### Use Of Water For Outdoor Purposes Is Curtailed By City Utilities

In a special notice that was delivered to city water users the past weekend by City Utilities, customers were informed that it has become necessary to curtail the use of water for outdoor purposes. The request for cooperation in that connection was effective immediately and curtailment schedule was set forth.

Complete text of the WATER NOTICE follows:

"It has become necessary to curtail the use of water for outdoor purposes.

"Beginning now, you will water your lawn, shrubs, trees or garden only on half of the days of the month.

"If your house number is even, as No. 912, you will water on even days of the month, as 2nd, 4th, or 6th, and etc.

"If your house number is odd, as No. 911, you will water only on odd days of month, as 1st, 3rd, 5th, and etc.

"If you do not know your house, number, it is printed on your light bill. If unable to find it, call City Utility Office for information.

"Your usual cooperation will be appreciated by your neighbors.

"We hope that this method will work out so that no further curtailment will be necessary." Thank You, City Utilities."

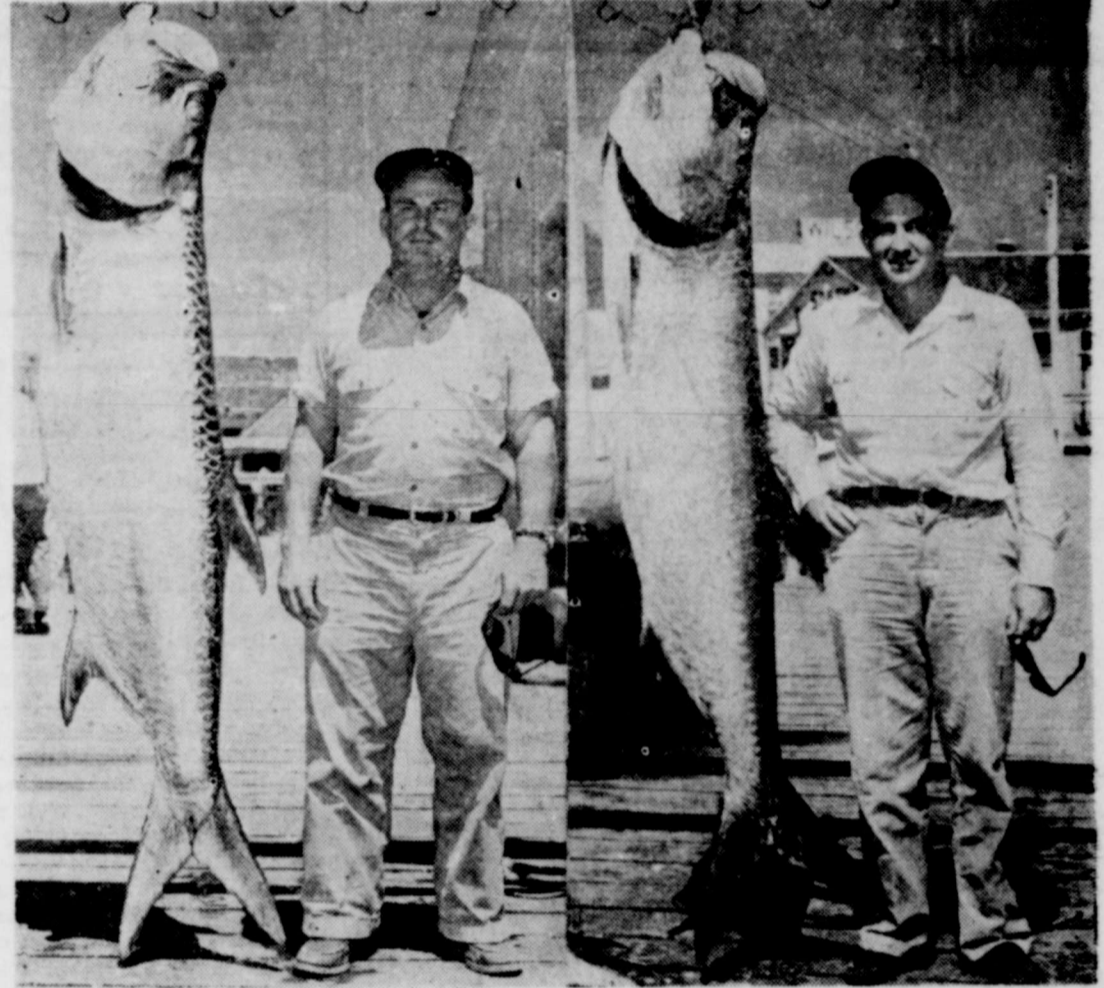

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Indian Government, People Dulles Indo-China Views
Friendlier Today to U. S. Coincide With India's Own
Special to Central Press

WEDNESDAY—State department officials are highly gratified with reports from New Delhi that the Indian government and people are more friendly toward the United States than they have been in several years.

On the negative side is Dulles' return from the Geneva conference after less than a week's attendance. For some typically inscrutable reason, his personality is not pleasant to the Indian delegates there.

Two of these conditions coincide exactly with the Indian view: That the United States should not intervene unless it is for the purpose of defending "liberty and independence" rather than colonialism; and unless the United Nations gives its moral sanction to the move.

However, even before these statements were made, India and Premier Nehru had felt more warmly to the United States. Nehru attended a conference of southeast Asia prime ministers in Ceylon several weeks ago at which the Pakistani, Burmese and Ceylonese prime ministers in particular emphasized the dangers of Communism to their homelands and the need for strong ties with the United States.

CAMPAIGNING FROM STRENGTH—Three former secretaries of agriculture are expected to join the campaign this autumn to win farm votes for Democrats seeking election and re-election to Congress.

Since Agriculture Secretary Ezra Taft Benson and his policies are considered politically vulnerable, the Democratic high command is expected to use these three former federal farm leaders to woo the farm vote.

Anderson will be seeking re-election in his home state, and Branman may possibly enter the senatorial race in Colorado for the seat being vacated by his friend and fellow Democrat, Senator Edwin Johnson.

MORAL FROM MARTIN—House Speaker Joseph W. Martin, Jr. (R), Massachusetts, has a favorite true story with a moral he tells young congressmen to stress the importance of fence-mending in their home districts when Congress is not in session.

Martin recalls a veteran member from the midwest who had won election after election with no difficulty and had risen in seniority to chairmanship of the powerful rules committee.

However, while serving in Washington, he became entranced with the idea of living the life of a country squire in nearby Virginia and accordingly bought a farm equipped with a fine old southern manor house. When Congress recessed, the congressman headed for his Virginia farm and completely neglected his home district.

Then came the year when a popular young candidate opposed him in the primary and the congressman was compelled to return to his district for an old-fashioned political rally complete with bunting, ballyhoo and bands.

BACK TO KING ARTHUR—The Army apparently is going back to King Arthur for its ideas of the best way to protect its hydrogen-armor soldiers. Soldiers in those days believed the best protection was body armor, bulky and awkward as it was.

## Local Post Master Attends Open Forum Meeting At Brownwood June 23

Postmaster Lucille Fairman attended an open forum meeting of postmasters in District 3 of the Dallas Regional Operations organization of the Post Office Department which was held Wednesday, June 23, in the Brownwood Hotel, Brownwood, Texas.

The meeting was presided over by Brownwood Postmaster Rufus Stanley with approximately 100 postmasters present.

These District meetings are being held in Brownwood, Fort Worth, San Angelo, Waco and Gainesville by the District Manager Homer J. Dennis for the

purpose of explaining the function to be performed in the District pertaining to the decentralization of postal operations.

About 40 counties are included in District 3, which embraces 382 post offices headed by Mr. Dennis. Of the 382 post offices, there are 31 first class offices, 54 second class offices, 115 third class and 182 fourth class offices.

District offices under the Dallas Region are located at Dallas, Amarillo, Fort Worth, San Antonio, Houston and New Orleans.

## Three Local Soldiers Start Basic Training In Antiaircraft Artillery

FORT BLISS, TEXAS (Spec.)—Three soldiers of the Goldthwaite area recently began eight weeks of basic training in the Antiaircraft Artillery Replacement Training Center at Ft. Bliss, Texas.

They are Pvt. Wilburn H. Miller, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Miller of Goldthwaite, Texas, and Pvt. Bobby L. Wilcox, son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Wilcox, Route 1, Goldthwaite, Texas, and Pvt. Johnny R. H. Henkes, son of Mrs. O. M. Henkes of Goldthwaite, Texas.

All will spend the first eight weeks of basic training on fundamental Infantry subjects like army drill, rifle, machine gun, and a book a marksmanship, and familiarization with army technical subjects. This first phase of training is climaxed with a one-week maneuver in the field.

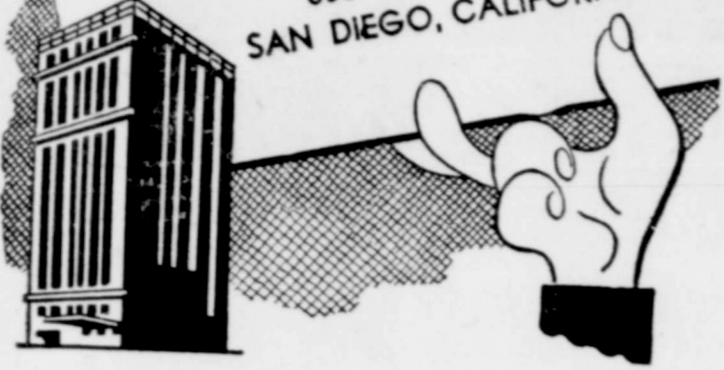

**CUTTING FARM COSTS**

Farmers who are faced with the problem of increasing farm operational costs may be able to lower them by using improved fertilizer and other cultural practices.

Investigations and experiments show that improved practices, as compared with farm practices currently used, can cut the cost of producing a bushel of wheat from \$1.65 to \$1.28, of oats from 90 cents to 89 cents, and of corn from \$1.21 to \$1.02. Recommended practices also lowered the cost of producing a ton of alfalfa-brome grass hay from \$16.80 to \$13.30 and a ton of sugar beets from \$11.21 to \$8.19. All this means more profit to the farmer.

The recommended practices which are best suited for particular areas may be obtained from county agricultural agents or the Texas Extension Service. Researchers have found that it is necessary to spend more money per acre to follow proved practices but the resulting greater per-acre yields more than offset the extra expense.

An example can be found in the production of corn in a midwestern state. Where the farmer spends \$46 an acre to produce 39 bushels of corn, he could spend \$62.25 an acre and produce 61 bushels of corn on each acre.

Fertilizer plays a big role in this increase. Other factors are involved such as timely planting, use of adapted varieties of seed, seed treatment, crop rotation, soil management, tillage and weed control. Each of these help lower production

costs. While Texas is a leading producer of many commodities, such as cotton, it is an uncomfortable fact that it ranks low in actual per-acre yields. We have enough land to produce tremendous amounts of crops, but we are not taking full advantage of the soil's capacity to produce per acre.

In these days of high production costs, it is definitely to the farmer's advantage to practice every known measure to increase his per-acre productivity and assure himself of more gain for effort expended.

### Brown-Mills Soil Conservation News

A deferred range this summer can pay a dividend this winter. This is what D. R. Edgington, four miles south of Goldthwaite, found. Mr. Edgington deferred a pasture last summer and was well pleased with the results he obtained.

This spring it was easy to tell the pasture that had been deferred. More litter was present in the pasture, the choice grasses were more noticeable, and grasses such as Sidecoats gamma and Little bluestem had old seed stalks from which seed had been produced. These conditions are signs of range improvement.

If you are planning a summer deferment this year, the month of July is a good time to take the stock off the pasture. Stock

should not be returned to the pasture until the choice grasses have seeded.

Al T. Langford, L. D. Hollingshead, and Vance Cornelius have recently finished constructing field terraces on their farms. These terraces were built as a part of the conservation plan that each made on his farm. Langford built three miles of terraces, Hollingshead and Cornelius built one mile each.

Otto Singleton of Mullin is constructing a diversion terrace on his farm west of Mullin.

## PARENT PROBLEMS

### Religious Interest Is Greater Than Ever

By GARRY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D.  
LEADERS of the various religious faiths in the United States seem to agree that organized religion here has never been healthier.

Fifty-nine per cent of our population claims religious affiliation, the highest ever reported. (Of course, that still leaves 41%.) Membership in U. S. churches has risen almost 70% in a generation, outstripping the population increase two to one. There's a record program for church and synagogue construction for 1954. The big religious bodies are in 1954 financial shape. Contributions toward religious work are increasing.

#### Interest in Religion

There's a growing interest among laymen in religious education and participation in day-to-day work of church and synagogue. More youths are preparing for religious service and leadership. Most of the seminaries of the three leading faiths—Jewish, Catholic, Protestant—are operating at full capacity. They are crowded with the kind of young men the secular world competes for. It appears, too, that the proportion of returning G.I.'s entering the "ministry" is rising. And more religious books are being read. Best seller lists are crowded month after month with religious themes.

From various surveys reported in the public press, it doesn't seem that man's faith in God has suffered any crippling blow in the last few decades from the horrors of war, discoveries of

science, or the encroachment of materialism.

As nearly as I can learn, all the three leading faiths feel that their belief in God and worship of Him, and their basic emphasis on the individual as a precious person, provide the greatest possible armor against the godlessness of Communism; that, moreover, the growing brotherhood among these religious faiths is helping strengthen our democracy. While there has been no spectacular religious revival, there seems to have been a healthy growth of religious intentions and concerns.

A very significant movement by Protestants, Catholics and Jews in recent decades has been the growing leadership and activity by laymen of the various churches and synagogues.

In any community, regardless of the sect or faith, when many of the members of a congregation freely invite their neighbors not regularly attending elsewhere, to their respective religious services, and make them warmly welcome there, a newer and more enduring mode of evangelism is operating. When a layman thus becomes a real assistant to his rabbi, pastor or priest, this layman grows spiritually himself, and if he has children whose affection and esteem he has won, his whole family grows likewise.

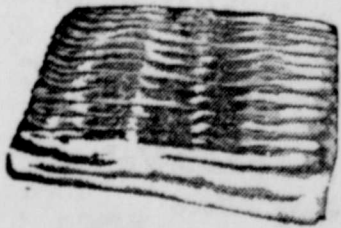
