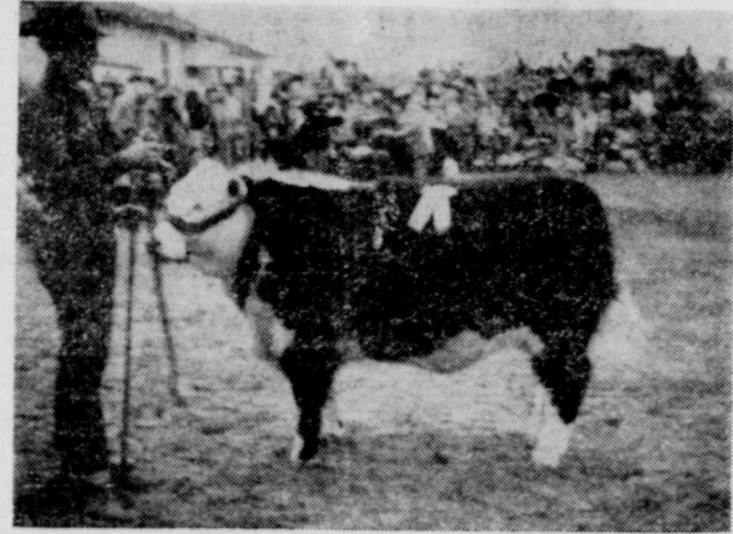

Mills County Commission Company Has Record Year In 1953 Sales

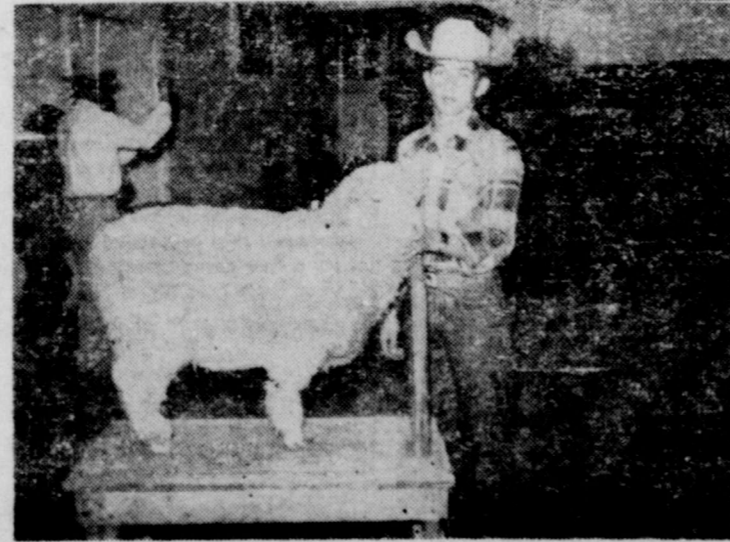
Mills County Commission Company had a record year in livestock sales for 1953, according to S. D. "Sig" and Malcolm Jernigan, owners and operators of the firm, selling 272,446 head of sheep, goats and cattle in the twelve month period. The company sold through their

sales ring 171,250 head of sheep, 98,950 head of goats and 2,237 head of cattle. Cattle sales are for a period from January until June when cattle sales were temporarily discontinued. Sheep sales showed the largest increase in number of head over the previous year, going from 101,852 in 1952 to 171,250 in 1953. In 1950 they sold 151,149 head of sheep which was the highest number in the four year period until a few records were established last year.

Goat sales have shown a steady increase over the past four year period with a consistent increase in number of head sold each year. 66,858 head of goats were sold in 1950 as compared with 98,950 in 1953. Total volume of cash realized from these sales took a big drop during the past two years, reflecting the decrease in livestock prices. In 1951 dollar volume of sales of the firm was \$4,395,859.49 as compared with \$1,206,259.64 in 1953.

Mills County Commission Company, of Goldthwaite, which has built a reputation during the past five years as the "Biggest Little Sheep and Goat Sale in Texas," contributes much to the financial stability of the community. During the past year the firm paid \$29,376.83 in salaries.

W. T. "Son" Lee Announces For Commissioner

W. T. "Son" Lee, of Mullin, has authorized the Eagle to announce his candidacy for commissioner in precinct three, subject to the primary election in July.

Mr. Lee has lived in Mullin since 1923, except for five years during World War II, and has worked for the present and former commissioner in his precinct for six years.

In making his announcement he issued the following statement: "I have never held public office and since I have worked in the precinct for several years I feel that I am qualified to take care of the job and serve the taxpayers in looking after their interests. I sincerely solicit the support and cooperation of voters in my behalf. I will try to see all of you before the primary and if I fail to see some I do want you to know that I will appreciate your support."

City Health Officer Recommends Dogs Be Vaccinated

Dr. M. A. Childress, city health officer, has issued a statement which recommends that all dogs be vaccinated against the disease of rabies. His statement follows:

"Due to the fact that several rabid dogs have been located in Mills and Hamilton Counties, it is recommended that dogs be vaccinated against this disease. There is a City Ordinance at present time requiring that dogs be vaccinated, but the ordinance has not been strictly enforced.

"A dog should be vaccinated when it is 6 months of age and re-vaccinated annually. The vaccination can be done by any veterinarian. The cost of vaccination is small and includes the cost of a tag and certificate of immunization."

Wayne Poe of Star, member of the Mills County 4-H Chapter, carried away the grand champion ribbon for his exhibit in the 4-H and FFA fat calf show at Mills County Livestock Raisers' sixteenth annual show in Goldthwaite Monday and Tuesday of this week. The champion Hereford was bred by Turner Ranch of Sulphur, Oklahoma. Before being judged the grand champion he was pronounced the champion of the

heavy weight—951 pounds or over—class. He weighed 1,015 pounds.

The reserve champion of the show was exhibited by Billy Mac Newton, another 4-H Club member of Star. It was a Jim Dibrell, of Coleman, Hereford calf, which was also champion of the medium weight—851 to 950 pounds—class.

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Democrats Now Making Bid For Elusive Suburban Vote | Big Cities' Fringe Area Long Republican Stronghold

WASHINGTON—The Democratic national committee has been doing some quiet spadework in the suburbs of large cities. While the metropolitan centers are usually weighted on the Democratic side, suburban areas—which have expanded rapidly in population since the war—have been Republican strongholds.

Party spokesmen have complained that many suburban dwellers seem to change their politics when they move from a city to its adjoining area.

Chairman Stephen A. Mitchell disclosed the other day that he has been doing some extensive work to get Democratic activity organized in the suburbs. The immediate aim, he added, is not necessarily to turn up Democratic majorities but "to start reducing the Republican majority" in the suburban communities.

These sections will be watched closely in the 1954 congressional elections and if Mitchell has his way will be hotly contested.

SEGREGATION ARGUMENTS — The federal government's arguments before the Supreme Court urging outlawing of racial segregation in public schools did not satisfy either side in the controversy but they are now drawing some delayed praise.

Negro petitioners were disappointed because the government's statement was not a ringing appeal for equality such as the Truman administration filed. Southern states were in direct opposition to the government and had hoped the Justice department would take a middle-of-the-road course.

Closer examination of the 188-page brief shows that it was an extremely thorough historical document—containing much material not in the lengthiest histories and must have been dug out of publications and papers dating back 90 years. The statement is now viewed as a calm and rational viewpoint in the midst of heated debate.

For example, it notes that a ban on segregation would not necessarily force mingling of races in most southern schools because attendance would still be on a districting basis. In the south, white and Negro residential areas are separate.

NEW FIGHTER PLANE—The Navy and Air Force are jointly testing the Grumman Aircraft corporation's F-10-F Jaguar, the first fighter plane designed with wings that can vary the degree of sweepback while in flight.

A development of the Bell Aircraft X-5 experimental plane, the Jaguar, can sweep its wings from the regular 90-degree angle at takeoff, achieving a reported 35-degree sweepback when in supersonic flight.

The need for this variable wing has become apparent because at takeoff the straight wing has been found to give the best performance and at the speed of sound the swept-wing has top utility.

Both services are keenly interested in the development because it has also been found that at speeds above Mach 1.5—or one and one-half times the speed of sound—straight wings once again come back into their own and give better performance than swept-wings.

Soup's On—It's a Special!

By ALICE DENHOFF

COOLER weather finds a warm welcome awaiting a nice, big turkey soup, a hearty, savory soup. Excellent as are all our commercial soups, it is fun, once in a while, to rustle up a special of one's own, such, perhaps, as a special sour cream soup, the recipe to serve 8.

Cube one pound of beef. Add 1½ qts. water, 1½ tsp. salt, one onion, 2 tsp. parsley and one bay leaf, all finely cut. Cook slowly until meat is tender, about 3 hrs. Add 2 beets, chopped, then cook another 20 min.

Meantime, cube and steam 4 medium potatoes. Add one c. sour cream to soup and pour hot soup over steamed potatoes.

We have a friend who serves this as the hot dish at her buffet suppers and is it a success!

Here's a recipe for making a soup from the bones and trimmings left over from a turkey dinner.

To serve 8, place in soup kettle

the turkey bones and trimmings. Add one large onion, 2 carrots, one c. diced celery, 2 tsp. minced parsley, ¼ tsp. mace, tsp. Worcestershire sauce and 3 qts. water. Cook on low heat for several hours. When done, strain, and add ½ tsp. lemon rind, salt and pepper to taste.

Seasonal and Delicious

Portuguese Potato Soup is delicious, and just about right for this time of year, too.

For 6 servings, grate 4 good-sized raw potatoes. Bring 2 qts. meat stock to boil, add the grated potatoes, and simmer for 30 min. Rub through a sieve and return to saucpan. Keep hot.

A few minutes before serving, chop a bunch of water cress fine, and add to soup, seasoning with salt and pepper to taste. Put the yolks of 4 eggs in soup tureen and stir in one c. scalded milk. Stir in a few spoonfuls of the hot soup, mix well, then pour in the remainder. Sprinkle with 4 tsp. grated cheese. Serve piping hot.

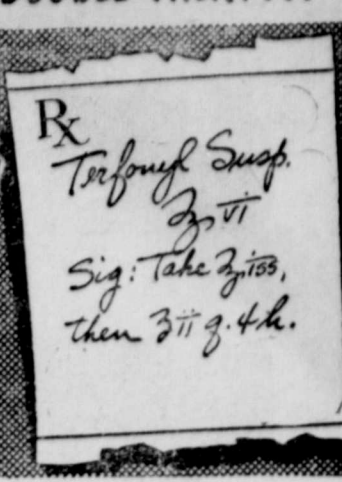

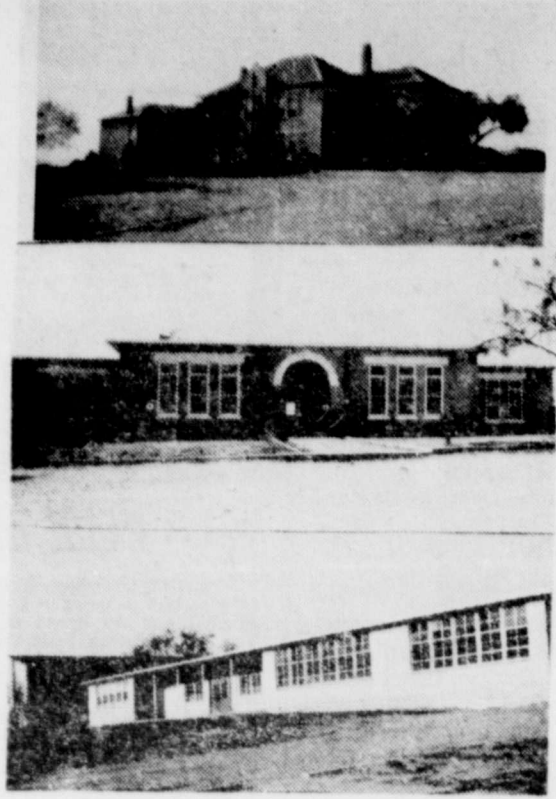

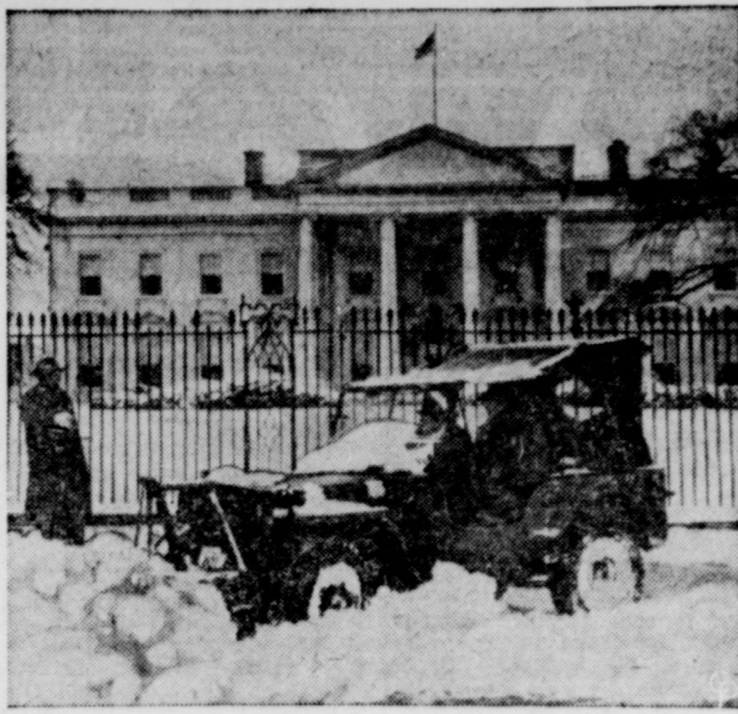

PARENT PROBLEMS

Modern Discipline Theories May Lead Some Parents Astray

By GARRY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D.

AS a rule, when a clergyman, superintendent of schools, judge or popular lecturer makes a public statement about the prevalence of juvenile delinquency and crime, he places the blame on parents, their neglect and indifference. Even when you raise the subject with the average teacher, she echoes this blame of parents.

Granted that some parents are indifferent and neglectful of their children, and that a few are unfit to bring up children, yet the vast majority of parents are very much concerned about their children, and have tried hard to bring them up to be worthy and respected citizens. Many parents whose children have gone wrong have cried their hearts out over these children. Many have spent sleepless nights, even hours and hours of prayer over wayward children.

Unable to Control
As a rule, these parents never succeeded in controlling their children. Most of these parents believed from what they had heard and read that they should not restrain the child in his early years, and that they were brutes if they laid a hand on the toddler to teach him the meaning of No, even to save his life. These parents, practically all parents, supposed that the rank and file of child experts have constantly warned against home restraints of a child and advised that a child should be allowed to do about as he pleases and expected to do only what he feels like do-

ing without inhibitions, or requirements.

Therefore, instead of condemning all parents whose children go wrong, why not place a good deal of the blame where it obviously belongs—on the army of gifted writers and teachers, looked up to as experts, who have told parents not to control their children when they could?

Specialists Criticized
The Most Reverend Richard J. Cushing, Roman Catholic Archbishop of Boston, had this to say in a keynote address at the National Conference on Catholic youth work: "While spanking delinquent parents, we should also lay the rattan on those modern, secularistic, sophisticated specialists in education, who have denied authority to parents and have tried to usurp the place of the home in training of the young."

This speaker maintained that theories which condemn all discipline and set up false standards of material success and minimize the importance of moral and religious training must bear part of the blame for the failure of some parents. He also held that a happy home, no matter where it was, could help curb the upsurge of juvenile delinquency. He seemed to imply, what I have asserted in this column over a number of years, that early home restraint of the child, in an atmosphere of family love, is essential to home happiness.
