Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

House's Un-Am Committee May Lose Its Independence | GOP as Well as Democrats Angered by Recent Actions

WASHINGTON—Although nothing is definitely decided, it will come as no surprise if a determined effort is launched when Congress returns to place the House un-American activities committee under the supervision of the House judiciary committee.

Such a move would set off an angry row on the House floor, but it has been given impetus by the recent performance of un-American activities committee's chairman, Harold H. Velde (R), Illinois, Velde peremptorily issued subpoenas for former President Harry S. Truman, South Carolina Gov. James F. Byrnes and Supreme Court Justice Tom Clark in the Harry Dexter White case.

The popularity of the committee has waned in recent years, and its recent actions have caused such concern that the Republican national committee took a hand in telling Velde to abandon his plans to investigate the White controversy.

All three of the subpoenas issued by Velde without consulting Democrats on the committee were ignored, and Republicans as well as Democrats are angry because this made the House seem ridiculous.

If the move to reduce the committee to a subcommittee of the judiciary group is made, Rep. Francis E. Walter (D), Pennsylvania, is expected to spearhead the fight.

Walter is the ranking minority member of the un-American activities committee and an influential member of the judiciary committee as well. He could make his demand when Congress holds its opening day session on Jan. 3 and adopts its rules for the year.

TRADE—Top government officials are highly concerned over Brazil's desire to trade with countries behind the Iron Curtain, because of what this may lead to in the rest of Latin America.

They are worried because they fear that this sort of trade might enable the Kremlin to get hold of strategic war materials.

However, the authorities concede that Brazil's desire stems purely from an effort to find markets for her goods and to solve pressing economic problems created by her increased purchases of foreign wheat and petroleum products.

Many Latin countries, according to the Washington authorities, are using Iron Curtain trade to bolster rapidly dwindling dollar supplies. However, if concessions are made for such legitimate purposes, they are likely to be used as levers to secure higher prices and other trade advantages.

COSTLY FATALITIES—Working for the government can be very dangerous! Secretary of the Interior Douglas McKay revealed recently that 243 were killed in 1952 while employed by the federal government. Most of the fatalities, which McKay termed "a shocking thing," occurred from falls and during the handling of materials.

Three million man-days were lost in 1952 through accidents, which also cost the government more than \$23 million in compensation. McKay disclosed that during 1951, one federal fatality cost the government \$151,530, and another the same year \$124,744. In the following year, one fatality cost \$144,407 in compensation, while several cost \$50,000.

RAIDS AID STOCKPILE—United States narcotics commissioner Harry J. Anslinger disclosed the other day that he sent 640 tons of morphine and other drugs to the nation's stockpile of critical commodities. Senators at hearings on juvenile delinquency had asked Anslinger what happens to the drugs he seizes in making raids on illicit sellers.

Anslinger said that "recoverable" drugs are sent to the national stockpile and pointed out that in event of war or other disaster, the need for pain-killers mounts. He said the stockpile has 640 tons of drugs as the result of raids. Incidentally, Anslinger pointed out that his undercover agents never sell drugs but deal only with those who have them to sell. "We buy, we don't sell," he said.

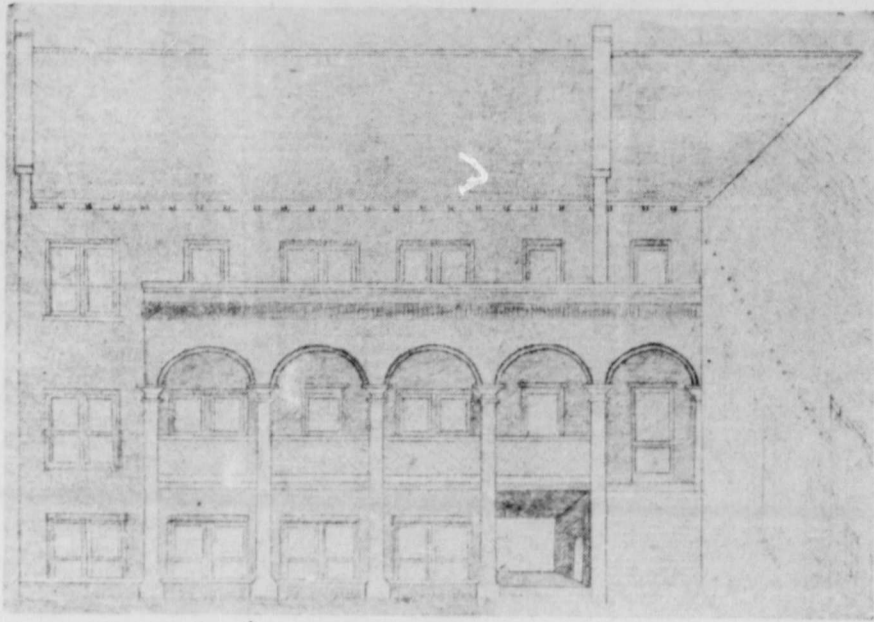

Refreshments for Children

YOU never know just when you'll be in on the planning or running of a party for the youngsters. Since it might be any time, here are some of the new recipes that we think may interest you.

When the last fall has been pinned on the donkey, these frosted "Raisin Ginger Cookies" will hit the spot, served with apple cider, hot chocolate foamy with cream, or glasses of milk.

**Raisin Ginger Cookies**  
To make up a batch of about 25 cookies, rinse one c. seedless raisins in hot water, drain and chop fine. Combine 1/2 c. boiling water, 1/4 c. each butter and shortening; stir in 1/2 c. (packed) brown sugar, and 1/4 c. molasses.

Sift 3 c. sifted all-purpose flour with 1/2 tsp. soda, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1 1/2 tsp. ginger, 1/2 tsp. nutmeg, 1/8 tsp. cloves and 2 tsp. baking powder. Stir into first mixture. Blend in raisins. Chill thoroughly.

Roll 1/4-in. thick on floured board. Cut into desired shapes and sprinkle with chopped, blanched almonds. Place on cookie sheet; bake at 350° F. about 10 min. Frost, if desired.

**Apricot Skillet Cake**  
Then, if you're on a baking

pre, for a special treat, make up a wonderful Apricot Skillet Cake, an upside down cake made on top of your range.

Line the bottom of the skillet with apricot halves, along with 3 pitted prunes to fashion eyes and nose.

Rinse and drain 1 c. dried apricots and cover with 2 c. cold water. Cook 20 min. in covered saucepan. Melt 1/2 c. butter in 10-in. iron skillet; add 1 packed c. brown sugar and 2 tbsp. liquid drained from apricots. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until a syrup is formed. Remove from heat and arrange drained apricot halves, cut side up, in syrup in skillet.

Cream 1/2 c. shortening and gradually add 1/2 c. granulated sugar, creaming thoroughly. Blend in one beaten egg. Sift together 1 1/2 c. sifted all-purpose flour, 2 tsp. baking powder and 1/2 tsp. salt; add to egg mixture alternately with 1/2 c. milk. Stir in tsp. vanilla extract. Pour batter carefully over fruit.

Bake at 350° F. 35 to 40 min., or until top of cake springs back when touched lightly. Remove from oven, let stand 5 min.; turn out of skillet with care, fruit side up. Serve warm. Serves 8.

### PARENT PROBLEMS

#### If Child Uses Your First Name

By GARRY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D.

SOME parents believe that they should encourage the child, as soon as he can talk, to call each parent by the first name. The assumption is that the youngster should feel he is a pal of each parent.

In the first place, most parents don't do this and, if you are so different, you arouse antagonism among your friends who are themselves parents.

**Confuses Relationship**  
Besides, the practice is un-sound. The little child gets a perverted notion about his relationship when he calls his mother or father by the first name. Always, he needs to realize that, with their greater age and experience, they are different. Always, they have certain responsibilities the youngster should recognize.

While trying to be a pal to the youngster, we forget that we have very different backgrounds and experiences, and we can't be equals no matter how ideal it may seem. He just lacks the experience to be on such terms, and when we try to be, we make ourselves ridiculous. There's a vast difference between trying to understand the child, whatever his age, and acting childishly toward him ourselves. We embarrass and annoy him when we do.

**When He Is Grown**  
Of course, after the child has grown up, his calling his parents by their first names may be very desirable. But when he is three, five or twelve, the matter is very different.

Parents must work out this matter for themselves, of course.

But so long as they feel certain responsibilities for the child of two, eight or fourteen, why should they fool themselves? Those parents who agree with the foregoing will, as soon as the child begins to talk or earlier, address and refer to each other as Daddy or Mother or by such other terms as they prefer.

But if your child should address you as Mary or Joe, don't be shocked. Say nothing about it. Just continue referring to your spouse as Mother or Daddy.

**Neighbors or Close Friends**  
When a child three, five or ten, hears us refer to a close friend as Jean or Sam, he may do likewise. Some parents meet this problem early by referring to the close friend as "Aunt Jean" or "Uncle Sam." Such reference suggests to the young child an expression of friendship and affection.

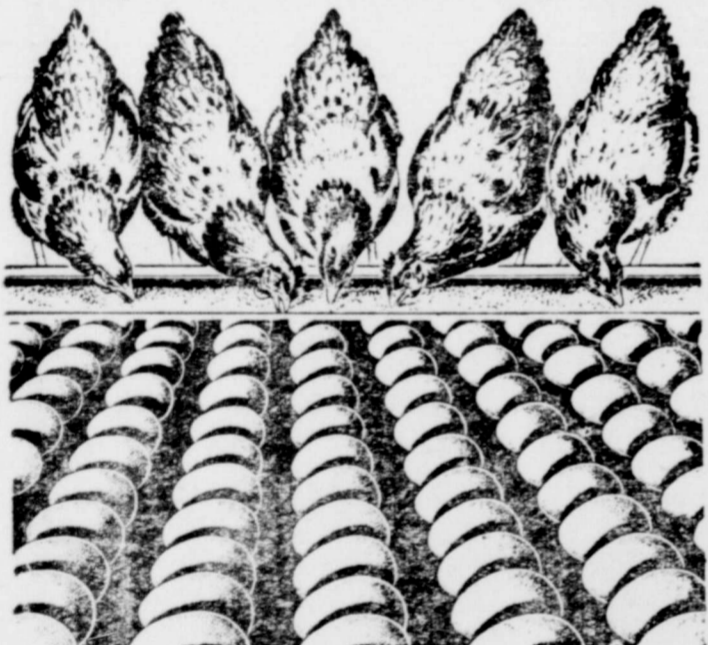
If, on the other hand, we encourage the growing child to address our adult friends merely by their first name, we usually hamper the growing child in his learning to acquire wholesome deference for older persons.

**Cultivating Deference**  
With our population having an increasing number of older persons, we can well afford, I believe, to cultivate in our growing children a reasonable deference for adults, especially for aged people.

A more serious problem may arise with the foster child or child who has a step-parent. Usually the acting parents can agree on a sensible manner of his addressing each of them, instead of by the first name.

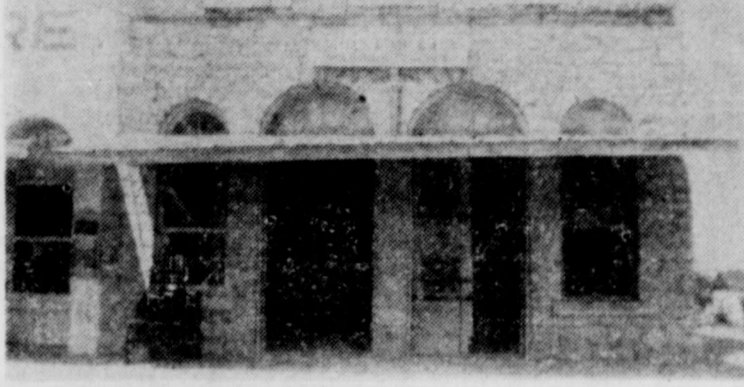

Agriculture Secretary Benson Talks Solution Of Present Farm Problems

By EZRA TAFT BENSON Secretary of Agriculture Part II

Any effective solution of today's farm problem must provide methods for reducing our huge stockpile of agricultural commodities...

Getting rid of these surpluses is only half of our problem. Even if we were able to bring them down to manageable proportions...

We already have approximately \$2.5 billions tied up in loans on farm commodities...

Our present program does not encourage the production shifts which are required to meet the changing market demands...

Of course, we could destroy some of our surpluses. Remember the government's potato fiasco of a few years ago?

Or we might plow under every third row of cotton and kill little pigs. Remember the mid-1930's?

Actually, we would not even consider such wasteful practices.

We are attempting to move surplus food and fiber into foreign markets. World prices, however, are well below the figures at which we acquired these commodities...

At the same time, we must avoid outright dumping, which would disrupt normal trade channels and bring down upon us the wrath of other friendly countries.

There are these other alternatives:

We can make a final effort to move surpluses out of warehouses and into stomachs by promoting greater public consumption of some commodities. We can push forward in our research programs to uncover new uses for farm goods. We can throw our entire weight behind plans for expanding present foreign markets and finding new outlets overseas.

Along these lines, I can report that our promotional campaign, undertaken with the meat industry and food stores, is producing real results. We are consuming beef this year at the rate of 75 pounds per person, the highest in our history.

Farm exports have turned upward since July 1, reflecting our emphasis upon expanding trade. Continued high employment at home, with national income at record levels, means a strong demand for farm goods

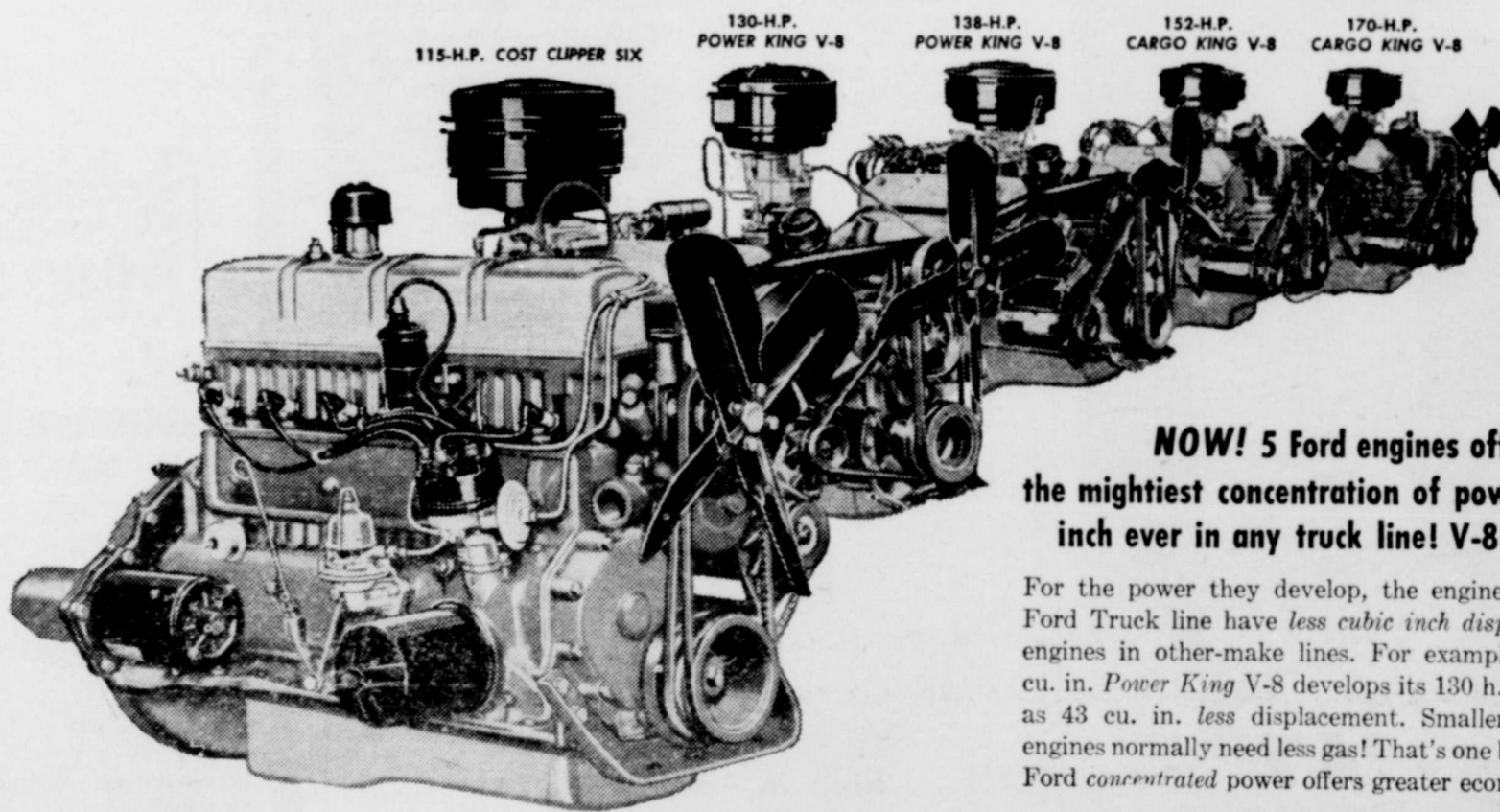
Our population is growing at a rate of more than 2,000,000 per year which means that by 1975 there will be 200,000,000 Americans. Our future farm problems may involve questions of shortages, rather than surpluses.

We cannot wait for an expanding population to solve our immediate troubles, however. We need an interim to encourage shifts to other crops. We must halt further build-ups of government stockpiles now. Our urgent need is for a price support program which can be

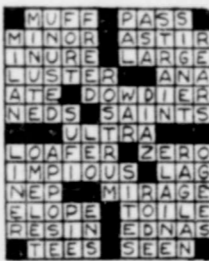

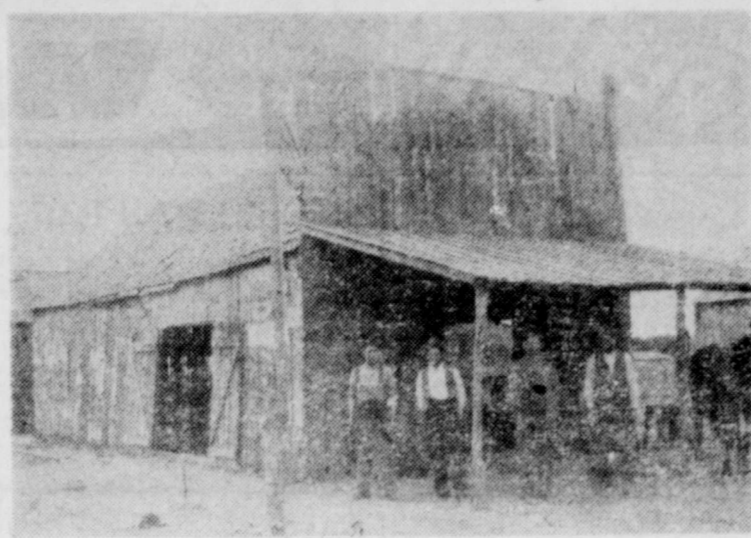

**Burns Blacksmith Shop Of 1890**



Pictured here is the Burns Blacksmith shop, built in 1890, on the site where the new Burns Building has just recently been completed which now houses the U. S. Post Office here in Goldthwaite.

Show in the picture at the left is Andrew "Buck" Burns, half brother of Robert L. Burns pictured second from right, owner of the establishment and father of Oscar T. Burns. Others in the picture were not identified.

The corner was purchased by Robert L. Burns from F. J. Semple of Brownwood in 1890. He erected the building, one of the first buildings in Goldthwaite, and operated a blacksmith shop there for many years. Later he leased the corner to the Smith Brothers who operated a garage and service station. At one time the building was destroyed by a cyclone and then rebuilt by folks of the community donating their labor. The building was later purchased by Oscar Burns who in turn leased it to Ches Frazier. Frazier Brothers operated the corner station until the new building was started in the Summer of 1953.

**During the Young Crib-Shaker**

GARRY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D.  
 Mothers write me of the child, from one to four, who has his crib. Usually, he does while standing up and holding onto one side of the crib. He may do this at each bedtime or bedtime, until he governs himself out.  
 Sometimes this grows out of the youngster's being placed in the crib as both a bed and a play place. A very bad practice. You let the child to associate his as a place to sleep and not play. Cut your budget elsewhere, if necessary, to have a lar play pen, and don't figure his sleeping in it.  
 Others who accept the prevailing theories of bringing up a baby suppose they should let do about as he pleases in his assuming he will eventually sleep. Often he does, but only many minutes or hours of ng with toys, walking about rib or shaking it. He doesn't while in action or in an up-position.  
**The First Year**  
 During his first year, he may be kept in a horizontal position by being fastened down by a bag or bedclothes. The can be dangerous, since is a possibility of suffocation unless the covers are fastened only over his When he begins to stand up at bedtime or naptime, it is not point to train him.

But while this may work well for a while he may expect you to ways to be right with him or to pat and teeter him for the following months and years indefinitely. Another easy way is to have him lie down with you in your bed, yet that also is pretty sure to start an endless nuisance.

In case you use this method, be on hand where you can see him the moment he rises, to provide the pain immediately and without exception. Say nothing about his going to sleep. Just see that he stays down.  
**For Bed-Shaking**  
 Apply the same measures to correct bed-shaking. Let everything else go so as to provide instant pain without exception if you have the slightest reason to suppose the child has fears alone in the bed. Leave his door ajar with a dim light outside.  
 Often he is in the next room or walk by his door making some familiar sounds. Even enter his room occasionally as if on an errand. But stick to the rule he must not rise to his feet or knees. If you don't believe you should employ this method, just go on hoping that the problem will disappear after a good many years.

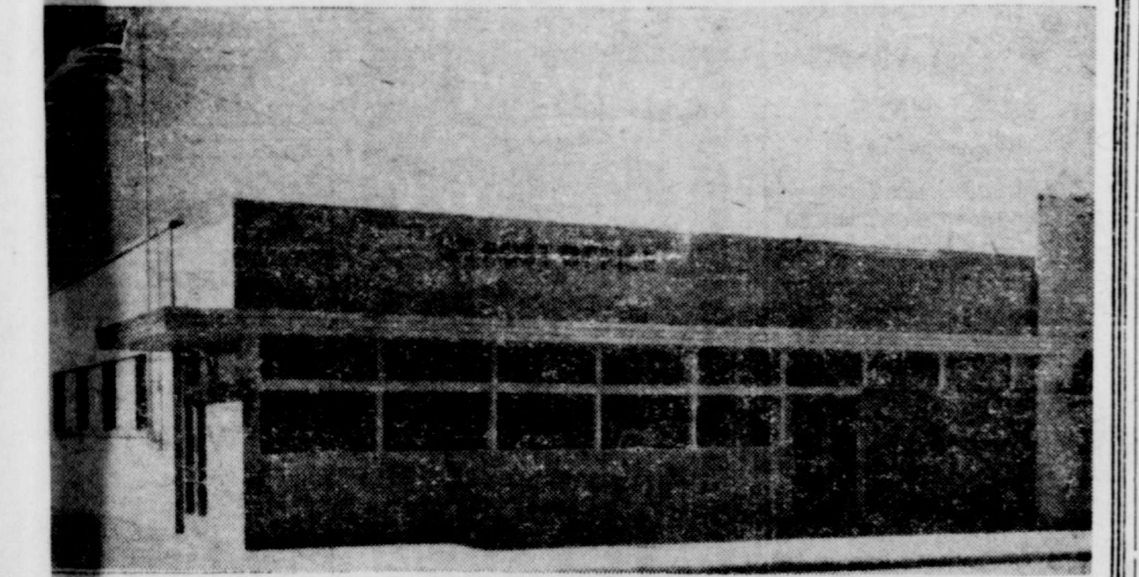

In September 1946 Colonel Stokes returned from Military Leave and resumed the postmastership. When he was recalled to three months Army duty in October 1947, Mrs. Fairman was placed in full charge of the office. In the fall of 1948 Colonel Stokes again received orders for Army duty and he then requested transfer from Postmaster to Rural Carrier. On December 1, 1948 Mrs. Fairman was appointed Acting Postmaster by President Harry S. Truman. At that time she had had 12 years service in the post office. After passing the Civil Service postmaster examination, she received the permanent appointment. This was confirmed by the Senate on September 20, 1950.

Mrs. Fairman was thus not only the first woman to receive the permanent appointment as Postmaster in Goldthwaite but was the first postmaster here to be selected from the ranks of Civil Service employees.

During the five years that she has been postmaster, she has been responsible for many improvements in the operation and equipment of the post office.

Through her tactful persistence she was able to convince Post Office officials of the need for a better post office building in Goldthwaite, and the modern new office is a tribute to her ability.

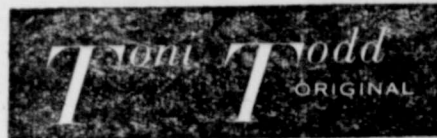

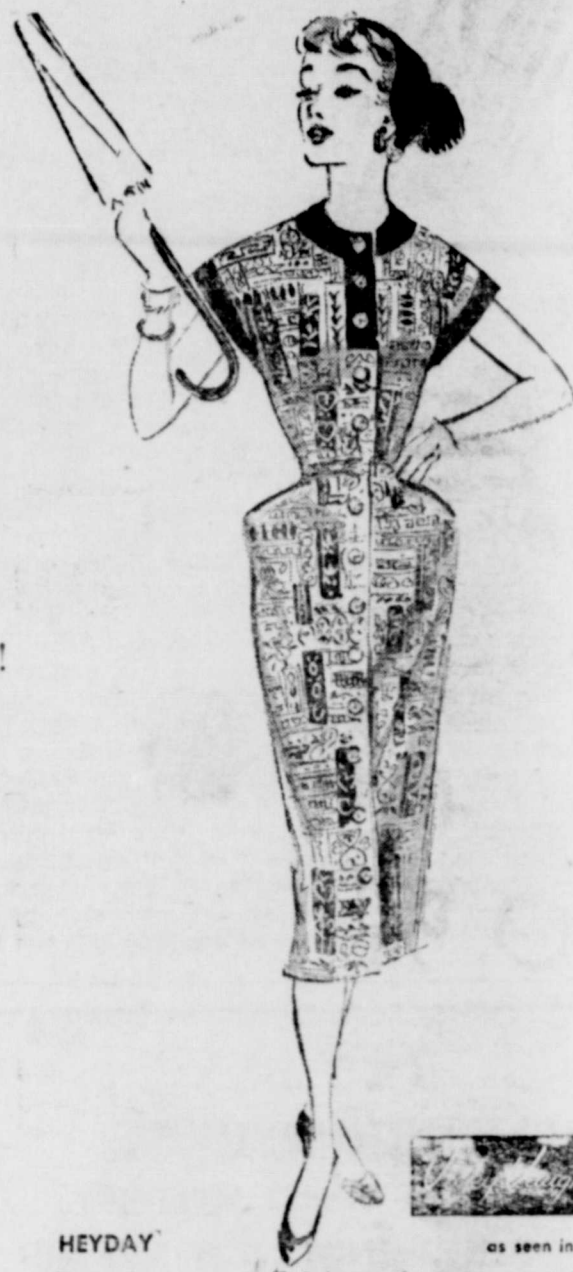

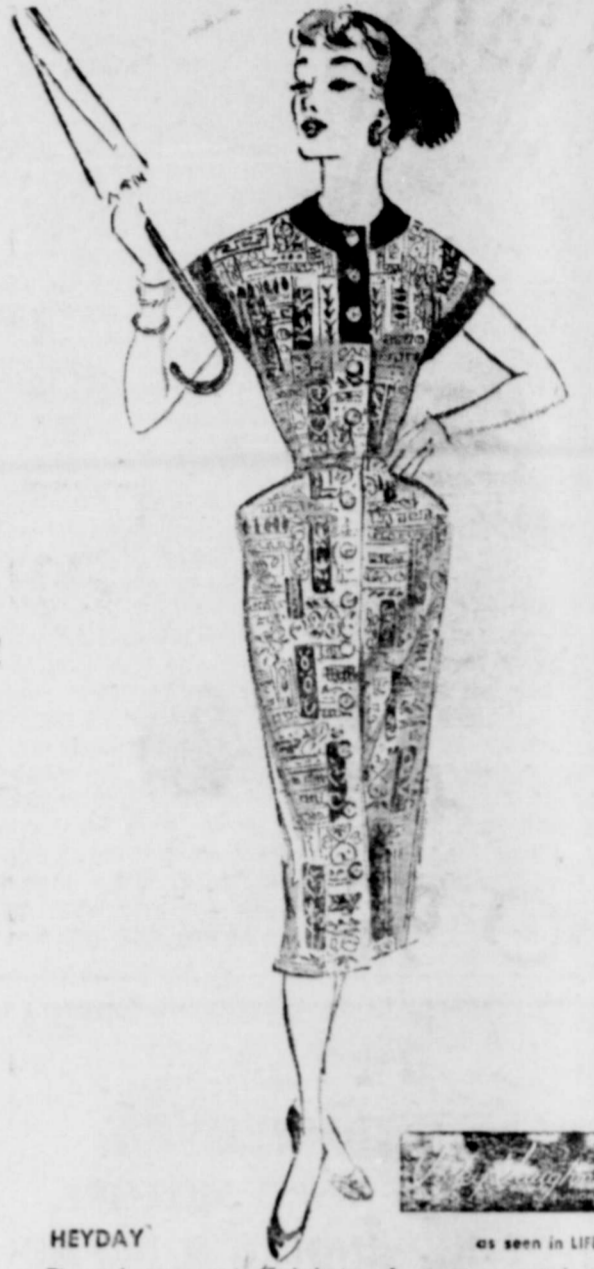
