Jail Breaker Is Still At Large

David L. Hewitt, who escaped from Mills County jail about 3:40 o'clock Tuesday morning, was still at large Wednesday afternoon, with officers on the lookout for him. He made his way from the jail after the lock to his cell was sawed off from the outside and then he cut his way from the jail tank and into the ceiling to the attic from which he jumped about 15 feet to the stairway landing.

Sheriff Stubblefield said that William Madison Head, another prisoner in the jail at the time has confessed to sawing the lock in two, planning to escape with Hewitt and later changing his mind since the jump to the stairway landing was too high.

It was announced by the sheriff that hacksaws were smuggled into the jail for this job.

Bobby Ray Foster, another prisoner in the jail at that time, was still in his separate cell when the break was discovered.

While officers were on the lookout for Hewitt a 1947 Plymouth car belonging to O. R. Gunn, 12 miles from Goldthwaite on the Lometa highway, was stolen from his home about midnight Tuesday. Stubblefield is of the opinion that the car was stolen by Hewitt who has been hiding out in the brush waiting for an opportunity to get away.

Local Officers Pick Up Stolen Car Wednesday

Mills County Sheriff C. F. "Stub" Stubblefield and his deputies were responsible for a quick pickup of two youths who had stolen a 1951 Buick car in Temple Wednesday morning and robbed a store at Arnett. They were picked up about two miles east of Goldthwaite by Stubblefield and Howard Campbell after the sheriff had received a call from J. Y. Hamilton of Evant about the car theft and the reported armed robbery, with the car heading this way.

Officers first came upon the car just this side of Center City where they failed to stop for officers. A chase of up to 105 miles per hour resulted from Center City to the point where they were apprehended. They gave up without resisting officers.

Officers from Hamilton and Gatesville along with members of the highway patrol answered the radio call and arrived shortly after they were taken by local officers.

The youthful pair was turned over to Sheriff Cummings of Gatesville.

Methodists To Hear District Official

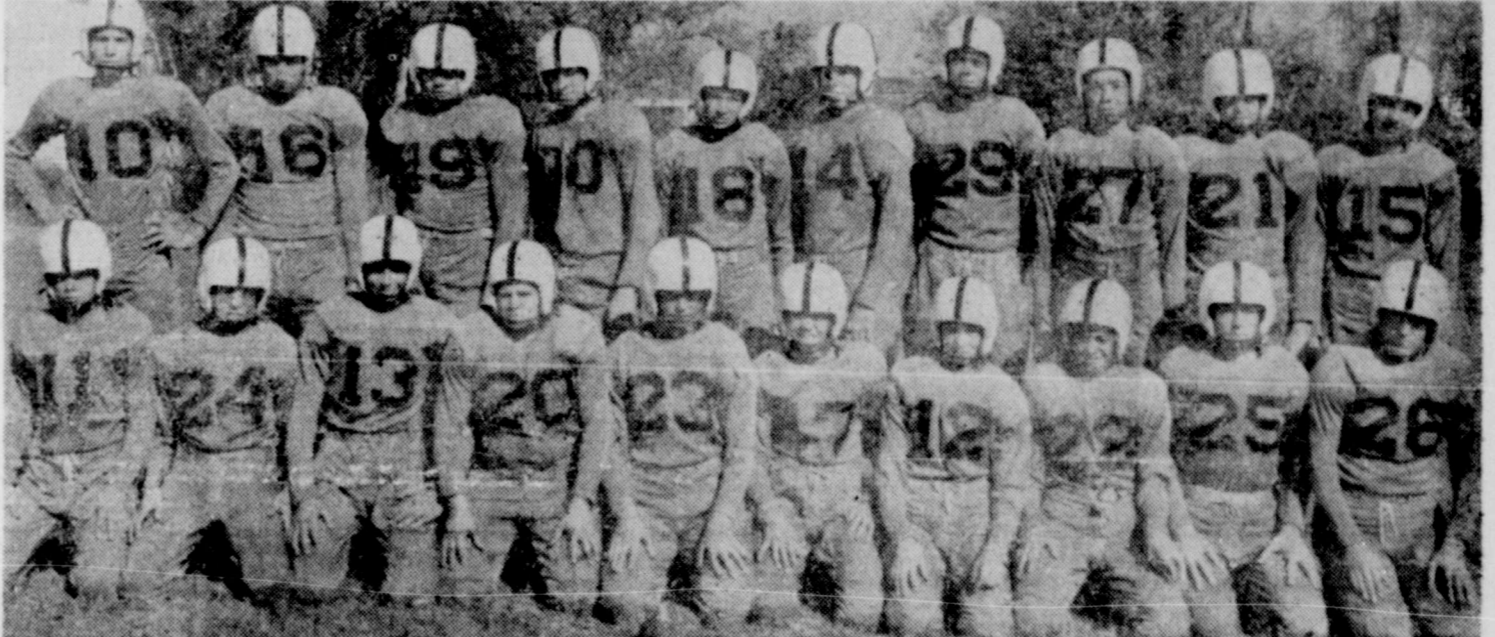
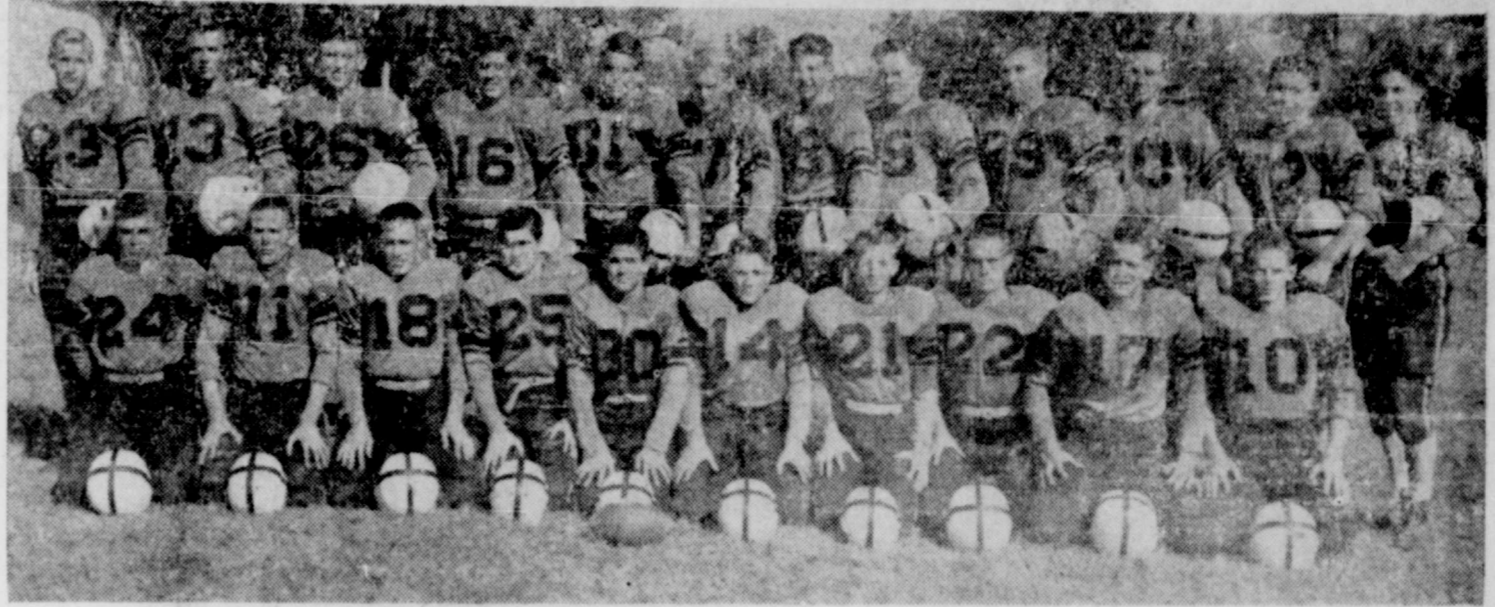

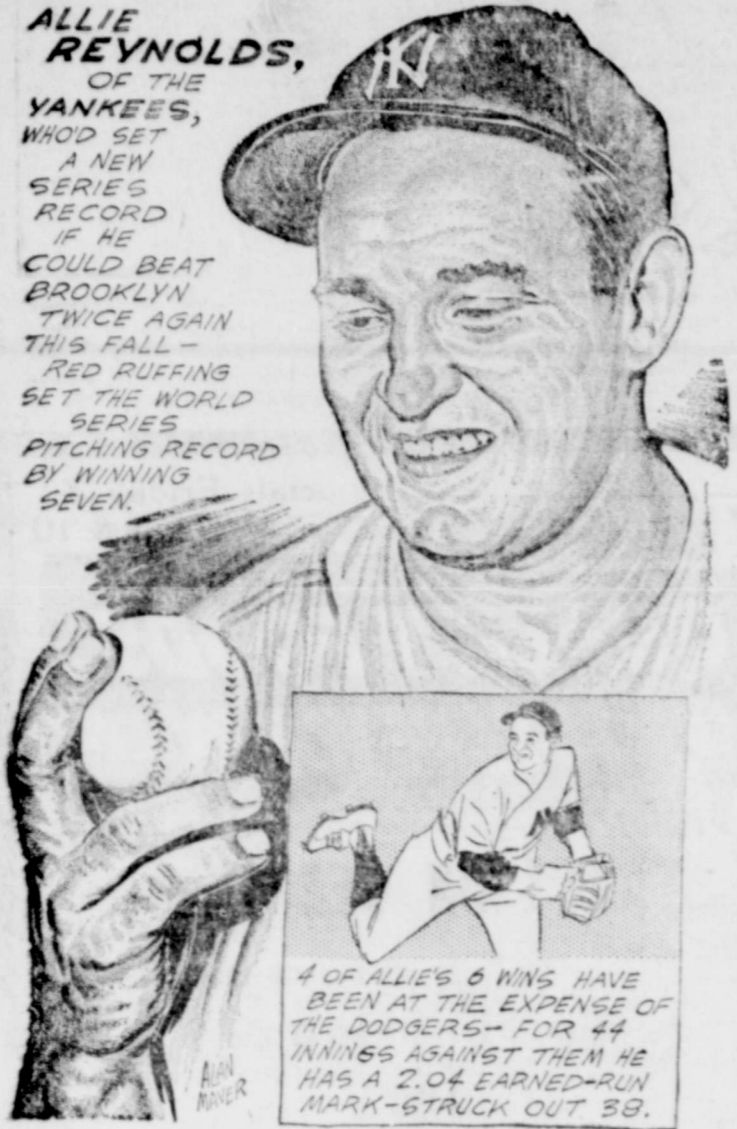

New and Delectable Cobblers

By ALICE DENHOFF
THERE are many schools of thought on the subject of that delectable dish known as the cobbler.

One prefers to make it with a pastry base. Another advocates biscuit dough. Some use two crusts; others one.

Some New Cobblers

Whenever your school, you might like to try new ways with cobblers such as the following:
To serve 6, sift once 3/4 c. sifted flour, measure, add tsp. baking powder, 1/2 tsp. salt; sift again. Cream 2 tbsp. taken from 4 tbsp. butter; add 1/2 c. sugar gradually, creaming after each addition. Add 2 tbsp. taken from 1/2 c. milk, beating thoroughly. Add flour, alternate with remaining milk, a small amount at a time, beating after each addition until smooth. Add 2 tsp. currants and 1 1/2 tsp. grated lemon rind.

Turn into well-greased baking dish (8x8x2 inches). Combine remaining butter, 1/2 c. honey, 1/4

c. water and dash of salt. Pour over batter. Bake at 350° F. 40 to 45 minutes. Serve warm with cream.

Main Dish Cobbler

A main dish cobbler is made with a bran cereal pastry.

Cut 2 lb. round steak into one-in. cubes; add 1 1/2 c. sliced onions and brown in 1/4 c. shortening. Stir in 2 tsp. salt, 1/2 tsp. pepper, 1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce, 3 tsp. chopped parsley and 2 tsp. flour, mixing well. Add 2 1/2 c. water slowly; stir constantly. Add 2 c. diced raw potatoes. Cover and simmer about 30 min. Pour into greased 8 1/2-in. casserole.

Bran Pastry

Cover with bran pastry rolled 1/4-in. thick. Prick with fork to show wedge-shaped pieces. Bake at 450° F. about 20 min.

To prepare pastry, roll 1/4 c. bran cereal until fine; combine with 1 1/2 c. flour and 1/2 tsp. salt. Cut in 1/2 c. shortening. Add 4 tsp. cold water (more or less) a little at a time, until dough is moist enough to hold together.

The Goldthwaite Eagles won their fourth straight victory of the season Friday night of last week when they defeated the Lometa Hornets with a score of 28-0. Lometa Coach Bill Milam threw in the sponge and told his players: "That's All, Boys" and forfeited the game about three minutes after the second half got under way. The Eagles were leading the Hornets at that time 27-0.

He forfeited the game after special privilege requests were denied by Goldthwaite Coach Ray Akins. Center of controversy was Johnny Clark, who was put out of the game a few minutes earlier for "slugging." Milam informed officials that unless Clark, quarterback, would be allowed to play, they would have to quit, since they didn't have a quarterback. The request was made for offensive only. After the request was relayed to Akins he informed the officials that in that case it would

be alright to let him play on offensive, but not on defensive. As soon as Goldthwaite got the ball Milam then came up with the demand that Clark be allowed to play all the rest of the game or they would forfeit the game. Coach Akins informed him that he had been met half-way, and since he had other players on the bench that could play in the defensive game there was no reason to waive further rules and he didn't feel that the request was in order and therefore couldn't go along with it. That's when Milam told his boys it was all over and they left the field.

Officials stated that in that case Goldthwaite got their 27 points plus one point for the forfeit, making a victory of 28-0.

John Gilliam made two touchdowns, one for three yards and one for 69 yards, both around end. Another touchdown made earlier by Gilliam

was called back. Bobby Elliott raced 50 yards for one touchdown and Joe Hammond made one plunging three yards. Dick Lindsay kicked three extra points out of four tries. This credits Lindsay with 16 extra points out of 19 tries this season.

The Eagles made 12 first downs against the Hornets four and in yards rushing they scored 288 against Lometa 42.

One touchdown was made during the first quarter, two during the second and one in the opening minutes of the third.

From all indications the Eagles were getting set for a run-away score during the balance of the evening when the game was brought to a surprising end by Lometa Coach Bill Milam.
