue. Shoulder of lamb is delicious, too. Marinate the meat ahead of time in a barbecue sauce consisting of ketchup, chili sauce, water and seasonings.

For an excellent sauce, combine 3/4 c. tomato ketchup, 3/4 c. water, 2 tsp. vinegar, 2 tsp. Worcestershire, tsp. salt, dash of cayenne, tsp. paprika, 1/2 tsp. black pepper and tsp. chili.

For good barbecued hamburgers, form ground beef, chopped onion and seasonings to suit into large, thick patties. Arrange on charcoal grill. Grill for 25 minutes, basting with barbecue

sauce, and turning after 15 minutes. Serve on toasted rolls.

**Barbecued Franks**

A special recipe for barbecued franks calls for a tangy sauce.

For 6 servings, brown 1/2 c. chopped onion in 2 tsp. salad oil. Add 1/2 c. lemon juice, tsp. vinegar, 1/2 c. ketchup, tsp. each mustard and celery salt, 1/4 c. honey, 1/2 c. water and tsp. Worcestershire sauce; simmer 30 minutes.

Arrange 2 pounds frankfurters on long metal skewers. Place 6 inches above glowing coals of barbecue pit and broil for 45 minutes, brushing with barbecue sauce and turning every 15 min.

Veal Chops with Savory Butter is a somewhat different barbecue recipe when a change from franks and hamburgers is in order.

**Veal Shoulder Chops**

To serve 6, have 6 veal shoulder chops cut one inch thick. Thoroughly blend 4 tsp. dry mustard, tsp. finely chopped onion, tsp. finely chopped parsley and 1/2 c. soft butter; shape into a roll and chill until hard. Combine 1/2 c. chili sauce, 1/2 c. lemon juice and tsp. salt. Arrange chops for barbecuing 12 to 14 inches above glowing coals. Broil for 45 minutes, brushing with chili sauce mixture every 15 minutes. Turn chops once 20 minutes before they are done. Slice butter roll into 6 pieces. Place one slice on top of each hot chop and serve immediately.

**PARENT PROBLEMS**

**Social Service Point of View Noted in Returning Veterans**

IT'S truly wonderful the way some teachers and principals, even in the elementary grades, keep in touch with their former pupils now serving in the armed forces. The number of boys on furlough or on returning to civilian status at the end of their periods of military service, who go to see these teachers and principals, is a great tribute to them.

At the February convention of the nation's school leaders at Atlantic City, I heard something which greatly heartened me. At a table during the banquet of the American Education Research Association, of which I am a member, sat a number of persons of wide experience in research and practical education. We got talking about young men returning as civilians after serving in uniform in Korea, and not about statistics.

**Swing to Social Service**

A lady sitting next to me, an elementary school principal in Lincoln, Nebraska, made this observation: "Many of my former boys returning from Korea have a marked social service point of view. Some of them are studying to be teachers, some entering the ministry, some social work. A few of them are participating in civic affairs of the community." She seemed to have no doubt about a prevailing attitude of social service among these returning boys who once were pupils in her school.

A few other persons at this table asserted they had observed

some similar indications among returning veterans. One man suggested that the poverty and deprivation of the South Koreans these boys had seen might have been a contributory factor.

**Something Significant**

Since hearing those remarks, I have been asking other persons about this matter, and the response has caused me to believe there might be something significant here, though I know, of course, that one tends to find what one keeps looking for.

Perhaps you, my readers, have an angle to this. Have you observed any such indications or trends?

If these exist, they may have some relation to the apparent awakening the country over to the enduring values of moral and spiritual ideals, the decline of cynicism about our nation's place in world affairs.

**Emphasis on Individual**

Certainly, awareness of the values furthered by our emphasis on the precociousness of the individual person in contrast with the opposite doctrine of communism has been growing, and our trust in the miracles of sciences as the sole medium for the good of mankind has been waning.

A further interest we parents have is in what our youths of high school age are thinking and feeling about these matters. How much have we parents and teachers had to do with their attitude as they look forward to their probable entrance into the armed forces? What have been your observations?

**TEXAS FEDERAL COOPERATION**

Should Texas abide by all the projects and directives from Washington? Which joint programs are the most worthwhile? The answer is obvious in some cooperatives projects now in operation within our state. Certainly the commodity market news which keeps producers informed on current prices is aided immeasurably by joint federal-state efforts. And no one objects when U. S. aid is rushed to states paralyzed by drought.

But where does federal cooperation end and federal encroachment begin? A prime case in point is the Texas-Federal Fruit & Vegetable Inspection Service. An average of a half-million dollars is involved in this project annually. This money is collected in Texas from Texas vegetable growers and shippers. It is of vital importance particularly in East and South Texas and other areas where commercial vegetables and fruits are grown. In return, the products are inspected and graded in a uniform manner. This allows qual-

ity Texas fruits and vegetables to be shipped out-of-state where they command prices comparable to those received by products from all other areas of the country.

This program is valuable and needed by all phases of the fruit and vegetable industry. Yet the question arises— who should control the functions of such a joint project? The obvious answer is that both parties should at least have 50-50 "right". But here is how the situation stands at present.

The most recent agreement with the federal government was drawn up and signed August 1, 1949. Under its terms, the federal authorities exercise almost complete control over state employees hired on the project. Federal agents can even veto expenditures of money believed necessary by state agents. And some 10 per cent of this Texas money is funneled directly into federal coffers.

The State Department of Agriculture has submitted a new contract to the federal government in the hope of remedying some of these defects. Texas money collected for Texas projects should be spent in Texas. Texas authorities should have control over their own state employees. But to date, officials of the U. S. D. A. Fruits & Vegetables Branch have refused to sign the contract—a contract which is in every way similar to those of other states where the cooperative project exists.

Texas deserves the rights granted other states. The present contract is a perfect example of federal encroachment.

**Social Security Representative To Be Here July 29**

A representative of the Social Security Administration will visit Goldthwaite on July 29, 1953 at 1:00 p. m., according to James B. Marley, manager of the Austin office. He will be at the District Court Room at the time specified to give information and service in connection with all phases of the Federal Old-Age and Survivors Insurance program.

The Austin office is particularly desirous of contacting those salaried and self-employed people who are thinking of retiring this year and claiming their benefits on the basis of their work and earnings since January 1, 1951. The office explains that technicalities in the law make it advisable for all such workers to obtain full information about their individual cases in order to satisfy themselves as to the most advantageous time for filing their application.

**Funeral Services Held Wednesday For Mamie Jane Wood**




