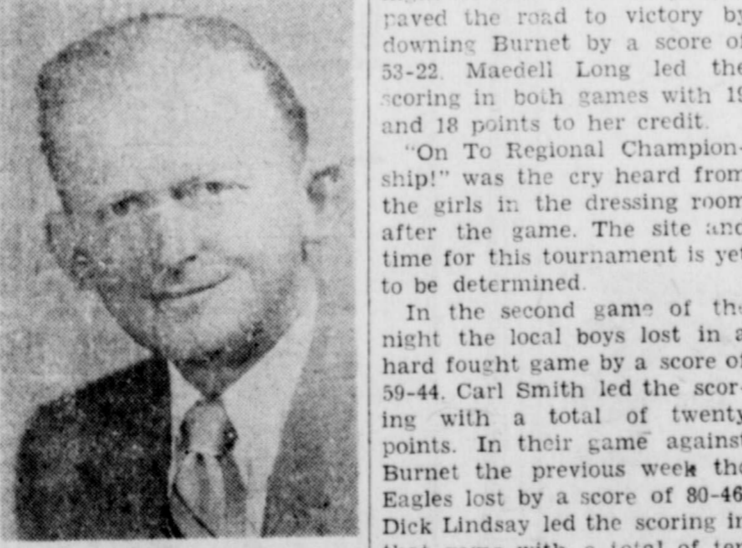
### Local School District To Elect Trustees

### Mills County Is Re-Instated For Drouth Feed Aid

According to announcement by A. C. Henderson, manager of the local ASC office, Mills County has been re-instated for drouth emergency feed program. Feeds available under the program are shelled corn at \$1.00 per bushel, wheat at \$1.10 per bushel. Mixed feed number one, consisting of 1,000 pounds corn, 500 pounds wheat and 500 pounds of mill ingredients. Mixed feed number two, 1,500 pounds corn and 500 pounds mill ingredients. Mill ingredients include cottonseed meal, alfalfa meal, soy bean meal, minerals and syrup. Percentage of mix depending on the mill. Applications for drouth feed are made at the ASC office and after they are approved corn and wheat are handled by that office and the mixed feeds are handled through local feed stores.

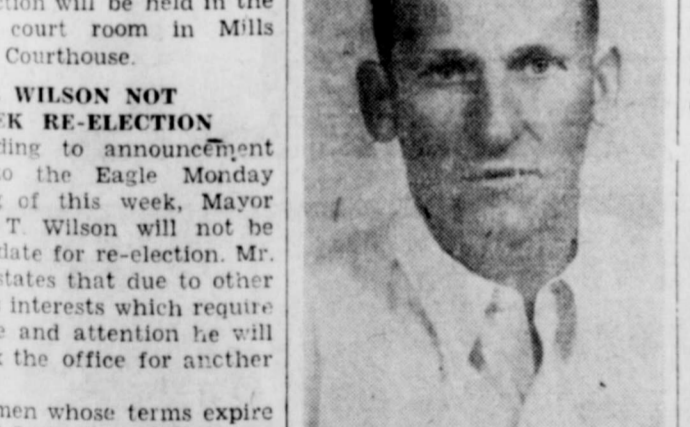

Democrats' Recession Talk Irks Republicans Just Propaganda Stunt GOP Senator Retorts

WASHINGTON—Republicans in Congress are questioning the motives of statements of Democrats that the economy is undergoing a recession coupled with demands that the Eisenhower administration prepare to meet a depression.

Some GOP leaders privately discount recession talk as merely a propaganda tactic launched by their political foes in advance of the 1954 congressional races.

They concede that two of the Democratic spokesmen who warned of recession—Senators Paul Douglas of Illinois and John Sparkman of Alabama—are well-qualified economists.

However, the Republicans argue that the economy is merely undergoing an "adjustment" which is normal in the changeover from a near-war footing to a peacetime industrial set-up and that any spotty economic conditions which develop are temporary.

One GOP senator declares it is too early to tell if a recession is underway. He comments: "The facts just don't support this view at the present time. If the Democrats keep talking about a recession or a depression, there may be something to my notion that this is a propaganda stunt."

**● CONFUSION ON THE FARM FRONT**—House and Senate members who expected a heavy mail on the President's farm proposals anticipate that it will prove more confusing than informative inasmuch as the three major farm organizations are each advocating a different plan.

The National Grange advocates a two-price system which would feature high supports for commodities grown for domestic consumption and the rest to be sold at prevailing world market prices.

The Farm Bureau, largest of the three groups, generally favors the administration recommendation for flexible price supports on all commodities.

The Farmers Union wants the present program continued and for that matter, extended to other commodities including livestock.

At this point, it looks like the Farmers Union, a consistent critic of the Eisenhower administration's handling of farm problems, will emerge the winner. Even the most ardent pro-Eisenhower congressmen admit there is little chance that flexible supports can be adopted in an election year and that the outlook is for a continuation of the present farm policy.

**● TRIMMING THE FAT**—The Navy plan to put 50 ships in moth balls during the next 18 months is viewed by Washington experts as another indication of the administration's determination to keep the military budget within reasonable limits.

Basically, the move is in much the same category as the intended withdrawal of two United States Army divisions from Korea and is hailed essentially as an economy move.

The Navy has not yet announced what types of vessels will be deactivated except for the heavy cruiser *Quincy* but presumably some of the others will include smaller, auxiliary craft of various types.

Whatever the type, however, it does spell out the intention of the Pentagon to cut down on personnel for the armed services, always a key item of expense in the federal budget.

The Navy move is also seen as insignificant in that it points up the administration's announced intention of placing the chief security on air power.

**● THREE-SHIRT SENATOR**—Senator Ralph Flanders (R), Vermont, who during the recess made a six-week trip to Australia to visit his children and grandchildren, *One Awaiting*, reported to his senatorial colleagues that he made the journey equipped with only three shirts and three *One Awaiting*, pairs of shorts. *One Awaiting!*

Flanders said that by using synthetic nylon shirts and shorts, he cut his packing problem to a minimum but the experiment did convert him into a short order laundryman.

He told fellow senators that under his formula, a traveler "wears one shirt, has one in the suitcase and the third on a hanger drying."

**Hearty Budget Main Dishes**

HEARTY, satisfying fare on the menu today, worked out with an eye to the budget.

Hamburger Pie will be the first recipe, a treat even when economy is not the order of the day.

**Hamburger Pie**

To serve 6, sauté 1/2 c. onion and 3 tsp. minced green pepper in 1 tsp. butter until clear. Add 1 1/2 pounds ground beef and cook, stirring frequently, until lightly browned. Combine an 8-oz. can tomato sauce, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. celery salt, 1/2 tsp. pepper, 1/4 tsp. kitchen bouquet. Add to meat. Place 3 sliced and cooked medium-sized carrots on pie crust lining 9-inch tin. Add half the meat mixture. Add 1 c. cooked peas and top with remaining meat. Bake at 375° F. for 1 hr. Serve with tomato-mushroom sauce.

**Lamb Shanks**

Lamb Shanks with Italian Sauce to serve 2-3 is our next offering.

Melt 2 tsp. butter or oil in skillet. Fry 1/2 c. chopped sweet onions and 1 green pepper that has been seeded and chopped, frying until soft and golden. Remove. When buying the lamb shanks, get about 2 lbs. and have the meat cut into serving-sized pieces. Dredge meat in flour. Brown in fat left over from on-

ions. (Do not add more fat as shanks are fairly fat themselves.) Remove and place in casserole with 1/2 tsp. garlic powder, 3/4 tsp. oregano, tsp. dried basil, 2 tsp. dried parsley flakes. Also add tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. pepper. No. 2 can Italian tomatoes, and 1 c. stock which may be made from bouillon cube and hot water. Cover and cook in 350° F. oven until shanks are tender—about 1 hr.

For one of those hurry-up meals, try scrambled spaghetti.

**Scrambled Spaghetti**

Brown 1/4 c. chopped bacon. Add equal amounts of minced onion, chopped celery and green peppers to suit. Mix together and brown. Add 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/4 tsp. pepper and 8 oz. ground beef. Cook 10 minutes. Add 3 c. spaghetti and 2 c. tomato juice. Mix well in large pot and cook 15 minutes longer. Youngsters go for that one!

**Hearty Casserole**

To eke out a meat course a little on the short side, serve a hearty vegetable such as Oregano Eggplant. Sauté a medium-sized eggplant cut in slices with minced onions, garlic and green pepper. Arrange in greased baking dish and season layers with salt, pepper and 1/2 tsp. oregano. Top with sliced tomatoes and sprinkle with Parmesan cheese. Bake in moderate oven 20-25 minutes until juice begins to bubble.

Gas Customers Feel Results Of January Cold Spell, In Paying Bills

If the sun is shining when you read this, you may wonder why cold weather is still news. Here's why:

According to J. L. Ward, manager for Lone Star Gas Company, the prolonged period of cold weather which started late in December and continued through most of January, accounted for quite a bit more heating weather this year than for the same period last year.

Basing his findings on U. S. Weather Bureau tabulations, Mr. Ward was explaining the effect of this year's cold weather on gas consumption as reflected in current gas bills.

"While rates for gas service have increased here, the cold weather had considerable bearing on bills now being received," he said.

He explained that heating

weather, of which there has been considerably more this year, exists whenever the average temperature falls below 65 degrees.

"According to weather statistics, much, if not all of the 30-day period through January 25 this year, required heat for comfort because the daily average temperature was 65 or less," he said.

U. S. Weather Bureau people figure this heating weather in DDD's or what is called "degree days." They are computed by adding the number of degrees the average temperature each day falls below 65.

For example, if the maximum

temperature for the day is 50 degrees and the minimum is 20 degrees, the mean or average is 35. When this is subtracted from 65 the number of DDD's for that day is shown as 30. The formula is based on the fact that normally whenever the mean or average temperature for the day falls below 65, some heating is required for comfort.

This heating requirement is increased proportionately, too, when humidity is greater and high winds accompany the cold. The January 21 sleet storm covering most of the area served by Lone Star, brought both.

Mr. Ward said that the gas rate now in effect in Goldthwaite is the same standard rate in effect in most other cities and towns on the Lone Star system.

Up until last year Goldthwaite enjoyed a gas rate lower

than during depression years. Rates were reduced in 1942. Last year's increase, according to Mr. Ward, simply restored the reduction made in 1942 and added three cents per 1,000 cubic feet.

Senator's Report

NO. 1 PROBLEM: Most Texans consider that, of the 10 biggest problems facing the State, the greatest is water shortage and the effects. That fact was brought out strongly in a recent public opinion poll.

Texas interviewed named water shortage or effect of water shortage as our No. 1 problem. This was mentioned almost more than the next five biggest problems combined — improvement of schools, cost of living improvement of highways, unemployment, cost of government.

WATER PLAN: Dr. Walter Prescott Webb, famed Texas historian, reports that the great inland canal recommended for carrying water to the Lower Gulf Coast area would increase the region's annual income by five million dollars.

This is the plan drawn up at my request by the Bureau of Reclamation of the Department of Interior.

In time, says Dr. Webb, the plan must be carried out, because "the logic of facts is so strongly in its favor, and because the need is imperative."

The future of Texas is bound up in a solution of our water problems.

Advance Planning Helps To Boost Profits From Back Yard Gardening

College Station (Spec.)— It isn't necessary to plan your spring garden on paper, but a little advance thought will be helpful in paving the way toward increased back yard vegetable production this spring.

More than half a million Texans planted gardens last year and indications point to more in '54, says Blueford G. Hancock, extension horticulturalist.

The garden fever oftentimes persuades people to plant a larger area than they can properly take care of, so keep your garden small, Hancock advises.

Make a series of plantings so your harvest will spread out over a longer period. A garden planted at one time causes over-production for a short period and then supplies are gone.

The horticulturalist suggests that gardeners plant a variety of vegetables. There are about 32 garden crops commonly grown in Texas so why not plant at least one new vegetable a season, he says.

Have supplies of commercial fertilizers, insecticides, seed treating chemicals and other

gardening materials on hand for ready use.

And, finally, plant only the vegetables adapted to your area.

English peas, turnips, cabbage plants, onions, head lettuce and white potatoes withstand considerable cold weather and may be planted four to five weeks prior to the last average killing frost, Hancock says.

Other vegetables adapted to planting two to three weeks before the last frost are radishes, mustard, beets, carrots and leaf lettuce.

RANCHMEN STILL NEED HAY

The Texas Drouth Relief Hay program has had a curious result.

Out in West Texas, stockmen desperately in need of hay for their livestock have been shipping it in from as far away as Idaho and California. Yet farmers in some parts of East Texas have a burdensome supply of hay in their barns.

Until recently, drouth area ranchmen did not have to consider the shipping cost when they made hay purchases. They could buy grasses outside the state and have the shipping cost refunded to them through a cooperative agreement between the railroads, the federal government and the state of Texas. This was a desperately needed emergency measure to get hay to stricken livestock.

Now, funds for this program are extremely low. The hay buyer must carry a part of the shipping expense. As a result, it is hoped he will buy the hay

from Texas growers.

Most of the money used in the hay relief program was furnished by the federal government. Because of this fact, there was no legal way that hay purchases could be restricted to within state supplies. In many respects, this was an unfortunate situation.

Since the farmer with hungry cattle did not have to consider freight rates, he naturally looked for good hay at the lowest purchase price. Many of them found conditions more favorable outside of Texas. Others did not take the time to locate nearby supplies but took what was offered from other states.

In order to encourage the purchase of Texas hay, the State Department of Agriculture has, at its own expense, endeavored to locate available state hay. This information, along with price quotations, has been forwarded constantly to country drouth committees, to feed dealers and to individual farmers.

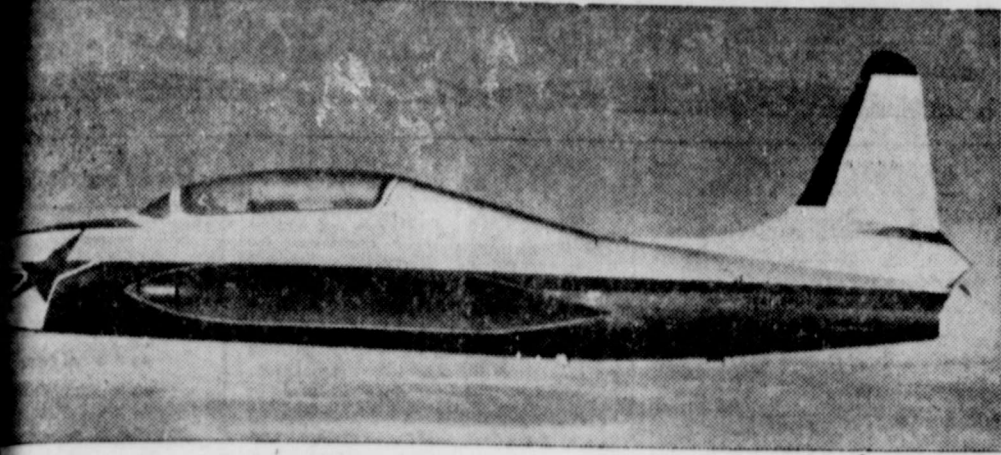

**News About Your Social Security Program**

A special guide sheet to help self-employed persons in correctly reporting their net income for social security purposes is now available. James B. Marley, Manager of the Austin social security office, announced today.

This leaflet, "Helpful Guides on Reporting your Self-employment Tax," he said, has been issued by the Social Security Administration, to supplement instructions given with the Federal income tax forms.

Pointing out that social se-

curity benefits payable to a self-employed person and his family, in his old age, or to his dependents in case of his death, are based on earnings credited to his social security account. Mr. Marley stressed the importance of correct reporting.

"It costs the worker, as well as the Government, additional time and expense when an incomplete or incorrect return has to be straightened out," he declared.

This guide to accurate reporting of self-employment net income is available for the asking at the Austin and other social security offices.

Self-employed persons whose trade or business is covered by social security should get a copy before making out their

1953 Federal income tax form. The social security tax of 2 1/4% must be paid at the time the form is filed on or before March 15.
