## Peanut Market Is Now Open With Collier Company Buying New Crop

The peanut market is now open according to announcement by Claude C. Collier of the Collier Company Inc., of Goldthwaite, which has opened warehousing facilities to handle the new crop, for producers of Mills County and surrounding area. Collier Company is the only firm in this county that is engaged in handling the current peanut crop.

There are approximately 100 peanut producers in Mills County and a good many in the area surrounding this county. Mills County has approximately 950 acres in peanuts which is expected to yield over 400 tons. According to reports this year's yield will be one of the largest this county has ever had.

Collier announced that they are taking current crop which is being placed in storage for the Southwest Peanut Growers Association which is the purchasing agency for the Commodity Credit Corporation. Current support price is \$230.00 per ton for 70 grade number one peanuts, but loan advanced is only \$222.30 per ton. Other grades vary in price, depending on grade.

Collier Company is furnishing bonded warehousing for the crop and is paid by the CCC for that service plus handling charges. Peanut crop is stored by the Commodity Credit Corporation until such time that it may be sold.

Producers who are in need of trucks are urged to contact Collier Company and arrangements will be made for hauling.

## Average Daily Attendance Of Local School Pupils Is Reported Good

According to information received in the office of Superintendent J. T. Jones from the two principals of Goldthwaite schools, the average daily attendance is good for the number enrolled. Jones said that apparently most of the absentees are due to illness and regular attendance is necessary for successful work. Statistics on the schools are as follows:

In the Elementary school the original entries amounted to 347, five re-entered and there was a loss of 8, with an average attendance for the six weeks period of 332.26. Original entries in the High school were 132. There were no re-entries and two losses, with an average daily attendance of 139.12, or a total average daily attendance for both schools of 471.38. Jones said the Average Daily Attendance of pupils living outside our district, unless properly transferred, did not count.

## New Regulation On Wheat Seeding Limit

It has been announced by the Secretary of Agriculture that wheat farmers who have not seeded their wheat yet, may plant as much as 90 per cent of their allotment and still receive credit toward their wheat history for the full amount of their allotments.

Most producers try to plant as close to their allotment as possible so as to receive as much credit for planted acres as possible.

This change makes it possible in many cases for the wheat producer to seed as much as 90 per cent of his allotment in one field and not have to split a field in order to plant and receive credit for his full allotment.

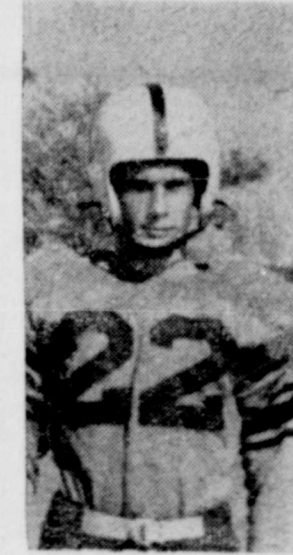
## Draft Board Call For October 19

## Eagles Lose To San Saba 24-13; To Play Mason There Friday Night

Goldthwaite High School Eagles lost their first game of the season to the San Saba High School Armadillos last Friday night with a score of 24-13, after holding the Dillos with a 6-0 lead until the last two minutes of the second period.

Joe Hammond, co-captain of the team, scored the first touchdown of the game for the Eagles in the final seconds of the first quarter with a 74 yard run. He made the only other touchdown for his team in the fourth quarter with a plunge across the line three plays after the period opened. This play was set up with a pass from Bobby Elliott to Hammond which came within inches of the goal line.

Dick Lindsay kicked one extra point out of two tries Friday night.

The Dillos made three touchdowns in the last two minutes of the second quarter with two of them during the last 25 seconds. Then they made one more during the third quarter, which was on the only pass they completed during the evening. Their second touchdown was made on a pass interception.

Hammond was the offensive leader for the Eagles, making 110 yards in 12 tries and caught four passes for 39 yards.

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Social Security Levy Rise Lower Income Group Folk Counteracts Cut in Taxes Pay Out More, Not Less

WASHINGTON—Your taxes are going up \$1 billion next January 1. This will come as a shock to most people, who had been anticipating instead a tax cut.

There will also be a tax cut the first of the year, but its impact on low income groups will be virtually nil, for its benefits will be largely wiped out by the new levy.

The new levy is a one-half per cent boost in the Social Security tax. It will apply to the first \$3,600 in the wages or salaries of every man and woman covered by Social Security, and that takes in most of the workers in the country.

President Eisenhower asked Congress last May to set aside for one year a provision in the Social Security laws requiring an automatic one-half per cent rise in the Social Security levy.

However, members of both parties, notably those on the House ways and means committee and the Senate finance committee, which have legislative jurisdiction, opposed the tax "freeze" on the ground it might undermine the financial security of the Social Security system. The President did not press his request and Congress took no action.

HERE IS HOW THE INCREASED TAX WOULD WORK:

Employees and employees each pay 1 1/2 per cent now in Social Security taxes on the first \$3,600 of compensation. This tax will rise to two per cent for each on Jan. 1, except for the self-employed.

Those in the last named category covered by Social Security now pay 2 1/2 per cent. Their rate will go up to three per cent, but they will not have to make their increased payments until March, 1955, because they pay their Social Security taxes annually on March 15.

The maximum increase in Social Security taxes will be \$18 a year. This boost will be paid by those making at least \$3,600 annually. Instead of paying \$54, they will pay \$72. (There are no Social Security payments on salaries over \$3,600.)

The increase will be \$15 on a \$3,000 salary; \$12.50 on a \$2,500 salary; \$10 on a \$2,000 salary; \$7.50 on a \$1,500 salary and \$5 on a \$1,000 salary. However, along with the boost in the Social Security tax will also come an automatic 10 per cent cut Jan. 1 in personal income levies. This is the Korean war tax boost which the administration agreed to leave lapse this year.

However, to the majority of those who make \$3,600 a year or less, and once again that takes in most of the nation's workers, the tax cut will probably be offset by the tax rise. Thus, a married couple with no children making \$1,500 a year will find their taxes increased by 90 cents. A married couple with two children and a \$3,000 annual income will have their taxes boosted by \$1.80. This is why: they will save \$13.20 a year through the 10 per cent cut in their income taxes, but their Social Security levy will rise \$15 a year.

THOSE WHO MAKE MORE THAN \$3,600 a year will benefit from the cut in income taxes. The higher the salary, the more benefits will accrue from the tax cut as the \$18 increase in the Social Security levy is overcome. Barring action by Congress the Social Security tax is scheduled to increase another one-half per cent in 1960, in 1965, and in 1970, until it reaches 3 1/2 percent for both employers and employees.

When the President urged Congress to eliminate the one half per cent boost, he pointed out that the reserves in the Social Security fund now total approximately \$18 billion. He said that the amount taken in now substantially exceeds benefits paid out to beneficiaries and therefore freezing the automatic tax rise would not endanger the fund.

However, key congressmen, looking to the future, expressed fears for the fund's solvency. They pointed out in turn that 60 million workers are covered by Social Security and, while only a few million now receive benefits, there will be an enormous increase in payments as millions more workers reach the retirement age of 65.

## New Egg Dishes for Fall Days

By ALICE DENHOFF

FOR your consideration today, here are some simple yet effective pepper dishes. These are in demand about now, we find.

First an egg dish with a nice tomato sauce, to serve 4.

**Hard Cook the Eggs**  
Cut 4 shelled, hard-cooked eggs lengthwise halves; press the yolks through a sieve or mash. Season with ½ tsp. salt, ¼ tsp. pepper and dry mustard. Add 2 c. grated cheese, blending well, and a few drops of sour cream. Needed, to mix smoothly. Refill with whites.

Add ½ tsp. grated onion and 2 tsp. minced green pepper to 1½ cups tomato sauce, and heat together about 8 minutes. Arrange the cooked rice in greased, shallow baking dish. Press the egg into it, and pour tomato sauce over. Sprinkle with ¾ c. grated cheese. Bake at 350° F. for 20 minutes.

**Tuna or Salmon**  
For another such dish, eggs combine with creamed salmon or tuna, the recipe for 4 servings. Combine one c. flaked canned salmon or tuna fish and 2 c. medium white sauce; cook together 5 minutes in upper part of double boiler. Add 4 hard-cooked eggs, quartered or sliced, one tsp. minced, canned pimiento, ¼ tsp.

pepper and ½ tsp. celery salt. Serve on buttered toast with a light sprinkling of paprika.

For a variation, use as short-cake filling on hot corn bread or biscuits; or use in pastry cases.

Vegetables seem to have their fashion cycles, too. Just now zucchini or Italian squash seems to be high in favor.

**Zucchini Casserole**  
Not content with its use as a vegetable, we have been receiving requests for recipes using zucchini in a main dish.

The following, served with crisp crackers of bacon, is delectable, and full of zesty flavor.

For 6-8 servings, use 1½ pounds zucchini. Wash and slice the vegetable. Add tsp. salt to c. water and bring to boil. Drop in sliced zucchini, cover and cook until tender—about 15 minutes. Drain and save the liquor.

Pan-fry 12-16 slices bacon. Make a white sauce of 2 tsp. bacon fat, 3 tsp. flour, ¼ tsp. salt, one c. liquor from zucchini and one c. evaporated milk. Place zucchini and ½ c. grated cheese with a few gratings of onion in a buttered casserole. Pour white sauce over top and cover with one c. buttered bread crumbs. Bake at 375° F. until crumbs are brown—about 25 minutes. Serve with crisp bacon.

## PARENT PROBLEMS

### Dogs Scare This Youngster

By GARRY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D.

A GOOD many young school children have the same fear of dogs which this letter illustrates:

"Dear Dr. Myers: We have a problem with which we feel we need help, since it doesn't seem to improve with time, as we had hoped. It concerns our six-year-old daughter. She is the youngest of three daughters, and we have never had this trouble with the other two.

**Terribly Afraid**  
"She is terribly afraid of dogs, cats, caterpillars or bugs. She seems to like dogs, but is tense and cannot relax around them.

"About a year ago, she attended a day nursery for a few months. They had a large, good-natured old dog in the yard, and the youngsters all played around. We noticed in the evening when we picked her up, she was terribly highstrung and nervous. The youngsters in our block have noticed this, and are beginning to dislike her and tease her with ugly faces, and so forth.

"She attended kindergarten last year and will start in the first grade this fall. This fear of dogs makes me feel that I cannot trust her to go back and forth to school alone, since she could become so frightened as to run into the street."

Enclosing my bulletin, "Fears in Children," I wrote this mother about as follows: Your little girl's fear of dogs is really a big problem for her. Although I don't quite share your anxiety about

the safety problem, I do understand your anxiety about her peace of mind.

### Change School Route

It might be well to employ an older child to go with her to and from school for a few months at least, or even for you to take her to school and back in a car. On her way to school, if she must pass a place where there's a dog, it might be well to go another way.

Meanwhile, why don't you get a puppy for her? Select one of a quiet, good-natured breed.

Never laugh at this child's fears or refer to them as foolish. They are very real to her. You might win the good graces of a few of her leading playmates and prevail on them to help her overcome her fears, instead of teasing her. Also, you might lessen her fears of bugs, worms and the like by helping her observe and study these lowly creatures. Read picture books to her about insects, cats and dogs.

**Slow Results**  
Don't look for quick results. Be glad if you see very gradual gains after several weeks.

Also work with your physician to build this child up physically and emotionally. Protect her from exciting programs of radio and television. See that she gets ample rest and sleep.

My own daughter, during her first year at school, had a great fear of dogs, from which she gradually recovered. I know how your little girl has suffered.

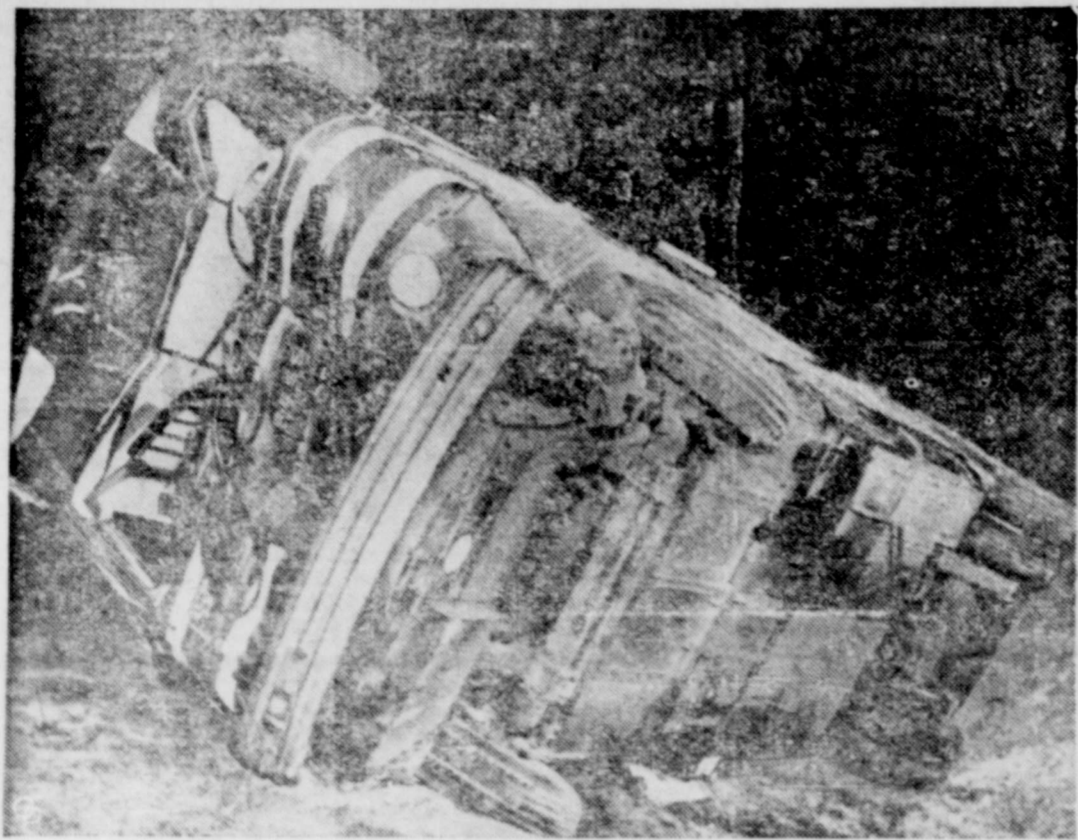

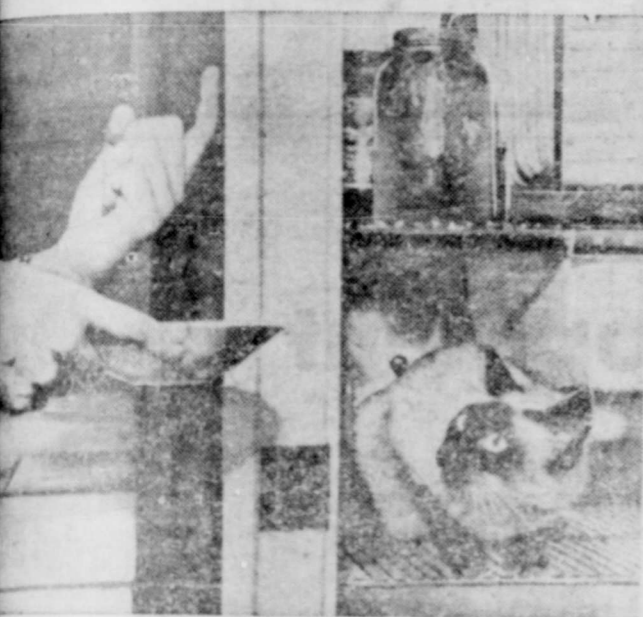

### INSECT PROGRESS REPORT

Pink bollworm, the cotton insect which makes Louisiana and Oklahoma entomologists eye Texas fields with apprehension, is believed to be on the decline this year.

Texas is generally regarded by other states as the gateway of the destructive pest for its entry into the U. S. from Mexico. This was particularly true last year when we faced the heaviest infestation in history. But due to strict state control measures, the latest progress report on the eradication program is encouraging.

The reduction is attributed to efforts of state entomologists, cotton growers and others, plus hot, dry weather. In some northern areas of Texas, however, the pink bollworm population remains uncomfortably high. The threat in those areas still is not as serious as it would be in the extreme southern portion of the state where the growing season is longer and more favorable for the insect.

In the South Texas counties of Kleberg and Nueces, cotton

gin trash examinations are showing greatly reduced numbers of pink bollworm. A recent seasonal examination found an average of only 49 worms per bushel of gin trash as compared to an average of 6,156 per bushel in the same area last year. In Nueces county, the average gin trash count has dropped from 5,020 per bushel in 1952, to 153 this year.

The prolonged dry spell during the summer gave most farmers good opportunity to clean up their fields in the Rio Grande Valley. But near the very end of the gathering season, the heavy rains delayed the harvest in some sections. The prompt use of defoliants on the plants may have offset any losses in the eradication program, however.

Planting and plow-up deadlines are still in effect in 61 south and central Texas counties. Farming operations are controlled in this large area to prevent the spread of the insect to other parts of the state.

The pink bollworm threat is not confined to those counties alone. In all, some evidence of infestation has been found in 239 counties. Only 15 counties in the northern Panhandle have no restrictions on cotton growth or treatment.

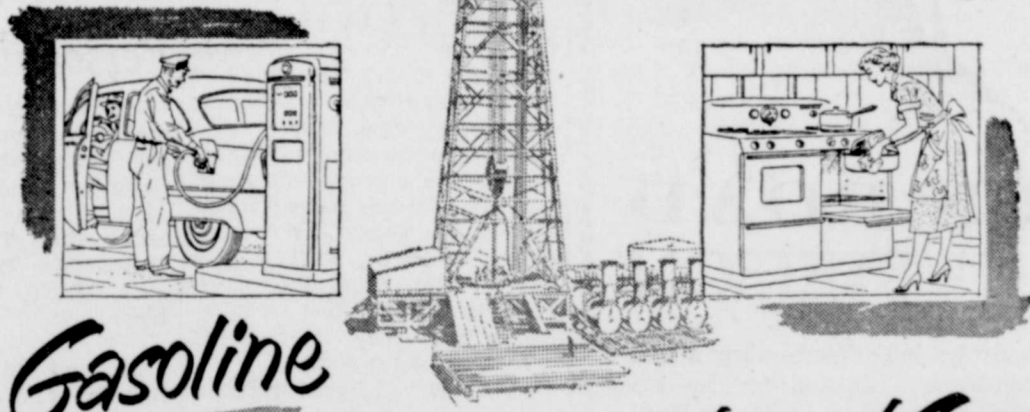

**Post Office Issues Information On Overseas Christmas Mailings**

Christmas packages for the Armed Forces overseas are to be mailed between October 15 and November 15, if they are to reach their destinations by Christmas Day, it was announced this week by Lucile Fairman, postmaster.

Folks are to inquire at the post office about the size, weight, packing and preparation for mailing Christmas parcels overseas.

Parcels mailed via AIRMAIL should be mailed not later than November 25. Limits of weight and size for AIRMAIL parcels—2 lbs. and 30 inches (length and girth combined).

Limit of weight for ordinary parcels— 50 lbs. to certain APO's. Ask at the post office

about these.

Parcels containing food stuff and perishable matter subject to spoilage and breakage in transit, are likely to reach their destination unfit for use.

Christmas cards should be mailed before November 1, with first class postage.

Those with Air Mail postage should be mailed not later than December 1.

Senders can be reasonably sure that parcels mailed not later than the dates specified below will reach their destinations by Christmas:—

Parcels for South and Central America, Mail not later than November 22.

Parcels for Europe, mail not later than November 15.

Parcels for Africa, mail not later than November 1.

Parcels for Near East, mail not later than November 1.

Parcels for Far East, mail not later than October 15.

Due to the long sea voyage, customs inspections and other formalities to which these parcels are subjected in the countries of their destinations, it is emphasized that mailings be made as early as possible, and not later than the dates specified, to assure delivery by Christmas Day.
