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RED CROSS BLOOD PROGRAM (GUEST EDITORIAL)

There is always a certain satisfaction in dropping the roundabout, tactful approach to hit straight from the shoulder It is, however, a departure so unpalatable to so many people that it is generally adopted only when the importance of the subject reduces the protests of damaged egos to the dimensions of a whimpering child who wanted his pill sugar-coated. It is a step not to be taken lightly or without due regard for the repercussions which usually follow unadorned truth. But certainly the safeguarding of human life justifies any unpleasant aftereffects.

For years, the Red Cross has pleaded and cajoled with the able-bodied adults of this and other communities to become blood donors. Their approach has been almost too tactful and unassuming, considering what it is they are asking and that they are not asking it for themselves. Fortunately, for those people who have a sense of responsibility toward their fellow man, no more direct approach is necessary. There are many of those people, but there are not enough to supply all the blood needed to carry out the merciful work of the blood program. There are just too many other people who follow the line of least resistance - let George do it. It is they who mumble excuses, or fail to appear at a bloodmobile at their appointed time. It is also they who denounce the Red Cross, the local hospital, and the world in general the most loudly if there were not blood on hand to save the life of a member of their

There are still others who can be labeled potential blood denors. They are the persons who need only to be made aware of the tremendous scope and great needs of the blood program to become regular blood donors. It is our purpose now to present some straight facts in an effort to promote understanding of the blood program on the part of the people it has been established to serve, and upon whom its success depends.

A certain amount of confusion exists because of the cease-fire order in Korea. Actually, that has not altered the present needs of the blood program as it affects us directly. Gamma globulin, the only protection available at present against crippling effects of polio, requires thousands of additional pints. Not only must a large quantity of blood be collected each month, but its collection must be geared to the continuous meeds of blood. It defeats the very purpose of the blood program if there is extra blood available one day and none for the next three days. In an effort to keep blood supplies steady, Red Cross bloodmobiler are scheduled well in advance and the collections at each, estimated wherever possible. It is quickly apparent what happens when a bloedmobile unit is cancelled, or a quota is not met. The entire region suffers a lack which must be measured in terms of human life and human suffering. The whine of an ambulance siren in the middle of the night can be a dreadful sound when there is no blood on hand to

There are 5,999 citizens residing in Mills County. The last time the Red Cross bloodmobile came here, only 97 pints of blood were donated. Was one of those pints yours, or did you let George do it?

The Red Cross Blood Program is your program. If you were asked if you would rather pay up to seventy-five dollar a pint for blood obtained from commercial sources, or whether you would rather have a pint of Red Cross bloed without charges, what would your answer be? But unless you support the Red Cross Blood Program by donating blood yourself and encouraging others to do so, there may come a time when you have no choice. The future of the blood program is up to you. Are you up to the challenge? When the Red Cross bloodmobile comes here again on February 12, will you donate a pint of your blood? Or will George have to do it for you again?

Latin American Trade Boost Congress Aim? Capehart and Smathers Urge Business Drive

trading operations south of the border more attractive to buyers and sellers In another development, Senator George H. Smathers (D), Florida, says the United States "must cultivate more trade with Latin America." He comments: "We have got to get busy and trade more with them, Tax barriers also have to be

Most trade experts agree a substantial market or American goods can be opened up if the governnent moves to provide a certain amount of stimuation. The whole problem may get a thorough airing at the hearings Capehart is now planning.

• SIT OUT POSSIBILITY-Don't be surprised if Senate Democrats "sit out" some of the toughest regislative battles which come up in the new session of Congress. Despite the fact they are leaving the Republicans in control of the Senate, they hold a 48 to 47 numerical advantage over the GOP and the one Independent, Senator Wayne Morse of Oregon, is expected to

side with them on almost every issue. However, prominent Democratic leaders favor a strategy in which they will leave it up to the Republicans to scrap over President Eisenhower's legislative program. They will sit by as silent observers so that any quarrels among the GOP will be fully spotlighted.

This will be particularly true when debate opens on reciprocal trade, foreign aid, taxation, boosting the debt limit and other measures where Republicans are divided among themselves.

These tactics may compel the President to exert his influence for harmony among the two wings of his party even more than anticipated and it may enable the Democrats to point to the GOP as a divided, undecisive political faction when the 1954 congressional campaigns get underway.
