Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Intra-Governmental Fuss Nat New in Washington
Monroe Once Chased War Secretary Out With Tongues

WASHINGTON—Washington observers are casting about in past American history for an intra-governmental wrangle that compares with the current one between Army Secretary Robert T. Stevens and Senator Joseph R. McCarthy.

Some recall that President James Monroe is once said to have chased his secretary of war, William H. Crawford of Georgia, out of the White House with a pair of cast-iron fire tongs.

Others point out that Andrew Jackson completely upset his Cabinet when its members directed snubs, or fancied snubs, at pretty Peggy O'Neal, the innkeeper's daughter who married John Eaton, and thereby became a Cabinet wife.

Still others recall the set-to between the late Harold Ickes, then secretary of the interior, and Ex-Senator Millard Tydings (D), Maryland, over the appointment of Edwin D. Pauley, California oilman, to be secretary of the Navy.

Opposition to the Pauley appointment is thought to have cost the self-styled "Old Curmudgeon" his job. However, many doubt that any of these past performances can stand up against the Stevens-McCarthy fight for purity of invective and freedom of speech.

CONGRESSIONAL "TAKE-HOME" PAY — The International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's union believes it has the answer to the proposed wage increase for members of Congress.

To alleviate their "plight," the ILWU proposes a program of "give-away" for each member of the Senate and House. It amounts to all the lawmaker and his family can consume from the government's stockpile of surplus foods—grain, milk, dried eggs, cheese, peanuts, butter and potatoes.

The ILWU contends this also would help pare down the government's surplus stocks.

In a statement of policy inserted in the Congressional Record by Senator William Langer (R), North Dakota, the ILWU said it thinks that with these foodbaskets, plus their present salaries, plus expenses, the congressmen should manage through the next year without a proposed \$250 a week wage increase.

FARM PRICE SWITCH—The Eisenhower administration apparently switched signals on the farm program when the bill embodying the program of Agriculture Secretary Ezra Taft Benson was written. The measure, introduced by Senate Agriculture Chairman George D. Aiken (R), Vermont, provided for a switch from rigid price supports to a flexible system with no provision for transition. Both the National Grange and the Farm Bureau federation, the last named a consistent supporter of Benson, immediately protested.

Benson had previously indicated that he would not favor an abrupt drop of from 90 to 75 per cent of parity. However, he ordered such a drop on butter and a spokesman for his department indicated that similar drops will occur in wheat and cotton if the flexible system is adopted.

CHANGE OF MIND—ALMOST—The recent shooting episode in the House chamber almost, but not quite, convinced Rep. Usher L. Burdick (R), South Dakota, to favor a pay raise for congressmen.

Burdick, who has been bluntly outspoken against the proposal to hike legislative pay as recommended by a presidential commission, told his constituents that the electrifying incident almost convinces him that he should tote a gun when he appears on the House floor so that he can shoot back at would-be assassins.

He concluded: "However, if I have to add shooting to my legislative duties, perhaps there should be a raise in my pay. I don't think there will be, so I'll have to continue to oppose it."

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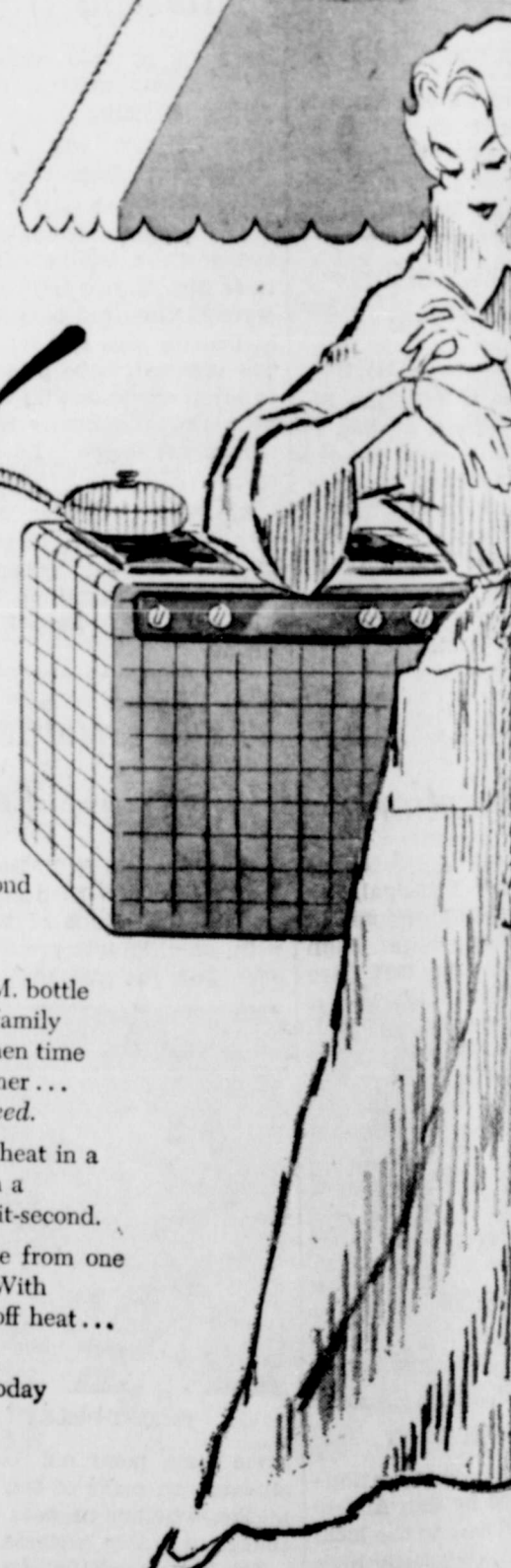

### Timely Dishes Feature Fish

By ALICE DENHOFF  
NO introduction is necessary for fish dishes at this time of year.

Starting with a recipe which is a bit out of the ordinary, try a Halibut Pot Roast, the recipe to serve 6.

**Halibut Pot Roast**  
Sauté a minced garlic clove in 3 tbsp. olive oil. Add a 3-lb. halibut steak, 6 carrots, 3 onions, 6 stalks celery and 3 tbsp. olive oil; brown. Cover and cook in 350° oven until tender.

Barbecued Salmon, a West Coast favorite, is another fish dish that will prove popular.

**Salmon Barbecue**  
To serve 4, you'll need 1 1/2 lb. salmon in one piece. Season fish with salt and pepper. Place 6 bacon strips in bottom of baking dish, place salmon on top. Melt 2 tbsp. butter or other fat, and add a small chopped onion, 1/2 chopped green pepper and 1/2 crushed garlic clove. Cook about 5 min. Add 1 c. cooked tomatoes, 1 bay leaf, tsp. Worcestershire

sauce, salt and pepper to taste. Cook 5 min. longer.

Remove bay leaf from sauce and pour sauce around salmon. Bake in 400° F. oven for about 30 min., basting frequently.

**For Oyster Lovers**  
To please oyster dish fanciers, cook 1/2 c. each of chopped onion and chopped green pepper in 1/4 c. butter until soft. Add 1/2 c. chopped parsley, 1 c. tomato ketchup and 1 pt. oysters. Cook until oysters are plump. Serve at once on toast. Serves 6.

To combine oysters and fish, prepare Baked Haddock with Oyster Stuffing, a substantial and delicious fish dish.

To serve 4, place a haddock fillet on a greased pan and sprinkle with salt and pepper to suit. Wash and clean 1/2 pt. oysters and dip in 1 c. cracker crumbs. Cover fillet with oysters. Place another haddock fillet on top of oysters and fasten in place with toothpicks or skewers. Sprinkle with remaining cracker crumbs, juice of 1 lemon and dot with 1/2 tsp. butter. Bake at 350° F. for 1 hr.

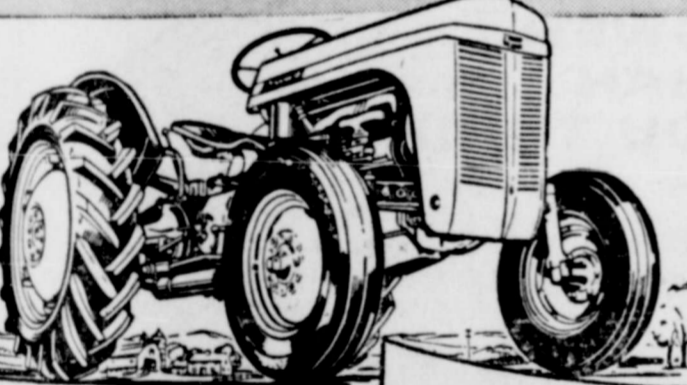

But experts tell us it is still a "firecracker" compared to such natural forces as the volcano Krakatoa which erupted in the early part of this century.

What can it do? For all practical purposes, it can destroy any city on the face of the earth. It can cause total destruction within a 50-square mile area; severe damage within a 200-mile square area; moderate damage within a 600-square mile area; fire destruction within an 800-square mile area. This does not take into

account the damage from radiation.

What does the future hold? The hydrogen bomb is a force which will either end war or end civilization. The answer lies in our wisdom; our unity; our ability to put aside our petty quarrels and dedicate ourselves to preserving our country for posterity.

Is there hope? I personally have a tremendous faith in the future of our country. I think we have the brains, and the courage, and the will to preserve our freedoms. I take comfort from these verses of the 91st Psalm:

Thou shalt not be afraid for the terror by night; nor the arrow that flieth by day; nor for the pestilence that walketh in darkness; nor for the destruction that wasteth at noonday.

In that spirit, we can control this tremendous force that we have developed.

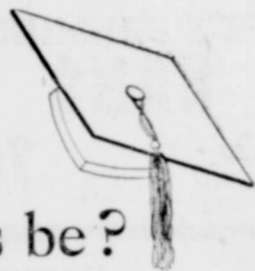

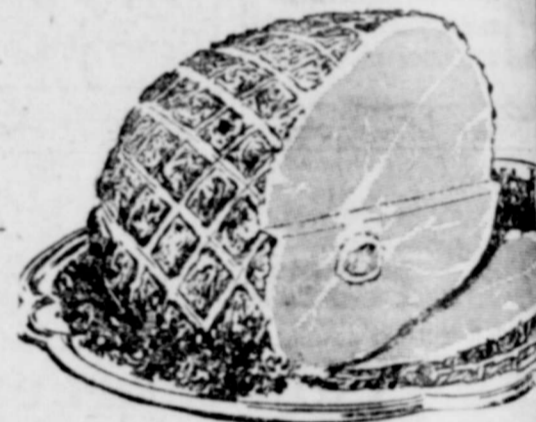

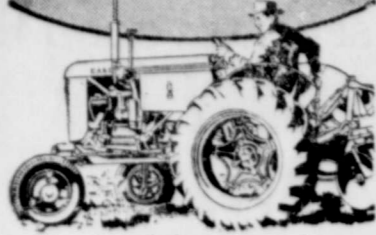

Loan Making For Assistance In Dust Storm Area Is Speeded Up

Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson has announced that more loan making authority has been given to Farmers Home Administration officials to speed up emergency loans in the dust storm area.

Loans up to \$25,000 may now be approved in the five states. Formerly all applications for loans for more than \$12,000 had to be sent to Washington for approval.

The Department is taking every step necessary. Secretary Benson said, to make sure that farmers and ranchers in the dust storm area receive all the assistance the Department can supply.

and other necessary farm and ranch expenses can be included in the loans.

To make sure that all applications for assistance are handled rapidly at the local level, additional personnel have been assigned in areas where wind erosion is a problem.

The loans are made repayable on a schedule based on the applicant's ability to repay and bear 3 percent interest.

In addition to the emergency loans, Secretary Benson has announced that drought relief funds are being made available on a reimbursable basis by the Department to States in the dust area for practices to help control wind erosion.

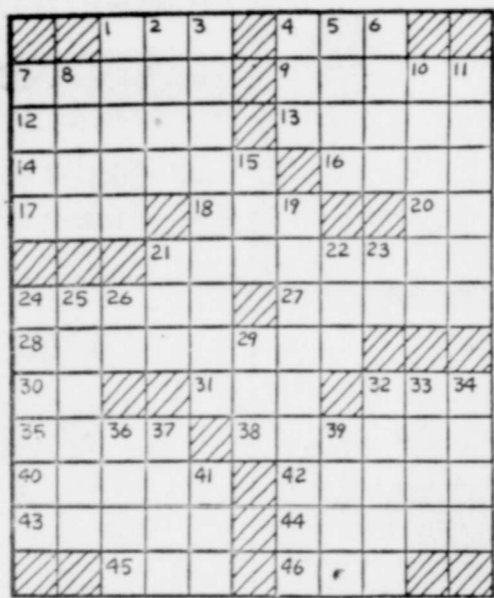

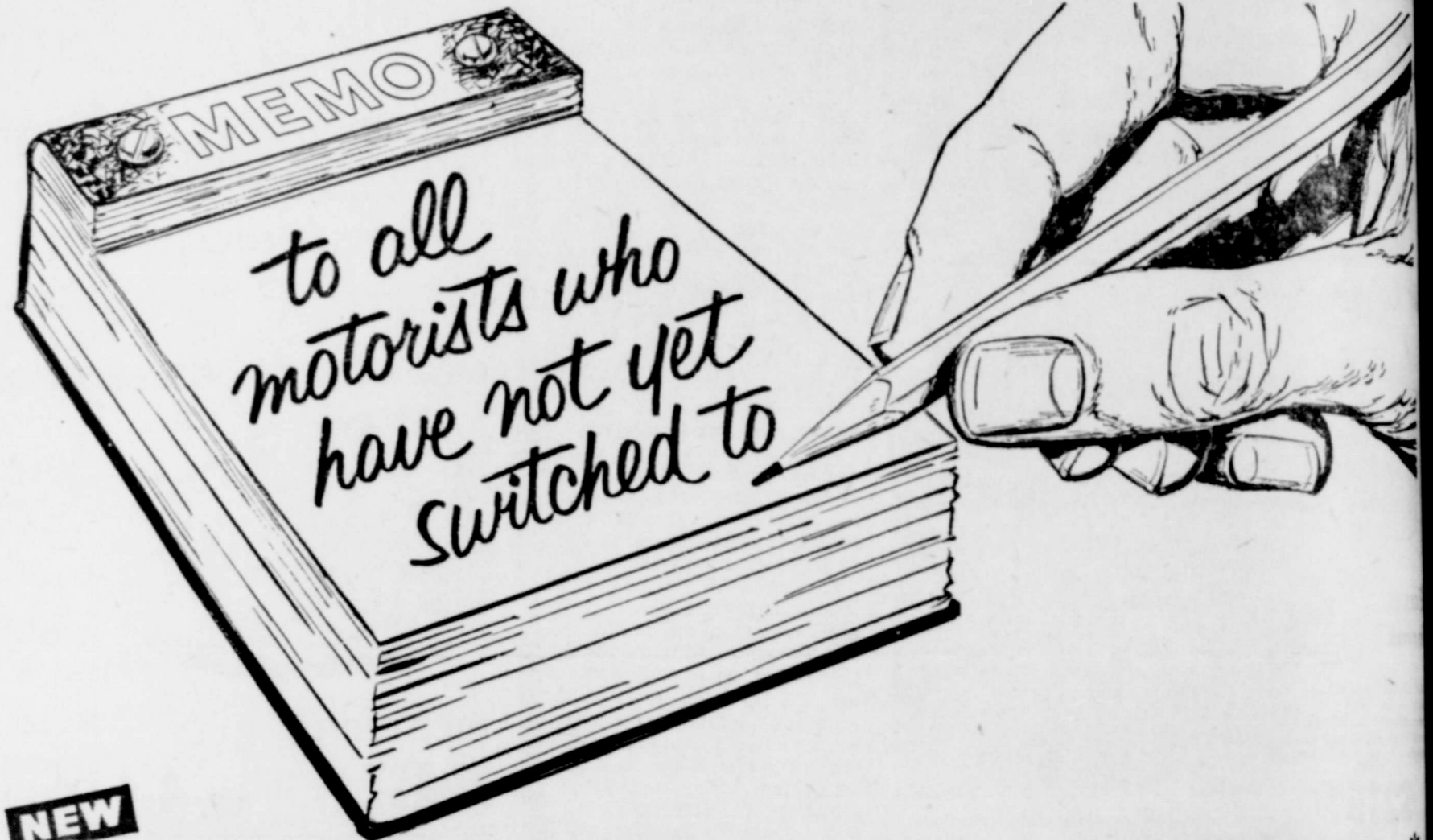

**Sam Connally Of San Saba Announces For U. S. Representative**

Sam Connally of San Saba officially announced this week that he will be a candidate for U. S. Representative from the

district. Connally's stand on this issue is in direct opposition to action taken by the incumbent Congressman from this district, who voted against a similar proposal and was instrumental in having it defeated.  
"I strongly favor raising the income tax exemption from \$600 to \$700 per year," Connally said. "Drouth-hit taxpayers must have some relief. The fellows who need it most and who would be helped most are the little fellows, not the big corporations. My father always told me the big fellow can take care of himself, and that we need able representation to take care of the little man."  
Another proposal voiced by Connally is to work for a comprehensive water conservation program with less federal control and greater participation and control on the state and local levels. This he sees as one of the most vital problems facing Texas today.  
Connally said his decision to be a candidate for Congress was prompted "by my desire to serve the people and because I feel that I can offer representation in Congress that will more

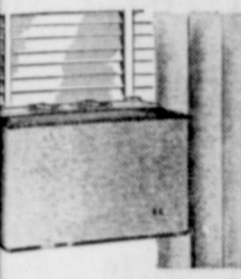
truly reflect the thinking and wishes of the people in this district."

**PARENT PROBLEMS**

**Easing Children's Adjustment To a Baby Brother or Sister**

By GARRY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D.

EVEN under the most favorable conditions, it's a hard ordeal for the youngest child of the family to adapt himself to the arrival of a new baby. It's not just the arrival that's trying for him, but the new experiences for weeks, months or years after the new baby arrives.

Feeling his loss of status, suffering from jealousy, the older child may be less good-natured, less co-operative with his parents or anybody else. He may grow stubborn, cry more readily, even go into tantrums. As a result, he gets more rebuke or punishment, less approvals and expressions of endearment from his parents certainly from other persons who call to see the new baby.

Obviously, this problem is greatest, as a rule, for the only child. As long as he has lived, he has been the center of attention from his parents, relatives and neighbors, practically the center of the universe. Then along comes the new baby and takes his place, or at least so he feels.

All this makes the older child feel he is less loved than he used to be, and feel more jealous causing him to do more "back things" to get more rebuke and punishment and so on in an upward spiral.

The mother must be in the hospital for several days and when she comes home the new baby requires most of her attention. She must dress and feed and bathe and tenderly handle this baby, and how can she help betraying her adoration and feelings of affection for the wee little creature? The more of such attention she gives this baby, the more the older child feels that the baby has stolen from him the endearments he used to enjoy from his mother and longs for now.

Helping the Child  
Wise expectant parents tell the child beforehand all about the expected baby, as "our baby." This may help some, but rarely enough.

Even when Dad doesn't physically care for the new baby, he expresses pride and affection and often talks with the mother about this baby. When relatives and friends drop in, their enthusiasm, naturally, is over this new baby. To this degree, they notice the older child less.

It is more important for the expectant parents to help this older child grow more and more self-reliant, depending less and less on his mother. His father, should try especially hard to have much fun with him just before and after the baby arrives. This older child also needs to feel secure and happy with the person who will care for him while father works and mother is in the hospital, or who will help the mother after her return home. It is desirable to win cooperation of other adults who may be around, toward helping this older child feel worthy and secure.

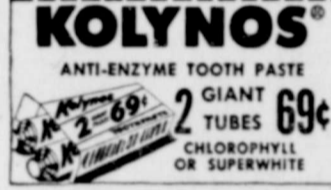

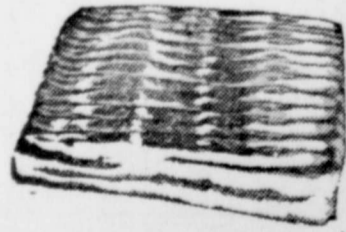

# Agiculture

Released by

### STURD DAMAGE

Men in West Texas are under two serious spells on Texas pasturelands.

The gradual disintegration of grassland during prolonged drouth does not have the dramatic impact of a sudden crop failure. Yet, the eventual result of this disaster to our grass could be, and probably is, more serious to our state's economy than the immediate effect on our crops.

Crops can make a comeback in one year of normal rainfall. But it will take many years to regain adequate natural cover on our pastureland.

Late last fall, the drouth damage in Texas was estimated at roughly \$500 million. Probably \$150 million of this figure resulted from lower range evaluation due to poor cover.

Continuation of the drouth this year could easily equal or top this loss and prevent a full range recovery until late in this decade.

If we receive the rain we normally expect during April and May, the picture in West Texas will be considerably brighter. But we shouldn't let temporary relief lull us into a false sense of security.

Records show that, down through the years, drouths occur with alarming regularity. It is up to us to prepare in advance for these natural disasters.

Despite the tremendous mon-

etary losses suffered in the past three years, this present drouth could be a blessing in disguise if we take advantage of the lesson it teaches. It pinpoints the crying need for comprehensive soil and water legislation in Texas.

The time has arrived when each region of the state should have area committees made up of men who have a complete understanding of the problem at hand. These local men could serve in an advisory capacity, promoting an effective soil and water program, both through the Legislature at Austin and in their own territories.

The soil and water problem affects all the people of the state. And the people, themselves, must aid in working out a solution.

## Census Bureau Sends Supplemental Questions To Mills County Residents

Supplemental questions on consumer income, migration and family characteristics will be asked in the U. S. Census Bureau's Current Population Survey in April, according to Supervisor Francis H. Wilmer, of the Bureau's district office at Dallas, Texas. The supplemental questions will be in addition to the regular employment and unemployment inquiries asked each month.

Similar supplemental questions on consumer income asked in the Current Population Survey in April of last year revealed that the people were receiving higher money incomes in 1952 than ever before in the Nation's history. The medium (average) income of persons with money incomes in 1952 was estimated at \$2,300 or about \$100, or five per cent, greater than in 1951. At the close of World War II in 1945, median income was only 1,400.

Supplemental questions on migration asked in the April 1953 survey showed that of the persons one year old and over in continental United States during that month, 122 million, or 79 per cent, lived in the same house as a year earlier; 31 million, or 20 per cent, lived in a different house in the United States; and 740,000, or one per cent, had moved into the United States from abroad.

The number of working wives in the United States hit an all time high last year, although the increase over the previous year was much smaller than in most other years since World War II, according to information developed from supplemental questions on family characteristics asked in the

April 1953 Current Population Survey. An estimated 10.7 million married women were in the labor force in April 1953—350,000 more than a year earlier.

The Current Population Survey will be conducted locally and in 229 other areas of the country during the week of April 11. Mrs. Nella Casbeer of Lampasas will handle the Current Population Survey interviews locally.

Supervisor Francis H. Wilmer emphasized that all information about individuals furnished to the Census Bureau is held in absolute confidence under Federal law. It is used only to obtain summary figures such as totals, averages, and percentages for various groups in the population and not to show information for particular families or individuals. The information cannot be furnished to any other Government agency and thus cannot be used for investigation, taxation, or regulation.

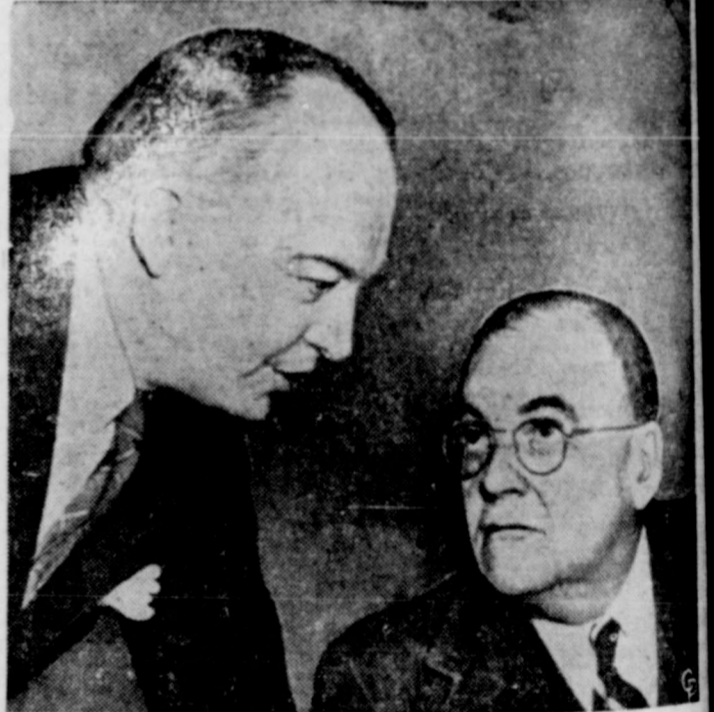
