## Auction Barn Damaged By Fire

Fire of undetermined origin caused considerable damage to the Mills County Commission Company Auction barn last night. Fire was discovered about eight o'clock by Jack Long who was driving along the highway and noticed fire inside the cafe section of the barn and smoke coming from the windows.

In a matter of minutes after the alarm was sounded volunteer firemen answered the call and were able to bring the fire under control in short order. The fire seemingly started in the cafe and burned up along the side wall with flames following up towards the upper section of the roof.

While contents of the office were moved out, the only damage to the building itself was in the corner housing the cafe and to the roof.

Sig Jernigan, co-owner of the barn, announced that things would be cleaned up and the Friday sale would be held on schedule, although the cafe will not be open by Friday. He was unable to place an estimate on the loss caused by the fire.

The cafe, which was operated by John A. Jackson, appears to be total loss. Jackson said he owned the cafe equipment and carried no insurance. He estimated his damage at about \$1,000.00.

## Eagles Defeat Mason Punchers 32-13 In Conference Game Friday Night

Goldthwaite High School Eagles rolled up a 32-13 victory over the Mason Punchers last Friday night in their first District 23-A conference game of this season. The game was played on the Mason Punchers' field.

Joe Hammond scored the first touchdown of the game during the first quarter with a sensational run of 99 yards. Jam-up blocking by Jimmy Don Elliott, C. D. Lindsay and Ruben Lippe and the entire line, helped to make this run possible. Two other touchdowns made by Hammond were for four and one yards, respectively, in the third and fourth periods.

John Gilliam scored touchdowns from the 20 yard line during the second quarter and from the one yard line during the final period. C. D. Lindsay kicked two extra points.

The Punchers changed early in the game to a passing offense and scored their first touchdown on a 62 yard pass from Bobby Durst to Gary

Schmidt in the second quarter. Their other score came on a pass of 22 yards from B. Capps to Wayne Hoffman in the final quarter. Reichenau made the extra point for the Punchers.

Score at the half-time was 13 to 7 in favor of the Eagles.

CALLING THE TUNE

A great many people seem to believe that it is possible to get all kinds of handouts from the federal government and still keep our freedom and independence.

They should ponder this sentence from a 1942 U. S. Supreme Court decision: "It is hardly lack of due process for the government to regulate that which it subsidizes."

The Court simply said, in judicial language, that when government pays the bills, it can call the tune to which we must all dance.

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Uncle Sam Getting Tougher On Aid to Other Nations Lush Era of U. S. Handout Over, Free World is Warned Special to Central Press

WASHINGTON—The Eisenhower administration has made it clear that its oft-expressed hopes for "Trade—Not Aid" among the free world nations will come to naught if Uncle Sam is expected to foot the bill. The administration has served notice that it will not ask the American taxpayers to put up the capital so essential for the development of industry in foreign countries if they are to produce trade goods.

Secretary George M. Humphrey put it this way: "The United States government must question both its right and its financial ability to continue to use taxpayers' money to finance investments abroad on a large scale in the development of competitive enterprise."

Humphrey made the statement to an advisory group of 121 business, labor and agriculture leaders who will study "financial aspects of the international trade problem" together with the Senate banking committee.

However, the Treasury secretary's words were directed mostly to foreign countries. He was telling them that the era of the United States handout is over—if they want American capital invested in their country, they will have to make such investments attractive to private interests.

● SNUB—A topic of conversation in Washington is whether a snub was involved when President Eisenhower and former President Truman came face to face for the first time since Jan. 20. It happened at the funeral for the late Chief Justice Fred M. Vinson.

Inside the church where conversation was not in place, Mr. Truman extended his hand to both the President and Vice President Richard G. Nixon. Both shook it. After the services were over, Mr. Eisenhower shook the hands of the eight justices who preceded the casket out of the church. Then he embraced Mrs. Vinson. Right behind her was the former President with his wife and daughter.

According to witnesses who were a few feet away, as Mr. Truman stepped forward to talk to the President, Mr. Eisenhower turned away quickly and walked to his car. Mr. Truman wasn't more than four feet away from the President.

Some argue that Mr. Eisenhower had already greeted Mr. Truman and was hurrying for his plane to return to his Denver vacation spot. Others say the plane would have waited.

● DURKIN—Left unsaid in the resignation of Martin Durkin as secretary of Labor is the fact that he was unhappy in the post. After several months as head of the Labor department, it became apparent that organized labor was not going to cotton to the new Republican administration.

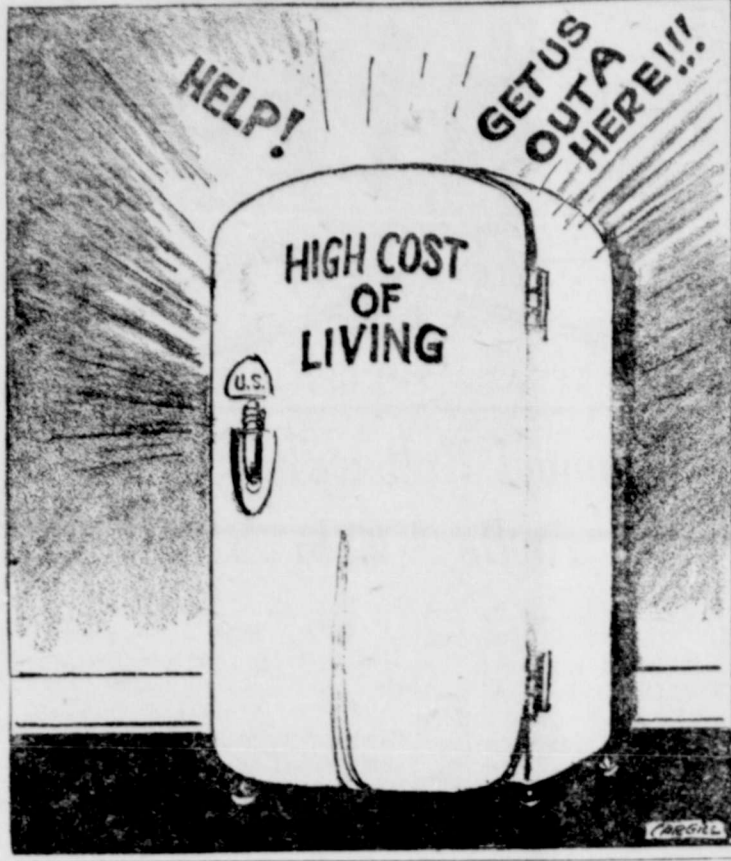
The record of the Republican 83rd Congress came under increasing attack by the CIO and the AFL, as well as the United Mine Workers and other large unions as anti-labor.

Durkin was a 100 per cent union man. He grew up in the labor movement and when appointed to the Cabinet was president of the AFL-affiliated Plumbers union.

Durkin grew unhappy because the administration was being attacked by organized labor. Furthermore, he knew the administration was in for a severe lashing when the AFL convention convened in St. Louis.

Durkin decided to get out before the labor movement could brand him, as well as his Republican Cabinet colleagues, with harsh names. This is the story behind Durkin's sudden resignation. The administration's failure to agree on revisions of the Taft-Hartley law provided him with a convenient reason for his departure.

## Fall Recipes Using Apples

By ALICE DENHOFF

APPLES are here again, bringing aroma and color to our markets, and mighty good eating and fine flavor to our fall and winter food pattern.

Much as we like apple pie, apple brown betty and others of the wonderful apple goodies, we like our apples raw, too, not only as a low-calorie snack, but used in interesting ways, as, for instance, in appetizers. Dieters will rejoice in this new version of the famous Italian first course, Antipasto.

### A Dish for Dieters

Use a salad plate for each serving, and on it arrange unpared apple slices; thin strips of green pepper and pimiento; a mound of cole slaw; one or two well-drained, boneless sardines; black olives and stuffed olives. Serve olive oil and wine vinegar in cruet for individual dressing. Italian bread sticks make a fine accompaniment.

Or remove cores from fine Cortland apples, but do not pare them. Cut in neat slices, topping each slice with a ball of sharp Cheddar cheese spread. Secure with toothpicks. Serve with small glasses of ice-cold apple juice or sweet cider. This makes a delicious dessert, too.

For another nice notion, core

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and quarter but do not pare 2 apples. Slice thin, cut each slice in halves. Peel and slice 2 small yellow onions, separating into rings.

Combine apples, onion rings and one c. diced celery. Combine 1/2 c. mayonnaise and 1/4 c. chili sauce; add to apple mixture, mixing well. Serve with deviled eggs. Makes 6 servings. Or heap on lettuce leaves and serve as a first course salad with poppy-seed crackers.

### Made with Cottage Cheese

Apple Ring Snack Nest calls for one lb. creamed cottage cheese combined with 1/4 lb. crumbled blue cheese, tsp. Worcestershire sauce, dash of tabasco, salt and pepper to suit, one small onion peeled and grated, and 1/4 c. heavy cream. Beat until smooth and creamy.

Core 6 unpeeled red apples and cut crosswise in thin slices. Serve as an appetizer, spreading cheese mixture on apple slices. A good help-yourself dip for buffet parties. Makes at least 12 servings.

For those hungry youngsters as they troop in from school or play. Spread apple slices with peanut butter, creamy or crunchy, as preferred. Serve with mugs of milk.

## PARENT PROBLEMS

### The Peaceful Dinner Hour

By GARRY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D.

THE homes of our grandchildren, now totaling thirteen in three families, are a good many hundred miles from ours. In relays, or altogether, they have spent several weeks with us practically every summer since there were only a few of them. Always there have been some babies with us each year, and always several children from two to five. They and their parents have provided a good laboratory for me.

#### No Eating Scenes

During these years, I have observed almost no eating scenes by these grandchildren. Their parents have assumed that the children do their own eating and eat when they are hungry, and the youngsters seem nearly always to be hungry at the proper times.

These grandchildren, as soon as they have been big enough to sit and eat comfortably from a high chair, have eaten with the whole family. You who have come from big families know what an extension table is. It's a table you can make longer by putting in more leaves (boards) and shorter by removing some.

#### Interesting Family Groups

Having an aggregation of fifteen or twenty persons from babies to grandparents makes an interesting family group. It hardly would be interesting if all the adults were fighting with several of the youngsters over their eating. But I'm able to report that ours has usually been a peace table.

Of course, some parents who have a scene at every mealtime over just one youngster from about two to five may not believe the foregoing. They have only my word for it. But they should consider that scenes over eating can more easily arise in a small group

than in a larger one. With so many children present, hearty eating can become contagious, and attention by the adults doesn't tend to center on just one child. Too, in the case of a large group, each person present can grow so interested in everybody else as not to pick on any particular child.

Suppose you have a child, say from two to five, over whom there is an eating scene at almost every meal.

#### Map Out a Program

Let me entreat you, the parents, to sit down together alone during a quiet period and map out a program you can agree upon. If it is to be successful, you probably will agree that one of you shall be solely responsible for the child at mealtime, and that the other parent, and the other adults or older children, will pledge to be silent and entirely indifferent to this child's eating. They should also agree not to say a word about their own dislike of food or what anybody should eat. Together, everyone will do his part to create a cheerful, happy mealtime. The responsible parent will resolve not to tell the child he must eat anything, but to serve him very, very small portions of food he should have, one at a time.

In many cases, if the responsible person says nothing and does nothing out of the ordinary, and reveals no concern at all about what the child eats, or how much, or even whether he eats anything at all, the problem may solve itself by and by, if the solution is not expected right away but welcomed after an extended period. 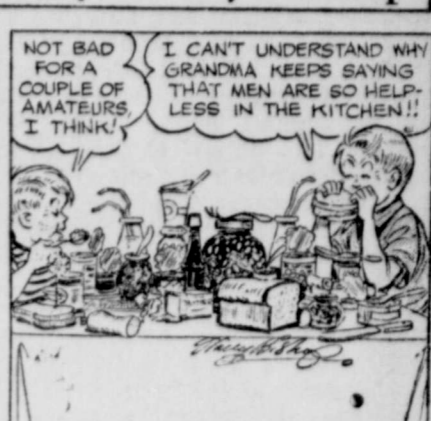
Another interesting family we read of was the Weatherby reunion which was at Lake Brownwood. Walter had told us he and Mrs. Weatherby attended.

**NEW TESTS FOR LIVESTOCK**

There are so many cattle inoculations and immunizations that Old Bossie must feel like a raw army recruit taking medical shots. Now the scientists have come up with another development with the needle—a test that shows the degree of fatness.

The test was developed specifically for live cattle, sheep or hogs. It should be very useful for purebred breeders who want to select their best young animals for breeding stock. The feeder who finishes fat steers or hogs, however, won't be affected.

The test calls for laboratory equipment and technical skill so it probably won't be generally made on the farm. It employs a drug called antipyrine which has been used by the medical profession to reduce a fever.

When a measured dose of the drug is injected into the blood stream of an animal, it dissolves immediately and then begins to be eliminated. On cattle, after 2½ hours, blood samples are taken every hour for four hours. The rate of elimination of the drug is recorded. The fatter the animal, the greater is the concentration of the drug in the blood samples.

Smaller animals, such as hogs and sheep, can be tested much faster since the drug is distributed more rapidly through the body. Blood samples can be taken from hogs one hour after injection of the drug and at intervals of 30 minutes.

Preliminary tests have been successful enough, the scientists say, to open up the field for critical breeding tests to prove the heritability of the high or low fat producing characteristics of the animal.

When applied to a few of the best bull calves, a cattleman may be in a better position to select a herd sire that has the ability to transmit early market finish to his calves. With this method, the cattleman would not have to wait to judge by the first crop of calves for each prospective sire.

The hog breeder may be able to select boars and gilts which have small amounts of fat and have the ability to make rapid growth with minimum feed requirements.
