about 87% in favor of Quotas. The Secretary of Agriculture has said that due to the large percentage in favor of Wheat Marketing Quotas, that he will carry out a rigid Marketing Quota Program.

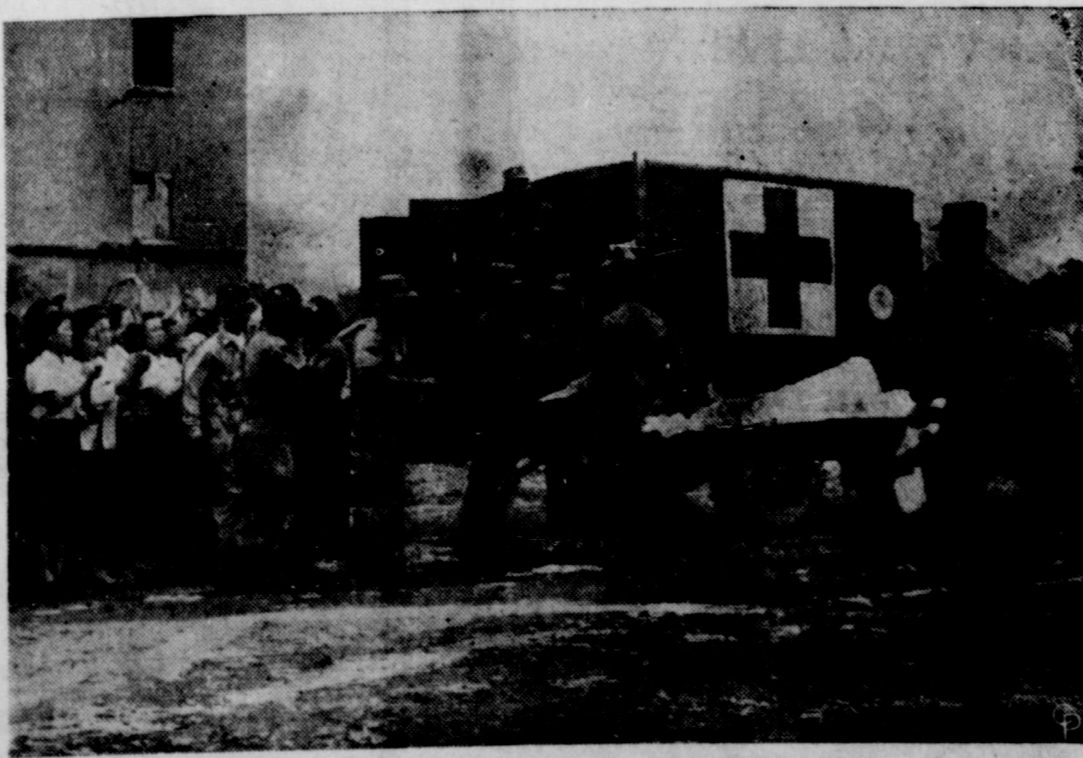
Due to the Quotas voted in, wheat farmers must plant within their allotments or 15 acres, whichever is greater, or they will owe a penalty on the excess acreage. Wheat will be supported at 90% of parity for all who plant within their allotments.

Here is something to keep in mind. Producers who have no wheat allotments or have less than a 15 acre allotment and seeds over 15 acres, say 16 or 17 acres, he will owe the penalty on all 16 or 17 acres and will not be exempt on 15 acres of it. Same applies to the less than 15 acre allotment farm. If the allotment is 10 acres and the farm is seeded with 13 acres of wheat, the penalty will be owed on 16 acres and not just 1 acre, which could be supposed.

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SIGNS OF LIFE

America, generally speaking, is a sign-conscious nation.

We depend on the convenience of signs in thousands of phases of our daily lives. Signs tell us prices in stores, advertise merchandise in shop windows, speed up all our methods of conducting business.

And signs help us maintain order in countless little ways. For instance, if there were no signs it might be difficult — almost impossible — to keep people from walking on the grass, disposing of trash where they shouldn't, smoking in forbidden places, loitering in busy buildings, posting bills on telegraph poles, talking and shouting in libraries and hospitals.

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Look for Strong U. S. Hand At Korea Peace Conference | New Slate of Joint Chiefs Experts on Asia Operations

WASHINGTON—The United States is determined to play a strong hand at the post-armistice conference on Korea's future and the larger issue of future Communist aggression in Asia.

The Communists will be asked, in emphatic terms, for guarantees that they will keep the peace.

Backing up the stern United States attitude will be a new slate of joint chiefs of staff, all experts on military operations in Asia.

Adm. Arthur W. Radford, new JCS chairman, comes to that post from command of the Pacific fleet. Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway, Army chief of staff, fought the Communists as supreme United States commander in the Far East.

Adm. Robert B. Carney, chief of naval operations, held high operational posts in the Pacific during World War II and is credited with having planned some of the most devastating strikes against the Japanese.

Gen. Nathan F. Twining, Air Force chief, was one of Gen. Douglas MacArthur's key airmen and is as familiar with top targets in Red Asia as any military man alive.

AIR BATTLE—Several senators have protested a Civil Aeronautics Board crackdown on non-scheduled airlines. They contend it is a drive against independent small business operating without government subsidy.

The loudest protest came from Sen. William Langer (R), North Dakota, chairman of the judiciary committee, who declared the CAB is "inviting the loudest explosion from Congress that any of these administrative agencies have heard in a long time."

Langer threatened an investigation by the anti-trust and monopoly subcommittee of the judiciary committee. Other senators who have protested the CAB action include Wayne Morse (Ind.), Oregon, and Thomas C. Hennings, Jr. (D), Missouri.

The hassle started when the CAB accused one of the largest independent airlines, North American, with operating more flights than it was authorized to do, and demanded that the company show cause why its license should not be revoked.

Langer contends the issue is "monopoly in the air."

DULLES—High administration sources tend to discount the rumor, circulated by Rep. Clarence Brown (R), Ohio, that John Foster Dulles is on his way out as secretary of state and that he will be replaced by Under Secretary Walter Bedell Smith.

However, men close to President Eisenhower are convinced that "Beedle" Smith is emerging as an increasingly important figure in the nation's top councils.

The chief executive is known to have enormous respect for Smith's ability. They were wartime comrades. Moreover, as a former ambassador to Moscow, Smith has first-hand knowledge of the Kremlin. Later, he did much to increase the effectiveness of the super-secret Central Intelligence Agency.

There is every evidence that Smith's star is rising in Washington.

BARGAINS IN BEEF

Steaks and other good beef cuts rate star billing on the family shopping list the rest of this month and through September.

With beef of all types more plentiful now than during any comparable period in recent years, Texans now can really indulge in their traditional fondness for this home raised product. Prices should be favorable enough to warrant laying away a good supply of meat in the deep freeze, too.

Supplies of beef during August and September will be setting new records. The hot, dry weather that prevailed over much of the cattle-raising region during the early summer has stimulated unusually heavy marketings of range cattle. This movement, added to the large supplies of fed cattle, means that the consumers are finding meat counters well stocked with attractively-priced cuts.

Judging by the quantity of livestock marketed during the past six months, and estimates of what is expected to come to market the rest of this year, consumption of beef in 1953 may be as high as 73 to 74 pounds per person. This would be a big increase over the 61 pounds per person last year and

would equal or top the 1909 record of 73.2 pounds per person.

Housewives will need very little prodding to choose beef and beef products for her family. They know that the protein in beef is needed by young and old alike, and that variety meats in particular are good sources of important vitamins and minerals. Lean beef is a valuable source of B-vitamins and of phosphorus and iron. Protein and minerals are found in beef liver, kidney and heart. And liver, with its iron and copper content, is an important blood builder.

But the best news is that after years of almost prohibitive prices, beef is now coming within the family budget. As a result, weekend chefs of both sexes who go for outdoor cookery on summer evenings will be even more active in the next few weeks.

The barbecue baron may rely on easy-to-fix hamburger sandwiches, topped with onion or tomato slices. Or he may choose the ever-popular frankfurter on toasted roll with a generous garnish of relish or sauerkraut. But grilled steaks and other cuts are expected to top the list. Whatever his preference, beef will score a hit every time.

New Licenses To Be Issued

Austin (Spec.)— Fishing and hunting licenses for the new fiscal year beginning September 1 will be distributed soon, according to the License Clerk for the Texas Game and Fish Commission.

He said the supplies, totaling over one million separate licenses, will be shipped to approximately 1,800 county clerks and licensed deputies in 254 Texas counties by August 20.

Both hunting and fishing licenses must be renewed for the new fiscal year which begins at midnight, August 31.

First sizeable demand for the hunting licenses will center around the north zone mourning dove season beginning September 1.

The twenty-eight different kinds of licenses cover all phases of hunting and fishing, ranging in cost from fifty cents for a duplicate license to \$200 for a wholesale fish dealer's license.

The License Clerk said a new addition to the hunting licenses, which is expected to prove popular in the coastal areas, calls for a \$5 five-day, non-resident license to hunt migratory waterfowl. Heretofore, non-residents desiring to hunt ducks and geese had to buy a regular \$25 non-resident hunting license.

This new non-resident hunting permit is in conformity with the previously arranged five-day non-resident fishing licenses for \$1.65 or a season's non-resident fishing license for \$5.25. Resident fishing licenses are \$1.65.

The main hunting permit costing \$2.15 is the popular one for resident Texans because it covers both big game and small game.

The License Clerk noted that the paper tags again will be used for big game since the proposed metal tags are still being tested as to their practicability.

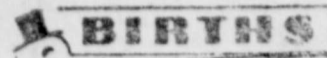
