Drouth Relief Feed Program To Be Continued

Washington — (Special To The Eagle) — Drouth relief feed from government stockpiles will be continued beyond the April 15 cut-off date, provided it does not rain in the meantime and produce some Spring grazing, Congressman O. C. Fisher has been assured by the Department of Agriculture.

Fisher conferred with Kenneth L. Scott, in charge of the emergency program, and told him the continued drouth in most of southwest Texas makes the outlook there worse than it was at this same time last year.

Several telegrams have been received by Fisher following receipt by local Drouth Emergency committees in various counties of notices of the cut-off date. These included one from Walter Pfluger of Eden, President of the Sheep and Goat Raisers Association.

Fisher reports that the Department is presently surveying available stocks, reported to be low, of cottonseed products to determine if more meal and pellets may be made available.

Most of the emergency feed is now in the form of corn, wheat, and mixed feed.

Clyde And Cecil Locklear Featured As Part Of Locklear Clan Of Horsemen

(Editor's Note: In a recent issue of the Hot Springs, Arkansas, Sentinel-Record there appeared a story entitled: "A Clan Of Horsemen—Clyde, Cecil Best Known At Oaklawn, But 50 Locklears Are Close To Racing." Since both Clyde and Cecil are Goldthwaite boys and many of their friends and relatives making their home in Mills County, we are reprinting the story along with picture as it appeared.)

"If they ever call the roll of the Locklears in racing, watch out for an old-fashioned Texas stampede.

"A family historian estimates there are at least 50 members of the clan either raising or training horses, and most of them live in the wide open spaces of the Lone Star State.

"You'd have to consult the U. S. Census Bureau for an official count.

"Two of the best known around Oaklawn Park are brothers Clyde and Cecil.

"The 48-year-old Clyde, trainer for the Reynolds Brothers' Stock Farm of Fort Worth, hasn't missed an Oaklawn meeting since 1937.

"Cecil started bringing his horses here in 1938, and has been absent at only a few since.

"The Hot Springs track is their most common meeting ground, and they compete against each other like any rivals would.

"I always beat him," quipped Cecil, whose Big Ike won the 1950 Arkansas Derby.

"Oh, is that so?" laughed Clyde, who comes up with some outstanding performers each year.

"Tracing the Locklear family tree is like trying to find your way out of a forest. There have been a lot of acorns down through the years.

"In Texas, the folks who know just naturally associate the family name with horses—stock or racing.

"Let's begin with Clyde and Cecil's grandfather, Jack Locklear, although there were horsemen ahead of him.

"Jack Locklear was a Baptist minister and horse raiser too. He had a stable of racers, and the brothers believe he even ran them here shortly after the turn of the century.

"The elder Locklear had eight sons, all of them raisers or trainers, including Clabe, the father of Clyde and Cecil. He is still active at the age of 69.

"Besides Clyde and Cecil, there are two other brothers in

this branch of the family — Wayne, a trainer at the Reynolds Brothers' breeding farm; and Jack, a breeder and racing official.

"Father Locklear who today weighs about 125 and is 5-6, rode around the Texas bush tracks until he became too old. "But only Cecil was small enough to follow in his footsteps as a jockey. He didn't ride at any of the major tracks.

"A long time ago Clyde and Cecil formed a trainer-jockey team and toured Texas' quarter-horse tracks with a measure of success.

"Both formally embarked on careers as trainers in 1925.

"There was a time when the Locklear clan took over a country fair race meeting at Eastland, Texas.

"On one of the three days, it was staged, their mounts finished first in all nine races. Since they had two horses in each, they also won six seconds and three thirds.

"Despite their long association with racing, the brothers will tell you "we learn something new everyday."

"You can't train any two horses alike," said Clyde.

"Racing has become more of a profession than a sport," declared Cecil. "It sure is complicated, and you've got to work at it to make a go."

"Clyde has 24 Reynolds Brothers horses here for this meeting. Cecil will race six of his own, and two for Mrs. L. Fry.

"Fans will remember several of the well-regarded horses Clyde has trained—Mr. Chairman, Col. Goodnight, Powder Bluff, Gunnison, Mountain Time, and Texas Melody.

"Mountain Time won four straight races here a few years ago, and Texas Melody was the first winner of the Oaklawn Preview as a two-year-old three seasons ago.

"The brothers agree why they like to come to Oaklawn each year.

"It's the climate, the people, the town. The water is good for the horses and the training gets them in good condition for the summer campaign."

"The Locklear family is "very close." Seventeen members of Dad Clabe's family attended a Christmas reunion.

"What does Mom Locklear have to say about her racing family?

"She wouldn't even put a bet on a race," the brothers smiled.

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

See Salesmanship Solving Present Economic Problems U. S. Liquid Assets Today Four Times That of 1940

WASHINGTON—High government officials—including many who were recruited to the Eisenhower administration from the ranks of big business—believe that old-fashioned American salesmanship will go a long way toward solving present economic problems.

These men point out that liquid assets in the United States are four times the 1949 totals, with double the purchasing power; that ample credit is available at reasonable rates, and that personal savings and income are higher than ever before, and more evenly distributed.

The experts say that these things add up to vast purchasing power, which can be unlocked by the kind of salesmanship that became a lost art during the era of war-borne prosperity, in which the demand for consumer goods exceeded the supply.

Administration spokesmen are particularly irked at what they have labeled "prophecy of gloom and doom," for fear that widespread pessimism may intimidate potential customers into hoarding their money.

They believe that salesmen, earnestly selling their wares in the rugged competitive spirit once characteristic of the American way, can be the best weapon against a recession.

SAVINGS—A congressional committee recently was impressed by facts and figures concerning one of these prosperity factors—savings. They were given to the joint House-Senate economic committee by Arthur A. Smith, vice president of the First National bank of Dallas, Texas.

He said that despite rising prices, the American people have saved more money since 1939 than in any similar period in United States history. A point worthy of note, he said, is that the "vast majority of people who save do not themselves determine the real economic use to which their savings are put."

The banker explained that such decisions are made largely by institutions with which the people have entrusted their savings—banks, savings and loan associations and insurance firms.

Smith said the big problem still remaining in the American economic picture is that "despite the fact we are the most advanced people in the world in matters economic, we still have not found for sure what it is that swings the economy periodically from expansion to contraction."

Smith urged a doubling of efforts to find out the identity of the "ingredient" in the "economic pie" which causes it to sag.

BIG FOUR—Perhaps the greatest accomplishment of the Big Four Foreign Ministers Conference in Berlin was to give the West an insight into Soviet foreign policy under Premier Georgi Malenkov.

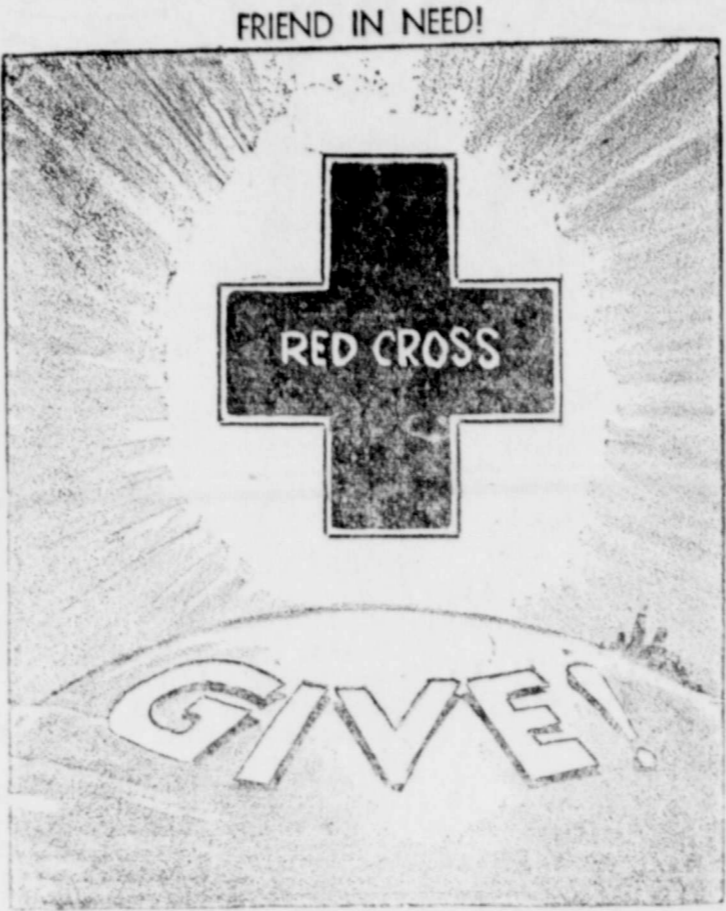
Although this was a purely negative result, and added up to no more than an extension of cold war tensions inaugurated under the late Joseph Stalin, it nevertheless has given the Allies a factual basis on which to plan in the field of foreign policy.

Secretary of State John Foster Dulles returned to the United States convinced little is to be gained by the kind of negotiations carried on in Berlin. Dulles must feel that Russia reacts only to world "realities" and that the West will have to conceive and execute policies which will make it advantageous for the Kremlin to seek settlements.

Berlin-Type Negotiations Seen Futile

This realization brought about an end to the Berlin blockade and to the Communist uprising in Greece. It is what the free world is working for in Indo-China, what the Allies hope has been accomplished in Korea.

For the West, it has become axiomatic that the United States, Britain and France must deal with Russia out of a position of economic and military power.

Worldly Ways For Beef Stew

By ALICE DENHOFF
"BEEF stew is a world traveler, equally at home on household, club and restaurant menus. Men are especially fond of this hearty dish."

A popular version of stew, Hungarian Goulash, is as tasty as it is filling, the beef stew meat simmered to fork tenderness in bouillon seasoned with a generous amount of paprika and a bare whiff of garlic.

Hungarian Goulash
Served with a simple fruit salad and hard rolls, Hungarian goulash makes a satisfying and economical family dinner dish.

To prepare 4 servings, cut 1 lb. beef stew meat into 1-in. cubes and brown in a little fat. Add 1 clove minced garlic, 2 medium onions, sliced, tsp. salt, 1/2 tsp. pepper and 2 tsp. paprika and 2 bouillon cubes dissolved in 2 c. boiling water. Cover and simmer 2 1/2 hrs. Add 1 c. hot water and 2 c. potatoes cut in 3/4-in. cubes. Cook 20 min. longer or until potatoes are tender. Season to taste and thicken, if necessary.

Now we come to a nice Western World version of beef stew. Just to show you how versatile this dish is, here it is as prepared in Mexico where it shapes up as a Beef Pie.

Cubes of beef are cooked with a tomato sauce and kidney beans, then the mixture is poured into a cornmeal mush "crust" and baked.

The German Version
For beef stew, German style, brown cubes of beef stew meat and some sliced onions in a little hot fat. Sprinkle with salt, pepper and caraway seed. Add a bay leaf and cover with water. Simmer, covered, over a low heat until meat is tender, about 1 1/2 hrs. Then add a little cider (about 1/4 c.) and more water, if needed. Top the meat with wedges of cabbage and cook, covered, until tender. Remove meat and cabbage to a hot platter and thicken gravy with a few gingersnaps dissolved in a little hot water. Pour the spicy gravy over meat and vegetables and enjoy a hearty, aromatic, delicious dish.

While the parents also enjoyed this outing, the mother, naturally, did not get very much relaxation, always a problem when the whole family goes off together.

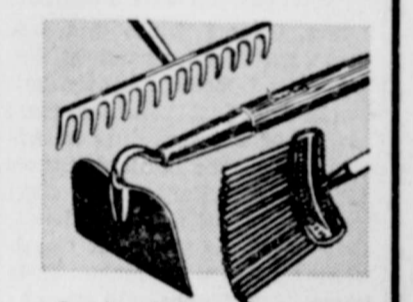

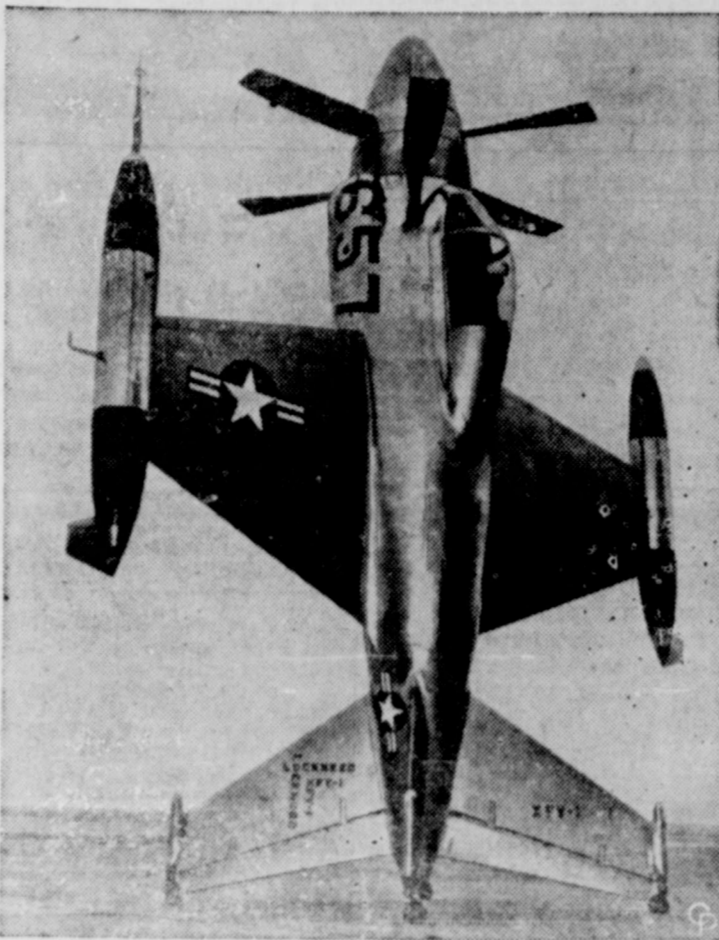

FUTURE DEMANDS

ON OUR WATER SUPPLY
Water is our most precious mineral. It is an indispensable part of living. But in terms of present and future needs, it is growing alarmingly scarce.

The demand for water increases with each passing year. Water consumption records are set at an all-time high one month, only to be broken and surpassed the next month. It is a sobering fact we are using our available supply much more quickly than it is being replaced by nature.

According to W. P. Webb, author of "More Water For Texas," the population is doubling every half-century. If the consumption of water per capita remains uniform, the demand will double in the same period. Actually, Webb points out, as the standard of living rises, as people move from the rural areas to the urban ones, consumption of water per capita will increase enormously.

For Example, Texas in 1953 was consuming 34 times as much water as it did in 1890, although the population has increased only 3.2 fold. Texans were consuming 2.5 times the amount in 1950 that they did in 1940, though the population in that decade increased by only one-fourth.

In other words, each Texan is consuming 10 times the amount of water he did in 1890 and about twice the amount of 1940.

The ever-expanding industries in the state also are accounting for a terrific amount of our water—and will in years to come. They use many thousands of acre-feet of water.

An acre-foot of water equals an acre of land covered to a depth of 12 inches, or 43,560 cubic feet, or 325,800 gallons. Industry can make 22 tons of chlorine from one acre-foot, or 40 tons of sulphur, 36 tons of synthetic chemicals or 15 tons of rubber.

A surprising fact is that it takes 325,800 gallons of water to produce 200 pounds of beef or veal, or to grow 10,000 oranges or to raise only 200 pounds of cotton.

The estimated population of the nation by the year 2,000 A. D. is expected to be some 227 million persons, as compared with 151 million in 1950. It is obvious that a vast water conservation project is needed if our water supply is to meet the demand.

When Their World Crashed . . . RED CROSS HEARD THEIR CALLS

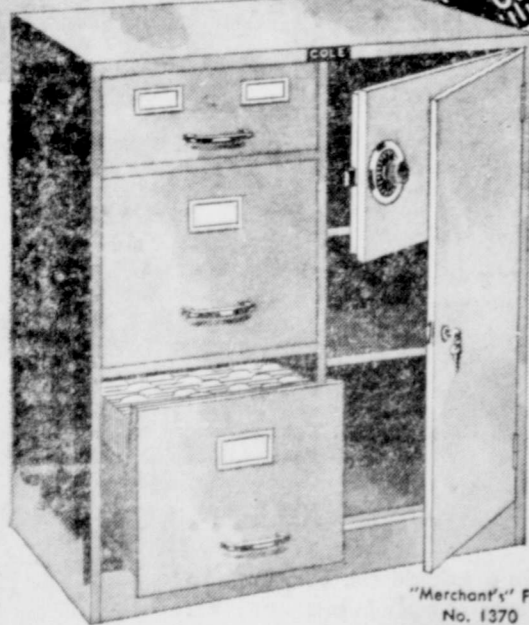
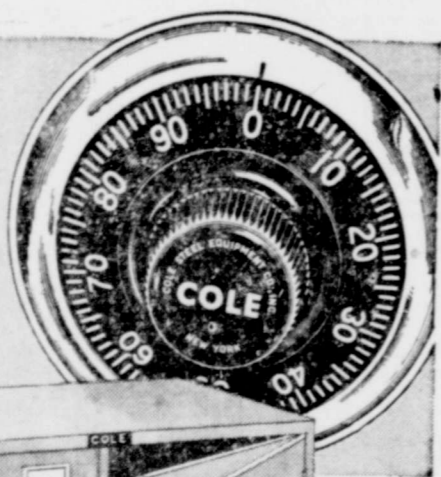

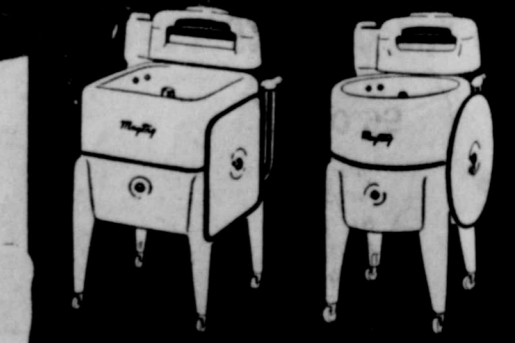
