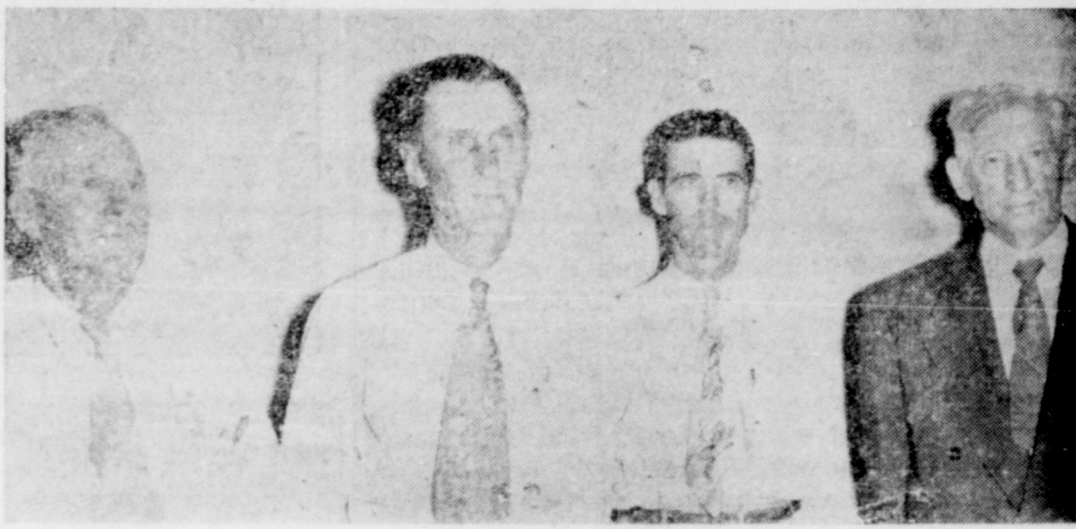

Auction Barn And Cafe Are Being Repaired

The Mills County Commission Company auction barn and cafe are in the process of being repaired, at this time, after the recent damage by fire.

In the process the sale barn is being enlarged considerably, according to announcement by Sig and Malcolm Jernigan, owners. The building will have a new roof and on the west side it will be raised to give room for an additional three rows of seating space in the ring. This has been needed for some time and the owners are taking this opportunity to make the extension to provide the additional space for their many customers on sale days. They are also making improvements in their heating facilities while on the job of making these repairs, and moving their feed barn to new location.

The cafe is being rebuilt and enlarged, nearly doubling the seating capacity and working space, according to announcement by John Jackson, operator. There will be 25 stools around a horseshoe counter in the cafe. It is being extended to the west, in the enlargement move, covering some of the area that was formerly the feed barn. Jackson announced that all equipment and fixtures will be new. The cafe is expected to be open by Friday of next week.

Eagles Nosed Out By Llano 21-12; Play Gorman There Friday Night

The GHS Eagles were edged out by the Llano Yellowjackets last Friday night, 21-12, in their final district 23-A conference game of the season, played on the local field. It was one of the best games played this year with each team digging for yardage during the entire game. Passing from either team was on the lighter side of the encounter.

Llano scored the first touchdown in the first quarter when Kenneth Decker carried the ball over for eight yards. Sherman Bauer making the extra point.

Quarterback, John Gilliam, Eagle sparkplug during most of the game, went 11 yards for touchdown in the second quarter. During the same period Jimmy Watkins made 18 yards for Llano's second touchdown and Bauer again converted, making the score 14-6 at halftime.

Gilliam plunged two yards for the Eagles' second touchdown in the third period after setting up the play with a 60 yard run.

During the last quarter the Eagles came within inches of scoring again when a pass from Gilliam on the twelve yard line to Lindsay in pay territory failed to stick.

Llano made one more touchdown with extra point in the final seconds of the game.

Goldthwaite had 15 first downs against Llano 17. In total yardage gained, both

rushing and passing, Llano marked up 294 and Goldthwaite 249. The game was outstanding in having the lightest penalties. Goldthwaite two for 10 yards and Llano four for 20 yards.

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MILKING THE TAXPAYERS

A British woman, who is a member of Parliament and Parliamentary Secretary to the Ministry of Health, plans a tour of this country. Her purpose is to talk to groups of all kinds in praise of England's National Health Service — the system under which the practice of medicine has been socialized in that country. It is reported that she is a gifted speaker.

Anyone, of course, is entitled to advocate socialized medicine. But what makes this visitor's tour interesting is its auspices. The trip is to be made under a Smith-Mundt grant. And the Smith-Mundt Bill, which became law in 1948, was passed by Congress "to promote the better understanding of the United States among the peoples of the world and to strengthen international relations." The American taxpayers, of course, pay the bills for those who receive the grants.

Just how talks on behalf of British socialized medicine can "promote the better understanding of the U. S." is extremely difficult to perceive. This country is supposed to stand solidly on the side of maximum freedom for all — and that means freedom for the professions and enterprise no less than for individuals. Socialism, whether of medicine or anything else, is the great destroyer of freedom. Under socialism the government makes the rules and calls the tune and those affected have no choice but to obey.

In short, one wonders why the taxpayers should be assessed to subsidize projects, large or small, which if successful would eventually destroy America as we know it.

MARCH OF EVENTS

Uncle Sam's Fiscal Ills | Worrisome Problem Faces
Become Growing Headache | Congress Before Election

WASHINGTON—There's a hoary, moth-eaten old adage among politicians that the man most likely to succeed in public life and keep getting re-elected longest is the legislator who votes for all appropriations and against all taxes.

Like most moth-eaten old adages, there is a lot of truth in it. That is why, if you buttonhole any of the few Republican legislators in town (what with Congress on vacation), you'd find them heaving a collective sigh of relief that President Eisenhower has announced that he won't ask for the enactment of a sales tax in the next session of Congress to bolster up the Treasury's sagging revenues.

With 1954 being an election year and all members of the House of Representatives up for reelection and with slightly over a third of the Senate also facing the voters (several seats will be at stake for unexpired terms of legislators who have died or resigned), there was just too much resistance on the part of the solons to a sales tax.

From the point of view of congressmen seeking reelection all taxes are bad, but sales taxes are the worst because they are right out in plain view where their irate constituents can see them. That is why most taxes are hidden from the view of the public like a rabbit in a magician's hat. You pay them, but they don't hurt quite as bad because you don't see them.

BIG DECISIONS ARE NOW BEING MADE in the Treasury department and the White House which will drastically affect the amount and kind of taxes you will pay next year. There is little doubt that some taxes will be added and others subtracted—or at least subtracted from.

Your federal tax bill will go down about 10 per cent next year unless Congress blocks a scheduled cut, which is very unlikely. The excess profits tax on corporations will also expire at the end of the year.

This is good news for taxpayers, but bad news for the Treasury which will stand to lose about \$5 billion in revenue from the cuts. Another \$3 billion revenue loss to the Treasury will come next April 1 when the income tax of corporations is reduced another five per cent and a "hook" of excise taxes on things you use, expire automatically.

Congress has established by law a limit on the public debt of the United States, setting it at \$275 billion. The rub comes in that Uncle Sam now owes about \$273 billion and, while a billion or two might last you or me a long time, Uncle Sam is a big time operator and that kind of money is chicken feed to him.

There seems little doubt that when Congress comes back next January, the debt limit will be upped. Right now, the only question is—will the Treasury be able to pay all its bills until then?

THE TREASURY IS NOW STUDYING what kinds of new taxes can be imposed to replace the revenue lost through these scheduled reductions. The sales tax has been ruled out, but a closely-allied tax, the manufacturers' excise tax, has not. Basically, the difference between them is that the manufacturers' tax is paid by the maker of the taxed product and not by the buyer. Since the tax is on a comparatively few manufacturers and is reflected in higher prices on the goods and not stated separately, Flat Tax On many people are not aware that they are paying the tax.

It seems likely this next year will see the enactment of many manufacturers' taxes, or perhaps a flat tax on all manufactured goods. The Treasury needs the money and a manufacturers' tax is easy to administer because there are only about 300,000 manufacturers. (If a sales tax had been enacted, a check would have had to have been kept on more than two and a half million retailers.) Also, such a tax is easier to get through Congress. Another proposal seriously being considered is that the scheduled reduction on corporation income taxes and many excise taxes slated for April 1 be postponed. At any rate, there's little doubt that some new taxes will be added to your bill early next year.

Zesty Food Befits Fall Days

CREAMED ham and eggs on toasted corn bread is a zesty dish indeed, good for Sunday breakfast or brunch, a delicious supper special, not to mention lively luncheon fare. It also provides a nice way of using the left-over tidbits from a boiled or baked ham.

Creamed Ham and Eggs

For 6 good servings, melt 1 1/2 dsp. butter; stir in 2 tsp. flour. Add 1 c. boiling water, stirring to keep smooth. Cook until sauce begins to thicken, then add 1 c. evaporated milk. Continue cooking until sauce is thickened. Add 2 c. diced, baked or boiled ham and 4 diced, hard-cooked eggs, mixing lightly to prevent eggs from crumbling. (Salt may be added, but usually the ham is salty enough to take care of the sauce.) Serve on squares of corn bread which have been split, toasted and buttered while piping hot.

Hot Corn Bread

To prepare the corn bread, pour 1/2 c. boiling water over 1 c. corn meal, stirring to blend well. Let cool. Corn meal should absorb all the water and still be

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mealy. Beat in 1 egg yolk, 1/4 tsp. salt, 1/4 c. each evaporated milk and water. Fold in one beaten egg white and tsp. melted butter. Pour into well-buttered, shallow baking pan. Bake at 425° F. until brown, or about 15 minutes.

Chicken Croquettes

Chicken croquettes with a mushroom sauce, simple to make and deliciously tender to eat, make a nice dish for about this time of year when something a little more substantial than a salad is in order for lunch or supper.

To prepare 2 large or 4 small croquettes, mix 1 1/2 c. finely ground chicken and 2 tsp. lemon juice into 1/2 can condensed cream of mushroom soup. Set in refrigerator to chill. Then shape into cylinders, balls or cutlets. To make the dipping mixture, cover the croquettes with bread or cracker crumbs, then dip into one egg beaten with 2 tsp. water. Dip in crumbs again. Fry in hot deep fat (365-385° F.) for 2-4 min. or until browned.

To prepare the sauce, mix 3 tsp. milk into 1/2 c. condensed cream of mushroom soup. Heat and serve with croquettes.

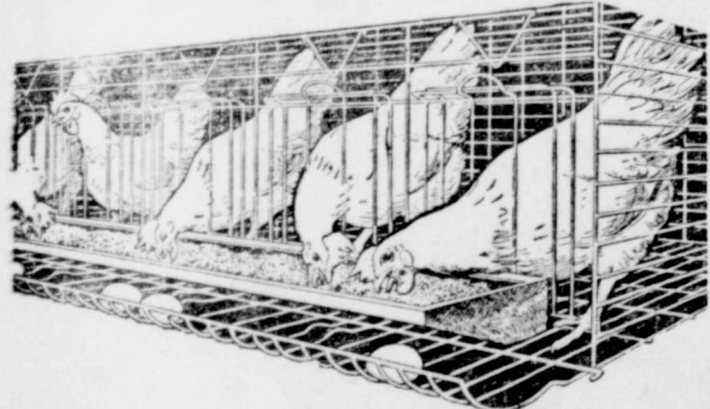

Social Security Withholding Tax Scheduled For Increase January 1

The social security tax rate for persons whose work counts toward old-age and survivors insurance is scheduled to increase on the first of January, 1954, James B. Marley, manager of the Austin social security office, reminded employers, employees, and self-employed people today.

This scheduled increase in tax contribution is in accordance with the 1950 amendments to the social security law, and was enacted by Congress in anticipation of future obligations of the program.

Employees in jobs covered by the law will have 2 per cent instead of the present 1 1/2 per cent deducted from their pay beginning with the first of January up to earnings of \$3600 a year; their employers will contribute an equal amount.

The new rates will apply to all taxable wages paid after December 31, 1953, regardless of when earned.

The social security tax for the self-employed is scheduled to increase from the present 2 1/4 per cent to 3 per cent, for the period commencing January 1, 1954. Since the self-employed whose work is covered by the law pay their tax just once yearly at the time of filing their Federal income tax return, they will pay the present 2 1/4 per cent social security tax on their 1953 income that counts toward social security. This will be due not later than March 15, 1954.

In the meantime the Internal Revenue Service reports that employers will be furnished late this year with income tax withholding tables and Federal Insurance Contributions Act (social security taxes) tables reflecting rates applicable next year. The next scheduled increase, six years from now, in 1960, will be 2 1/2 per cent each for employer and employee, and to 3 3/4 per cent for the self-employed.

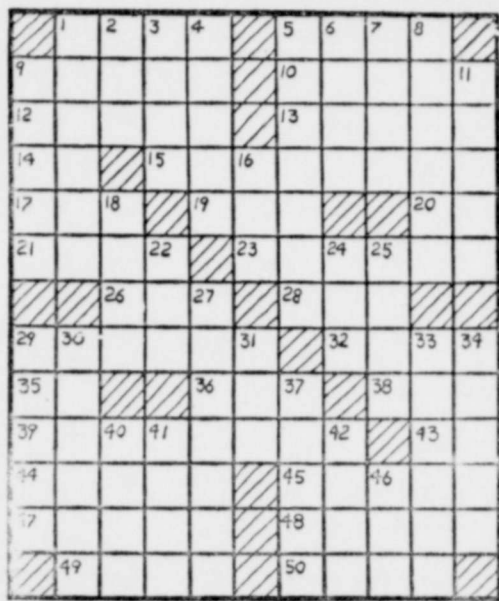

Many Livestock Producers Take Advantage Of Emergency Loans

More than \$11,689,000 in special livestock loans has been loaned to approximately 1,190 farmers and ranchers throughout the United States and nearly 600 other applications are being considered, George M. Dorman, Farmers Home Administration county supervisor for Mills County, reported this week.

The special livestock loan program authorized last July, helps established producers of cattle, sheep, and goats to maintain their herds, Mr. Dorman said. The producers who can borrow are those with good past records of livestock production but who are temporarily unable to get adequate credit from commercial banks, cooperative lending agencies, or other responsible sources to enable them to go ahead with normal livestock operations. They must have reasonable prospects of success with the help of a loan. Commercial feedlot operators are not included.

Applications can be made at the county Farmers Home Administration office in the Mills County Courthouse, Goldthwaite, Texas. Committees authorized by Secretary of Agriculture Benson approve the loans. Applications for more than \$50,000 must have final approval by the Secretary of

Agriculture in Washington. A borrower may use his loan funds for usual expenses of carrying on a livestock operation, including restocking his herd up to the number he held before he had to reduce his herd. The 5 per cent loans may be amortized over a 2-year period and secured by the best lien possible on the borrower's property and his personal obligation to repay the borrowed money. Other creditors, although not asked to subordinate their claims, are expected to agree to stand by so the farmer can have a fair chance to work out of his difficulties. Agreements are made to let the farmer apply a reasonable part of his livestock income to repaying the special livestock loan.

Household Hint

Genuine leather is a natural product and, as such, has a tendency to wrinkle. These wrinkles do not detract from the wearing qualities of the leather. However, dust and dirt gather in the wrinkles, and can eventually cause damage. Put a mild soap (saddle soap is best) on a damp, not wet, cloth and rub the surface of the leather briskly. Then rub with a moist cloth without soap. Rub dry with a clean, soft cloth. If some gloss disappears after the first two operations, it will be restored by the friction produced by the dry cloth.

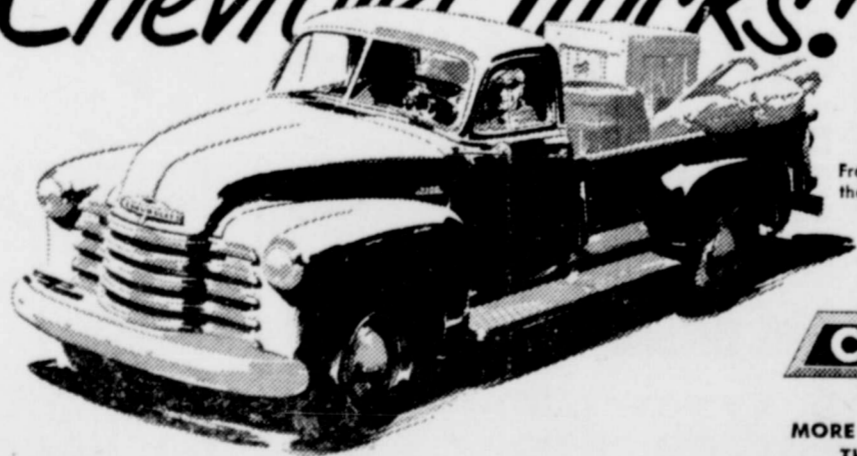

PARENT PROBLEMS
Effect of Divorce on Child
 By GARRY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D.
 THERE are 9,000,000 stepchildren in the United States, 1,000,000 of them between the ages of ten and sixteen, and their number is increasing, due to the high divorce rate and casualties in recent wars.
 Remarriage often brings into the home a new child or children. If the husband brings some of his children, and the wife brings some of hers, and they have a new set of children, "Your children and my children and our children" can multiply the problems. And stepchildren mean new and added in-laws to complicate matters further.
 Some interesting light is thrown on the dark experiences of stepchildren by Dr. William Carlsson Smith, in "The Stepchild," University of Chicago Press.
 Dr. Smith finds that the stepchild contributes more than his quota to juvenile delinquency, that girls are more affected by a broken home than boys and by a stepfather than by a stepmother.
 He says that "when a home that has been filled with conflicts finally breaks through separation or divorce, the children do not by that action all at once become happily adjusted. There had been a feeling of insecurity, but such a crisis usually deepens that feeling. The children are actually thrust into a great unknown, upon what to them is an uncharted sea."
Remain with Mother
 He notes that the children usually stay with the mother, and that if she goes with them to her parents, these children have to make adjustments to the grandparents and other relatives. So does their mother, who is a very different person from what she was when she left this home to
 marry.
 Consider the tug at the child's heartstrings by all the relatives and the possibility of increasing enmity toward the other parent.
 If the court should "cut a child in two," by assigning him part-time to one parent and part-time to the other, even if the parents have moved far away from each other, the child, Dr. Smith continues, "is apt to be under a taboo upon what he can say concerning events in the other household. Not only must he suppress part of his memories, but he must alter his personal habits and his family terminology each time that a shift is made."
A Parroted Half-Truth
 Writing about Dr. Smith's study, Dr. Paul Popenoe says in his bulletin, "Family Life":
 "His comments on the effect of divorce are particularly pertinent because of the half-truth so regularly parroted by women divorcing their husbands, that it is better to bring up a child in a peaceful home with one parent, than with an atmosphere of conflict with two parents. The logical solution would be to remove the conflict—a task frequently accomplished rather easily by competent marriage counseling . . . the court decree does not always bring peace!"
 However, Dr. Smith notes that many stepparents have proved successful with the stepchild and calls to mind the devotion of Abraham Lincoln whose stepmother, widow Sarah Bush Johnson, came to him three years after his real mother's death. We all know some divorced persons who have also been good stepparents. Truly they deserve applause for their achievement.
 Obviously, the stepchild whose one parent is dead faces fewer problems, as a rule, than if both parents are divorced.

FOR MORE PROFITABLE WHEAT

Will the coming restrictions on wheat acreage in Texas be a blessing in disguise? Perhaps — if it forces the farmer into more profitable practices. Surprisingly enough, wheat raised at average yields is often a relatively unprofitable crop. A recent study in a mid-western wheat growing area showed that average yields of 19 bushels per acre returned the farmer a profit of less than \$2 per acre if he got \$2 per bushel for his wheat. Actually, that farmer would be better off using his land for some other crop. This doesn't mean the farmer should stop growing wheat on the vast acreages of his land. It does mean he should stop wasting his time on 19-bushel wheat. He should boost his yields.

How about this business of boosting wheat yields? Sometimes it involves using quite a bit of fertilizer, and the necessity of greater mechanization of operations. Is it profitable? Researchers say "Yes." By using enough fertilizer

and time saving devices, the farmer can boost his yield to 40 bushels per acre and his profit to over \$32.00 in the mid-western area where studies were conducted.

The dollar-and-cents picture in the test area looked like this: The fixed cost for low yield wheat ran to \$32, plus \$4.33 worth of fertilizer, for a total cost of \$36.33 per acre. This yielded 19 bushels of wheat for a crop value of \$38. This meant only a profit of \$1.67 per acre, with wheat costing \$1.91 per bushel to produce.

On the other hand, the high yield wheat, using more fertilizer and efficient operations ran like this:

Fixed cost \$32, plus \$15.85 worth of fertilizer for a total of \$47.85 per acre. Production here amounted to 40 bushels per acre, for a crop value of \$80 per acre. This left a profit of \$32.15 per acre with wheat costing only \$1.20 per bushel to produce.

Of course, wheat acreage allotments are designed to hold down production, in the first place. But a farmer producing low yielding wheat on a vastly reduced acreage next year can easily be squeezed right out of the picture.

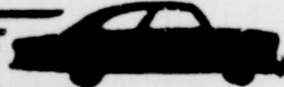
