Mistletoe Packing And Shipping To Get Underway Here Next Week

The annual central Texas Mistletoe Pack, for the Christmas Holiday season, will get underway here next week, according to announcement by Wilford Schuster of the Circle X Mistletoe Boys. He stated that packing and shipping is expected to be in full swing by the week of December 5th, and will continue for two weeks, or until about December 17.

Goldthwaite will again be headquarters for the packing and shipping operation which will be located at the Agriculture Barn. Approximately 50 women will be employed for assembly line grading and packing. Buying stations for receiving mistletoe will be located in San Saba, Priddy, Hamilton, Menard, Marlin and Goldthwaite. Mistletoe purchased in stations outside Goldthwaite will be brought here for processing. In announcing plans for the

This change, he said, is being made so that they may supply the market with 24 hour fresher mistletoe. By adopting this schedule they will be able to gather and bring fresh mistletoe from their receiving stations to the local plant and pack it daily for airline shipments during early morning hours.

The Circle X Mistletoe Boys expect to process 110 thousand pounds of mistletoe this season. Four hundred thousand one and one-half ounce, special holiday packages, will be packed for Patricia Murphy Company of Detroit, Michigan. Seventy thousand pounds will be processed and shipped in bulk with twenty thousand going to a packing firm in New York.

Missionary To New Guinea To Speak At Priddy Church Next Wednesday

Rev. Albert C. Frerichs, missionary to New Guinea, will speak in Zion Lutheran Church, Priddy, Texas on Dec. 1 at 7:00 p.m., o'clock.

Rev. Frerichs, a native of Talmage, Nebraska, is the son of Mrs. Fred Frerichs of that town. A missionary of the American Lutheran Church, Rev. Frerichs has returned to the United States on furlough from his work in New Guinea.

After being graduated with honors from St. Olaf College, Northfield, Minn., he attended Wartburg Seminary, Dubuque, Iowa. Following his graduation from the theological school he served as pastor in Lincoln and Hidreth, Nebraska. In 1937 he accepted a call to serve as foreign missionary in New Guinea. Upon arriving in New Guinea, Missionary Frerichs worked on Karkar Island, off the coast of Madong. In 1940 he was assigned to the new station in the Central Highlands known as Raipinka. His work there was short-lived however, due to the Japanese invasion of his part of New Guinea in 1943. He was evacuated and escaped the capture and death visited on other missionaries of the Lutheran Church.

During the war, Rev. Frerichs took some advance studies and served as home missionary in various California locations. In 1943 he was married to Miss Sylvia Fritz of Albert Lea, Minn. After his return to New Guinea in 1946 he was again assigned to Raipinka and was instrumental in establishing a strong native

congregation there. It is a vital part of the native church, which now numbers more than 130,000 members. Over 100 missionaries from the United States, Canada, Australia, and Germany serve in Lutheran Mission New Guinea.

Rev. and Mrs. Frerichs are the parents of four children: David, 10, Catherine, 9, Angela, 6, and Jonathan, 4. The missionary is now speaking in many churches on his work in New Guinea. The public is cordially invited to attend when he speaks in Zion Lutheran Church, Priddy, on December 1 at 7:00 p.m., o'clock.

Postmaster Announces Program For Christmas Card And Parcel Deliveries

Postmaster Lucile Fairman today announced a three-point program designed to insure delivery of all Christmas cards and parcels by December 25.

"This will leave elbow room at the Post Office to process the tremendous volume of holiday mail we'll be handling and I'm quite sure it will exceed the volume we handled last Christmas," the Postmaster warned.

Point 2, also requires the full cooperation of the public. Begin now by checking your Christmas card list—this week. Each address should include the full name, street and number, city, and state and the zone number if that is known.

After this, visit the Post Office and order the stamps you'll need and be sure to lay in a good supply of heavy wrapping paper and strong twine as well. Then there will still be a week left for leisurely Christmas shopping—a New Year's resolution you can keep!

Finally the Post Office itself has moved into high gear. Temporary employees have been sworn in and all ink wells filled, so just do your part and remember that all gift packages should be mailed before or by December 5, and all cards at least a week before Christmas.

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Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Televising of Presidential Press Conferences Near? Some Technical, Political Problems Must Be Solved

Special to Central Press WASHINGTON—Presidential press conferences will eventually be televised for the world to see and hear.

When such press conferences will begin neither Hagerty nor other members of the White House staff will venture to make any guess.

The advisability of broadcasting and televising the presidential press conferences has been debated by White House advisors and Republican leaders since President Eisenhower was swept into office in 1952.

A favorable decision has been held up by technical and political considerations. The industry, fully aware of the benefits it will derive from this radical innovation, is confident it can solve all of the technical problems.

The industry expects soon to produce a micro-phonized phone no bigger than a matchbox. Hidden on his desk and with nothing to obstruct his view, it is thought that President Eisenhower will then be able to talk in the casual, intimate, informal manner in which he always appears at his best.

Republican leaders have given the political considerations the most careful study. The possible advantages and disadvantages have been weighed from every angle.

"If the press conferences are televised," says Hagerty, "there'd always be the danger that the national committee—be it Democratic or Republican—might plant certain questions to be asked. Knowing that these conferences would be televised, there would be this temptation. There would be the possibility of turning the press conferences into political circus—and that would be highly undesirable."

What effect will televised press conferences have on the newspaper representatives, knowing their every word and action will be observed by millions, including the publishers who pay their salaries?

The President now enjoys the most pleasant relations with the Washington correspondents, including the representatives of his most partisan opponents. Will television in any way change these press relations?

While Hagerty made no mention of these considerations, others have raised the question of the possibility of some of the now anonymous White House correspondents developing into actors for television and radio. Will any of them be tempted, as have some politicians, to "ham it up" before the cameras and microphones?

A CAREFULLY PLANNED and complex operation is behind every broadcast of the chief executive. "The networks have a committee of liaison men in Washington, with a new chairman every three months," Hagerty points out. "I keep him informed of important White House events to be covered either live or by tape or news-reel and tell him what day and hour we would like reserved for us. I give him from one to three weeks' notice, except in emergencies."

The network men then contact their home offices and find out what time the chains have available. Then the White House makes its choice.

"We haven't as yet hit on a workable formula for handling the press conferences," Hagerty concludes. "However, in view of the many technological advances being made, we shall, in fact, some of the President's answers to questions of White House reporters are actually on the air today. The fact is that we have released more tape recordings of the President's spoken words to radio and television than any other administration."

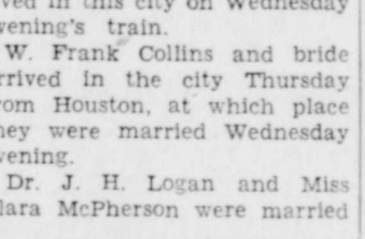

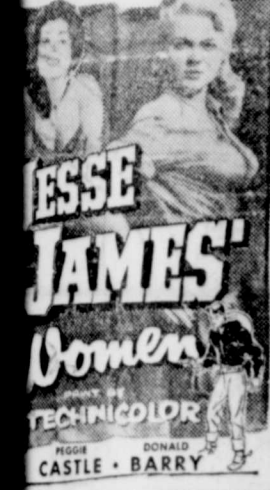

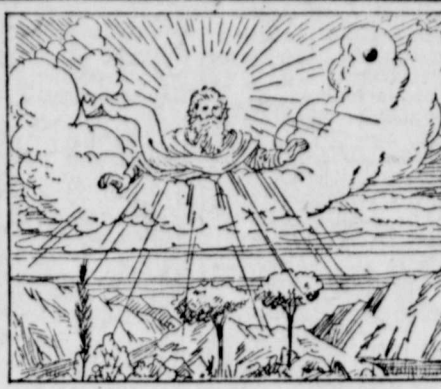

EMPHASIS ON QUALITY

Marked increases in the per capita consumption of eggs over the past few years has been accompanied by an increase in demand for a quality product.

Some of the fault lies in the failure on the part of the egg producers to follow practices to maintain quality.

Confining the laying flock is a time tested practice of farm management known to result in greater production and more high quality eggs.

Providing clean, dry floor litter and clean nesting material are two practices which help provide more A quality eggs.

Gathering eggs at least three times a day is a necessary practice in the production of top quality.

Collecting and cooling eggs in wire baskets permits free circulation of air to cool eggs rapidly before they are packed in cases and reduces the chance of quality deterioration.

Cooling eggs before packing, keeping them cool, and maintaining proper humidity are practices which go hand in hand.

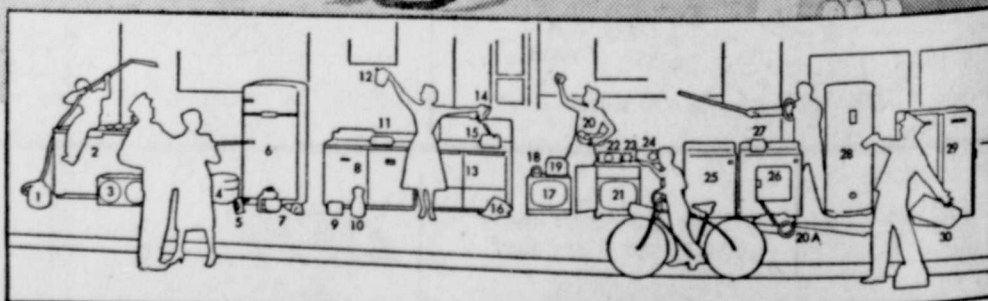

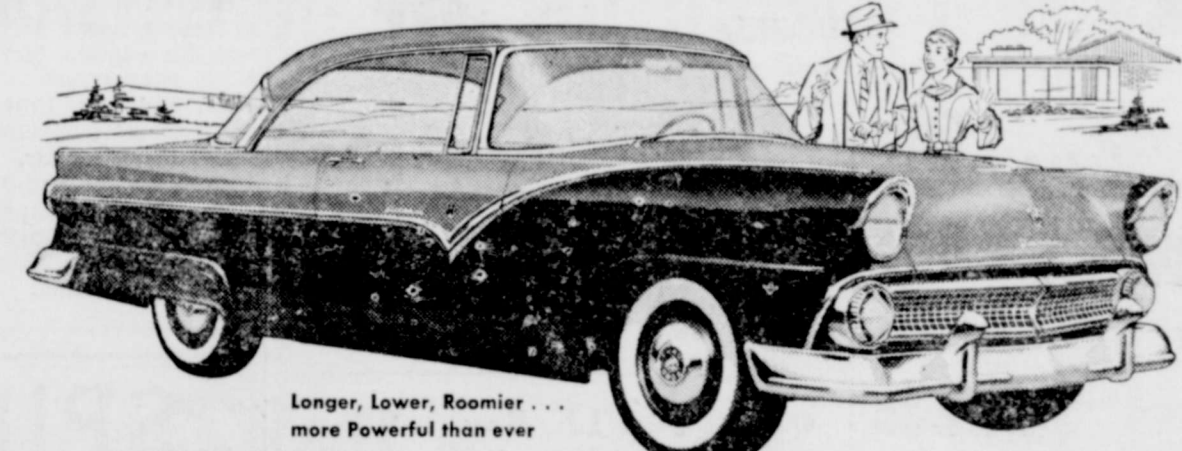

Brown-Mills Soil Conservation News

By CHARLES HAENISCH

Holding water where it falls has become a major objective for many farmers and ranchers in the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District. The loss of rainfall through runoff on rangeland is becoming alarming to the landowners in this District. An average of only 1.2 inches of rain on the Bennett Creek Watershed caused the Creek to rise over five feet. Moisture penetrations on the Lee Walton farm in the Bennett Creek watershed made after this 1.2 inches rain showed that on a bare area in the pasture the rainfall only penetrated four and one-half inches. Not more than ten feet away in the same pasture on an area that had a good grass cover, the moisture penetrated to the depth of 26 inches.

Rangeland that will not allow the rainfall to "soak in" has made the shortage of cover very apparent. A one to two inch rain with most of the water running to the creeks has proven that a shortage of cover can be a costly thing.

"At least three billion tons of solid materials are washed out of the fields and pastures of the United States each year by water erosion alone. It has been figured that to move such a bulk of American soil on rails would take a train of freight cars 475,000 miles long—long enough to girdle the planet 18 times at the Equator."—To Hold This Soil.

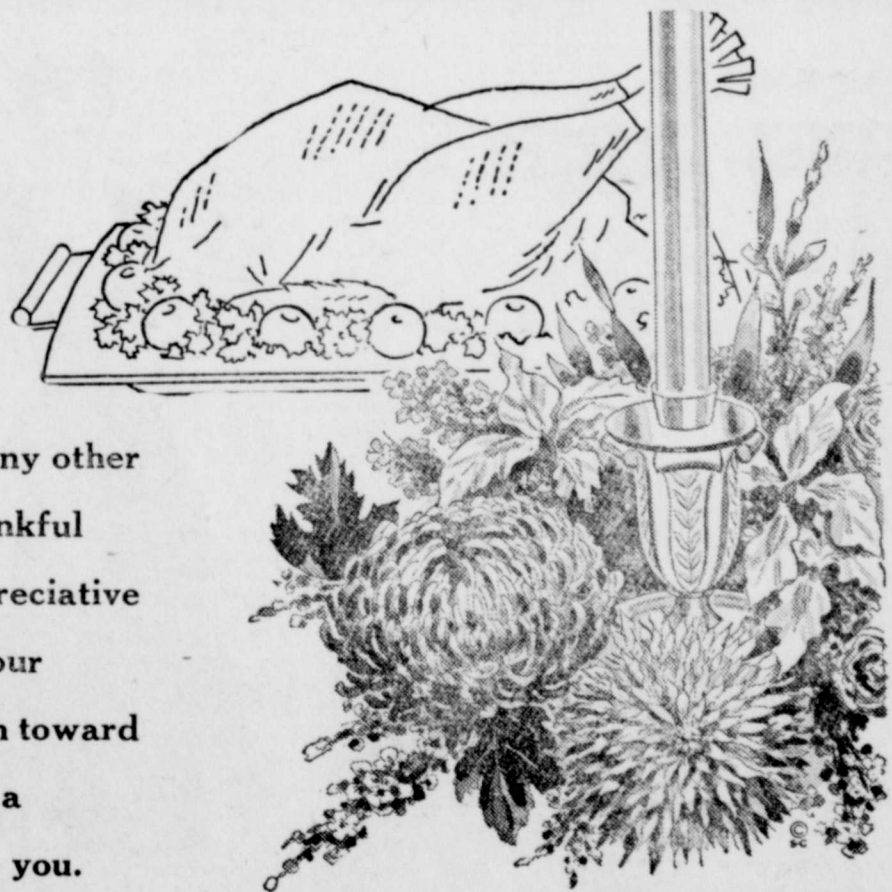

Eight Point Plan To Aid Taxpayer Make Out Own Income Tax Return

District Director of Internal Revenue Service, Ellis Campbell, Jr., announced today an extensive 8 part plan to educate taxpayers to correctly prepare their own tax returns.

- This program is as follows:
1. Provide through newspaper explanations and pictures information on how to prepare tax returns.
 2. Provide, in cooperation with TV stations, television demonstrations and instructions on how to file a tax return while watching the TV program.
 3. Provide technical assistance to newspapers to answer taxpayers' questions through tax question and answer columns.
 4. Provide technical assistance and speakers to radio and TV stations to answer questions on radio and TV programs.
 5. Hold 3-day Internal Revenue Service schools for key employees from large companies, army camps, and government agencies on how to prepare re-

turns and answer employees' tax questions. These key employees will answer questions and assist plant employees in preparing their returns or in solving their income tax problems.

6. Contact civic, professional and other organization in North Texas and make available to them one of the technical tax men that have been specifically trained to speak before such groups on preparing income tax returns.
7. Establish taxpayer assistance days at local offices. Taxpayers' questions will be answered. Taxpayers having simple returns will be given group education and assistance in how to prepare their own returns. The taxpayer will actually prepare his own return, following the Internal Revenue instructor's directions.
8. Taxpayers who cannot read or write, or who are physically unable to assist themselves, will be given individual assistance.

News About Social Security

An additional number of household workers (maids, cooks, etc.) are brought under the social security law after 1954. Under the old law only household employees who worked on 24 days or more in a calendar quarter for an employer were covered by social security.

Under the new law, beginning January 1, 1955, a domestic employee will get social security credit for her work for any household employer who pays her \$50.00 or more in cash wages in a calendar quarter. A calendar quarter is a 3 month period beginning January 1, April 1, July 1, and October 1.

The Austin Social Security Office has a new pamphlet explaining this added feature of the 1954 Amendments to the
