Arms Aid Alone Won't Stop Red Drive, Belief | U. S. Planning Accent On Freer World Trade

WASHINGTON—Eisenhower administration officials are drawing up multi-billion dollar plans to keep the Communists from making hay out of economic and political instability in the underdeveloped areas of the world. As a result, United States trade and foreign aid policies will no longer be geared so closely to military needs.

The experts have come to the conclusion that arms alone will not stop the Reds—that the Communist danger is not so much armed aggression as it is internal subversion. We poured billions of dollars worth of military aid into Indochina, the advisors point out, and it didn't do us much good.

The Communists shipped arms to their friends in Guatemala, the advisors add, and the Reds still were driven out. So the great emphasis from now on will be on economic and technical assistance—money to build roads and factories and to produce power, as well as the scientific know-how required. Great stress will also be laid on freer world trade. Tariffs will go down, making it easier for foreigners to buy American products and for Americans to buy theirs. All this will be expensive to the United States taxpayers. No administration expert denies this. However, they say, it's still a lot less costly than would be war—or seeing more and more of the free world go under to Communism.

● MARTIN'S ARITHMETIC—House Speaker Joseph Martin (R), Massachusetts, points out that since the turn of the century, the United States has experienced 26 years of Republican and 27 years of Democratic administration in Washington. Martin said his arithmetic shows that Republicans in their 26 years spent \$186 billion. He said Democrats in 27 years spent \$821 billion.

● JET AGE—The Air Force and Pentagon brass are anything but happy these days over the small number of applicants to the new Air Force academy at Colorado Springs, Colo. This is pointed out in the semi-official Army-Navy-Air Force Journal which notes that there have been only about 500 applicants to the new academy when the Air Force hoped to select 300 from at least 50,000 applicants. The Journal considers the lagging number of applicants as the "newest evidence of jet-age flying apathy." It goes on to say that "the lack of applications appears directly related to persistent difficulties the Air Force and other services have been having in recent years to obtain qualified volunteers for flying training."

● BLOODY BUT UNBOWED—Army Secretary Robert T. Stevens continues to insist that he has no intention of resigning as a result of his long and bitter hassle with Senator Joseph R. McCarthy. Much undoubtedly will depend, however, on what the Senate does when it reconvenes, Nov. 8, to debate the pending resolution to censure the junior GOP senator from Wisconsin. Senate Action Watched
If McCarthy emerges unscathed from that fracas, Stevens might well change his mind and quit the so-called "little cabinet." However, asked at a recent news conference whether he plans to change occupations, Stevens grinned and quipped, "The picture didn't look like it, did it?" That was a reference to a news photo of President Eisenhower, Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway, Army chief of staff, and Stevens. All three were laughing.

The Star Tigers met the Mullin Bulldogs on the Bulldog field last Friday night in a conference game which produced a hard fought game won by the Mullin Bulldogs by a score of 32-27.

Those making the touchdown on the Bulldog team were two runs by Lee from the two yard

line which gave the Bulldogs the lead. The third touchdown was made by a pass from Davidson to Joe Reeves for a 10 yard gain and touchdown. Edgar succeeded in kicking the extra two points. The fourth touchdown was run over by Davidson from the Tigers' five yard line. Clinton Chesser ran the fifth and final touchdown of the evening from the Tigers' 15 yard line.

Star Tigers made the first touchdown on a fumble by the Bulldogs. The extra point was made good by a drop kick by

Now most of it is sold to consumers in bread, cakes, pies and other bakery products. The number of persons at work in preparing and marketing farm food products back in 1932 was estimated at over 3 million. Last year it had increased to nearly 5 million workers. Included were persons engaged in assembling, processing, wholesaling, retailing and transporting farm products. In the past two years, we have seen farmer income gradually drop. Normally, the consumer would expect food costs drop accordingly. However, in most cases, wages and costs of processing foods has increased and this higher cost has been passed on to the purchaser while the farmer actually got less for his raw product. If the housewife were to abandon "specialty" foods and prepackaged goods, and depend upon her own kitchen skill to convert "raw" farm products into family meals, then she would find her costs would be lowered correspondingly with the farmer's profit.

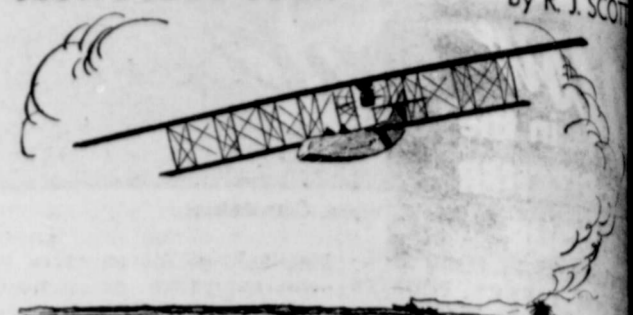

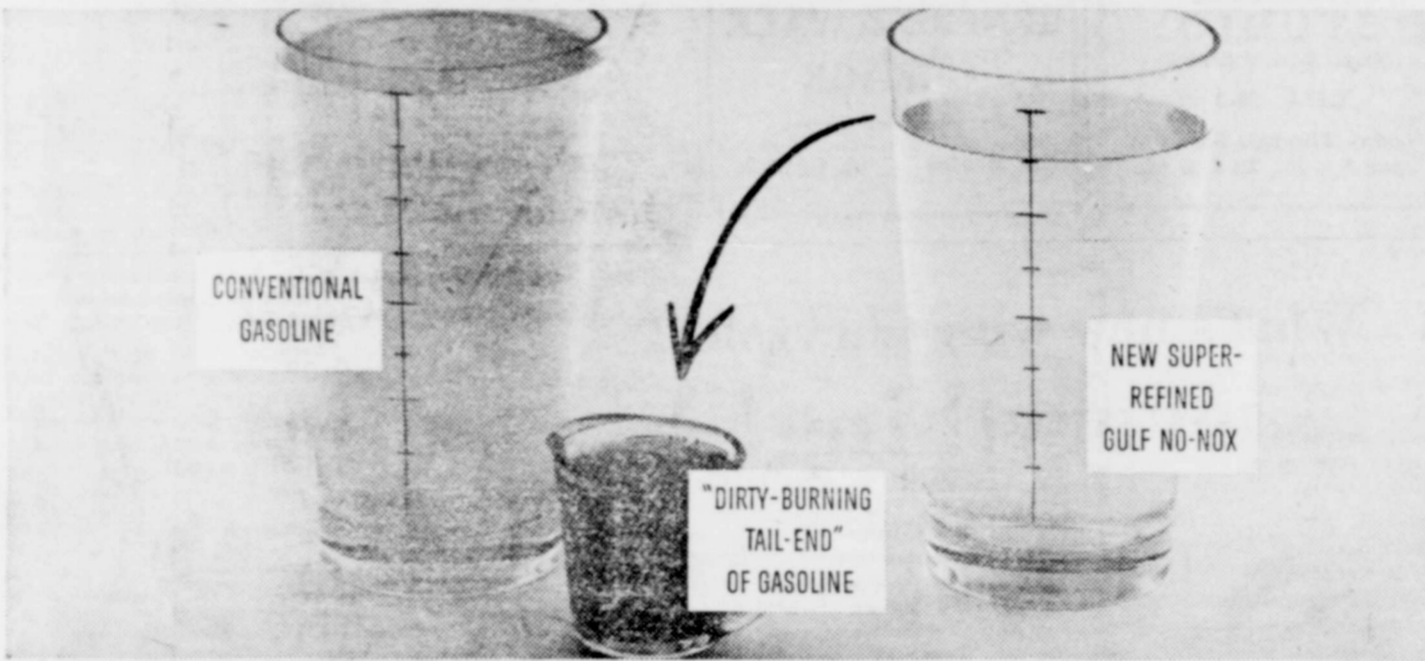

Tasty Foreign Recipes

By ALICE DENHOFF

IN RECENT weeks, we have enjoyed an excited exchange of recipes wheeled out of hostesses and restaurant folk back from junkets to Europe, Mexico and Canada.

Chicken, Mountain Style

Some friends were fortunate enough to be house guests in France, and they have come home with wonderful recipes carefully adjusted to our own way of doing things.

One of these was Chicken Mountain Style.

To serve 4, select a good-sized but young rooster, weighing about 4-4½ lb. Cut into small meaty pieces (wherever possible, remove superfluous bones, wing tips, etc.).

Beat 2 eggs with an amount of water that 2 half egg shells will hold. Salt and pepper chicken thoroughly, then dip in egg so that all parts are moistened. Allow to remain for 1 hr. Then roll each piece in egg crumbs.

Place in well-buttered casserole and cover. Bake in top section of

oven at 350° F. for 1½ hr.

When tender, remove, place under broiler and brown, if chicken is not already as brown as desired. Serve with parsley and lemon quarters.

Lamb Cutlets

Lamb Cutlets, Milanese style, is another foreign recipe.

Trim superfluous fat from 4 lamb chops, or cutlets from leg of lamb; season. Mix ½ c. sifted bread crumbs and ½ c. Parmesan type cheese, grated. Dip chops in this mixture, then in 1 well beaten egg. Sprinkle with ¼ c. melted butter, and cook under slow broiler until done.

Tasty Salad

One traveler says that she is going in for the substantial salad that she found served at so many restaurants in Paris. It is basically a potato salad, enriched with hard-cooked eggs, spiced with onion and meat such as snippets of veal or tongue, well peppered and dressed with oil and vinegar. In season, lettuce is added.

Brown-Mills Soil Conservation News

Now that some moisture has been received, many farmers and ranchers on the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District will begin planting their cover crops. To get help on the cropland of any given farm the local A. S. C. office asks that you bring the sales slip from the purchase of legume and fertilizer to their

office and get reimbursed in part for your purchase. December 15 is the dead line for this.

A hint in inoculating legume seed might be passed along here. Many farmers have found the use of skim milk valuable in getting the inoculant to stick to legume seed. Instead of using water to mix inoculant, use skim milk. The milk not only causes the inoculant to stick better but is thought to

furnish some food for the bacteria thereby getting more assurance of good inoculation.

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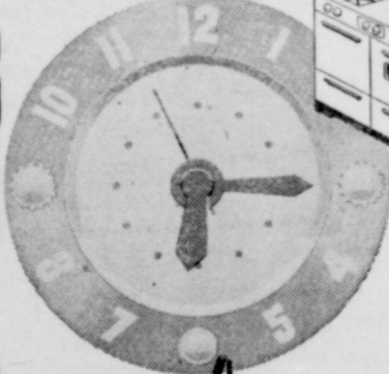

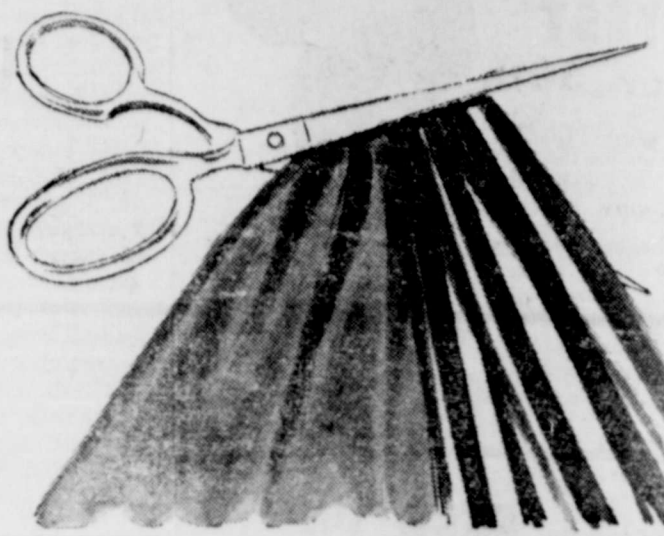

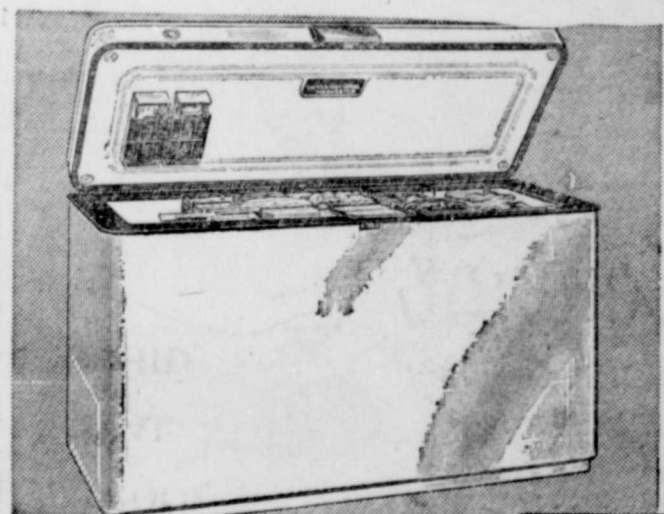
