Soil Conservation Work Pays Off For George Brooks In Peanut Crop Yield

Talk a few minutes on soil conservation with George Brooks of the Jones Valley community west of Goldthwaite and you'll find he is carrying out one of the most effective means of conserving and improving his soil. Yields and profits have gone up nicely in the past few years as a direct result of con-

servation farming. In 1953, for the fifth consecutive year, Brooks put his peanut hay back on the landand, in his own words, this wasn't easy at first because of the demand for hay throughout drouth-stricken West Texas, Although he had to forego ready cash for his hay, he is now convinced that he is actually many dollars ahead by virtue of having left the hay on the ground.

Visit Brooks and he'll cite numerous figures to back up his thoughts on the matter. For example, he harvested 30 bushels of peanuts per acre in 1953, while 10 bushels were harvested on the same type of soil without the hay treatment. The meat content of the peanuts grown on his farm ran from 71 to 73 per cent.

According to Brooks his land has almost stopped blowing, thanks to the conservation practice concerning hay. The hay turned back on the land does other things, too. Considerable organic matter has been added to the soil, thus increasing its fertility; greater amounts of moisture are retained; yields and, consequently, profits, go up.

Local SCS technicians ran a series of moisture tests on Brooks' farm. On the land where he has turned back the hay, the tests showed that a pound of soil will hold one ounce more moisture than a pound of the same type soil where the hay has not been returned to the soil. In more understandable terms, this means practices carried out on his that the soil where the hay has farm include terracing, and been turned back will hold growing peas and vetch.

| 150,000 gallons more water per acre then the same type of soil without the hay treatment

Other tests likewise show the value of returning the hay to the soil. Recent dust storms indicate what happens as a result of little or no organic material being returned to the soil from year to year. When high winds lift soil from the land it is the ery fine fertility bearing particles that depart for places nknown and laboratory analysis shows that the fine particles which blow away contain 12 times as much phosphorus. four times as much potash, and three times as much nitrogen as the soil remaining in the field Brooks states that five years ago his soil would blow as much as any in the country, but now it has almost stopped blowing. He also says that in April combine tracks from the previous fall are still easily seen in his field. What does this mean? Simply, it means that the organic material in the soil halts wind erosion, and that a high percentage of the soil moisture is retained.

To make his case for soil conservation even more convincing, Brooks states that he grossed about \$100 per acre in 1953. This compares to a gross of \$30 to \$35 per acre on the same type of soil where the hay has been baled and sold. Ask him, finally, if the loss of cash by not selling his hay offsets the benefits of this particular soil conservation practice and he'll tell you that more than half of the approximately 65c that a bale sells for goes for baling, hauling, and other expenses. He thinks that's proof enough that turning the hay back to the soil is a profitable venture.

Brooks is a cooperator with the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District. Other conservation

It means our soil is blowing away at a rate greater than at any time in the past 15 years. Our soil moisture content is at such a low ebb in some sections that early crop prospects are der the constant buffeting of very poor. If the dust storms a three-year drouth. continue, then . much of our cropland in West Texas can be counted out of production this

The truth is, we didn't go wrong. We just haven't gone far enough in the right direction. We have done wonders in some sections, but our soil saving measures have broken down un-

for hides 40. Lamprey of our state. One good pasture or crop can be eradicated or buried by a nearby blowing field where no soil and moisture saving plan is in effect. Conservation is a state-wide, full time job.

The task now rests with the state, the county and the individual farmers. The federal government has already announced it will not provide funds to initiate soil and pasture restoration programs which were recommended by the drouth states.

A study of 17 states, including Texas, showed that on pasture restoration alone, some \$308 million would be needed. And this is merely for seed, lime and fertilizer required to restore about 39 million acres of land.

Actually, this 39 million acres ncludes only land within "maor disaster" areas. The figure would be considerably increased if pastureland were included where weather conditions have been bad but not severe enough to warrant designation as a disaster area.

Since we cannot turn to federal aid in this time of need, then Texas must depend upon its farmers to do the best they can under the circumstances. It is a job that must be done!
