Loans will be made in amounts of \$2,500 and more, at 5 percent interest for periods up to 3 years for the purchase of feed, seed and other operating expenses. They can be renewed if renewal is found to be in the best interest of the farmer and the Government. The loan funds cannot be used to refinance debts the farmers already owe.

When a farmer applies for a livestock loan, his creditors will not be asked to subordinate their claims to the Government. However, they will be expected a long enough period to enable the farmer to have a reasonable chance of recovery.

The Secretary will set up special loan committees to serve a whole state or a few counties,

When the Secretary of Agriculture finds that farmers force of an economic disastersuch as a substantial price decline - to the extent they cannot get needed credit from local sources to carry on farming operations, he can authorize loans to meet that need.

Large areas of Texas and Oklahoma and parts of Colorado, Kansas, New Mexico and Arkanses have recently been designated as major disaster areas.

Emergency loans to help farmers hit by economic disester will be similar to the disaster loans now being made by the Farmers Home Administration to farmers who have suffered production losses from natural disasters as drouth, flood and windstorms. New loans will be made only during the period of emergency. Lending will be handled by the Farmers Home Administration offices. Credit will be available at rates and terms to be established by the Secretary.

The new legislation also provides that in the future whatever expense the Government bears in supplying feed and seed in disaster areas will be borne by a disaster loan revolving fund under the jurisdiction of the Secretary of Agriculture. In the past this expense had been carried by the President's emergency fund.

The other two new programs will also be financed out of the disaster revolving fund. About \$16 million is available at the present time. A request for additional funds is being made.

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AN EXAMPLE FOR US ALL

Local chambers of commerce, like other organizations, often cry loudly for sharp cuts in government spending as a general policy - and then protest violently at proposed retrenchment which will affect their own areas.

However, there are honorable exceptions to this, and a group of Indiana communities recently provided an example which deserves widespread praise and emulation.

The Army decided to close Camp Atterbury, which meant that three Indiana municipalities, Indianapolis among them would directly feel the loss of a big payroll. It might have been expected that the chambers of commerce involved would move heaven and earth in an attempt to get the decision rescinded. The opposite was the case. All three chambers recognized that economy must begin at home. The president of the Indianapolis chamber wrote the Secretary of Defense pledging support to the action "regardless of its immediate effect upon this locality." His letter continued: "We regard the necessity for economy in federal spending as most urgent, secondary only to the requirements of adequate defense of our country against a foreign army This is an occasion where those who urge reducing federal spending should show they mean what they say

Foresee 'Copter Playing Big Role in A-Warfare Flying Windmills Proved Value in Korea Fighting

Special to Central Press

WASHINGTON—An important role in atomic warfare has been mapped out for the helicopter which has demonstrated its value as a life-saving craft in the Korean war.

Army transportation officers reported in testimony before a Senate committee that the helicopter is the ideal means of moving men to the front after an atomic attack-if one has to be made in future war. Speed at such time, they said, is most important because an

attacking force must move before the enemy is able to recover from the "high shock" of an atomic attack and regroup its forces. Brig. Gen. Paul F. Yount, acting chief of Army

transportation, said: "The helicopter with its ability to overpass destroyed roads and bridges, and deliver troops into an area 20 or 30 miles away in a matter of minutes, offers the only solution to this problem.

In the Korean war, the 'copter, which aviation experts have long predicted will play an important role in civilian flying, has come into its own-bringng food and other supplies to men in mountain utposts and rescuing the injured from isolated

6 SAVING BY ACCIDENT-The taxpayers' billions and millions do some strange tricks when military budget makers make their calculations. Take the case of the B-47 jet bomber -delayed for six months before production started. The unforeseen block saved taxpayers at least \$100 million, the Pentagon experts

When the new bomber first began coming off the assembly lines, Gen. Curtis LeMay objected because it did not have a tail gun. Designing and installing the gun took six more months. The setback in the production program meant fewer planes, so there were fewer lost in training accidents.

Budget makers can show-by compilations from records-that if the scheduled number of the B-47s had been produced and if the expected 1 mber of crashes had occurred, these alone would have cost an extra \$100 million. The big planes cost \$2,300,000 each and many crashes involve damage without serious casualties.

The accountants can also show that since in the normal course of events, the plane will become obsolete in five years, billions of dollars will be saved because a smaller number of B-47s will be produced. The current rate of production is about 600 a year.

It is not quite clear whether such savings are real or just something that affects budget-making, but at least the conclusion can be drawn that unfavorable delays, miscalculations and accidents in starting production provide a favorable action in the current budget.

• THE CHINESE SOLDIER-The Army has compiled statistics on the average Chinese Communist soldier fighting in Korea. He is a simple peasant, about five feet, seven inches tall, weighing 140 pounds. The average Red army man of China is neither a fighting demon nor a "dyed-in-the-wool intellectual professing the Marxist doctrine."

Instead, according to the Army description he is:
"In all probability, a farmer in his mid-20s. He cannot read or write. He gripes about incessant night marches, bad treatment from his officers, lack of equate clothing and medical care, the frequent

UN air attacks and the lack of Red air support. 'His chief concern is not for the ideological principles involved in the struggle nor the absurd Communist charge of 'imperialistic aggression.' His main interest is staying alive and being able to obtain bis daily quota of grain, rice, fried flour and millet."

He has little in the way of amusement, virtually no contact with civilians in North Korea and leads an austere and disciplined life.







These self-employed workers have retirement protection if they reach age 65 and retire before mid-1955. Future selfemployment will extend the period of protection for these workers and their families at the rate of two years of protection for every year engaged in completed 10 full years in covered employment either as a wage earner in the employ of another, or as a self-employed individual, he and his family will be permanently insured for life. The amount of the family payment, however, is dependent on the amount of employment and the amount of wages or net earning from self-emtime of retirement or death Under existing law, the minimum monthly family payment is \$45, while the maximum is
