

> Drilling rig was moved on location, one and one-half miles south of Goldthwaite, last week when operation on the new test were started.

The test is slated for a depth of 1,800 feet with rotary tools. Location is 150 feet from the north and 900 feet from the west lines of G. W. Riddell Survey.

County Hardware





Arms Aid Alone Won't Stop Red Drive, Belief

WASHINGTON-Eisenhower administration officials are drawing up multi-billion dollar plans to keep the Communists from making hay out of economic and political instability in the underdeveloped areas of the world. As a result, United States trade and foreign aid policies will no longer be geared so closely to military needs.

The experts have come to the conclusion that arms alone will not stop the Reds-that the Communist danger is not so much armed



aggression as it is internal subversion. We poured billions of dollars worth of military aid into Indochina, the advisors point out, and it didn't do us much good.

. JET AGE-The Air Force and Pentagon brass are anything but happy these days over the small number of applicants to the new Air Force academy at Colorado Springs, Colo. This is pointed out in the semi-official Army-Navy-Air Force Journal which notes that there have been only about 500 applicants to the new academy when the Air Force hoped to select 300 from at least 50,000 applicants.

The Journal considers the lagging number of applicants as the "newest evidence of jet-age flying apathy." It goes on to say that "the lack of applications appears directly related to persistent diffi-culties the Air Force and other services have been having in recent years to obtain qualified volunteers for flying training.

• BLOODY BUT UNBOWED-Army Secretary Robert T. Stevens continues to insist that he has no intention of resigning as a result of his long and bitter hassle with Senator Joseph R.

McCarthy. Much undoubtedly will depend, however, on what the Senate does when it reconvenes, Nov. 8, to debate the pending resolution to censure the junior GOP senator from Wisconsin.

If McCarthy emerges unscathed from that fracas, Stevens might well change his mind and quit the so-called "little cabinet." However, asked at a recent news conference whether he plans to change occupations, Stevens grinned and quipped, "The picture didn't look like it, did it?"

That was a reference to a news photo of President Eisenhower Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway, Army chief of staff, and Stevens. All three were laughing.


