## Grand Jury Recommends Repairs On Jailer's Quarters To Commissioners

The Mills County Grand Jury for the May term of district court which went into session Monday of this week returned nine indictments and one special communication to the commissioners court recommending improvements to the jailers' quarters on the first floor of the county jail.

Indictments returned included one for aggravated assault and one on negligent homicide, both of which were reduced from district court to county court. Four were on burglary with intent to commit theft. One each on aiding a prisoner escape from jail, breaking jail after a felony conviction and forgery.

In their communication directed to the commissioners court the grand jury pointed out that they had made a personal inspection of the first floor of the jail, known as the jailer's quarters and found that it is badly in need of repairs to make it fit or suitable for jailer to live there. ## Mills County FM Roads Have Been Designated

The following report with regard to Farm to Market Roads that have been designated for Mills County by the State Highway Department has been released this week.

Mills County—The following roads are designated as Farm to Market Roads subject to the availability of funds and subject to the condition that Mills County will furnish all required right of way free of cost to the State:

From end of Farm to Market Road 574, 11.6 miles West of Goldthwaite, West to Road intersection near Ridge School, a distance of approximately 3.3 miles.

From U. S. Highway 34 in Mullin, Southwest, a distance of approximately 4.2 miles.

Upon acceptance of these conditions, the State Highway Engineer is directed to proceed with construction and to assume the roads for maintenance.

## Eagles Lose To Burnet By 12-7; To Play Llano Here Friday Night

Goldthwaite High School Eagles lost to the Burnet Bulldogs the second Conference game of season in district 23-A play last Friday night at Burnet with a score of 12-7, after holding the lead by a single point, 7 to 6, from early in the first quarter until the final period.

The Eagles, with five wins and two losses out of seven games played before last Friday night, started off when they recovered a Bulldog fumble on the first play of the game after the kick-off to Burnet. After one Eagle running play that gained three yards John Gilliam fired a pass to End Dick Lindsay for 17 yards and a touchdown. Lindsay kicked the extra point—his 19th of the season.

The Bulldogs made their first touchdown about halfway of the first period and their second in the final quarter after having two others nullified with penalties before the halftime.

## City Council Approves Street Repair And Improvement Program

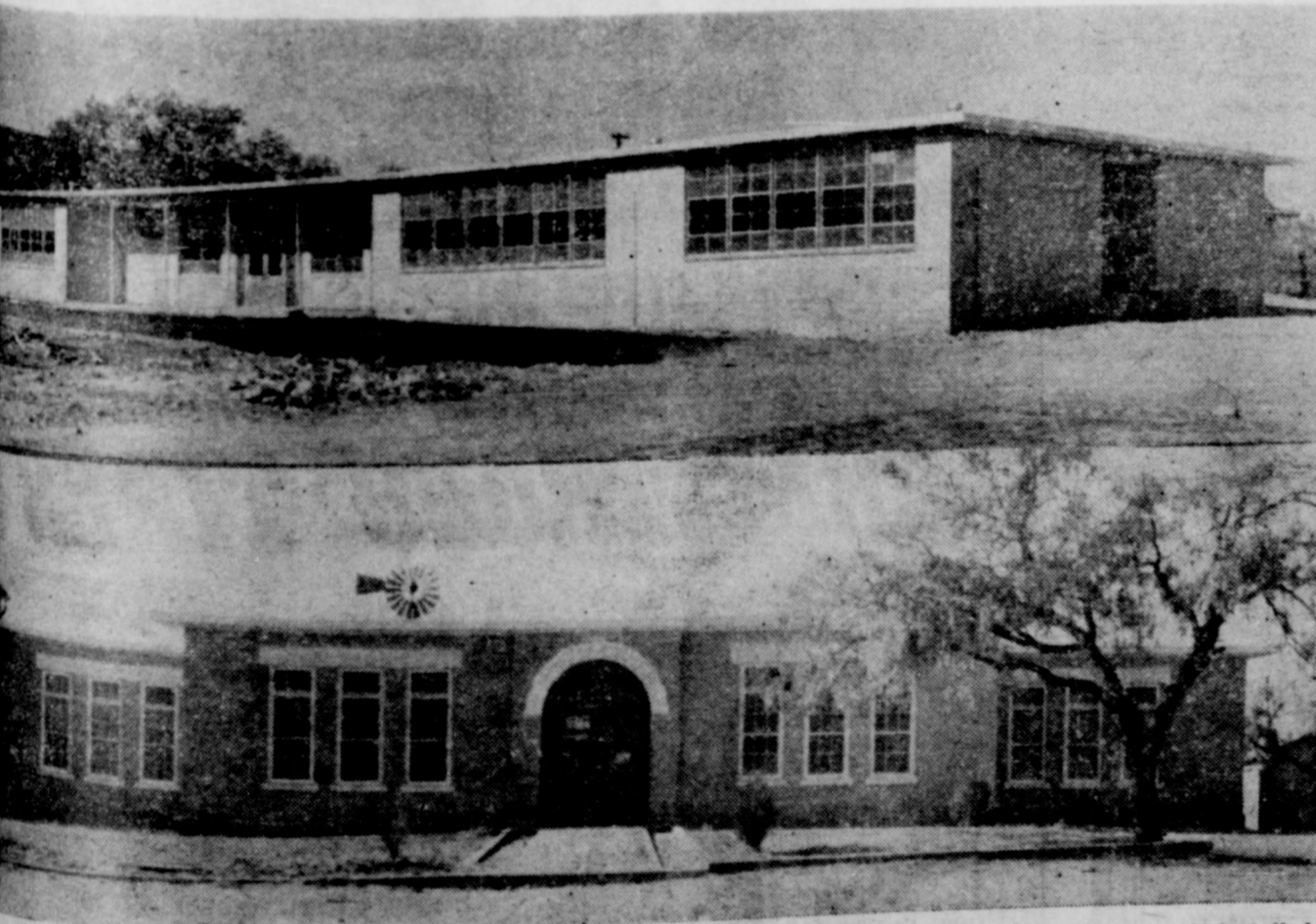
Members of the city council meeting in regular session Monday night of this week passed ordinance clearing the way for issuing \$7,500.00 in three per cent warrants for a general street repair and improvement program. Funds from warrants are to provide the necessary machinery and materials needed for the job. According to provisions of the ordinance warrants will be retired by a 15c reserve from the regular tax levy of \$1.50 beginning with tax collections for the year 1954. There will be no tax increase from this street improvement program which is being undertaken by the council.

This action was taken by the council after report was made by the finance committee recommending such a move.

In connection with this program the city purchased a heavy grader, which has been a paramount need for some time, that will be put to use on this project. Members of the street committee made a number of trips to various cities during the past two or three weeks in search of a grader, that would fill the needs of the city, and that could be acquired within means available. After making their report to the council the machine, that has been here on trial during the past week, was purchased at a cost of \$4,500.00. About 25 blocks of city streets have been gone over during the past week with the grader.

The council also went on record to have an engineering firm to come in and make necessary street drainage survey which is a part of the long range street improvement program.

## Mullin Schools To Have Open House Program Tonight At 7:30 O'clock

The new high school, pictured above (top) is 52 x 137 feet and contains eight class rooms, offices and rest rooms. It has been furnished throughout with new furniture.

Pictured above (bottom) is the newly remodeled old high school building. The top floor has been removed and the entire building has been remodeled and made new inside.

Baltimore, Md., Daily Record: "One of the country's credit experts say that 'easy dollars are a thing of the past.' Some people call it a return to highly competitive conditions, while others call it a 'readjustment.' Which ever it may be it does mean that intensive and intelligent selling is going to be demanded in all lines."

San Marino, California, Tribune: "Some 90 million Americans have paid \$17 billion into the Social Security program Representative Carl T. Curtis declared. . . Of the 13 1-2 million people who have reached age 65 in America since the program started only 3 1-2 million are eligible to draw cash benefits. The original purpose of the Social Security act, Representative Curtis pointed out, was to protect the aged when they could no longer earn a living. It is becoming quite evident that Social Security isn't doing that, and perhaps never can be expected to do so."

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Warren Inexperience Seen With Just Six-Man Body High Judiciary Functions With Just Six-Man Body

WASHINGTON—Supreme Court attaches feel the time it takes Chief Justice Earl Warren to break into his new job will have little effect on the Court's operations this term.

Despite his lack of judicial experience, Chief Justice Warren can disqualify himself from some of the hearings until such time as he feels at home on the bench. A six-man Court is all that is required to hold hearings and there have been many occasions when Court members have refused to sit in judgment on certain cases.

Even if the Chief Justice chooses to plunge immediately into all aspects of the Court's operations, his relative inexperience still may have little effect on the amount of opinions handed down by the high Court.

Frequently it takes the Court more than a month to render a final decision after the start of a hearing and this should give Warren a chance to learn the ropes.

MORE STALLING—United States diplomats feel that another round of stalling with Red China and North Korea is in prospect over the Korean Peace Conference, scheduled to begin Oct. 25 under terms of the armistice agreement.

The agreement specified that the overall peace conference should begin within three months of the signing of the armistice, but the State department had to prod the Communists with a formal note before the Reds even agreed to meet to discuss the time and place of the formal confab.

What the Reds are trying to do is unprecedented in diplomatic annals—dictate to the democracies the make-up of the peace conference. This has caused United Nations circles to believe that nothing concrete in the way of a settlement of the Korean problem can be expected.

Secretary of State John Foster Dulles was roundly criticized months ago when it came to light that he was thinking in terms of another dividing line between North and South Korea as the only practical solution to the East-West clash there. However, United Nations officials are now quietly coming around to this view themselves.

HOUSE WARMING—The new cottage built for President Eisenhower at the Augusta (Ga.) National Golf course may be seen by its intended tenant for the first time late next month—but only for a brief interlude.

Mr. Eisenhower's schedule for the autumn and early winter is becoming so jammed that it's doubtful he can spend more than a long weekend there.

For one thing, beginning early in November the White House social calendar will require the President to be on hand each Tuesday evening for a long series of official dinners and receptions.

Also, there's the matter of a state visit to Canada announced by the White House only a few days ago.

However, when the President was in Augusta last spring he said he would be back in the fall for another work-out on his favorite golf course. As he himself said when Labor Secretary Martin Durkin resigned in a huff, Mr. Eisenhower has never reneged on a promise.

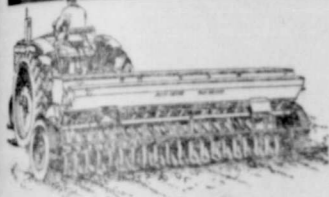

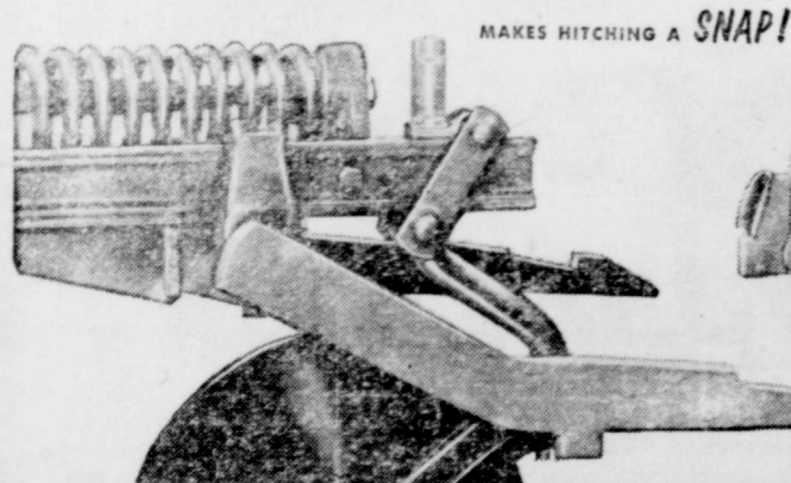

Mr. and Mrs. Henry Benningfield have returned home after several months stay in South Dakota.

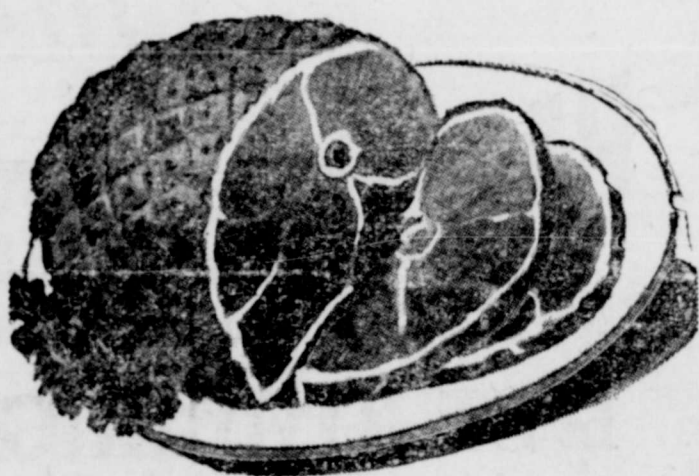

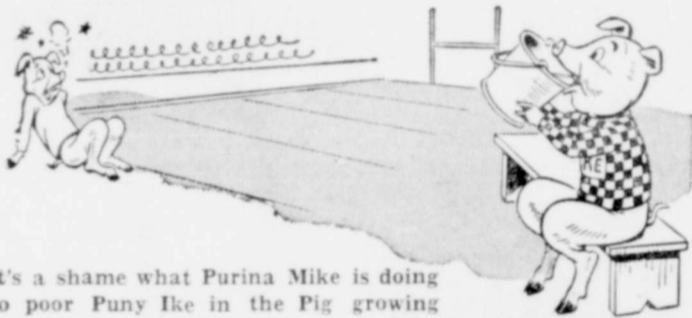

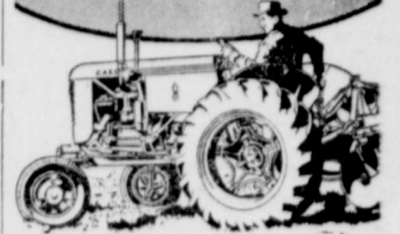

### PARENT PROBLEMS

#### Helping Child at Schoolwork Requires Parent's Patience

By GARRY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D.

BY this time, you may have had some report on how your child is getting on with his schoolwork.

If this report indicates that he is lagging in one or all subjects, you may suppose you should help him with his lessons at home. Even if you have no discouraging word from school, you may decide to have him read, spell or do some arithmetic with you.

If his school report is inferior, don't express disappointment or annoyance, or exhort him to work harder. Instead, you should calmly and sympathetically assure him you are going to try to help him enjoy more school success.

Perhaps you should spend some periods in his classroom to understand what he is supposed to do there. Perhaps you should try to find out from the teacher just what his learning difficulties are.

Then work with him on a regular schedule of brief periods when you can be wholly unencumbered by other cares and can give him your sole attention without hurry or avoidable interruption. Make the total period relatively short, even breaking it up into periods of ten or fifteen minutes at a stretch, with some fun or relaxation between these shorter periods.

Though you may require him to be in a certain place for the lesson, you hardly can make him attend well and concentrate by ordering him to do so. You will need to call upon your best resources to win his cooperation

and help him succeed. The better he can do what you help him to do, the better he will attend, the longer he will concentrate and the harder he will try. Seek to help him to win successes early, then celebrate these successes. Aim to help him go at the job hopefully, and leave it finally, feeling worthy.

#### Holding His Attention

If his attention wanders or he often pauses or makes mistakes, don't feel annoyed at him, or scold him. If you do, his attention will wander more, he will halt more often, he will make more mistakes. What is worse, he will repeat these mistakes many times. This will only vex you more and prompt you to scold further, causing him in turn to feel more discouraged. Such a scene between you and this child may arise that he will give up in despair and run away weeping.

Let us hope you won't let such a tragedy occur. Try to catch yourself as soon as you hear your own voice rising. But if you merely hold your tongue and have pent-up emotions within, this child will sense it and still be hampered in his learning. It is better to walk away, play a game with him or retire than to proceed while still angry.

Try to put yourself in this child's place. Then you won't have to watch your words and voice. You won't have to try to be patient. It will come naturally to you. 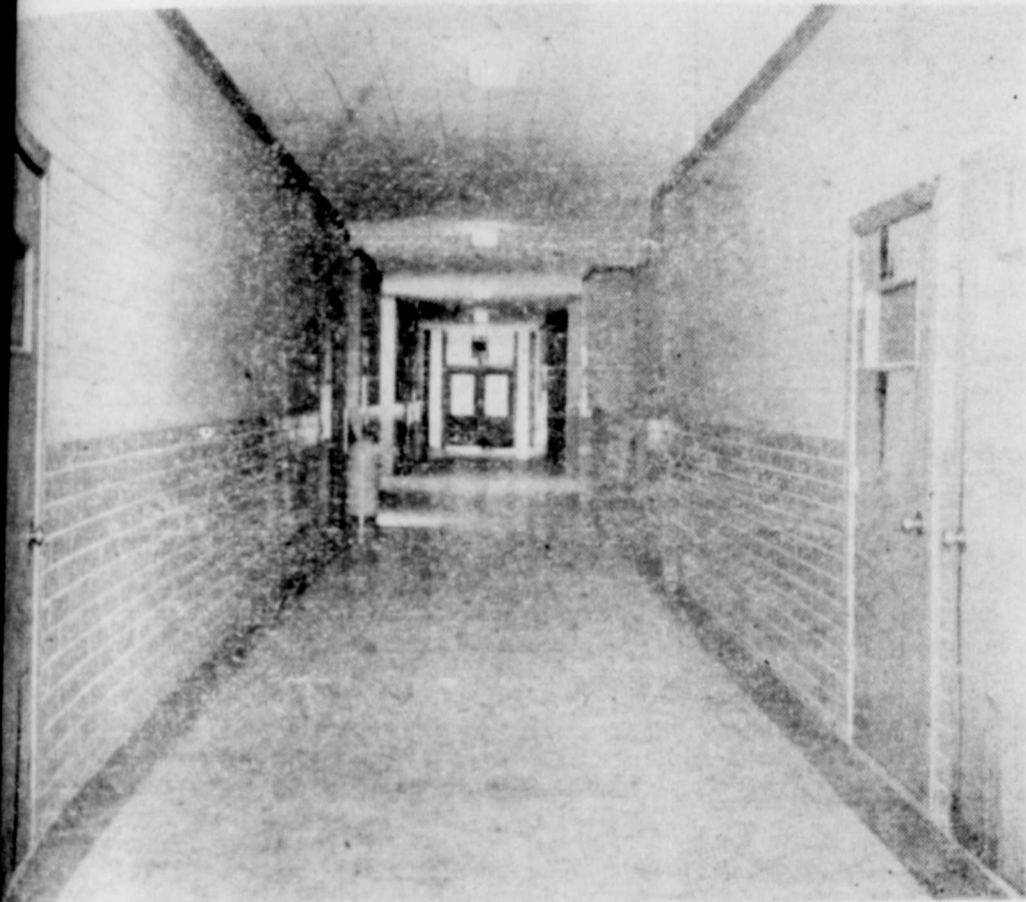

# TODAY'S Menu

## Ham, Veal, Pan-Broiled Dinners

By ALICE DENHOFF

MEAT dishes featured today  
begin with a pan-broiled recipe.  
To do right by pan-broiling, a  
method of cooking done in a hot,  
uncovered heavy frying pan,  
place meat in pan, and do not  
add fat or water. Brown meat on  
both sides. Season with salt and  
pepper. Reduce temperature;  
turn occasionally. Pour off fat as  
it accumulates.

Pan-Broiled Ham

For superb pan-broiled meat,  
a ham slice is a good choice just  
now. Have a center-cut ham  
slice cut 1/4 to 1/2 in. thickness. Rub  
tsp. mustard into ham; brown  
slowly in heavy skillet. Sprinkle  
with some brown sugar moistened  
with lemon juice. Cut 2 ripe  
bananas into lengthwise slices,  
and roll in brown sugar. Arrange  
around ham in skillet. Cook until  
bananas are heated through.

As a change, try veal pot roast.  
Choose a 5-lb. rump roast of

veal, bone left in. Mix tsp. dry  
mustard, tsp. poultry seasoning,  
tbsp. brown sugar, tsp. salt and  
some pepper together; rub mix-  
ture into roast. Brown the roast  
very slowly in 3 tsp. fat. The  
slower the browning, the better  
the flavor will be. Add 1/2 c. diced  
onion, 2 tsp. vinegar; cover  
tightly. Simmer over low fire for  
2 1/2 hrs. It makes its own gravy.

Veal and Dumplings

Another veal recipe uses potted  
veal with dumplings. Remove fat  
from 2-lbs. veal shoulder; cut  
meat into 1-in. cubes. Simmer  
with one sliced onion in 1 qt.  
water for 1 hr. Add 2 tsp. salt, 1/4  
tsp. pepper, 1/2 tsp. Worcestershire  
sauce, 2 c. diced potatoes and 6  
carrots, sliced. Continue cooking  
for 15 min. Thicken mixture with  
4 tsp. flour and 1/4 c. cold water  
blended together.

Prepare dumplings; drop by  
teaspoonfuls on top of meat.  
Cover tightly; steam for 12 min.

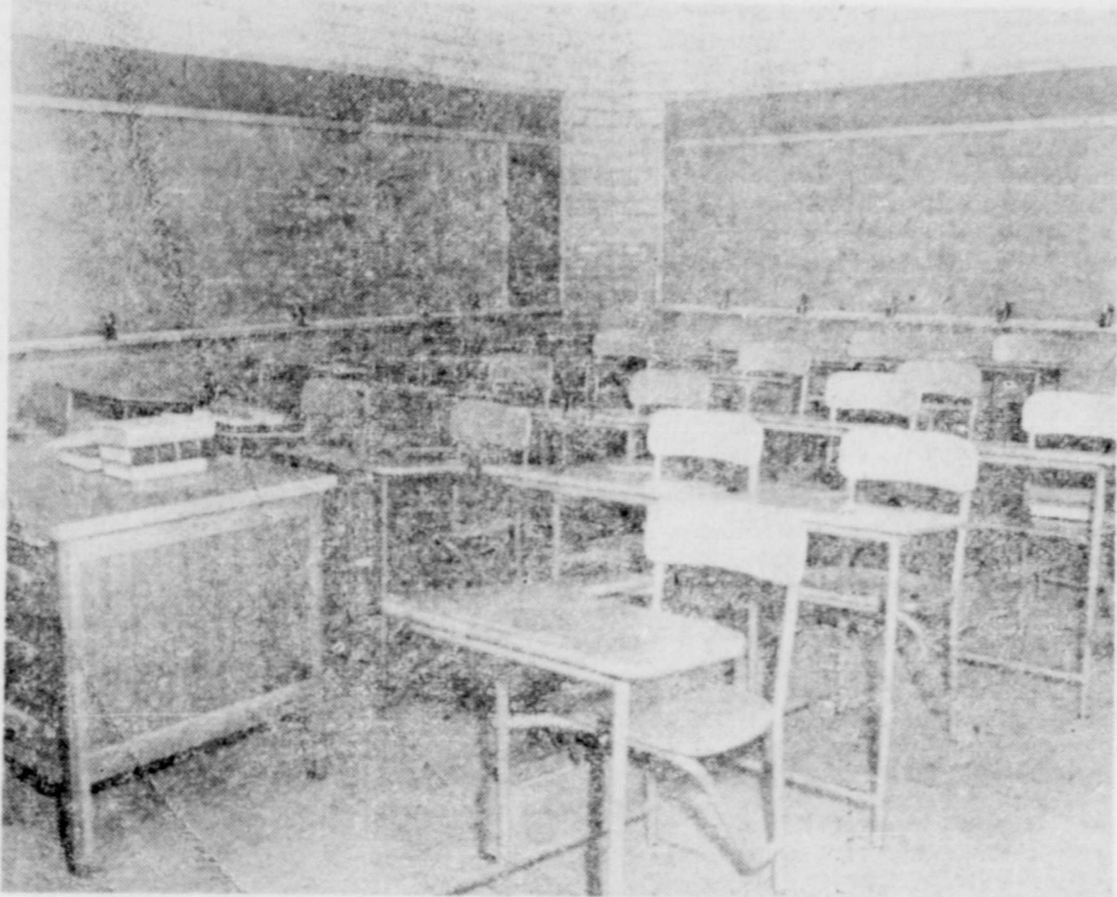

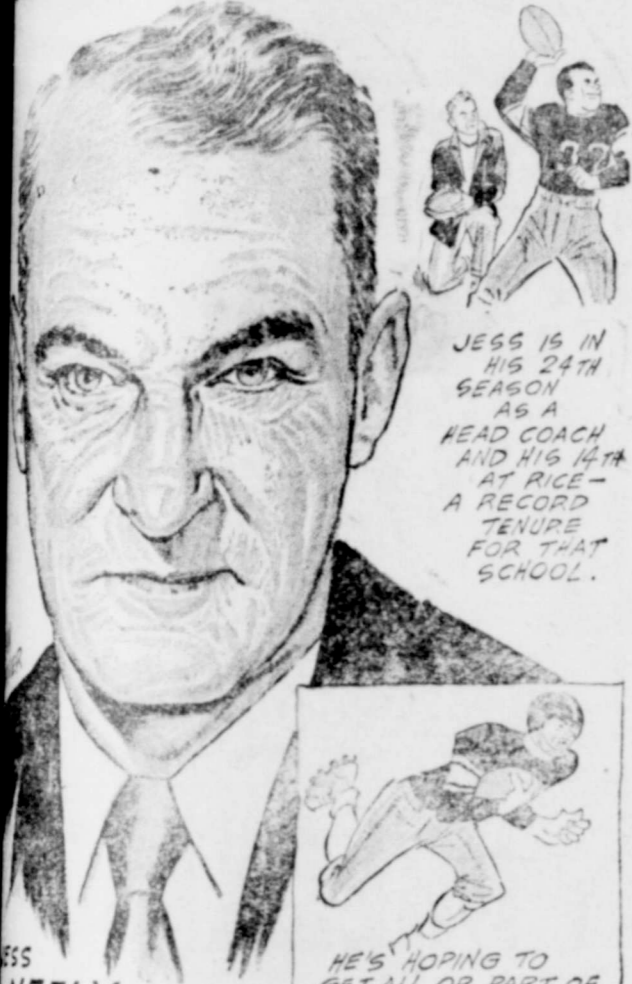


Pictured here is a view of the hallway of the new Mullin High School. This new build-

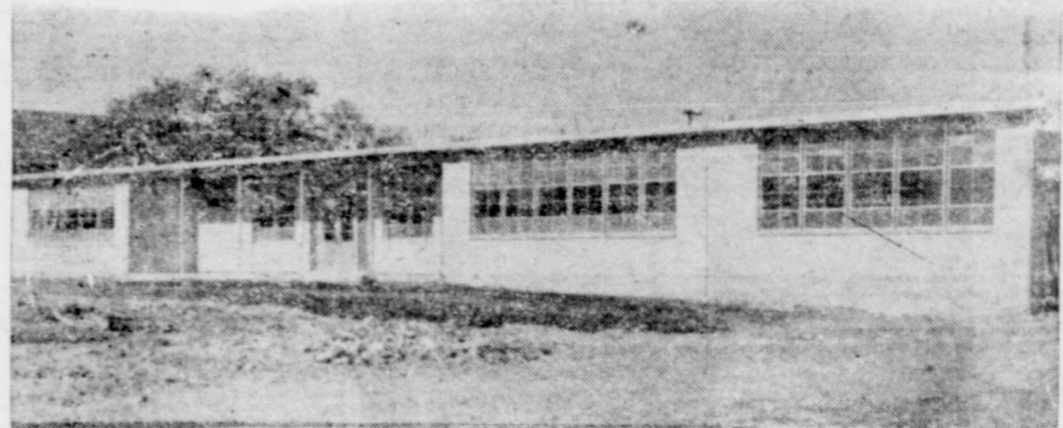

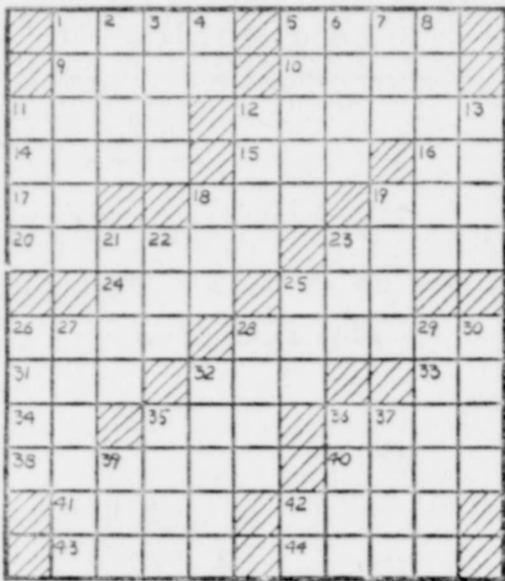

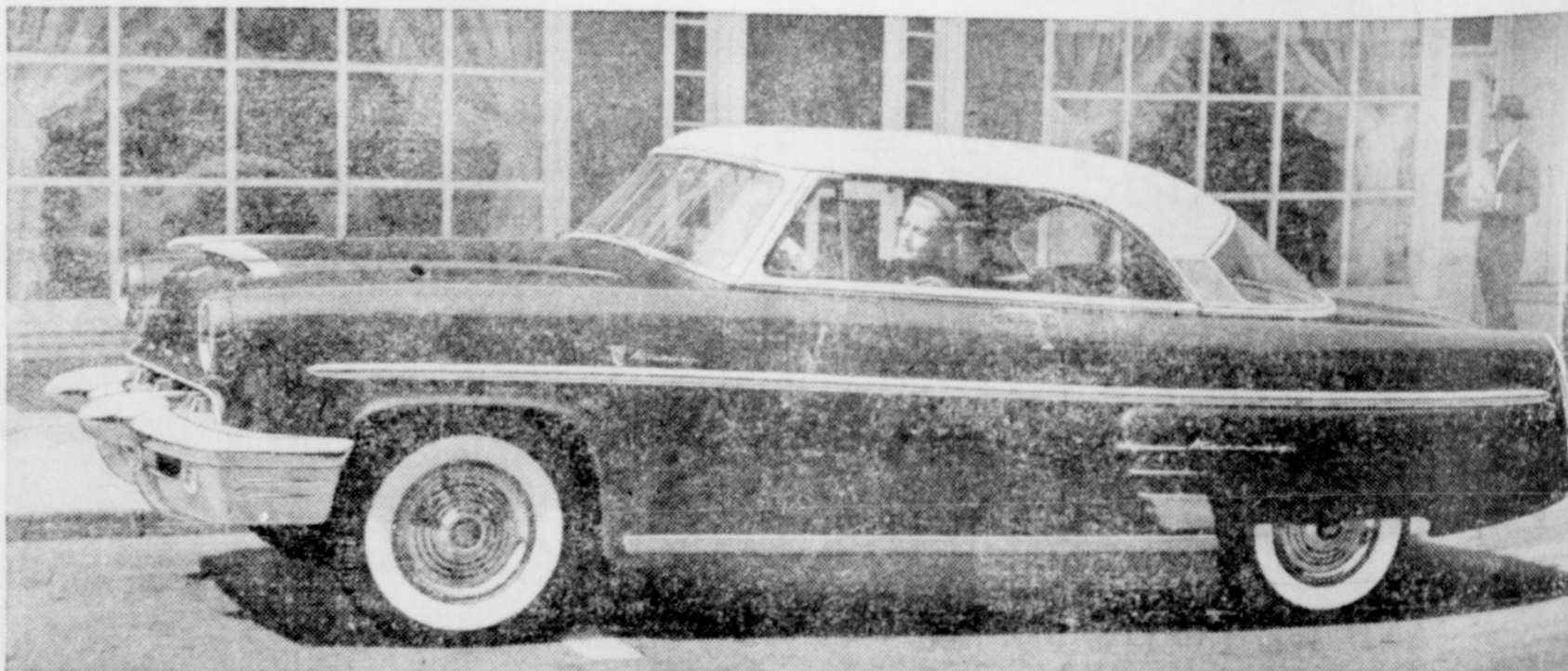
